• Civ c Hh l

Hopefully you will be aware that the ERYC has made the decision to dispose of the Civic Hall and Council Offices located in Market Green. Although the Parish Council is disappointed in the ERYC decision, it does not feel in a position to take over the ownership of both of these premises. The cost of refurbishment and running costs could probably have a detrimental impact upon the Parish Council's budget and subsequently on the precept it charges to the residents. The Parish Council still has a substantial amount of 2899.3 outstanding on the loan that was taken out to purchase and renovate the listed buildings in Market Green, currently occupied by the Parish Council Office and Unique. However, five of our Councillors are working alongside some of Cottingham's organisations and volunteers who are looking at the possible formation of a Community Trust to ascertain if it is viable to take ownership of these premises. If you are interested in offering your support to this initiative, please contact Katrin McClure at coach16@ mcclure.karoo.co.uk to discuss this further.

• Cotting an Neig bourhood Pla - Upda e

We are pleased to announce that the Cottingham Neighbourhood Plan is now in the final stages and is currently out for consultation before being submitted for approval. If you wish to view this document, please visit either the Parish Council Offices, the Customer Service Centre or the Library or visit our website on www.cottinghamparishcouncil.org.uk. Any comments you wish to make must be submitted to the Parish Council Office by Monday 14 November 2016 in order to be considered. When completed, the Neighbourhood Plan will be subject to examination by a suitably qualified, independent person to ensure that it complies with legal reqi rements and is line with both national planning policy and the strategic aims of the local development plans produced by the East Riding of Yorkshire Council. If this is successful, the Plan will then be subject to a referendum within the Parish in which it has to secure over 50% of the vote if it is to be adopted. We will keep you updated as this process continues.

• Memorial Gn dens - Upda e

As Cottingham Parish Council now owns these gardens, work has begun in improving them and bringing them up to a more presentable standard. Over the nex few weeks you will see the trees and shrubs being tidied and reshaped, the central bed and front tubs planted for winter, laurels planted in the gaps in the hedges, along with a new planting scheme along the back wall. Future work will hopefully involve the conversion of the solar powered lights to mains powered ones that will operate on a timing system. We are very proud of these gardens and want to maintain them for the benefit of all our residents and visitors. If you have any comments or suggestions, please do not hesitate to contact the Parish Council Office.

• Youth Prov sion

The Parish Council is currently in the process of collating information to submit a bid to the ERYC to help secure the appointment of Youth Workers within the village. These Youth Workers will be employed for a period of six months by Cottingham Parish Council to carry out a survey to ascertain the future youth provision reqi rements of our village and to look at how we can meet these demands. We will keep you updated on how this initiative progresses.

From April 2016 to September 2016, this initiative has raised £415.50. We would like to thank you for your support for a cleaner village whilst raising much needed funds for this worthwhile project.

As most of the salt bins in the village are owned by the East Riding of Yorkshire Council, they will be in the process of filling the salt bins near you in preparation for winter. Please note that salt bins are intended for self-help use by the public.

Sam Pullen, Solicitor in our Private Client Department discusses why it's important to review your Will

Whilst preparing a Will in the first instance is essential, regularly reviewing it is equally important. There are many factors which can affect your will, varying from a change in your family circumstances to a change in the law.

We recommend that you review your existing Will at least every 4 to 5 years or more frequently if a major change occurs in your life or in the life of one of your beneficiaries.

Significant events in your life such as marriage and divorce can legally change the effect of your Will as can the death of a beneficiary, the birth of a child or grandchild, entering into retirement or receiving a large sum of money such as an inheritance. Any of these factors could mean that when you die, the wishes contained in your Will no longer reflect your current wishes.

If, for example, you have married since you made your last Will, this would mean that in most cases, your Will would be revoked in its entirety and if you were to die before making a new Will, you would be deemed to have died intestate. If you and your spouse or one of the beneficiaries named in your Will are divorced, this could also impact upon the effect of your Will.

In addition, if a beneficiary of your Will dies during your lifetime, you should consider what you would like to

happen to your assets which would otherwise have passed to them. It may be that you would like those assets to pass to a certain person in substitution but without your Will express stating this, it may not happen.

Changes to the law might influence the provisions in your Will and the way in which it is drafted. The Government has recently announced a change to the way they are intending to deal with Inheritance Tax in relation to your family home effective from April 2017. It is intended to introduce a Residence Nil Rate Band which, provided that your Will is drafted effectively, could increase the Nil Rate Band available to your estate on your or your spouse's death and could mean that any Inheritance Tax payable is reduced.

News stories abound particularly over issues caused by the 'Anniversary Update' that has been rolling out since July. Sound or webcam or printers not working. Even consumer magazine Which? has joined the fray by saying "Many people are having issues with Windows 10, and we believe Microsoft should be doing more to fix the problem." Alex Neill, Which? director of campaigns and policy, added: "We rely heavily on our computers to carry out daily activities, so, when they stop working, it is frustrating and stressful".

Mn y customers hu a ked me if they could cla m redress from Microsoft after having had to pay to have their computer repaired following Windows 10 upgrade or updates. A report by tech firm Softpedia (http://tinyurl.com/ z2rzz99) mentions a qe stion raised last year following the launch of the free Windows 10 upgrade on a Microsoft community forum on the subject of a class-action lawsuit being taken against Microsoft. The message says that after upgrading to Windows 10 via 'automatic updates' thousands of the PCs have "been rendered useless," and left with 1. no sound, 2. no operating screen time 3. no access (password issues) 3. memory issues 4. lost files 5. unauthorised access by Microsoft." However, it noted, users considering pursuing a class-action against Microsoft must keep in mind that they agreed to the EULA (end user licence agreement) while installing the new operating system. This renders some of the problems ineligible for redress,s ays the report.

Turning off Windows upda es has always been regarded as 'not recommended' and anyway is virtually impossible in the Home version (without fiddling with the network settings).





WITH ROY WOODCOCK

Alsace a wine of distinction

lsace is known the world over for wine with distinctive aromatics, pur ity of fruit and food-matching prowess, ow ing to the huge range of soils (volcanic, limestone, gneiss, s and stone, m arl and granite to name but a few) and grape varieties, f ound in the mosaic of vineyards.

You can enjoy everything from vivacious and aromatic Muscats, to spicy and floral Gewurztraminers and smoky Pinot Gris. I love all three, but particularly the last two.

People often associate wines from the region with those of Germany,m ainly because of geography and the fact that Alsace and Germany grow the same grape varieties. Because of that,a typical response is "I avoid Alsace wines because there'll be too sweet".

Riesling is a case in point, an underrated wine but considered by many to be the most noble of Alsace's wines and I'm drinking a lot of it right now. Just over one fifth of the region's vineyards are planted with this grape as it thrives in the dry climate here to give characterful and elegant wines.

But where the German winemaker is more likely to add a small amount of the naturally sweet unfermented grape juice back into the wine, the winemaker from Alsace ferments every bit of the sugar in the grape. The majority, therefore, a re totally dry.

Another fundamental difference between wine from Alsace and wine from Germany is the alcohol content - wine from Alsace has,t ypically,1 1 to 12 per cent alcohol,w hile most German wines has a mere eight to nine per cent.

A Riesling I've really enjoyed recently is Close Saint-Jacqe's Riesling 2014 vailable from Majestic at £ 1.99 a bottle, although the price reduces to £ 99 if purchased as part of a mixef sixbot tles.

Scientist Chrétien Oberlin,w ho devoted his life to combatting phyllox ra,a parasite that feeds on the roots of grape vines,f ounded Domaine Viticole de la Ville de Colmar in 195 with the financial support of the city of Colmar. Today, the winery is fortunate to own 28 hectares of vineyards with vines in a number of the Grands Crus - including Pfersigberg, Hengst and Florimont.

It also has an additional 10.5 ctares in its Clos Saint-Jacqe s vineyard, which is where the grapes for this Riesling come from.

Clos Saint-Jacqe s is located on the outskirts of the town of Colmar,w here the warm, dry conditions (Colmar is the second driest town in France) and stony soils are ideal for the cultivation of Riesling grapes.

Protected from the wind by the surrounding high Vosges mountains to the west,t he Clos also benefits from a complex terroir, which is influenced by the nearby Fecht river. The intricate soil composition adds to the uniqe terroir, from low layers of limestone and sandstone,m oving up to a stony surface of gravel and silt,all allowing for optimal growth and slightly earlier ripening than other vines in Alsace.

The 2014 vintage saw tricky weather conditions,s uch as a mild winter and hotter than usual spring. This was followed by a cool summer,all leading to high acidity levels in the grapes. Alongside Sylvaner,R iesling was one of the two big winners in this particular year and the vintage is recognised as producing Riesling wines with great finesse and freshness.

The grapes for this wine were harvested at the peak of ripeness,t hen the whole bunch pneumatically pressed and cold settled for 24hou rs. There was no malolactic fermentation involved, but the wine was aged for two to three months on its fine lees. The result is a wine that is full of pure lime freshness,w ith a complex inerality owing to the vineyard's soil structure.

This Riesling has a racy acidity, which will allow it to age gracefully. In its youth, the wine is marked by a fruit focus which will then give way to an extra ession of mineral nuances over the next four to sixye ars.

The nose shows lime, a pple and white blossom notes, and on the palate the wine has a balanced spicy finish. The perfect accompaniment to salmon, pork or even soft cheese.



The bright lights and colourful parcels around the tree, the smell of Christmas pot pouri and the ever seasonal plants are a magnet to any child let alone a 1 year old but what about our pets? We as parents/grandparents, often take care in buying the toys that are presumed safe for little fingers, watching out for parts that can easily be consumed if they fall into the wrong hands but how many of us pet owners go along with the same line of thinking?

Every child loves chocolate and to see the various array of sweet items dangling from the Christmas tree can be so tempting but more so to our canine friends. Human chocolate is highly is highly tok c in dogs, especially dark chocolate because the cocoa beans contain a substance called Theobromine.

In general the amount of Theobromine found in chocolate is small

enough such that chocolate can be safely consumed by humans. In domestic animals, the amount metabolises more slowly so they can easily consume enough to cause tok c poisoning. The most common victims are dogs for which can be fatal. The tok c dose for cats is even lower and are less prone to eating chocolate since they are unable to taste the sweetness.

Everyone likes a Christmas cake even if its just for the icing and marzipan but please be very careful as 2 of the ingredients namely raisins and currants, can be potentially poisonous and is highly tok c to a dogs kidneys.

So far it has been our canine friend but our felines do not get off that lightly. Tinsel can be so decorative around the tree and also a playful attraction to small children but in a cats eyes its especially ex iting. After all, it's shiny, dangles and is something new in their environment so few cats can pass this up. Playing with the tinsel is not the problem, it is when it gets wrapped round their tongue or is swallowed when the nightmare begins. Objects that are swallowed can cause an obstruction in their digestive tract which may then involve major surgery to be removed. With the tree still in mind, cats may also be attracted to the baubles which then may shatter, splinter and cut their paws. In the case of real Christmas trees, beware of the sharp pine needles.

Twinkling lights around the tree is a big attraction to any toddler and can be so mesmerizing but obviously DANGEROUS, even to cat or young puppy.....lights have electrical wires which are a major hazard when chewed not only for them but a potential fire risk too. Please bear all these in mind when decking out your halls.

How many of us have holly, ivy or poinsettia in the house? Me for one, but how many realize they are tok c to our furry friends? Also on the list are mistletoe and amazingly, lilies! They are all my favourites but are now kept well out of reach of inqi sitive paws. Turkey bones (although tempting to give as a treat) can cause choking, constipation as well as seriously damaging internal organs. I know the nek one may seem silly but alcohol should never be given to a pet. I'm not saying you will be offering a 'tipple' on Christmas day morning but if a glass is within easy reach to our four legged friends then they could be just that bit too inqi sitive. If drank it could lead to coma and eventually death.

New pets......we do not recommend getting a new pet for Christmas. It is better to leave it until after the festive season when things in the household are just that bit more calm but if you happen to have a new addition, please make sure they are identichipped. With all the hustle and bustle, coming and goings in the house, an escaped pet may go unnoticed for a few hours which may then be too late. It may only cost the price of a couple of bottles of wine but is for life so what better way of giving you that ek ra peace of mind. Some of the nicest things at this time of year are the smells...logs on the fire, baking in the oven or potpourri pots which give off the amazing smell of Christmas. I used to like them around the house during the festive time but since 2 little dogs were admitted to our Park Street surgery with poisoning after eating one of these pots, they are now kept well out of reach. They contain 2 substances namely essential oils and cationic detergents and it is the later that is the most concerning. It can cause severe ulceration and chemical burns to your pets skin and their digestive tract.

Something that is not in the house but associated with the cold weather... anti freeze. Please keep this well away from inqi sitive paws. The sweet taste can be so tempting but fatal!!

So there we have it......the HAZARDS of Christmas.... but please remember, they are only hazards when they are within the reach of inquisitive paws, mouths and not forgetting little fingers!

If you have any qe ries at all or concerns that your pet has consumed a hazardous item, please contact us immediately. Time is important so please do not hesitate, no matter how small and insignificant you feel your qe stions maybe.

ello again, I hope you are well. Another busy month has passed. I had a great trip to Munich to an International Dental Laser Conference. The first part was invitation only don't you know. I was the only Brit in the place and got a bit of good-humoured stick about Brek t from some European colleagues. What was interesting was a taste of things to come.

So, W a 's The Future?

Well, I thought that we were futuristic using the high tech lasers we have in practice. However, there is a team in Bonn, Germany, that are working on pico and femto-lasers. Get ready for the GEEKY bit. A picosecond is a trillionth (one millionth of one millionth) of a second. A femtosecond is a qa drillionth (one millionth of one billionth) of a second. So these are fantastically small lengths of time. A pico or femto laser has a laser pulse that is that short. This means that a low energy, pulsed laser light can have outrageously high peak power. In turn this means that the vvvvvvv short pulse of electromagnetic energy is powerful enough to strip electrons from atoms. This causes ionisation and formation of plasma. WOW!

So, W a 's This GeekyS tuff Got To Do With Dentistry

It means that tooth tissue, gums and bone can be removed very quickly and with no heat production because the reaction is so

instantaneous. In the future it may replace the dental drill. One of the three lasers I use can all this without vibration but needs water for tooth tissue and bone because it is absorbed in water. All three lasers we have are what we call wavelength dependent. These



new lasers are not wavelength dependent just low energy but high peak power to create plasma. At the moment though they are about the size of a double wardrobe without a small delivery system!! It was like Tomorrows World. I'm showing my age now.

Anti Snoring Trea ment

I saw another presentation on non-surgical laser treatment to shrink the soft palate to help snoring sufferers. It can also be effective in helping sleep apnoea. No surgery, no numbing, just laser light therapy in three 20 minute treatment sessions. Success rates of %, lasting between 1 and 3 years. Guess who is looking for the training course to do it? Ex iting, life changing stuff this.

Free Mouth Cn cer Screening

I mentioned last time about November being Mouth Cancer Action Month. In support of this we are putting on a full day of free Mouth Cancer screening with Anna our new dentist. She's getting a fan club already! She will have a good look and use a VELscope Vx device as an extra screening. We are



teaming up again with Lloyds Chemist who will do Blood Pressure and Diabetes checks, in the morning and maybe in the afternoon. The date for your diary is November 29^{th} .

Off To Trea Refug es

In the last week of November I am pleased to be off to Greece with my four other Trustees of Dental Mavericks. It is our inaugural trip to treat refugees at camps in and around Thessalonika. We are working with Health Point Foundation and on particular Dental Point Project. I was vetted over the phone last week by the Dental Lead, Ola.



She only graduated from dental school in 2011. She has real purpose and it was great to talk with her, she was lovely. There are thousands of people there. Originally there was a non-official camp of 16,000 people. Since the Turkish agreement the camps are now military run and there are 13 of them but they may be up to 15 by the time we get there. We are aiming to sort out a programme and protocol to able to send out groups of volunteers on a monthly or two monthly basis. Every little helps eh. I love being a Maverick.



The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.



tart at the Bus stop immediately before the "T" junction in Burstwick and on alighting from the bus turn left to walk towards the Hare & Hounds pub. At the junction near the Memorial Cross,t urn left into Pinfold Lane.

At the end of the lane continue straight ahead between a wooden fence on the left and a hedge on the right. Pass through a kissing gate into waste land and then pass through a second kissing gate into farm land and ascend a short rise into open fields and walk with the hedge on the right which eventually disappears to leave a dyke on the right.

Cross a wooden foot bridge and walk straight ahead across the next narrow field and then cross a wide foot bridge with metal hand rails. Immediately after crossing the bridge turn left and walk with a drain on the left. Continue straight ahead across three fields keeping the drain and, at times, a hedge on the left.

Eventually leave the field to emerge onto the old railway track and turn right. Follow this railway track across two roads which both lead back into Hedon. After crossing the second road, continue ahead for about 90 metres and then turn left into a grass field.

Keep the field hedge on the left and after a short distance pass through a narrow wooded area and cross a concrete bridge. Turn right and follow the track for about 200 metres and then turn left at a way marker sign, cross a foot bridge and pass through a metal gate and walk with the hedge and cemetery on the right.

Exit the field through a metal kissing gate and emerge on a lane, turn right and at the end of the lane continue straight ahead crossing a grassed area to take a path with houses to the right. On reaching the road turn left and cross the road to the Bus stop.



hat will winter bring this year? The weather has been remarkable different over the last few winters with one of the warmest Christmas's for a long time last year and the year before the worst snow we had seen for over θ ye ars.

Plus when the days are dark and dreary we can cheer our gardens up with bursts of colour. There's something especially valuable about shrubs which flower in winter. Seeing these delightful and resilient flowers putting on a show through short, dark days and taking frost, rain and snow in their stride lifts our spirits and encourages us to get outside. Many can also be cut for indoor winter posies, and many are fragrant.



Housepla ts

At this time of year it's nice to add colour to your garden and your home with flowers and foliage. There's nothing better for brightening up an indoor environment than a well-grown houseplant and they are available in a vast range of forms from tiny gems suitable for the smallest windowsill to rampant growers for the largest hallway. They offer lush foliage, beautiful blooms and interesting forms. Some thrive in damp bathrooms, others need a sunny spot, so make sure you choose a houseplant that will tolerate the conditions in which it is to grow. Ask our staff for advice on the best choice.

Once you've made your purchase, take care when transporting houseplants to protect them from cold, drafts, wind or ex essive heat. Failure to do so can lead to plant deterioration or even death, and the effects may not fully show themselves until some time after you've bought it.

Once your new houseplant is safely home, you need to care for it correctly to ensure that it remains in pristine condition – and this largely depends on how well it is watered. Too little or

too much watering can cause problems.

Ov rwa ering Giving too much water can be as dangerous as under watering. The roots not only reqi re moisture but also air, so overwatering leads to the forcible removal of air from the potting compost so the houseplant's roots are killed by suffocation.

Best Pra tice: Watering little and often is the best advice, taking into account the growing environment and the seasons. Watering from below is the best approach as some plants can suffer from rotting or sun scorch if water is directed onto their stems,r oot systems or foliage.

Dra ng

The best method is to stand the pot (which must have drainage holes in the bottom) on a suitable sized saucer into which a small amount of gravel has been placed.

Fill the saucer to about 1/3 of its depth with water and leave the plant standing for θ m inutes.

If all the water has been taken up you can repeat the operation until uptake stops, then any surplus water should be tipped away but of course retaining the gravel.

Pests & Disea es

Healthy Habit: Plants that are well-fed and watered are less likely to suffer from pests and diseases, so prevention is always better than cure. However, keep a look-out for common houseplant pests. Pick off any visible pests from the stems, leaves or soil, clean leaves with water and use a chemical spray available from our garden centre, or try an organic or biological control.

Beekeeping with Neil Gower -Neil continues his quarterly review of the calendar of a beekeeper

A New Home . . .

Since my last article I've been stopped in the street, at the supermarket checkout, in a car park and even at a set of traffic lights in the centre of Cottingham. The question has always been the same,....."Have you found a new home for your bees?"

I'm delighted to say that after some anxiety they do have a new home

and seem to be settling in nicely.

Many Beekeepers constantly keep their eyes and ears open in the hope of finding sites for new apiaries; some in order to increase their colony numbers, some to be able to provide a qa rantine area for swarms they have collected and others who may wish or need to vacate their existing sites. Sitting firmly in the latter category I'd previously put out a few tentative enquiries and started to follow up on some of them once I realised, in the summer that I would have to move from the site I occupied at that time. Fortunately, one of my preferred options started to look promising and actually came together quickly with the result that shortly after my last article had 'gone to press' I was on the move.

My new apiary offers slightly less space and I am restricted to two hives, but I had amalgamated some of my colonies anyway, so this was not really an issue. Once agreement had been reached and I had erected some new hive stands everything was ready to receive the bees.

I closed the hive entrances the evening before the move and the next day I loaded the hives into the back of my car. It's funny how none of the family want to sit in the car with two fully laden bee hives in the back even when they are sealed with duck tape and strapped down with webbing. The transfer was smooth without too much trauma for either me or the bees and they have spent the summer foraging and gaining in numbers in preparation for the winter.

Shortly after the move I received a call from the Government Bee Inspector. He had discovered a case of foul brood during a routine inspection in the area and wanted to examine the apiaries of all local Beekeepers who had caught swarms this season. Foul Brood is a notifiable disease which causes complete colony collapse, is highly contagious and results in the destruction of the bees and the burning of all affected frames and equipment in a fire pit. I was confident that my colonies were not infected as I had only just inspected them and am pleased to report that they received a clean bill of health from the inspector. It also looks like his discovery and prompt action had restricted the problem to a single case.

The British beekeeping fraternity has been monitoring two other potential pest threats to our bees over the past few years. One is the Small Hive Beetle which originates from Africa but has decimated colonies across Australasia and the United States and has now been discovered in Italy. The beetle is a scavenger that feeds on honey, pollen and bee larvae, first weakening and then destroying a colony. The Italian authorities are working hard to isolate and destroy the outbreak and there is cooperation across all European countries.

The second has been the expected arrival of the non native Asian Hornet into the UK. The hornet was introduced into Southern Europe by mistake through the importation of garden ornaments from China and has been working its way northwards through France for some time. The Asian Hornet is carnivorous and kills honeybees as they emerge from or return to the hive by decapitation. Eventually there are not enough bees to defend the entrance and the hornets enter the hive, eat the larvae and steal the honey.

In August of this year the Asian Hornet was discovered in the Channel Islands, and in September the first sighting was made on mainland Britain in Gloucestershire. The Government agency FERA has been planning how to deal with such an eventuality for some time and the plan swung into action. Insects have been caught and destroyed along with nests, and search perimeters have been set up under the control of FERA. A second sighting was then confirmed in October in Somerset. It is suspected that the Asian Hornet will not be able to venture too far north due to the colder winters, but we watch developments with interest.

Unlike some Beekeepers I don't take my bees up to the moors for the heather so my season is pretty much over at the end of August. The good weather in September and early October was very welcome as it allowed the bees to continue to forage for pollen and nectar on Russian Vine, Ivy and Himalayan Balsam which has boosted their supplies for winter. I've treated them against Varroa and have given them extra support by adding syrup feeders to the hive to help them stock up. Wasps are active in the early Autumn looking for an easy meal, so the hive entrances are restricted to allow the bees to defend the hive against wasps wanting to steal their honey stores. Mouse guards are also added at this time of year for the same reason and will stay on until the spring. I'll inspect the hives much less frequently, mainly checking that they have enough food and will let you know how things are looking in my next article scheduled for February.

Pictures

inding a tenant is usually the first step for a Landlord in letting out a property. The vast majority of tenants look for a property online and take seconds to decide whether they are interested in a property or not. You may have the most stunning of properties to show to the world, but if your pictures don't reflect this, you won't generate the interest that your property deserves.

Great pictures are essential for the letting and future letting of your property. If your property doesn't quite have the 'curb appeal', don't use a picture of the front of the property as one of your first photos to appear online. Tenants are very different to people who are buying a property, they are not as concerned about what's on the outside, they want to know what is on the inside.

Make sure you have at least one killer picture that has the WOW factor that makes the tenant want to find out a bit more about your property. There is nothing more a tenant likes to see than an impressive kitchen, a light, spacious lounge, French doors, maybe a feature fireplace.

Your pictures can only be as good as the camera that you are using, the picture might look quite good on your phone, but when it is uploaded to your advert, the quality of the picture can sometimes become distorted. Your pictures are likely to be competing with other pictures. Investing in a good camera, using a wide angle lens to get a better perspective of the smaller rooms is an investment in your property and used correctly will reap the rewards.

A professional photographer may be regarded as a bit of an extravagance to take pictures for you of your property, however, if you know a friendly one, for the price of a bottle of wine or a light lunch this would be a small price to pay for great photos. You may not know a photographer that you can ask, however there are lots of online courses, groups to join and even photographers that are happy to give you some of the basics, which can really make a difference to your pictures.

Take your time and think about what you are photographing, you often only get one chance to take a good picture before a tenant moves in with all of their items. A good picture taken at the start can be kept and reused every time you need to find another tenant and you don't want to wait until a tenant has moved out to take more pictures, you want to hit the ground running as soon as you know a tenant is going to be leaving.

A well-lit room is much more appealing than a dark one. Open all blinds, curtains and doors to get as much light in as possible. Are the curtains straight and uniform and the pictures on the walls straight? Move objects out the way that clutter areas and don't need to be there. If it doesn't enhance your picture then don't let it hijack the shot.

Mutilation and abuse in our showing and pet breeding industries.

umans have this fascination in ruining everything. At coffee time this morning my staff, customers and I were all talking about the impact of human vanity on our animals. The discussion ran from dog breeding to suspect veterinary procedures which physically alter an animal for no gain to the animal in question.

Crufts this year was blighted by the ex raordinary prize given to a crippled German Shepard, to which there followed a real hue and cry across many spectrums. The dog walked on its hocks because the breeding had sloped its rear end to near complete collapse. The Judge in question had thought that this horrific, hobbled state was not only acceptable but should become the breed standard by presenting it with a win. German Shepard's used to be powerful attack dogs, standing over their forehand on lifted hocks and strong rear end musculature.

So many breeds of dog and cats have had their faces flattened, ears minaturised and noses shortened to such an awful degree that the animals suffer their entire lives with eye, ear, lung and throat infections as a result. They can no longer breath. They can no longer eat. Their jaws have become deformed with their lower jaw jutting out in-front of the upper.

So many breeds have become miniaturised to a ridiculous degree, including horses, pigs designed for the pet trade, dogs and cats, rabbits..you name it, we have destroyed any semblance of what the original breed stamp was and all for what? Simply for our human vanity!

In days of yore, all our Clydesdale and Shire horses were routinely tail docked as a safety precaution for their working lives. It was imperative that their tails could not get caught up in the traces, thresher, plough or

any other mechanical farming eqi pment they pulled. Thankfully these days they no longer dock heavy horse tails but their tails are frequently shaved off just for the show ring. Horses need their tails to swish away biting insects and flies which torment them all summer long. Is it an ethical dilemma to take away their only means of protection from biting flies? I think so. Try standing with your hands tied behind your back and be presented with mosquitoes and horse fly bites for all the daylight hours, all summer long. You would be driven insane! It would literally be a form of torture. There is no need to shave the docks, skilled plaiting can keep the tail up and away in a decorative way for the short time they are in the show ring.

In the USA, tail muscles and tendons either side and underneath the tail are cut or severed to prevent the show Saddle Bred horses from being able to lower its tail ever again. Sometimes they remove part of the end of the tail bones too so that the stump is short and very upright. It is a very painful procedure and perfectly legal. Applying ginger paste to the anus just before entry into the ring is also common practice. How disgusting is that! There has been much publicised over the use of Soring in the Tennessee Walking horse world to produce an over ex ggerated gait called The Big Lick.

"Soring involves the intentional infliction of pain to a horse's legs or hooves in order to force the horse to perform an artificial, exaggerated gait. Caustic chemicals—blistering agents like mustard oil, diesel fuel and kerosene—are applied to the horse's limbs, causing extreme pain and suffering.

A particularly egregious form of soring, known as pressure shoeing, involves cutting a horse's hoof almost to the quick and tightly nailing on a shoe, or standing a horse for hours with the sensitive part of his soles on a block or other raised object. This causes excruciating pressure and pain whenever the horse puts weight on the hoof."

I have only touched on this subject. It is vast, internationally widespread and creates much in the way of suffering to the animals we proclaim to love. We really do have much to answer for in the world of Showing animals across the spectrum and the production of mutilated animals for the pet trade.

Beware of unannounced doorstep sellers

esidents across the East Riding are being asked to be vigilant and not buy goods or services from unannounced doorstep sellers or unsolicited telephone calls.

Recently, officers from East Riding of Yorkshire Council's food safety team have received reports of gangs, usually from the north east, knocking on doors offering fish for sale.

The scam usually involves a high-pressure doorstep sales pitch in which the resident is encouraged to hand over a sum of money for some fish, which may be of questionable quality.

Whilst the gangs sometimes only accept cash, there have been cases where a hand-held debit or credit card machine has been used to scam residents out of a large amount of cash.

The gangs will usually offer to put the fish, which may not have

any proper packaging or use by date, directly into the freezer and by the time the buyer has realised the fish is of poor quality, those responsible are long gone.

Residents who are targeted by doorstep sellers should:

- not allow cold callers into their home
- not hand over any cash on the doorstep
- not use any bank card or cheque book on the doorstep.

Doorstep selling is just one way of conning money out of people, who can be targeted because they are vulnerable, and the council's trading standards officers are reminding residents to be vigilant when answering telephone calls when someone is trying to sell a product or service and asking for immediate payment.

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and local partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Criminals are starting to use more sophisticated ways to scam residents but people still need to be aware that the old-fashioned methods of telephone and door-step scamming are still being used.

"I would ask people not to feel pressured into buying services either on their doorstep or over the telephone and either shut the door or hang up and not to hand over any money or card details.

"There are many legitimate fish sellers operating in the East Riding who sell locally and these businesses will operate in clearlymarked vans with their details and information on the goods they

"Those selling legitimate products or services on the phone will give people time to think about what is on offer rather than demanding payment there and then.

"If the goods or products sound too good to be true, they usually



Free flu vaccinations available to more school children

Tith the flu season approaching it is time for eligible patients to get their vaccinations. This year, as part of the Stay Well This Winter campaign, vaccinations in England are being extended and will now be available to children in school year three.

Once again NHS Hull Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) is keen to encourage as many eligible people as possible to get the vaccination, particularly those who are most at risk from flu.

The Stay Well This Winter campaign seeks to ease the pressure on the NHS by helping people to remain fit and healthy throughout the colder winter months.

Sarah Smyth, Director of Quality and Clinical Governance/ Executive Nurse, said: "Seasonal flu is a highly infectious virus. While many people recover from it quickly, the flu can cause complications for some.

"Prevention through vaccination is still our best weapon in the battle against the spread of flu. That's why it is so important to protect ourselves and the people around us by getting vaccinated.

"If you're over 65, have a long term medical condition, are living in a nursing home or if you are the main carer for an older or disabled person, then it's essential for you to get your vaccination. We also encourage pregnant women to get the vaccine. Your body will naturally pass on its antibodies, helping to protect your child.

"The big news this year is that flu vaccinations are being offered to more children. If your child is aged two, three or four or is at school in years 1, 2 or 3 then they can have a free, painless vaccination in the form of a nasal spray.

All of these groups are eligible for a free vaccination. Simply speak with your GP, practice nurse or pharmacist.

It is best to have the flu vaccination in the autumn before any outbreaks of flu. People are reminded that they will need it every year as the virus changes. Even if you had a vaccination last year, you may not be protected.

Superfoods

uperfoods can really contribute to your good health because they have so much to offer you. The more that you consume on a regular basis the stronger will be your immune system and the greater your energy and vitality levels. To optimize your health you owe it to yourself to include these foods in your new year's meals!

In my last post I shared two superfoods for the New Year here, but there are lots more but not enough space for them all.

Here we look at three more superfoods that you will want to start enjoying or more of 4 his year.

ChiaS eeds:

Chia seeds are very much like flaxseeds. They are a source of soluble fibre which is good for the heart. They are also high in protein and high in essential omega-3 fats. They are also rich in calcium, magnesium, iron and potassium. You only need a small portion of chia seeds to give you a boost of energy and to balance out your blood sugar.

Chia seeds make a great addition to your breakfast cereal, a bowl of oatmeal or a bowl of yogurt. These small health enhancing seeds contain six times more calcium than milk, three times more iron than spinach, two times more potassium than bananas and 15 times more magnesium than broccoli.

Pomeg a a es:

Pomegranates are a perfect food for the winter because they are most readily available during the late fall and the early to mid-winter months. Often thought of as the "jewels of winter" this colourful and tasty fruit can add variety to your salads and your desserts.

Pomegranates are rich in an antioxidant known as ellagic acid which can help to combat inflammatory health conditions such as atherosclerosis, arthritis and a number of infections. Pomegranates and pears make for a tasty treat when eaten together.

There is a trick to eating a pomegranate. Submerge it is a bowl of water as you go about the task of taking off the outer rind and the white pith. This will cause the seeds of the fruit to sink to the bottom of the bowl. When you eat the seeds directly from the opened rind of the fruit you become conscious of how many you are consuming which makes eating too many highly unlikely.

Green Tea

If you are a coffee drinker then it would not hurt you to give green tea a try. While coffee does have some health benefits, green tea also has its share of benefits that can do your body good. Both coffee and green tea contains antioxidants and help to promote weight loss. However green tea has also been shown to be an effective cancer fighter.

Approximately one-third of a green tea leaf is composed of antioxidants known as catechins. The main catechin is called epigallocatechin gallate. Due to its long name it is most often referred to by its acronym, EGCG. Research studies have shown that EGCG is effective in terms of boosting metabolism and it also is able to prevent the development of certain types of cancers, in particular these include bladder cancer and prostate cancer.

But the goodness of green tea does not end there. It also contains an amino acid called L-theanine which helps to relieve stress and anxiety and supports a relaxed and calm state of mind. Green tea is good in general (green ginger mint tea is qi te a savoury treat!) but if you wish you can choose the most potent form of it known as matcha. This type of green tea is finely milled and very tasty to the taste buds! Yum!
