Now it's three months of free weekend parking

popular scheme to waive weekend car parking charges in the run-up to Christmas, which the council has operated for the last three years, is set to be extended to cover weekend parking for the whole of the three months November 2011 to January 2012.

For every weekend from 5/6 November to 29/29 January 2012, parking will be free at all 38 council car parks where charges normally apply. The concession also includes charges for on-street parking.

Parking charges will be suspended from 8am on the Saturday to 8am the following Monday. Pay and display machines in the council's car parks and on-street parking locations will be clearly marked to let people know there are no charges for these weekends.

Councillor Stephen Parnaby OBE, leader of the council, said: "We know how well received the Christmas period free parking has been and now I am pleased to extend the scheme for the whole of the Christmas and New Year shopping period.

"The council is conscious of the financial pressures people are under at this time and free parking will help lighten their load and

everyone who wants to do their shopping in the East Riding.

"The scheme will also be of real and tangible benefit to local businesses which are facing extremely difficult trading conditions. Free weekend parking is a way the council can help fight the economic downturn."

The council cabinet is set to confirm the free parking proposal at its meeting on 18th October. An evaluation will later be carried out to see how successful the extended period of free parking has been.




Ladies of Cottingham Red Cross say "Thank You"

At the Parish Council Meeting Councillors felt it was important that they find out for themselves how residents feel about the proposals and plan to hold a public meeting in the near future where you will all be invited to air your views. Once plans are made we will publicise the date and venue in the noticeboards, the library, Customer Services and on our website.

Snow and Ice - Be Prepared!

It seems that we have only just said goodbye to summer and we are already being warned of snow and wintry conditions to come. The Parish Council has been having discussions with ERYC on how we can help our residents cope in the event of similar conditions to last year. Your local retailers are keen to help and the Parish Council is currently in the process of providing rock salt to retailers in the village to help them keep their shop frontages accessible in snowy and icy conditions. We are also investigating whether it would be practical and economical to hire a contractor to keep the pavements around the centre of the village clear to enable residents to access the shops for supplies during a prolonged spell of bad weather. Watch this space!

New Bus Shelter - The Parkway

Finally – after many years of trying by Ward Councillors and the Parish Council – we have a new bus shelter on The Parkway. Responsibility for the maintenance of this shelter has been passed to the Parish Council from ERYC but they have only allowed the Council very limited funds to carry out any repair work that might be needed in the future. Please be vigilant and report any vandalism immediately to the Parish Council Office so that we can keep this shelter in good condition.

Beverley Theatre Company to peform "Blithe Spirit" at the **Beverley Memorial Hall**

The Beverley Theatre Company will be staging their first production of the 2011/12 season when they perform the farce, 'Blithe Spirit', at the Memorial Hall, Lairgate, Beverley, from Wednesday, 9-12 November at 7.30pm.

The play, written by Noel Coward, was first performed in the 1940's and centres around the aftermath of a dinner party at which the host arranges a séance for entertainment and to provide research for his new book. However, he gets a bit more than he bargained for as the evening has a surprising and chaotic outcome.

First staged in 1941 at the Opera House in Manchester, this comedy is billed as 'an improbable farce' in which the central characters hold a séance that unleashes a plot full of laughs and surprises. The story centres on Charles Condomine, played by Anthony Musgrave in his first role with the Beverley Theatre Company. Charles is a writer who holds a dinner party for his friends Dr Bradman and his wife, as well as the eccentric local clairvoyant Madame Arcati, played by Kate Henderson, from whom he hopes to pick up a few tricks for his new book. Charles believes that Madame Arcati is a harmless fraud, but that he will get a few good stories along the way. However, to his shock, the medium is better at her work than he had bargained for and the Condomine's house soon has another visitor much to the annoyance of Charles' second wife Ruth, played by Pamela Day. Chris Dunnachie and Helen Wild play the Bradmans whilst Charles' first wife Elvira is played by Yvonne Parkinson.

Finding your family tree and some useful websites

o what do you enjoy using your computer for? As mentioned last month, we'll take a look. Sandra has always had an interest in family history, so much so that she became a voluntary secretary of East Yorkshire Genealogical Services that quotes on its website as being a 'refreshingly different type of Family History organization'. So if you're interested in researching your local roots, then take a look.

There are masses of resources available to anyone online, and even if you don't have your own computer you can just pop into the local library and use one of theirs! The 1911 census is available (plus many earlier ones), there's Ancestry.co.uk, and libraries are always good places to find practical help and advice.

Now here are some Windows 7 hints and tips (many will work in Vista too)

Want to do a quick calculation on screen? Click the Start button (or hit the Windows key) and type calc and press enter. Et voila, Calculator will appear. The only keys that are different here are: * means multiply, and\means divide.

Want to find a folder or file quickly? Click the Start button (or hit the Windows key) and type the first few letters of the name and you will see a suggested list appear, just click on the one you want to open.

Have a few applications open and want to switch between them? Hold down the Windows key with your thumb and hit the Tab key with your finger, to scroll them around your screen, and let go when the one you want comes to the front.

Want to check the exact time? Go online and search GMT. This top result should be wwp.greenwichmeantime.com and that will give you the exact time. Synchronize watches!

Amazon Kindle has been a very popular eBook reader for some time now. Latest news is that there is to be a colour screen version called Kindle Fire that you may have seen on TV recently. It's launching in the USA this month with a price tag of just \$199. This is very much based on using online content, like magazines etc., rather than just books, and promises a lot, particularly speedy browsing! It will be interesting to see when it will be launched here and at what price.

ESET has now released version 5 of its popular anti virus product too. Those using version 4 can upgrade free by going to www.eset.co.uk and click on download, and choose the product you have your subscription for. You will also need your username and

password provided at the time of purchase, and usually stored in the My Documents folder. Users of other security products can download a free 30 day trial, but remember to uninstall the old one first.

Can train technology reinvent the wheel? An interesting article on the BBC Technology website shows some revolutionary ideas for transport, some of which are in use already.

Google Chrome and Mozilla Firefox I have mentioned before as alternative ways of browsing the internet. Another one to add to that list is Opera, which has been recently relaunched and includes a 'turbo' button to detect slow connections and download webpages in a much faster way. (This is a technology similar to that built into in the Kindle Fire mentioned above). I have given this latest Opera a test run and it does seem to be quite speedy, Download it free from www.opera.com

Questions and answers section:

Q: My ESET anti virus is expiring soon, what can I do?

A: Just phone us for the discounted renewal figure, and we can action it for you. You have up to 30 days from the expiry date to renew, and it's the same price as online!

Q: How can I clear out my old deleted emails?

A: Just right click on the deleted items folder, and click empty (or permanently delete.

Q: When copying or deleting files or folders, how can I select (highlight) more than one?

A: Click on the first one, then hold down the Ctrl key and click on any others you require, in any order. If you want a batch that are all together, click the first one, then hold down the shift key, and click the last one. You need a steady hand for this so that you don't end up opening or duplicating by mistake!







British Sausage Week

31st October - 6th November 2011

hilst the British can't take credit for having invented the sausage, they do hold a special place in the hearts of many Britons. There's even a British Sausage Appreciation Society which boasts over 7,000 members.

According to the Agriculture and Horticulture Development Board Meat Services, 90% of British households buy sausages, 50% at least every four weeks, every day, five million Britons will eat sausages but despite being known world-wide for their wonderful cooked breakfasts which often include sausages, 46% of the total amount of pork sausages consumed are eaten in the evening.

Favourite British Sausages

Although there is thought to be over 470 recipes and flavours for sausages in the UK, plain pork sausages are the ones people buy most often especially for use in recipes such as toad-in-the-hole. However, many of the regional speciality sausages have now become popular throughout the country. Some of the favourites which are readily available in many supermarkets include:-

Cumberland

A pork sausage seasoned with a variety of herbs and spices but predominantly pepper and made in a continuous spiral. It is traditionally sold by length rather than weight

Yorkshire

A pork sausage flavoured predominantly with pepper, mace, nutmeg and cayenne

Lincolnshire

A herby sausage traditionally made with pork, bread and sage **Pork & apple (West Country)**

A pork sausage often cider or scrumpy and flavoured with sage.

Sausage and Stilton Mash

Ingredients

1kg/2.2lb Potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks

175ml/6fl.oz Milk

100g/4oz Stilton Cheese, grated or crumbled

Salt and Black Pepper

Freshly Grated Nutmeg

675g/11/2 lb Pork Sausages

Instructions

- Preheat the grill to hot. Place the potatoes in a large pan of cold salted water.
 Bring to the boil and cook for 20-25 minutes until very soft. They should start to fall apart and break up.
- 2. Grill the sausages for 15 -20 minutes, turning from time to time to brown evenly.

- 3. Drain the potatoes in a colander and return to the pan, mash with a fork or potato masher until smooth then add the milk, Stilton, salt, pepper and numeg to taste. Beat with a wooden spoon until well blended.
- 4. Serve the sausages with the mashed potato and onion gravy. For traditional Bangers 'n Mash, omit the stilton cheese.

Toad in the hole with Sage Batter and onion gravy

Thick sausages are baked in a light batter which has been flavoured with sage and served with a rich onion and beer gravy

Ingredients

125g plain flour

Salt and pepper

3 eggs

300ml milk

1-2 tbsp sage leaves, finely chopped

6 Thick sausages

For the onion gravy

30g/1oz unsalted butter

2 onions, peeled and sliced

1 sprig of thyme

1 tbsp wholegrain mustard 2tbsp onion gravy granules

150ml beer

300 ml Chicken stock

Salt and pepper

Instructions

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to 220C/425F/Gas 7.
- 2. To make the batter, place the flour into a large bowl and season generously with salt and pepper. Beat the eggs in a separate bowl with a splash of milk. Pour the eggs onto the flour and beat together until smooth. Gradually whisk in the remaining milk until you create a smooth batter. Stir in the chopped sage.
- 3. Sauté the sausages in a hot pan with a little oil for approximately 8-10 minutes, turning occasionally until they are evenly browned. Meanwhile, place a 1 litre ovenproof dish in the oven to heat through.
- 4. Remove the dish from the oven and arrange the sausages into the dish, along with the excess oil. Return to the oven for a few minutes until the dish is piping hot. Pour over the batter so it comes 1/2 of the way up the dish. Return to the oven and cook for 20-25 minutes until golden brown and well risen. Be careful not to overfill the dish as the batter will rise during cooking.
- 5. To make the gravy, heat the butter in a pan and sweat the onions and thyme for 5-6 minutes, until golden.
- 6. Add the wholegrain mustard, gravy granules and stir together. Pour in the beer and allow to reduce by half, then add the beef stock and bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 10-12 minutes until thickened. Season to taste.
- 7. Remove the toad in the hole from the oven, spoon onto serving plates and pour the onion gravy over to serve.

Arctic Rolls

If you're not familiar with (or do not remember) Arctic Rolls, these were a frozen dessert consisting of vanilla ice cream wrapped in a thin sponge which had been spread with jam. They first went on sale in 1958 and by the 1970s became a very popular dessert.

Did you know

Arctic Roll was invented in the 1950s by Dr Ernest Velden, a Czechoslovakian lawyer. Dr Velden fled the Nazis in 1939 and set up an ice cream factory the following year in Eastbourne, Sussex. His invention apparently helped earn him the OBE in 1983!

Eventually sales fell and production was stopped in 1997, however the product was relaunched in December 2008, apparently due to cost-conscious shoppers turning to the frozen treat as a cheaper alternative to fresh or chilled varieties as well as Britons seeking comfort foods in troubled times.

For those of you who can't find Arctic Rolls in your local store, or who don't like buying ready made desserts, here's a recipe explaining how to make your own.

Arctic Roll Recipe

Ingredients
For the Vanilla Ice Cream
300ml/10fl.oz. Double Cream
210ml/7fl.oz. Full Fat Milk
75g/3oz Sugar
1 teasp Vanilla Extract
4 Egg Yolks

For the Sponge

100g/4oz Self Raising Flour 100g/4oz Butter (room temperature) 100g/4oz Sugar 2 Medium Eggs

Other ingredients 2-4 tbsp Raspberry Jam

Instructions

- 1. Place the cream, milk, half the sugar and vanilla extract in a saucepan and heat over a low heat until hot but not boiling.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl mix the egg yolks with the remainder of the sugar until well blended then slowly oour the cream mixture over the egg mixture, stirring constantly.
- 3. Return the mixture to the saucepan and heat gently, stirring constantly, for 5-8 minutes or until the mixture thickens enough to coat the back of a wooden spoon. Once again, do not allow to get too hot or the mixture will curdle.
- 4. Remove from the heat and allow to get completely cold then pour in to your Ice Cream Maker and churn as per the manufacturer's instructions usually between 20-30 minutes.
- 5. Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4 and line a baking sheet with non-stick parchment or baking paper
- 6. Place the butter, sugar, flour and eggs in a large mixing bowl and beat together with a wooden spoon or electric whisk until well mixed and creamy.

- 7. Pour the mixture on to the lined baking sheet and using a palette knife, spread to a depth of no more than 1cm/1/2-inch then bake for 8-12 minutes until the sponge is risen and springy to the touch.
- 8. Meanwhile, once the ice cream has finished churning, turn out on to a tray lined with clingfilm and mould in to a cylinder about 20cm/8-inches long. Wrap well in clingfilm and place in the freezer until ready to serve.
- 9. Once cooked, turn the sponge onto a wire rack and allow to cool.

To assemble the Arctic Roll

- 10. When you are ready to serve, carefully remove the baking paper from the back of the sponge and trim to 20cm/8-inches long and wide enough to just fit around the ice cream cylinder. Spread the jam evenly over the back of the sponge.
- 11. Unwrap the ice cream on to the sponge then using the parchment paper carefully roll the sponge over the ice cream. Remove the paper, cut the roll into slices and serve immediately.

Special Equipment required to make this Arctic Roll Recipe

Ice Cream Maker (optional) Non-stick parchment or baking paper Swiss Roll tin Palette knife

TIPS AND OPTIONS:

If the jam is very stiff/cold, try beating it in a small bowl or warming it up in the microwave for 10 seconds only Use shop bought ice cream to save time

What's the difference between a cookie and a biscuit?

I suppose in truth there isn't a difference however, for some reason in my mind, the word cookie conjures up thoughts of a large, thick, sweet biscuit, with bits of things in them such as chocolate chips rather than dainty little thin biscuits.

Chocolate and Hazelnut Chip Cookies

Ingredients:
75g/3oz Butter
100g/4oz Brown Sugar
50g/2oz Sugar
1 Egg, beaten
150g/5oz Plain Flour
1/4 teasp Salt
1/2 teasp Bicarbonate of Soda
1/2 teasp Vanilla Essence
75g/3oz Chocolate Chips
75g/2oz Hazelnuts, chopped

${\it Instructions}$

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C, 375F, Gas mark 5. Do not bother to grease the baking sheets.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, cream together the butter and sugars until smooth. Sift together the flour, salt and bicarbonate of soda, add to the creamed mixture together with the vanilla essence and eggs. Mix well. Add the chocolate chips and nuts and mix to thoroughly distribute.
- 3. Drop teaspoonfuls of the mixture onto the baking sheets, spacing well apart then bake for 10-12 minutes. Cool on wire racks.

Switch on Night 2011 November 21st Don't Miss It:

his year's switch-on is the 30th anniversary of the famous Cottingham Lights festival, and could very well be the last. Due to the present economical climate and the continuing increase in costs (last years switch-on ceremony cost over £1,000), it is becoming more difficult to raise funds to cover the event.

New features this year include a magnificent new display on the HSBC Bank on the corner of Hallgate and King Street, which has been paid for by donations from the Cottingham Brass Band. The Parish Council has continued it's superb support by providing a grant to enable the complete re-wiring of the Hallgate section of the lights. There will also be numerous new features in Hallgate and King Street along with various stalls, tombola etc.

The Switch On will be as usual compared by Steve Massam and the ceremony performed by the winners of the "Design a Christmas Light Competition" currently being held within the local schools, at 7.00 pm Monday 21st November 2011.

After switch-on night, the lights will be in daily operation from mid-afternoon until early January, but they will be switched on all day on Saturdays and on Christmas Eve.

After year-long planning, installation got underway in October, with Hull-based lifting services firm, Peter Hird and Sons Ltd., of English Street, assisting with hoists. All scaffolding has been donated by Alan and Shirely Reid of B. A. Scaffolding.

Although the displays this year have not changed significantly since 12 months ago, there has been further massive investment in the lights, which have become a crowd-pulling Christmas highlight and placed Cottingham under a bright and colourful spotlight in the much wider East Riding area in the last 30 years.

The hi-tech, energy-saving lamps offer a five-colour sequence change and produce a flowing wave-like effect from the traffic-lights junction to George Street

As well as adding to the spirit of Christmas and the New Year, it is hoped that, as in past years, the illuminations, which are concentrated on the main village-centre shopping areas - and overlooked from the east by the floodlit towering St Mary's parish church - will again attract visitors and shoppers to Cottingham from throughout the Hull and the East Riding region and even further afield

In addition to grants from the Cottingham Parish Council to each of the three sections - King Street and West End, as well as Hallgate - additional money has been raised from a series of regular annual activities.

Carols and other festive-season music, commencing at 6.30pm, will be

provided by Mr. Brown and students from the Cottingham High School on switch-on night when, in addition to a wide variety of side-shows and charity stalls throughout the village, there will be children's fairground rides in Hallgate and on the Market Green, where the trees will be festooned with festive-season lighting.

Street sellers have again been asked to apply for a "Cottingham Lights Official Hawker" badge, and officials have appealed for the public to buy items only from the official hawkers displaying their official badge.

Also making a return this year will be the KCFM Radio's promotional vehicle - and stage - which took part in Cottingham Day 2011 celebrations.

Based outside the Duke of Cumberland Hotel on the Market Green, one of the station's presenters will compere the activities - including music and competitions for which there will be prizes - led by the promotion team, who will mingle with the crowds and also collect money to donate to the lights fund.

"We will interact with the people of Cottingham and our emphasis will be on enhancing what is always a brilliant event", said Sarah Harrison, Marketing and Events Manager for KCFM, which broadcasts to Hull and East Yorkshire

Throughout the afternoon and evening, village-centre road closures and parking restrictions will be in operation. Parking will not be allowed on the Market Green after 3pm. Hallgate will be closed at 5.00 pm and other road closures, from 6pm until 9.30pm, or at the discretion of the police, will be: Hallgate (from Arlington Avenue to West Green); the George Street junction with Hallgate; King Street, from the junction with Finkle Street to Somerfield's car park, which will be open.

There will also be many Craft and other stalls in the Cottingham Civic Hall on the Market Green.

The Cottingham Neighbourhood Policing Team, said that, throughout the event, police officers and PCSOs, in high-visibility uniform, will patrol on foot to provide the public with reassurance and to prevent any public disorder or alcohol-related incidents. The principle intentions are to ensure the safety of persons attending the event and to control the traffic, minimising any inconvenience caused to the general public and other road users.

Officers will deal with any incident promptly and efficiently to minimise disruption to the event and reduce danger to the public, he stressed.



Getting to the bottom of the problem!

That should no day be complete without doing? Well in my case it is squeezing a bottom, a cat's or dog's of course. One of the most common conditions we see is problems with dogs and occasionally cats anal glands. The presenting complaint from the client and dog is of an irritable bottom which causes the dog to shuffle or toboggan on the carpet and perhaps chews at their back end.

So what are anal glands?

Anal glands or sacs are two scent glands either side of the anus at 4 and 8 o'clock and have ducts that empty just inside the anus

What is the function?

Anal glands produce a scented material which fill the gland and this scented material acts as a method of marking and



communication. When dogs, as dogs do, sniff each other's bottom it is the scant from the anal glands they are intrigued by and when dogs pass motions they will squeeze material from the anal glands onto the motions so other dogs will know who has passed by.

What problems can dogs have with their anal glands?

Impacted anal glands are the most common problem. This is when the glands are full and cannot empty causing the dog irritation which results in the dog trying to relieve the problem by rubbing its bottom on the floor. It is solved by the glands being emptied manually. This is a job I never get tired of though I never speak while doing it as I have often been covered in anal gland matter. If your dog has repeated anal gland problems I am sure your veterinary surgeon would be only too happy to teach you how to do it.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if there was some way of preventing the distress to dog, owner and veterinary surgeon? Diet changes have been suggested, some say increase the fibre by adding say bran, others say feed a low residue food but my experience is that neither alters the occurrence of impaction.

One permanent solution is removal of the glands. In experienced surgeons' hands this is a relative straightforward procedure. When the animal is anaesthetised the glands are packed with wax which helps the delicate dissection from the surrounding tissues. My rule of thumb for advising when to remove anal glands is if the glands need expressing more than every three months.

The anal glands can also get infections in them especially if the dog has loose motions. Anal gland infections show as abscesses which burst out from the tissues surrounding the anus. These are very painful and need antibiotic for several weeks to resolve and sometimes even flushing under general anaesthesia. Repeated anal gland infections are another reason to consider removal

Unfortunately anal glands will occasionally develop tumours. These are very frustrating and upsetting as by the time an anal gland tumour is diagnosed even in the earliest stages it has often spread to the local lymph nodes and started to metastasize (spread to other parts of the body). Removal of the gland with the tumour in, as soon as possible is the only option.

A very peculiar bottom disease, very common in German Shepherd Dogs, is anal furunculosis and this can often involve the anal glands as well. This disease is closely related to crohns disease in people and shows a deep tracts in the perianal tissue often connected to the anal glands and can be fatal if not treated promptly. Surgery can be indicated to remove the anal glands and this is followed by medication in the form of powerful immunosuppressive as the disease is thought to be caused by the body attacking its own perianal tissue. The medical treatment has been a recent development which has saved dogs from very invasive surgery.

Some breeds are more prone to anal gland problems than others as Cavalier King Charles Spaniel owners will testify.

So there we are a quick guide to my favourite job as a veterinary surgeon, emptying anal glands.

My South African colleague, Ryan used to call the anal glands anal sacs but his accent has left him embarrassed on more than one occasion so he now reverts to anal glands!

After the flood - a survival guide to home insurance



With the fourth anniversary of the 2007 storm now passed, this disastrous incident is still causing an insurance nightmare for many residents of Hull and its outlying villages such as Cottingham. Refusal of cover, high excesses and, in some cases, refused claims have been the consequences for homeowners in our area. We set out to see how insurers are treating their East Riding customers with local insurance broker, Anne Walters.

Few Insurance firms are better placed to comment on the subject of the 2007 storm than East Riding Insurance broker, Hedon Insurance. With offices in: East Hull, Hedon and Hornsea they insured a sizeable number of the properties affected by the 2007 storm and subsequent floods.

Since 2007, they have been forced to change their approach to property insurance in order to keep their client's cover realistic and effective.

'It was a devastating time. People who we had insured for years saw their homes devastated. Claims systems were in meltdown. Frustration on a grand scale.' recalls Anne Walters.

It still seems amazing, but in a 24 hour period between 25th and 26th June 2007, 100mm (about 4") of rain fell on Hull and the surrounding district, causing devastation to almost 9 000 homes. It was likened at the time to 20 Olympic sized swimming pools falling on the town every second.

In all, as well as closing 90% of the city's schools and affecting the operations of 1300 businesses, some 3000 families were forced out of their homes. 1500 of these were still out of their homes twelve months later and, amazingly, some 300 were still out of their homes two years later!

The cost of property insurance claims locally was enormous, running into hundreds of millions of pounds. It was hardly surprising then that the Scientists' declarations that it was a 'one in a hundred year event' failed to convince the underwriters at most of the UK's insurers that it would be another 96 years before such conditions were seen again!

In the face of such massive claims, it was, perhaps, natural that insurers would view the risk posed by properties in the region differently and that they would need to reflect the recent local claims position in their premiums going forward - and so it was.

'What happened is very difficult for insurers to legislate for going forward' explains Anne Walters 'Floods tend to be caused by high sea levels or rivers and streams breaking their banks – this flooding was caused by a storm and the subsequent failure of the region's drainage system, on a scale never witnessed'

Buyers of insurance now have to be very careful when completing insurance application forms. Insurers often ask questions such as: 'Do you live near water?' or 'has your home ever flooded?' or 'is it free from flooding and in an area free from flooding?' The problem is that a lot of people in this area would have to answer 'yes' to one of those questions now.

And so the problems begin. Failure to disclose a known flood risk is likely to invalidate your property insurance in the event of a claim for flood damage.

'A lot of 'online' insurance quotations will either not ask about flood risk specifically, assuming it as being 'in the negative' in a long list of assumptions that you 'click' to accept, or if a risk of flood is declared they will decline to quote. People who believe that they would be considered to be at risk of flooding need to be very careful when they 'click the box' what they are agreeing to '

'I am usually comfortable with people exerting their freedom of choice to buy their cover from wherever they like – it's a market, after all. However, for people living around here, I would definitely suggest that they stay with local firms to ensure that the person arranging the cover will take into account 'local factors' – such as flooding risks'

The key to getting the best terms for cover that will stand up to the test of a claim is to be absolutely honest when answering all the questions on the insurance proposal form. Do not be tempted not to disclose significant facts (like your house has previously flooded) you'd be surprised what insurers databases can tell them! If you have made a claim previously – remember to mention it and include the important details.

made a huge difference in making things more comfortable for the kids (and my aging back!!). We worked in a clinic (but not as we know it) this year, again an improvement. One room had a sink but the tap was rusted on. This was hastily replaced but blew off after a time and soaked the place. It was a bit like faulty towers at this point. I'm glad that I was in the other room.

This year we had four English dentists but more support staff. We did not need to follow the lead of a Moroccan team but had our own licence. This gave us free reign and everyone involved who were there last year could see the difference. We had a very efficient clinic going on. It was a great team to be part of. We did get sent a Moroccan dentist through from Chef Chaouan from the Governor. She observed us and is supposed to go back every three months to continue the work. I do hope that this comes off. We did leave one of the chairs for the returning dentist but I feel that the midwife may commandeer this.

Mustafa Was Well Chuffed



Who is Mustafa? Mustafa is the headmaster of the school, and what a guy. He is there fifty-two weeks of the year looking after these kids. He is a very dedicated man who I hold in high regard. It was a proud moment when he expressed his gratitude and explained how much better it went this time because we could crack on and do it our way. That was with a lot of TLC and as pain free dentistry that we could muster. We had better kit this time as well.

A Solar Powered Prototype

We saw and treated 160 children and there was no one left waiting who had pain. What a result. We have already started to plan for next year. We recognise that we cannot do conventional fillings to restore teeth. We can only do very simple sealing or temporary fillings, other than that it is extraction. Dentaid who made the field chairs are in the process of making us a prototype solar powered dental chair so that we should be able to fill the void and restore teeth with fillings.

I would like to thank Sue McLaren for inviting me to give a presentation about my Moroccan adventure to the ladies of the Inner Wheel. They made me feel very welcome and put me at ease. 

In the Garden



Fruit and Vegetable garden

Plant any cane, bush and tree fruit ordered last month. Do not plant if the ground is frozen or waterlogged. If the planting site is not ready when plants arrive, then heel in the bare-root ones in a spare piece of ground, and leave containerised ones standing - but water them when needed.

Start winter pruning of established, open-grown, apple and pear trees (not cordons, espaliers, pyramids or fans).

Gooseberries, redcurrants and blackcurrants can be pruned from around now, but it might be better to wait until late winter/early spring, so that any winter damage can be removed at the same time. Grape vines can be pruned from now through the winter. Doing this early for those under glass will allow more light to reach other plants in the glasshouse or conservatory. Prunings can be used as hardwood cuttings.

Cut out the fruited canes of blackberries and hybrid berries, if not yet done.

Formative pruning of young, free standing, fruit trees and bushes (under three years old) can also be done from now. They should first be pruned to encourage branching and bushiness from the main stem. Subsequently, they should be encouraged to form an open centred 'goblet' shape of main branches, without any being misplaced or crossing.

Mulch fruit trees and bushes.

Lift and divide rhubarb plants to propagate them, or to rejuvenate old crowns.

Strawberry runners that have been potted up for forcing in February and March next year, should now be turned on their sides, or placed in a well-ventilated cold frame. Excess moisture or warmth could cause rots or precipitate premature growth.

Hardwood cuttings can be taken this month - this is a great way to propagate blackcurrants, redcurrants, white currants, gooseberries and grape vines - providing they are disease (especially virus) free.

Grape vines can also be propagated using eye cuttings. These are shorter than standard hardwood cuttings (having only one bud, or 'eye'), and are used commercially to produce a large number of plants. Only attempt these if you are confident, as

longer cuttings have more buds to rely on for rooting.

Clean and store bamboo canes in the shed (or other dry place) to ensure they're still in good condition for next year.

Vegetables

Harvest leeks. They can be heeled in horizontally into a shallow trench outside the back door, for easy access.

You may have other vegetables ready for harvest: Jerusalem artichokes, winter cabbage, spinach, Swiss chard, kohl rabi and radishes can all still be cropped.

Cauliflowers can be harvested, or left in situ with the leaves snapped and folded down over the curds to protect them.

Lift and store root crops such as carrots, beetroot, turnips and swedes.

Parsnips can be left in the ground until needed, or lifted and then buried in a shallow trench for easy access when needed. They taste better when frosted. Make sure to mark the trench.

If you have Brussels sprouts ready for harvesting, pick the largest sprouts from the bottom of the stalk first.

Stake any Brussels sprouts stalks that look leggy and vulnerable to wind rock.

Plant garlic cloves in modules inside a cold frame, or outdoors in mild areas in its final position (free-draining soils and low rainfall areas only).

Dig over, incorporating well-rotted organic matter if available and weed vacant areas of the vegetable plot. Once they are fully wetted by winter rain, cover them with thick black polythene or other opaque covering, and leave them until next season, when they will be easy to prepare for planting and sowing.

After digging, you may want to mulch.

Now is a good time to get ahead and prepare new asparagus beds for planting up in the spring. Plenty of organic matter and grit will help to improve drainage to the level required by asparagus. A raised bed could be a good investment on heavy clay soil, to make it more asparagus friendly.

Flower garden

Plant tulip bulbs this month. Some tulips persist year to year, some perform less well and are treated as bedding, and replaced every year.

Lily bulbs can still be planted in pots this month (if available). They can either be brought inside next spring to 'force' them into an early display, or left outside to flower naturally in summer.

Last chance to plant out winter bedding. You could try wallflowers, forget-me-nots, Bellis, Primula, Viola (winter pansies) and other spring bedding plants, planting them into well- prepared ground, or pots of suitable compost. Water them if no rain is forecast, using stored rain or recycled water wherever possible.

Now is a good time to plant new herbaceous perennials, as the soil is still warm, but moister than it was during the summer.

Penstemons are best left as-is (except for deadheading) until the spring, when they can be cut back further. In mild areas they can carry on flowering well into the late autumn and early winter. The old faded stems will help to protect the crowns from cold. Mulching over the crowns in colder areas will also help.

It is still a good time to lift and divide overgrown clumps of herbaceous perennials. This can improve shape, vigour and flowering, as well as increasing your stocks of favourite plants.

Lift and store dahlias, cannas and tuberous bedding begonias that have been hit by the first frosts. Only in mild areas can dahlias and cannas be left to overwinter in the ground, covering the crowns with a protective layer of straw or bracken, but they may come into flower very late the following year as a consequence of cold weather. Begonias should always be brought in, dried out, and stored in a similar way as for dahlias.

Tello and welcome once again fellow anglers to this month's fishing news. The date is 17th October 2011.

The first thing to report about this month has to be the River Hull Survey Match, which was held yesterday. For all those concerned it was a fantastic day, especially for the kids on Beverly Beck, and for the environment agency, which were able to collect the data they required regarding our River Hull. I want to take this opportunity to congratulate all the organisers and their partakers involved in this match.

I have fished in hundreds of large matches in my time, but this one was by far the best I have personally ever entered in too. Upon arrival at the leisure centre, the environment agency directed traffic (there was a lot!) to the nearest parking spot. The draw inside the centre was very well organised and quick. We were given a detailed map and directions to our pegs and parking. A big well done to all the catering staff, they produced an excellent breakfast with speed and efficiency.

The statistics and results are as follows:

There were 260 tickets sold, of which 210 people actually turned up, and 206 people went into the optional pools. The total overall pay out on the day was a staggering £4,600; 78 people in total all won a share, before I tell you who the winners where, I want to say well done to all the competitors for not only sticking it out all day, but just taking part shows you all care about our Rivers. Let us hope that with the information gathered from our rivers that something is done about our river fishing soon.

First place, congratulations to Mr Michael Anderson, he fished peg ten on the Shipyard stretch next to the bridge. He caught Roach and skimmers on maggot whilst trotting. He weighed in with 3kg 460gr, (7lb 7oz), which netted him a cash prize of £840 plus a Daiwa reel worth £150 and some other goodies.

Second place with a total weight of 3kg 300gr (7lb 3oz) was Gary Chadwick, who fished peg ten at Wilfholme, just below the pump. His catch mainly consisted of Roach and was again caught on maggot whilst trotting. Well done mate.

Third place was Nigel Beamson, who had a brilliant day at Hempholme. Nigel caught 72 Roach on the pole with bread punch. He weighed in with 2kg 930gr (6lb 5oz). Like the other two winners he was near a bridge with boats opposite. Brilliant result buddy.

It was good to see that the top three came from different areas of our river. It certainly goes to show that we need more bridges and boats and of course more fish! About 100 ton will do please. For any one that is interested, I drew Upper Tickton and caught an impressive: 2 small Roach and one small Perch on the feeder, to weigh in with a grand total of 100gr (31/2 oz). Don't laugh; at least I did not blank! Did you? Be honest now!

Sea scene: I am very pleased to announce that the Cod are back. I have had reports from many of our coastal marks, from Spurn in the weed to marine drive at Scarborough. Lots of Whiting are also inshore all over. I have even had reports of Cod to 4lb with photographic evidence from Bullnose. Lots of Flatty's and Whiting with the odd bonus Cod coming in from St Andrews right the way down to Makro. I think we are in for a great season this year.

Fresh bait is now available, blow lug, rag worm, yellowtails and slaps. Please try to order as spares are sold on a first come first served basis.

An interesting debate

was recently asked to talk on Humberside radio about the furore that the British Racing Industry finds itself in....to ban or keep the use of whip. It is a highly emotive issue.

Welfare groups want to ban its use altogether as they see it as a barbaric and punishing practise and ultimately mentally damaging to the horse.

The racing authority want to keep its use and protect its self-governing power while the jockey's themselves are up in arms about this interference...to the point of striking and resigning.

There are several trains of thought here so I will endeavour to put them all forward. Talks are ongoing as to how best find the middle line. At present the options are that during a flat race (which range from very short sprints and use very young horses to increasing distances as the horses get slightly older) The proposal is that the jockey can use the whip twice before the last furlong and then a maximum of 5 times in the run for the finish. In National Hunt (jumping) where the length of the race is dramatically longer, uses much older horses and requires stamina) they can use the whip up to 7 times but only 3 times after the last obstacle has been jumped.

Why use a whip at all?

There are uses which need to be considered here. If a horse starts to veer off course then a strike on the outside (or falling out) shoulder will correct its line....thus keeping all the other horses and riders safe. Every pleasure rider in the country who choose to carry a whip will do exactly the same on the right shoulder of a horse shying away from the pavement into the path of traffic.

To a tiring horse a well timed strike will give it a wake-up call and bring it back into concentration or ditto before or after jumping a fence carelessly. There is a safety issue here and that is that the jockeys and horses need to stay safe as get bunched up, trapped and pushed. The whip is a form of control and used correctly asks for instant obedience/attention. Correct use of any type of whip on any type of horse should be to back up the rider's leg aids. Jockeys have short length of leg to help steer so the whip is essential.

Incorrect use of whip and the reason for all the debate is where the line is crossed and whip becomes cruel. Driving tired horses to the end post by means of a battering is totally unacceptable. Overuse destroys the mind of the horses and many can be seen refusing to enter starting stalls or give up running when the whip comes down on them. These horses are finished, done in and are no use to the racing industry anymore. Ultimately they end up in the sales rings countrywide and are sold at meat price to whomever.....mostly horse- traders and dealers. Some dealers then sell them on to the unsuspecting general public; the majority feed our live meat trade to Europe. 100's and 100's each and every year befall this horrendous fate. We must congratulate ourselves for having such a thriving industry, with no public conscience and no laws to ban. There are no regulations in the foreign abattoirs for a calm, clean, stress free slaughter....In the greater scheme of things where are the issues that we should be really facing here?

I am of the opinion that the use of the new foam covered whip should still be allowed on British race courses, but only 3 strikes per race. This allows jockeys judgment on use and will highlight the weak, unskilled riders who rely on the whip in order to "ride out" at the end.

I think that the allowed usage is still dangerous and is enough punishment per race to ruin good animals physiologically.

I retrain racehorses to give them a chance of a life outside of the industry to which you regular readers will already know. This is a topic you have all heard me speak of before. I am delighted to see that the British Racing Authority is taking a long hard look at itself. No one has a god given right to damage animals for the sake of money.

Hallgate Schools - continued

The Year is now 1931

Then school reassembled on the 5th of January, Miss Hardy was worried about the health of one of her brothers. She was absent on the 8th as his illness grew worse and he died towards the end of the month. Both Miss Hardy and Mr. Wright, who was a cousin, attended the funeral on the afternoon of the 27th. Mr. Wright informed the Headmaster that he had been offered a place at Leeds Training College and that he would be leaving the department in the September.

A twelve week course of Garden Science was begun in February. This was for the benefit of heads of schools in the East Riding and was under the auspices of Leeds University Agricultural and Horticultural Department and was held in 'the new manual room for 1/2 day each week. This was a newly built detached building at the bottom left hand side of the boys' playground, erected due to the increased pressure on schools to provide more non-academic experience for pupils foreshadowed in various government reports.

The Woodwork Room

This became known as 'woodwork room' and was equipped with benches, cupboards, and a supply of saws, hammers, nails, screws and wood and lessons were given to the older boys by a male member of staff each week. Items produced ranged from egg holders, to boxes, shoe racks, cupboards etc., with various results! The finished items were proudly taken home at the end of term and a few pence was charged to offset the cost of the materials. This manual room was later used as an extra classroom in the 1960's and later still, used to store school furniture.

Lantern lectures were held in February and March - 'Climbing Mount Everest', 'The Story Of The Moon', and 'A Holiday In Holland' were all enjoyed by pupils and some parents. During March and April colds and laryngites claimed many victims with staff and pupils alike; Mr. Brookes, Miss Warwick, Miss Brown, Mr. Bramley and Mr. Wright all had to be away from school at various times. The symptoms often returned after the victim had got back to school seemingly recovered, resulting in several more days away.

Tributes paid to two deceased pupils

On April the 13th. Mr. Brookes entered in the log book -"I am exceedingly sorry to have to record here the deaths of two scholars which took place during the Easter vacation; Edwin John Coupland who died in the Hull Children's Hospital on the 5th. inst. as a result of an injury to his knee sustained during a school football match a week previous, and. Leslie Gardham who died following a fainting attack on Wednesday the 8th. inst. They were boys popular with their school fellows and their decease has come as a great shock to all concerned. Floral tributes from the Staff and Scholars were sent to the funeral in each case." On the 14th of May, Rev. Dakin the Congregational Church Minister and a school Manager visited the school and wrote in the log book:-

"I have visited the School this morning, have checked the- Registers and found all correct and in good order. The discipline is good and control by the teachers is both firm and kind. It has been a pleasure to see the behaviour of the Scholars."

Success on the Sports Field

The second Annual House Sports Festival of the boys' department was held on the cold, windy, evening of the 18th of May on the Ellerman's ground. The usual supporters were there and the cup was presented to the 'Purple House' by Councillor Arthur Dixon. Interestingly, the purple colour was dropped in favour of yellow, ie. in future red, blue, green and yellow team bands would be worn in sports, P.E. etc.; perhaps the purple clashed with the red too much and yellow would be more distinctive on the field.

Further success followed on the 4th of June when the combined Cottingham Schools won the Lambert White Trophy again at the sports event held at Hedon. On the 10th, school finished at 3pm so that pupils

attending the Wesleyan and Congregational Sunday Schools could get home, get washed and changed and go to the 'Feasts' served up in the respective church rooms as usual.

Two boys awarded scholarships

Two boys gained scholarships that year - Francis Edwin Hatfield to Beverley Grammar School and James Coupland to Trinity House: Hatfield and Coupland are old Cottingham names along with Gardham - James Coupland was probably related to Edwin John who had died in April.

Mr. Wright left the department to begin his spell at Leads Training College and Mr. W.S.Hall began duties with St. V. - he was an old scholar and student teacher at the school.

Coughs, Colds and other illnesses

The girls' school opened in January with coughs, colds and an outbreak of scabies - this was often present in schools, small irritating spots between the fingers and was highly contageous and easily passed between pupils and resulted in exclusion from school for several weeks. The weather grew increasingly bad during January and February with snow, rain, frost and the girls' Christmas parties were held later than ever - in mid-February.

In March the dentist examined all the girls and it was found necessary to recommend several extractions. The dentist, Mr. Harris, assisted by a nurse carried out the extractions under gas in the mobile surgery; mothers could wait in the school if they wished to take their daughters home afterwards. Attendance was down to 74% due to colds, flu and then mumps and several teachers were away too.

Success for the Netball Team

The department entered the Hull Netball League that year. The first match was with Northumberland Avenue School and resulted in a draw; netball teans were organised in the school in most classes greens, reds, blues and yellows, and the most proficient in certain year groups represented the department in inter school matches.

Empire Day was celebrated as usual in May - songs were sung, poems recited, prayers said, and the girls were addressed by Rev. Dakin in the hall who spoke about the Empire and everyone's place in it. The weather towards the end of June 'was very stormy' at times and several girls won scholarships that month, Miss Brimelow was pleased and proud of their achievements.

In July Rev. French officiated at the presentation of a Cup awarded by Mrs. Holtby to the colour team who had gained the highest marks for achievements in the school year, including sports and games.

Four days holiday was given for Hull Pair in October and two H.M.I.'s spent one morning in the school and declared themselves very pleased with what they had seen. Attendance fell again, this time due to whooping cough and diptheria mainly, but colds and 'flu took their toll as well. Dr. Daniels conducted 'medicals' for two days and Nurse Ward examined hair, finger nails, etc.

Miss Both visits from Natal in South Africa

In early December, Miss Both, a visiting teacher from Natal in South Africa, arrived to study classroom method and was immediately struck down with 'flu, as was Miss Brimelow and several teachers and more pupils and attendances were down to 75\$« Term exams began "but so many girls were away ill that they were abandoned until January. Miss Brimelow and Miss Both returned to school just before the Christmas holidays and spent two days visiting the Training College, the University, the Open Air School situated at the back of the College, Flinton Grove and Thoresby Street schools in Hull to see work in progress at each of these establishments. It was a, brief excursion into English education for the visitor, but a valuable one.

Everyone must have been thankful when school broke up for Christmas that year. The holidays usually ensure a break in the chain of illness in a school; pupils are no longer in crowds for hours at a time enabling germs to spread, and the opportunity taken for rest and care to speed recovery.

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council's civil enforcement officers will be issuing dummy tickets for illegally parked vehicles across the East Riding from Wednesday, 26 October until 7 November. The dummy tickets will inform motorists what they have done wrong and will include a letter informing them about civil parking enforcement (CPE), which is due to start in November.

No further action will be taken on offences committed during that period, but enforcement action will be taken after 7 November.

From 7 November the council will become legally responsible for parking enforcement - keeping the highways free moving, safe and available to all users - taking over the duties previously carried out by Humberside Police traffic wardens.

John Skidmore, head of the council's streetscene services, said: "The aim of issuing dummy tickets for a limited period is to raise awareness among motorists that the council will be responsible for keeping the highways clear of illegally parked vehicles, causing obstruction and congestion.

"This benefits us all, not least because it helps with road safety and reduces the adverse effects of illegal parking on the commercial viability of town centres.

"This exercise will also allow new staff to become familiar with the areas they will be working and to put into practice what they have learned." Mr Skidmore said: "The only major change the public will notice is that instead of police traffic wardens enforcing parking restrictions, they will be council wardens.

"CPE will be self-funded through the income generated from on-street parking and from enforcement action so there will be no cost to council taxpayers.

The council has already stated that it will not be implementing new parking restrictions as it believes those currently in place are adequate. The council has taken over responsibility for enforcing parking restrictions after the decision by Humberside Police to withdraw its traffic warden service

ottingham Fitmums and Friends, the village's own friendly, inclusive running (and walking) club, recently signed up its 200th member. As the club has been going for less than two years and started with a few friends meeting on someone's drive, this is a remarkable achievement.

Founder Sam Barlow is thrilled to bits with the success of Fitmums. "I never imagined that Fitmums would grow like this but as it has, it has become my dream to bring the joy of running to a wider community, and Fitmums shows that there really is a group of people out there who just need a bit of encouragement and support to lace up their trainers and get going," she says.

Asked about why she thinks Fitmums is so successful, she's quick to find a host of reasons. "Well, for a start there's the fact that it only costs £25 to join, and you get the much loved trademark Fitmums vest (pink for women, blue for men). But I think it's the inclusive, supportive ethos of Fitmums that makes people come along once and then stay to join. And it's not just about running; we've got an enthusiastic group of walkers and buggy burners too.

"We're also keen to make it possible for those people who might struggle to find time to run, like parents of young children, to come to the club. We hold a session on Monday mornings in partnership with Blue Kangaroo nursery; parents can leave their kids to play while they go out for a health-boosting, stress-relieving run.

Remaining healthy during the Cold and Flu season

o one enjoys being sick with a cold or the flu but for many it is par for the course during the colder months of the year.
