Cottingham Parish Council

Article from Cottingham Parish Council Chairman – Cllr Don Hardwick

ollowing recent events I feel it is necessary to provide an update on the following issues:

- 1. Costa Coffee planning approval
- 2. Castle Hill Park proposed 600 house development
- 3. The implications of a Neighbourhood Plan and the current position of the Cottingham Parish Council
- 4. Planning advice available from the Parish Council and the probable implications of the government's relaxation on planning approval requirements.

I intend to provide the above over four issues of this magazine starting with the Costa Coffee planning approval.

I fully admire the action taken by the affected traders regarding the notice that the East Riding of Yorkshire Council Cottingham Ward Councillors supported the application which was not in the best interest of the village café/coffee providers or the village community.

At the Cottingham Parish Council Planning Committee meeting held on 10 July 2012 a recommendation was made to ERYC to refuse the application based on the following grounds:

- \bullet Concerns over the provision for the fire escape and lack of space for the assembly point
 - Traffic generation loading and unloading of delivery vehicles
- Policy S3 of the Beverley Borough Local Plan adopted plan June 1996. "The change of use from Class A1 (shops) of the Town and Country Planning (Use Classes) Orders to any other use at ground floor level within the Primary Shopping Zones of the Beverley, Cottingham and Hessle Shopping Areas as identified on the Proposals Map will be approved only when such change of use will not undermine the retail function of the zone and class A1 (shops) will predominate." (The Primary Shopping Zone is defined as King Street west side, between Hallgate and the Market Green).

The Council already feel that there are too many A3 classes in the Primary Shopping Zone as opposed to A1 retail, this application would only make matters worse.

At the meeting Councillor Jump gave the impression to all who attended that she supported the recommendation of the Parish Council, yet she did abstain at the vote.

It must be understood that:

- a) Ward Councillors can be provided with information pertaining to an application after the Parish Council's Planning Committee Meeting
- b) In this case the Officer recommended approval.
- c) Minimal formal planning evidence supporting refusal was provided to the Ward Councillors or ERYC Planning Department by the Cottingham electorate, other than the Parish Council's response.

ERYC Planning Officers will advise their planning committee according to their evidence and the possible success of the applicant at appeal (an appeal would be decided by the Planning Inspectorate) and the cost of defending an appeal which would be borne by the council taxpayers.

What does concern me, and I will try and ensure to all concerned, that at any meeting both Parish and ERYC Ward Councillors make clear their voting intentions and the reasons for their decision based on the current information available.

Footpath along Mill Beck, Cottingham

Within the next few weeks work will be carried out to improve the footpath along Mill Beck which goes from Lawson Avenue to KGV. If you regularly walk this path you will know the section that slopes badly toward the beck and seems to be falling away. The remedial work will flatten the section and shore up the bank to make this a more safe and pleasant pathway.

Impending Winter

Last year the Parish Council provided retailers in the village with a bag of rocksalt to use as and when required during the winter. Our intention was to help keep the village centre pavements clear so that residents could use the village shops during times of snow and ice. Councillors agreed that this project had been very successful last year and we will be restocking retailers again shortly.





Garlic Thyme Chicken

Ingredients

- 4 Boneless Chicken Breasts, halved
- 2-3 tbsp Olive Oil
- 2 -3 Garlic Cloves, finely chopped
- 2 tbsp Fresh Thyme Leaves
- 2 tbsp Freshly Chopped Oregano
- Salt and Black Pepper
- 4 tbsp Water
- 1 teasp Worcestershire Sauce

Instructions

- Place the oil, garlic, thyme, oregano, salt and pepper in a shallow dish and mix well.
- 2. Add the chicken and coat with the oil and herb mixture, rubbing it into the chicken on all sides with your fingers.
- 3. Heat a large frying pan until very hot then add the prepared chicken together with the oil and herbs and cook for a few minutes on both sides until well browned.
- 4. In a small cup, mix the water with the Worcestershire sauce then add to the chicken, reduce the heat, cover and cook over low heat for 10 to 15 minutes, turning once, or until the chicken is cooked through.

Chicken Kiev

Ingredients

- 125g/5oz Butter, softened
- 2 Garlic Cloves, crushed
- 1 tbsp Parsley
- Salt and Pepper
- 2 tbsp Lemon Juice
- 4 Boneless Chicken Breasts, skinned
- Oil for deep frying
- Plain flour to coat
- 1 Egg, beaten
- 4 tbsp Fresh White Breadcrumbs

Instructions

- 1. Place the butter, lemon juice, garlic, parsley, salt and pepper in a bowl and mix well. Form into a cylinder, wrap in foil and place in the freezer for 1 hour.
- Place each chicken breast between dampened greaseproof paper and beat with a rolling pin or mallet to flatten them out. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.
- 3. Preheat the deep fryer to 170C, 350F. Remove the butter from the freezer and cut into four. Place one piece of butter on each flattened chicken breast then roll up and secure with a cocktail stick.
- 4. Coat each piece of chicken in flour then dip in the beaten egg and finally roll in the breadcrumbs to thoroughly coat, pressing well.
- 5. Deep fry for 15 minutes until golden brown or until chicken is cooked. Drain on kitchen paper and serve immediately.

Frangipane Apple Tart

Ingredients

- 225g/8oz Shortcrust Pastry
- 100g/4oz very Soft Butter
- 100g/4oz Caster Sugar
- 2 large Eggs, beaten
- 100g/4oz Ground Almonds
- 1 tbsp finely grated Lemon Zest
- 3 Dessert Apples, peeled, cored and halved
- A knob of Butter plus extra Caster Sugar

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4. Roll out the pastry and use to line a 20cm/8-inch flan dish. Trim the edges and prick the base several times with a fork then line with greaseproof paper, fill with dried beans and bake for 10 minutes. Remove the foil, and bake for a further 5 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, in a large mixing bowl, beat together the butter and sugar until pale and fluffy.
- 3. Beat in the eggs a little at a time until well incorporated then stir in the almonds and lemon zest and mix well.
- 4. Transfer the mixture to the baked pastry case then press the apple halves into the mixture, flat sides down.
- 5. Melt the knob of butter and use to glaze the tops of the apples. Sprinkle with the extra caster sugar and bake for 40-45 minutes, until golden brown and risen.

Serve warm or cold. Excellent served with Vanilla Ice Cream

ottingham will once again be illuminated this Christmas and New Year, when the village turn out for the 31st switch-on of the ever popular 'Cottingham Christmas Lights'.

The now famous Christmas Lights in Cottingham were first erected by a group of volunteers in 1981; they have grown from a very mediocre display to the fantastic array we will be switching-on, on Monday 26th November 2012 at 7.00 pm.

Of the original group there are still two volunteers actively involved with the lights, they are joined by a regular gang of eight willing volunteers, who turn out each Sunday morning, come rain or shine or snow, from mid October until the switch on. The volunteers are made up of residents and shop owners of Cottingham.

The organisers of Cottingham Lights would like to thank those of you in the community who have already made donations to the lights this year. We rely on donations from the public, traders, fundraising activities throughout the year and grants from the Parish Council to enable us to not only maintain, but to improve the standard of our display. A huge £5,000.00 has already been spent on refurbishment in readiness of this years switch on, together with the purchase of low energy LED bulbs for the displays.

Last year saw a record number of people witness the spectacular turn on of the lights. This year's switch on night will be another fun packed evening for all the family with local shops staying open and a funfair; we are also pleased that Cottingham High Schools Brass Band will be performing.

The organisers like to keep this event a community event, something for all of Cottingham to be proud of. This year three local children will be chosen for the exciting task of switching on Cottingham Lights, it will be a night to remember for these children.

This year the 'switch on' platform will be located opposite John Fords Menswear, this will help the flow of people around the village

The thousands of people who attend the switch-on and the people who come to see the lights over the festive season bear witness to how popular they are with this years Christmas Lights Display being the best ever!

Street sellers have again been asked to apply for a "Cottingham Lights Official Hawker" badge, and officials have appealed for the public to buy items only from the official hawkers displaying their official badge.

Also making a return this year will be the KCFM Radio's promotional vehicle - and stage - which took part in the Cottingham Day 2012 celebrations.

Based outside the Duke of Cumberland Hotel on the Market Green, one of the station's presenters will compere the activities - including music and competitions for which there will be prizes - led by the promotion team, who will mingle with the crowds and also collect money to donate to the lights fund.

"We will interact with the people of Cottingham and our emphasis will be on enhancing what is always a brilliant event", said Sarah Harrison, Marketing and Events Manager for KCFM, which broadcasts to Hull and East Yorkshire.

Throughout the afternoon and evening, village-centre road closures and parking restrictions will be in operation. Parking will not be allowed on the Market Green after 3pm. Hallgate will be closed at 5.00 pm and other road closures, from 6pm until 9.30pm, or at the discretion of the police, will be: Hallgate (from Arlington Avenue to West Green); the George Street junction with Hallgate; King Street, from the junction with Finkle Street to Co-op's car park, which will be open.

There will also be many Craft and other stalls in the Cottingham Civic Hall on the Market Green.

The Cottingham Neighbourhood Policing Team, said that, throughout the event, police officers and PCSOs, in high-visibility uniform, will patrol on foot to provide the public with reassurance and to prevent any public disorder or alcohol-related incidents. The principle intentions are to ensure the safety of persons attending the event and to control the traffic, minimising any inconvenience caused to the general public and other road users.

Officers will deal with any incident promptly and efficiently to minimise disruption to the event and reduce danger to the public, he stressed.



So What Are The Cold Facts?

Over 6000 people will be diagnosed with mouth cancer this year alone in the UK and half will die without early diagnosis. It is on the increase. It is related to age, smoking, drinking alcohol, poor diet, human papilloma virus, smokeless tabacco. Smokeless tobacco is normally defined as any tobacco product that is placed in the mouth or nose and not burned. Although some people believe this type of tobacco is safer than smoking, the reality is that it is much more dangerous. The types of smokeless tobacco products most used in the UK often contain a mix of ingredients including slaked lime, areca nut and spices flavourings and sweeteners. Smokeless tobacco is used particularly by South Asian Communities, especially women. The incidence of mouth cancer is significantly greater among South Asian women.

How Do We Detect Early?

Regular screening is important. At our place have a good look under magnification and white light at every examination. We have now invested in the cordless VELscope Vx which is another layer of screening that shows up suspicious areas due to the way the tissues

fluoresce under the specific blue light.



eave the cars and walk east on the northern side of the road. Take the left fork at the junction and walk on the wide grass verge to the entrance to Hessle Golf Club. Turn left and walk up the drive and, on meeting the first buildings, turn left and skirt round the golf course on a distinct fenced path.

On reaching Eppleworth Wood at the north of the Golf Course, turn left and walk north with a hedge on the right. Bear left and then right again keeping the hedge on the left to emerge on a farm track just to the west of the redundant railway bridge.

On reaching this track, turn left and after about one mile pass under power cables and then turn left and ascend a slight gradient keeping the hedge on the left. On reaching the Eppleworth to Ripplingham road, cross the road and turn left and after about 50 metres turn right and follow the farm road to York Grounds Farm. Pass through the farm and follow the farm track keeping the hedge on the right.

On reaching a cross road of paths, turn left and follow the sign for Nut Wood. On reaching the wood, bear right and walk uphill to a sign post and then turn left and walk along the upper perimeter of the wood. On reaching the end of the wood, turn left and walk down hill and back to the cars.

Plus when the daya are dark and dreary we can cheer our gardens up with bursts of colour. There's something especially valuable about shrubs which flower in winter. Seeing these delightful and resilient flowers putting on a show through short, dark days and taking frost, rain and snow in their stride lifts our spirits and encourages us to get outside. Many can also be cut for indoor winter posies, and many are fragrant.

All gardens should find space for at least some of these Award of Garden Merit winners below.

Cornus mas 'Golden Glory'

The yellow flower clusters of Cornus mas have long been appreciated but 'Golden Glory' takes it to new heights. Making a small tree, or a large shrub, 'Golden Glory' is less spreading in its habit, more prolific in flower and also flowers as a younger plant. It also features red fruits, which are edible but acid, and reddish purple autumn foliage so has three distinct appeals. 15ft/4.5m

Daphne bholua 'Jacqueline Postill' One of the best of all fragrant flowering

Then there's the fragrance, which can be almost intoxicating. Appreciates shelter in colder areas. 8ft/2.4m

Mahonia x media 'Underway'

One of a group of outstanding AGM-winning winter flowering hybrids ('Buckland', 'Lionel Fortescue' and 'Winter Sun' also have awards), 'Underway' is the toughest of them all and is also a little shorter than the others. Its long vertical spikes of slightly scented yellow flowers are really impressive, especially set against the rows of dark, holly-like leaflets. 10ft/3m

Skimmia x confusa 'Kew Green'

We tend to think of skimmias as valuable for their bright red berries, but this is a form for which the flowers are the main feature. In fact the plant is male and never produces berries but the large conical clusters of fragrant creamy white flowers, set against aromatic evergreen foliage, are impressive over many weeks. 'Kew Green' will also pollinate female skimmias to ensure they produce berries. 3ft/90cm

Viburnum x Another deciduous shrub valued for its combination of colour and fragrance. Deep rose red buds opening to white flowers with pink tints are gathered in clusters along the bare branches and are usually produced so prolifically that twigs can be cut for the house without spoiling the display. The flowers are also unexpectedly tolerant of frost. 10ft/3m



HOUSEPLANTS

At this time of year it's nice to add colour to your garden and your home with flowers and foliage. There's nothing better for brightening up an indoor environment than a well-grown houseplant and they are available in a vast range of forms from tiny gems suitable for the smallest windowsill to rampant growers for the largest hallway. They offer lush foliage, beautiful blooms and interesting forms. Some thrive in damp bathrooms, others need a sunny spot, so make sure you choose a houseplant that will tolerate the conditions in which it is to grow. Ask our staff for advice on the best choice.

Once you've made your purchase, take care when transporting houseplants to protect them from cold, drafts, wind or excessive heat. Failure to do so can lead to plant deterioration or even death, and the effects may not fully show themselves until some time after you've bought it.

Once your new houseplant is safely home, you need to care for it correctly to ensure that it remains in pristine condition – and this largely depends on how well it is watered. Too little or too much watering can cause problems.

OVERWATERING: Giving too much water can be as dangerous as underwatering. The roots not only require moisture but also air, so overwatering leads to the forcible removal of air from the potting compost so the houseplant's roots are killed by suffocation.

BEST PRACTICE: Watering little and often is the best advice, taking into account the growing environment and the seasons. Watering from below is the best approach as some plants can suffer from rotting or sun scorch if water is directed onto their stems, root systems or foliage.

Top Ten Tips

- 1. There is still time to plant Spring blooming bulbs for the early part of November
- 2. Transplant trees and shrubs
- 3. Prune evergreens to shape
- 4. Cover strawberries two inches deep with straw or hay
- 5. Increase feed and provide plenty of fresh water for the birds
- 6. If you haven't already feed your lawn with a fall or winter feed
- 7. Rake leaves from the lawn and compost them
- 8. Drain your hoses and put away over winter
- 9. Finish weeding and tidying up beds
- 10. Clean up and cover you garden furniture to protect over the Winter

DRAINAGE:

The best method is to stand the pot (which must have drainage holes in the bottom) on a suitable sized saucer into which a small amount of gravel has been placed. Fill the saucer to about 1/3 of its depth with water and leave the plant standing for 30 minutes. If all the water has been taken up you can repeat the operation until uptake stops, then any surplus water should be tipped away butof course retaining the gravel.

Plant of the month

November's plant of the month is the beautiful Hellebores.

Hellebores (sometimes known as the Christmas or Lenten rose) are perennial garden plants with elegant flowers, perfect for brightening up shady areas during late winter and early spring. Some species are grown for their striking architectural foliage. evergreen Hellebores prefer to grow in rich. well-drained soil in dappled shade. Avoid planting in very dry or waterlogged soil. Provide shelter from strong, cold winds.



Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

Fishing news. We hope you are all well and are still enjoying your favourite pastime. The date is 15th October.

Firstly I must tell you the results from the River Derwent and River Hull Survey championships.

On day one, 120 anglers entered the competition on the River Derwent; they fished from Sutton to Halsham. Unfortunately the river, due to the flooding just two days before, did not fish very well at all. Nonetheless, a very well done to everyone whom took part.

The winner was a Mr Peter Kittwood from Goole, he drew peg 2 at Halsham and caught 6 perch on Lob worm for a total weight of 6lb 6oz, and for his troubles he went home with £1200. Not bad eh!!! Congratulations Peter.

Second place was Mr Mark Halksworth from Chesterfield. He caught a 5lb Chub on bread flake from Scrayingham.

Third place was Mr Wally Brown from Hull he caught 2 chub again on bread and he was pegged at Buttercrambe.

Finally fourth place was Mr Shaun Leskiewicw; he caught 4lb of Roach.

Out of the 120 anglers whom took part 63 anglers weighed in.

Day two of the competition was on our River Hull, the results this year compared to last years are a lot better. I have been reporting since

June of this year that the River Hull has been producing brilliant bags of fish, and I am pleased to say that even with 159 competitors on the bank, (it was under some considerable pressure) there remained some good surprises and some decent weights.

Firstly I would like to congratulate the winner, Mr Dave Brooks Senior from Hull. Once he caught his breath back after running to his peg at Shipyard he had a brilliant day. He was catching a right mixed bag of Roach, Skimmers, Ide, Perch and Flounder all on maggot and worm. Dave finished up with an impressive haul of 38lb 9oz, and same as the Derwent match, Dave walked away with a nice £1200. Congratulations Dave.

Now then Mr Craig Hirst from Beverly whom came second deserves an extra pat on the back for his result. Craig had a fantastic bag of Roach four pegs up from the Bridge at Tickton that weighed 32lb 8oz, and he caught the lot on the stick float with maggot. Well done once again Craig.

Remember Mark Halksworth from the Derwent match? Well here he is again, Mark caught 19lb 4oz of Roach from Shipyard to come third

Fourth place was Mr Oliver Waddy from Beverly. He drew at Figham and you aren't going to believe this! He weighed in with 19lb 2oz of Flounders, 23 of them all caught on lob worm. Brilliant. The River Hull match was fished from Hempholme to Kingswood, out of the 159 that entered, 73 weighed in. Someone caught an 8lb Sea Trout from Kingswood but unfortunately could not weigh it in.

Over the two day match Mark Halksworth from Chesterfield finished with 5 points overall and won a further £1000. Congratulations mate. Dave senior ended up with 9 points overall and took another £650. Not a bad weekends work, eh!

At this point, I would like once again to congratulate the Environment Agency and all the others concerned for another well run and organised weekend.

Hallgate Schools - continued

by Peter Railton - Local Author and Historian

The Year is 1937

anuary came in accompanied by a lot of foggy weather, which caused absences among the girls who lived a long way from the J school; 'flu then took its toll towards the end of the month resulting in more absences including members of staff - Miss Buttery, Miss Wright and Mrs Wrigglesworth who were all away at the same time and classes 4, 5, and 6 were massed together for afternoon sessions for over a week and two supply teachers were sent from Beverley. Attendances varied from 84% to 89% all through February as illnesses of different kinds dogged the school. Mrs Evans caught tonsilitis and was away all May.

The Year of the Coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth

On the 20th of April, Rev Dakin wrote in the log book -

"This day I visited the Council Schools and found all in order and all girls correct. I was very much struck again with the cheerful service given by the scholars at my request and that tone of cheerful willingness seems to be highly characteristic of the whole working of the school". This was the year of the Coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth and Cottingham schools, in common with the rest of the nation's children, prepared for the event.

The girls decorated their school with flags, talks were given by guests, special lessons arranged, the Coronation Ceremony explained in all the classes with the significance of the occasion emphasised. Three day's holiday was given, 12th, 13th and 14th of May. Sports and parades were organised for the great day and a tea to follow, but the weather was so bad that the outdoor events were cancelled and only the tea survived and pre-school children could attend, I was taken by my mother to one laid on at the Primitive Methodist School Room in King Street, once used as an infant school before the Hallgate Schools were built, the Modus shop stands on the site now.

Heavy rain and fish paste sandwiches

It rained heavily and we were late in arriving at the venue, with wet coats and an umbrella turned inside out by the strong wind. My aunt and my youngest cousin were waiting for us and the festivities were well under way when we got there, with lots of girls and boys demolishing cakes, buns and sandwiches at an alarming rate until only the fish paste sandwiches were left for us and my memories of Coronation Day 1937 are of vanishing buns and cakes, wet clothes and fish paste sandwiches.

The violin ochestra was again successful at Hull Music Festival and won the Shield. On July the 7th, the Divisional Sports were held at Driffield and the girls took first places in the Senior, Inter and Junior Jumping events, the Junior Relay, and second in the Junior Skipping. The following day the school's own sports were held on the Ellerman's ground and one girl competing in the jumping events fell and broke her wrist and had to be taken to Hull Royal Infirmary (the old one where the Prospect Centre is now).

Pupils increase due to families moving to Cottingham

After the summer holidays 45 girls were admitted to the department from the infants - an increase of 10 on the previous years this could be as a result of families moving in to the village from outside as Cottingham became an inceasingly attractive place in which to live. Eight girls had obtained various scholarships to Beverley High School and to the new Gregg School of Commercial Studies on Beverley Road in Hull. The arrangement of classes and teachers was - Class 1 Mrs Tether; Class 2 Miss Padget, Class 3 Mrs Evans, Class 4 Mrs Wrigglesworth, Class 5 Miss Buttery, Class 6 Miss Wright, Class 7 Mrs Wilson.

Mr. Arnett and the Rev French paid their usual visits and signed the log book. Mr. Harris, the dentist, followed up his earlier visit by returning and extracting the teeth of some girls, whose mothers were in attendance. A milestone in the history of the school is recorded by Miss Brimelow: two loudspeakers were placed in the rooms of classes 5 and 7 respectively by the Broadcasting Relay Service, and geography, history and biology talks were listened to. Presumably, a radio licence

was obtained for the department as was the case in the boys' department.

Students from Hull College were in the school during the autumn term taking classes 5 and 7 and no doubt making use of the new facilities. Class 7 girls were taken to the Albion Street Museum to see specimens of birds, accompanied by their teacher and a student. Term exams were held in November and December, plus medicals and the weather was wet and foggy - the year ending as it had begun.

Well disciplined and cheerful boys

The boys' school opened on the 5th of January with 246 scholars present and Miss Hardy away with the 'flu. The Rev. Dakin recorded that attendance was down in this department too due to colds and 'flu -

"The boys are cheerful and discipline is well maintained."

The arrangement of classes and teachers was - Class 1 Miss Warwick, Class 2 Miss Thomas, Class 3 Miss Hardy Class 4 Miss Brown, Class 5 Mr. Bailey, Class 6 Mr. Wright, Class 7 Mr. Bramley, Class 8 Mr. Hall (later replaced by Mr. Clarke). On the 5th of February a Lantern Lecture was given in the hall on the growing of flowers and bulbs and marketing by Mr. Campbell of Leeds University, in connection with the Cottingham Horticultural Society. Mr. West, of A & G. W. West, market gardeners of Middledyke Lane, proposed a vote of thanks.

Scholarships and Lantern Lectures

Four boys successfully sat exams for Trinity House - Hubert Coupland, Frank Fellows, Reginald Johnson and Ronald Arthur Tuttle. Another Lantern Lecture on the evening of the 5th of March was given by a representative of the R.S.P.C.A. and essay competitions were to be held for boys and girls on the subject of the show which dealt mainly with wild animals of the countryside, and two boys, Eric Dawney and Dennis Ireland won Merit Certificates awarded by the National Lifeboat Institution for essays on 'A Lifeboat Rescue'.

On the 21st of April a G.C.E. (General Electric Company) Broadcast Receiving Set was bought out of school funds. This 'asset' was in addition to the wind-up tall gramophone which stood on the dias just inside the hall doors - more of that later.

The school closed for Whitsuntide and the Coronation Sports in May; these were held on Saturday afternoon the 29th at the Grange Field on Harland Way (the site of the Cottingham High School). Various events were held and teachers, parents, local digitories and friends all helped and dancing was enjoyed on the field during the evening, music again provided by Cottingham Silver Band and the celebrations were rounded off with a grand firework display.

Excursion to London

On Friday the 14th of June, many boys and girls plus teachers and some parents set off for a day's excursion to London, leaving Cottingham Station at 5.30 a.m. Breakfast was taken on the train and King's Cross was reached at 10.15 am. Buses took everyone to the Houses of Parliament and the party was shown round by Sir Servington Savery, M.P. for Holderness. Then to Westminster Abbey, followed by a bus tour of London finishing at Hyde Park where 'a splendid lunch was partaken under the trees with the sun shining gloriously. Then back to the buses for more sight-seeing - Regent Street, Oxford Street, Broadcasting House to the Zoo for a limited visit, then back to King's Cross for the journey home, arriving at Cottingham Station at 10.50 p.m. 'tired but happy'.

Memories

Edwin Stroud, Jack Denneth and. Kenneth Garwood won scholarships to Beverley Grammar School and 35 boys 'went up' from the infant's department in September. The schools were closed on the 18th of October for the visit to Hull of the King and Queen. I remember being taken to the Station to see the Royal Train pass by, very slowly, through a carriage window I caught a glimpse of a lady's wide brimmed hat which, my mother assured me, was being worn by the Oueen!

One more memory - a small boy going through the big red door to the infants' school - the rows of coat pegs, the huge hall, the rocking horse, the distinctive smell of wood, floors and the dozens of unfamiliar faces - the start of school life.

"To Them"

orse after horse walk their four legs through my door, week after week, all bearing scars, both physically as well as emotionally. We see a pattern emerging as each one's life story unfolds before us. Some horses come with a full history from birth, some with a limited history from point of sale where its previous life is shaded with grey. Some come from dealers' yards where a huge dollop of dope and a pack of lies have been told in order to sell to the less experienced and gullible potential owner. A few days later when the dope has worn off usually reveals the horror of their mistake as an extremely different character and personality emerges from their new purchase.

Some owners offer up real honesty over the course of events leading to its need to come and visit us. We always need as much truth as is possible to offer up as we are putting our heads in the lion's mouth, so to speak.

Accidents and injuries can change equine personalities and leave them feeling vulnerable and unsafe.....just like us. The same can be said with the effect of environmental changes. We usually have the luxury of power to self govern. We can, as a rule, make choices in our lives not open to our pets...In the main we are masters of our own destiny. We have the ability to choose where and how we live. We choose what we eat and when.

We choose who our friends are and have fashion and music preferences. We choose our working environment, career path, our potential spouses.....we even choose where we go at any one time, which route we take and the speed with which we do it in (with the exception of the motorways which totally dictate to us much to our expressive frustration!) We are even responsible, en masse, for who has the right to govern the country.

Singularly, only cats as pets have the ability to dictate their own path...if the hotel services you offer up are not up to their meticulous standards they will simply move on....cats do not have owners after all, they simply have staff! They train us to serve them! Sorry if I offend any cat lovers/owners here. It is my simple analogy having been a cat "owner" all of my life, one way or another!

Dogs, horses, pet rabbits, hamsters etc all are completely at our mercy when it comes to how they are treated and cared for. They are trapped in the environment we choose for them to be in with very little or no power to help themselves in any way, shape or form.... except through expressing their emotions through behaviour....be it good or bad.

Horses are sold on. They are loaded into transporters and taken to new homes. They leave behind strongly formed bonds with other horses. The ones left behind are affected by the loss of a bonded companion. That in its own right can have a ripple effect. The "new" horse arrives at the mercy of new owners, new yard staff and already established equine herds. The "new" horse in the field immediately gets threatened or is beaten up by the Alfa horse (usually a mare) in order to put in into its place within the hierarchy. It needs to learn quickly to give no trouble or challenge to the established hierarchy in that new paddock. This is the herd rule of law as ancient as the hills. There is an order to conform to. This done and dusted he will then find his place and hopefully will have the ability and opportunity to bond with a new friend.

Care must be taken when introducing new horses to a field of established relationships as the metal shoes worn by most can and do frequently cause injury and physical harm. Vet bills are the singularly most expensive care cost in maintaining an equine! I am sure vets make it up as they go along adding several zeros to the end amount just for good measure!

Horses need a good routine in order for them to settle in. Routine is as important to animals as it is to providing security to our children. Once in a routine they start to know what will happen **TO them**. I underlined that word on purpose.....To them, not with them, not for them or anything else. All they want to know is that they feel safe, are understood and can find a place to relax and be exactly what they are....a horse, a herbivore, and a quadruped (and as such need to feel predator free!).

They do not have thick armoured plating, claws or big sharp teeth. Defence through flight is their one real defence as is the way of any herd animal at the bottom of the food chain. Awareness of any perceived threat is by smell and movements which then trigger appropriate actions in order to survive. It is these signals which we, as owners, need to be aware of and try hard to train confidence in place of fear or uncertainty....

We are always trapping horses into confined spaces...stables, trailers and lorries, ménages or schools and most certainly the limited space on a road (trapped between the pavement and the traffic)- even a field is an entrapment surrounded by fences or big hedges to confine our animals. After all, horses evolved on vast tracts of open plains or prairies plains where they were free to roam at will.

Where predators crept up slowly, crawling through the long grass, trying to remain hidden for as long as possible in order to pounce at the last minute. The big cats (tigers, Lions etc) cannot out run a horse, surprise is their biggest tool. Our modern day horses are still as acutely aware of their environment and of any perceived threats to their lives as their ancient predecessors....which is why they are such interesting and challenging animals to have as pets.

To own a horse is to take on a huge commitment. Its training is continuous and lasts the lifetime of the horse. As each horse we deal with is a different individual, with differing temperaments and experiences, we, as trainers, constantly learn from each oneso our training lasts a lifetime too.

TIP: When printing a document, make sure you only get the pages you want. When the print dialogue box comes up, click to select pages by number, for instance just page 1 or 2,4,7 to print selected pages.

This is often caused by under-use, leading the inkjets to become dried out and unable to dispense the right amount of ink onto the paper. Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell

Car buying

If like us, you have never experienced the second hand car market in Spain you will quickly find out it is nothing like the UK. If you buy privately, you will certainly pay a bit less than at a dealer, but be prepared for Spanish beaurocracy with the paperwork. Unlike the UK, both buyer and seller have to fill in the paperwork take it to the traffic department at the town hall, pay a fee, sign the paperwork and if everything is in order, you now own the car.

This process can be long and drawn out and can take the best part of a day but does protect the new owner from inheriting any fines or debts on the car. We decided to buy from a dealer who would do all the transfer paperwork in the price, as well as give us a warranty. It may cost a little bit more but at least we have peace of mind that everything will be done right. We started with car dealers in the local villages and soon discovered that age and condition didn't really make a great deal of difference to the price.

We saw some real junk at ridiculous prices, all with some body damage, really high mileage, ropey insides or generally just tatty. Most of them don't have prices on them until you ask and a car that would cost you £3,000 in the UK will be at least double that in Spain. Having said that, just about every car we looked at was rust free. As we wanted two cars, we had set a budget and hoped to get a deal but I don't think Spanish dealers understand the concept of a "deal" as the prices stayed the same.

After visiting half a dozen local garages without much success I looked on line and found an English guy on the coast in Fuengirola who sold ex lease cars, about four years old, full service history but high mileage, although the pictures looked really good. I contacted him by phone to find out his location but he didn't have a show room but would bring any cars we wanted to view and meet us in a car park.

Dodgy I know but we selected three cars to look at, all Ford Focus estates, and set off to view them. Anyway the standards were what you would expect in the UK, all polished and clean inside and out, full service and repair history and all original

paperwork. They are all ex lease cars and it looked as if no one had ever sat in the back seats so we picked out two of the three, both four years old but fairly high mileage. He wouldn't move on the price but he did agree to a full tank of diesel in each, that was six weeks ago and so far so good.

At the back end of August we had a major problem with the fish pond. We woke up to find about 30 of the biggest fish floating on the water. As we pulled them out of the water and checked them, none appeared to have any obvious signs of infection or disease on their bodies. The next day another 20 had died but what was really strange is that the remaining fish all seem to be ok. I hope it was just an isolated incident as a couple of weeks have now passed with no more dead fish.

Trip to the beach

When my wife's family came out they wanted to go to the beach so we decided to visit Salobrena to the east of Malaga, a place none of us had ever been to before. It's about an hour's drive from here so we set off about 9.30am and when we arrived it was fairly quiet but by midday the beach was really busy although the weather was gorgeous, the sea was really rough so we couldn't go swimming.

At lunchtime we all headed off to a beach front restaurant offering a 3 course "menu del dia" at nine euros including a drink. As most Spanish tend to head for the restaurants just after 2.00 pm we got there about 1.30 pm, meaning we had ordered and had been served before it got really busy. The food was really tasty and, for the price, there was plenty of it, and they only charged half price for the kids meal. The total bill with drinks was only 80 euros (about £65), not bad value at all for 11 people.





Saving Face Every Day


