



The Internet of Everything

s it really November already? Winter draws on and the trend will be for everyone to be spending more time in front of their computer screen, and more specifically, using the internet. So by no coincidence, this month's article is all about that.

Peering through the mists of time back to the early 1960's, when most people were looning round in bell-bottoms and platforms, Universities in the UK, USA and France were experimenting with sending data between campuses. Fast forward through the years of peace & love, and what was known as The ARPANET was pioneering 'internetworking' and a standard was born that survives to this day: TCP/IP. This is the protocol by which all data is transmitted & received over the internet. Gradually these closed networks were opened up to commercial organisations in the 1990's, and as mentioned last month, by 1994 there were 1,700 website up and running. And in those days you would have to pay to access them!

1998 saw the start of the internet revolution when high street giant Dixons launched subscription-free access to the internet for the masses. In those days, if you were lucky enough to own a computer with a modem inside plus an ordinary telephone line, you could get a CD from Dixons and install Freeserve and 'dial-up' to the internet. Those of you who remember this will also the recall listening the high-pitched squawks and twangs as computers started talking to each other, and the 'world-wide wait' was born; that was the minutes it took to watch each website load!

'And then it was now', as they say in all the best stories. We're all blasé about the connected world, and in these frantic times if a website takes more than a second or two to launch users will lose interest and move onto the next link. 'Online'

has become a byword for doing everything from shopping to banking and even paying taxes. We are encouraged constantly to 'go online'. And indeed many people spend a large part of their waking hours doing so. A recent survey reported that the very first thing most people do when they wake up is to check their smartphone or tablet!

The Internet of Things is the next buzzword (IoT). Estimates vary as to the number of devices that will be connected by the year 2020 but is around 26 to 30 billion. So the concept is that all manner of devices and services will be connected from household appliances to cars, and more importantly health-related systems like heart monitoring. Every device will need a unique identifier (known as an IP address), and the method we use now is having to be reworked to handle the massive and growing requirement. You may have seen adverts for services such as Hive, that enables you to control your home heating from your phone. CCTV is another important user of this technology. Fridges, washing machines and other appliances are next. The idea is that wherever you are, as long as you can get online, you will be in control.

But what happens when your internet goes down? Calamity, the end of the world is nigh, how can we possibly survive, cut off from the rest of the world! There used to be a joke email doing the rounds that warned that the internet would be closed down on January 1st each year for cleaning – can you imagine if that were true!

So who are the people that make sure we all stay connected? Well that falls to your internet service provider (ISP), in our area that of course means KC, aka Karoo. At this point I will thank Chris Philpott, Technical Support Manager for inviting and showing me around the impressive set up at the KC head office in Hull. All the staff are located in one big open plan office and cover everything from marketing & sales to residential and business technical support areas.

KC Technical Support (tel: 606101) is open 7 days a week and handle everything from telephone faults to broadband problems and help. In order to maximise support they have a high-tech computer system that is solely concerned with anticipating customer demand based on incoming call history. This is constantly updated and works out how many staff need to be available on-shift at any time, and when they can take their breaks and days off. Their experienced specialists aim to answer calls in the quickest possible time, but at peak times bearing in mind broadband issues can be quite time consuming, queues inevitably build up. Best advice before phoning in is; first check your router and see if all the lights are on, if in doubt power it off, leave for a minute or so and turn back on again. If you have more than one computer, try the other one. If you use a wireless connection, try plugging in an ethernet cable from your computer to the back of the router and see if that works. Lastly, KC technical support can't deal with problems like your computer not starting up, or not booting into Windows, for that you know who to call (875666)!





Beetroot Soup

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 potato, peeled and diced
- 2.5 cm piece of fresh ginger, grated or finely chopped
- grated zest of 1 orange, plus extra to serve (optional)
- juice of 2 oranges
- 3 medium beetroots, cooked, and cut into small dice
- 1.2 litres of water
- a little cream or yoghurt, to serve (optional)

Method

- 1. Cook the beetroot gently wash leaving roots and an inch or so of stalk and boil for 30 minutes. Slip out of their skins by squeezing them under a cool tap.
- 2. Heat the oil in a large pan, add the onion and fry until soft but not coloured. Add the potato and ginger and fry for 3 minutes.
- 3. Add the orange zest and juice, plus the beetroot and water, then bring to the boil and simmer for 20 minutes, until the potato is tender. Blend until smooth. Reheat gently and season to taste.
- 4. Serve garnished, if you like, with a swirl of cream or yoghurt and a little grated orange zest.

Oven baked bubble and squeak Ingredients

- leftover cooked potatoes
- leftover cooked green veg e.g. savoy, kale, broccoli, brussels sprouts
- salt + pepper
- butter
- grated cheese (optional)

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C. Grease a baking dish with butter. Mash or finely chop the veg and season well with salt and pepper.
- 2. Press into the baking dish and dot with a little extra butter, some cheese too if you like. Bake for 20 mins or so until golden brown on top. Serve with grilled tomatoes, bacon or baked beans!

Apple, Orange and Dried Apricot Crumble

Ingredients

- 8 dessert apples, peeled, cored and cut into 1cm dice
- 1 orange, peeled and divided into segments (or diced)
- juice and grated zest of 1 orange
- 100g dried apricots, roughly chopped
- 60g dates, roughly chopped
- 60g light soft brown sugar
- 175g plain flour
- 125g butter
- 100g caster sugar
- 60g rolled oats

Method

- To make the topping, put the flour and butter in a food processor and whiz until the mixture has a fine consistency. Remove and place in a bowl. Add the sugar and oats and rub together with your fingertips so the mixture is slightly lumpy and not dry.
- 2. Mix the apples and orange with all the remaining ingredients and place in an ovenproof dish. Top with the crumble mixture and then bake in an oven preheated to 150°C/Gas Mark 2 for 45 minutes, until the fruit is tender and the topping golden brown.



On the first day of Christmas, my Labrador brought to me..... an empty chocolate box!

7es, that is what Teal proudly presented to me one early December morning. No problem you may be thinking but I was horrified because the box had been full and was ready to be wrapped. Human chocolate is highly toxic in dogs, especially dark chocolate because the cocoa beans contain a substance called Theobromine.

In general, the amount of Theobromine found in chocolate is small enough such that chocolate can be safely consumed by humans. In domestic animals, the amount metabolizes more slowly so they can easily consume enough to cause chocolate poisoning. The most common victims are dogs for which, can be fatal. The toxic dose for cats is even lower and also they are less prone to eating chocolate since they are unable to taste sweetness. So, as I was saying ... Teal!

My lovely day off began and ended in our Park Street waiting room. She was admitted into the hospital for the day to induce vomiting and also to be monitored. I know the next one may seem silly but alcohol should never be given to a pet. I'm not saying you will be offering a 'tipple' on Christmas day morning but if a glass is within easy reach of our four legged friends then they could be just that too inquisitive. Sadly, if drank it could lead to coma and eventually

New pets? We do not recommend getting a new pet for Christmas. It is better to leave it until after the festive season when things in the household are just that bit more calm but if you happen to have a new addition, please make sure they are identichipped. With all the hustle and bustle, coming and goings in the house, an escaped pet may go unnoticed for a few hours which may be then too late. 
In The Final



Here is Paul's latest walk in his series of monthly rambles. This month his destination is Victoria Square to Stoneferry


The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

Start at Victoria Square City Centre. Distance 2.3 miles.

Prom Victoria Square walk down New Cross Street into Queens Gardens and walk to the left of the Fountain then take the ramp down into the garden and walk towards the towering statue of William Wilberforce. On reaching the end of the gardens emerge on Wilberforce Drive and turn left and cross the road at the traffic lights and walk towards North

Bridge spanning the river Hull.

Cross the bridge and at the busy junction take great care to cross into Witham. Continue down Witham and cross the dual carriageway when convenient and continue down Witham to Holborn Street, turn left into Holborn Street, cross over Spyvee Street and continue walking in the same direction along a distinct path and cycle lane. Pass a children's playground on the left and on reaching Mark Street turn left and then immediately right and again continue in the same direction.

On reaching Chapman Street, follow the path to the right passing under Mount Pleasant via an underpass then follow the path as it swings to the left, cross James Reckitt Avenue and follow the path signed Bransholme, Sutton and Hornsea. Distance to this point 1.2 miles.

Pass through a squeeze stile and continue walking towards a railway bridge, pass under the bridge and continue on the path/cycle track. After passing various derelict buildings, ignore the track to the right signed Sutton and Hornsea but continue ahead on the track signed Bransholme although the sign is not clearly visible.

On reaching Chamberlain road cross over and continue walking in the same direction. Total distance to this point 1.7 miles.

Pass allotments to the right and then an area of waste ground to the right. Almost at the end of this waste ground turn left on a short path to emerge on Foredyke Avenue then turn left. Ignore all side roads off to the left but continue down the main road to the end. Pass to the left of the last house and emerge on Stoneferry, turn left and walk the few yards to the bus stop. Total distance of walk 2.3 miles.

How I did it

Started walk at 10.00 am at Victoria Square.

Completed walk at 11.05 am and boarded bus No. 30 at 11.10 am back to Hull Interchange.

The weather has been remarkably different over the last few winters with one of the warmest Christmas's for a long time last year and only a few years ago we were knee deep in snow. This year differs from the last again with the MET office and the papers saying this winter will be the coldest yet with snow brought down from the artic. Even though we usually take the papers weather warnings with a pinch of salt it is always best to be prepared and protect your garden.

Many plants succumb to frost or to cold, excessively wet soil during winter. The leaves can be frost-bitten and the roots can rot. Prevention is the best course of action and we recommend protecting your plants before the first frost strikes to ensure a good display next year.



How to prevent winter damage;

Mulching – mulching can benefit the soil as well as protect beds from winter weather. It is especially beneficial if you have clear beds. Bare soil is not a natural state and mulching can prevent leaching and soil erosion. Composted bark, mushroom compost, leaf mould and well-rotted manure are great soil quality improvers. A great tip is to pile leaves up when you have cleared them from the lawn and beds. Having a leaf pile will promote leaf mould, which can then be used on bare beds.

Protect plants – there are a number of ways you can protect frost tender plants. You can transports plants like Canna and Dahlias into a container to be moved into the greenhouse, or you can wrap plants with horticultural fleece.

Plant windbreaks – your garden can take a beating from strong winds over the winter months. We suggest planting a strong hedging plant where possible to help protect your garden.

Stake saplings and rose bushes – staking will add strength to young vulnerable plants. Make sure when staking that you do not cause too much damage to the root ball if they have been planted recently.

Move container grown plants – ensure container grown plants are kept in a dry, sheltered area where they can be grouped together for mutual protection. You can protect roots from freezing by wrapping the containers with bubble polythene or a horticultural fleece.

Check sheds and fences – before the weather worsens it is always best to check garden structures for loose panels, roofs, posts and fences. Either replace or repair as this will help to prevent further damage.

Drainage – wet soils can lead to uprooting trees in heavy winds. Deal with any drainage problems promptly over the coming months.

Clear snow off trees and hedges – a build up of snow on hedges or the crowns of trees can cause branches to break. Shake off excess snow if it begins to build up and prune hedges to taper at the top to minimise snow damage.

Feeding – avoid using a nitrogen-rich fertiliser too late in the season as this can stimulate sappy growth.

Protect herbaceous perennials – use grit around the base of the plant as this will stop moisture collecting and rotting the stems. Apply a layer of bark compost about 5cm deep around the plants to help keep them warm.







Here is the latest article from Chris Moore who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

ello and welcome fellow anglers to this month's fishing news it is the 21st October. How are you all? Ok I hope and that you are all still fishing! By the time your read this you may all have dug your winter woollies out, but hey if you have wrapped up correctly then a drop in temperature isn't a problem is it?

This month's tips are to scale back on everything and I do mean everything. The fish will be a more lethargic by now and not bang on the feed as they are in the warmer months and they become weary about feeding. They still do feed and that is the reason a lot of us fish all year round. The Carp don't tend to fight half as hard in the colder months and the silver fish do not give as good a bite indication like they do in the warmer months. So you should be adjusting your tackle accordingly. First of all change the line on your spools to lighter lines, e.g from 6-81b in summer to 3-41b in winter. Plus use a smaller hook and smaller hook lengths i.e down to 18-20's and $1\frac{1}{2}-31$ b hook length. This goes for both your float and feeder gear.

As for your pole fishing it is basically the same principle. Firstly go on to your medium to light elasticated top kits and then just like your reel lines dig out your fine line, small hooked rigs.

Then the biggie, you even have to scale down on your feed. I know I have told you this many times before but it is time to feed little and often, unless the fish are feeding very well if they are not then don't feed very often. Sometimes you may decide to chuck a bomb out with just a grain of corn or a single pellet with no extra feed going in at all.

This is where your own judgement has to come into play. If you are not having any indications from any fish at all periodically keep looking over this swim but fish a different swim instead. The other option is to stop feeding the swim altogether and try another tactic such as a

change of bait etc. I mentioned changing bait it is also time to do that as well. Start using a darker ground bait from now until next March and don't forget to riddle it. Take static baits such as casters, corn and dead maggot. Feed small pellets or hemp and try smaller hook baits such as pinkies and bread punch depending on the size of your quarry of course. With a bit of lady look your catch rates will still be very good if you follow this advice.

The River Hull Championship results as follows:

1st place – N Hurst he fished at Tickton opposite the pub and weighed in with 8930g or 19lb 9oz, well done mate.

2nd place – D Brooks Snr, he weighed in with 7810g or 17lb 4oz. Dave fished Shipyard at Beverly.

3rd place – B Brown whom weighed in with 6340g or 14lb 15oz he fished at Deans

4th place – L Todd, he weighed in with 6300g or 14lb 13oz and he fished at Shipyard too. Well done guys.

I believe 157 people fished so that is not a bad turn out eh? Give it a go and fish our River Hull it is fishing its head off at the moment.

River Derwent Championship results as follows:

1st place – Eric Peacock he weighed in with 6kg 970g and he fished Barmby. He caught on pole and caster.

2nd place – John Urruty he weighed in with 6kg 780g, he fished at Bubwith and caught all his fish on the stick.

3rd place – Craig Hurst he weighed in with 5kg 360g he also fished at Bubwith.

4th place – Julian Griffin he weighed in with 5kg 260g he fished at Barmby.

Nigel Hurst from Murfield and Craig Hurst from Beverly (not related) tied on points for 1st place overall. Nigel took the Championship after the weights were added up. 114 anglers fished this championship and overall 270 anglers fished the Hull and Derwent Championships and over £10,000 where paid out in prizes, not bad that hey guys? Well done to Nigel for winning and well done to everyone else who entered. The survey could not be done without you guys.

Sea scene: the coast is finally producing some good Cod. Top marks are Dimlington, Cowden and Albrough. Best baits are Lug worm and Crab with Ragworm catching Bass and Flattys. The Humber is producing loads of Flattys with an odd Cod to 6lb and some whiting. Once again do not forget to order your live bait as early as possible to avoid disappointment. But as you know we always have an excellent supply of frozen baits to go at if you forget to order.

Remember that our fireworks are on sale until November 10th and are back on sale in December for New Year, Christmas vouchers are available too.

Finally without wanting to cause to much disappointment, I would like to announce to you all that my intention is to stop writing this article. The 2nd International Animal Trainers Conference at Twycross Zoo

Thave just had the pleasure of attending this amazing conference again. It was nearly the highlight of my year....my anticipation was rewarded hugely!

The 1st Conference a year last April had a huge impact on me as a trainer because it opened up a whole new world of Animal training possibilities of which I knew nothing. Training horses using exactly the same techniques as you would use to train a dolphin was an alien world to me. These reward based techniques are all based on absolute unarguable science.....and are 100% ethical. Nothing is done with pressure, nothing is done with punishment and everything is laid out for the animal to be able to succeed. Everyone wants relaxed animals in their care so that living the life is a pleasure for all concerned. Understanding enrichment and its huge variety in its own right is really important to any animal in our care.

Attending this second Conference has reinforced many friendships I made previously and has helped me to understand far more in relation to training any animal, not just horses.and this includes training Humans too!

As with any training strategy there is so much to learn about the absolute basics. In this last year and a half I have spent a vast amount of time getting my head round the science, the long complicated words as well as the actual delivery of reward based training actions. I have read many relative books, attended other conferences (Dr Susan Freidman was brilliant for one!) and have had personal training myself. I have watched endless footage

and have taken Animal welfare and training courses.

It is so important that trainers and pet owners completely understand the impact that their actions have on the behaviour of the animals in their care. We all have huge responsibility when it comes to shaping how our pets, children and even spouses feel by the actions we choose to use in given circumstances.

When deciding on a training plan of action we need to be very clear about what the end result should be, look like, feel for the animal and how it is delivered. When behaviour is going wrong the main criteria is that the course of action you decide to take will completely eliminate the wrong behaviour by building in a positively reinforced desired behaviour (or emotion....as emotions are behaviours too) Having the ability to master a very clear line of communication with your chosen species to mark the second in time the animal performs what you want and following it up with something very reinforcing for the animal is simply brilliant. It works for the trainer because you are spending all your time looking for the good stuff and not the bad! It's great for the animal because they get to find out that we really can understand how they feel and we can be there for them completely free from any negatives!

All animals are like human toddlers in one respect. They get frustrated as well as fearful and can only communicate these frustration feelings through their actions. It is our responsibility to mould their environments, routines, regimes and interactions so that aggression and frustration does not rear its ugly head. Aggression in animals is normal behaviour even though it is obviously undesired by trainers and owners. It is innately hard wired into the brain systems and is part of their coping mechanism.... it helps them cope with their environment. Survival is a massive innate drive and is number 1 for us all when all is said and done. A caged lion or Tiger will tend to display aggression more often than if it is free to roam in its natural setting therefore unbelievable work is going on behind the scenes in order to fulfil these animals needs by providing enrichment is environment, enrichment in training and fulfilling all their natural needs. I didn't realise how very aggressive Sea lions are naturally, some animal species are simply more aggressive by nature but any animal, from a mouse to a Giraffe can and does display aggression. Testosterone can fuel aggression in its own right (as can alcohol and drugs in humans.) It is avoidable of cause and that takes huge skill and knowledge from trainers with animals in captivity.

We keep horses in captivity, even if we deny it. They are only free to roam when they are turned out in a field.....but that field is still fenced round preventing true roaming, which is how a horse was designed to live. It is all relative at the end of the day. Avoidance and reduction of aggression and frustration is a hugely important part of any animal owner's responsibility. Therefore the more we understand about proven science of animal learning and training, the more harmonious the relationship can be.... which is then hugely reinforcing on both sides.






