



Our office is currently experiencing staffing issues and you may have seen that we have not been open to the public on Monday's in October. I would like to take this opportunity to apologise for any inconvenience caused. At the time of writing, I am unsure as to whether this arrangement may have to continue into November. If it does a notice will be placed on the front door of our offices and online on the Parish Council website.

On a personal note, part of the staffing issues have been caused by myself as I took two weeks leave for the birth of my first child. Aurora Kay was born on 11th September and both her and her mother are well. I would like to apologise to anyone who has been into the office since then and noticed me looking more tired than usual!

I am enjoying meeting the people of Cottingham who come into the office, but just a word of advice for those who come in for dog waste bags, if you really need some bags come early in the month. We order our bags in bulk for the financial year and then ration them out on a monthly basis. We have 120 bags per month which equates to 60 people, on the assumption that everyone takes the two bags that they are allowed. We work on a first come first served basis and normally run out at least a week before the end of the month, sometimes sooner. In October we ran out at around lunchtime on the 18th.

Grants to Local Organisations

Cottingham Parish Council may award grants to any community groups or charitable organisations that are beneficial to the village. If you belong to an organisation and wish to apply for grant funding from the Parish Council, then in the first instance, please contact the Parish Council Office for more information and an application form. Please note that there are criteria elements to this form that need to be taken into consideration. All application forms received are decided upon at the next scheduled Finance & Asset Management Committee Meeting. The next meeting of the committee is **Tuesday 14th November**.

At our meeting in September grants were given to Cottingham Christmas Lights, Twilight Football, and the Mens (de Luda) Society.

As well as individual grants, the Parish Council donates money received through the sale of dog waste bags. Between April 2016 to March 2017 this raised £830, which was given to Cottingham Christmas Lights. For the 2017/2018 financial year the money will be given to Cottingham Wild Spaces. The charge for the bags remains at 50p per pack (each pack containing 50 bags) and is limited to 2 packs per person per month.

Cottingham Parish Council extends its warmest congratulations to the Cottingham Village Trust who have acquired the transfer of the Civic Hall and Council Offices from East Riding of Yorkshire Council. The transfer is due to take place early next year and we look forward to working with them in the future.

Cottingham Parish Council supported the Trust with grants to enable them to conduct a survey of the building and to put together a business plan. The Trust will now be conducting a number of fundraising events including a Zumbathon on November 26th and a carol concert on December 15th. We encourage you all to attend.

New computers, security and new product news

November and December are the months when many people are thinking about new computers. So it's a good time to mention another important point and that's security. Wi-Fi security - The big news recently, of course, is the newly-found security hole in WPA2 - the security standard used by modern Wi-Fi to keep your sensitive information encrypted. At the time of writing, major manufacturers and software companies were aware of this new threat and were going about issuing patches and security fixes as necessary. Although home users probably don't have to worry unduly about this as they are less likely to be targeted, do look out for possible news of software upgrades for your WIFI router.

Closing iPad apps – When using your iPad (or iPhone), every time you open an app whether it be email, messaging, weather etc., it stays running in the background. This can use up memory and battery power, so every now and then it is a good idea to close them all down. All you have to do is double press (quickly) the round home button, and this will cascade all your open apps and you can swipe up each app to close it. When you've finished just press the home button once to return to the home screen.

An undersea internet cable that is fast enough to stream over 71m high-definition movies at the same time has just been laid by Microsoft and Facebook. The 160-terabits-persecond pipeline that stretches 4,000 miles under the Atlantic Ocean is the highest capacity subsea cable to cross the body of water and runs from Virginia in the United States to Bilbao in Spain. Telephone scam – yes, I must mention this again as I have many times before. There has been another spate of unsolicited calls to computer users in this area purporting to be from Microsoft (which they are not) offering to fix problems with your computer (which they won't) and then fraudulently taking money for their (non-existent) services. If you get such calls, and they can be very persistent, tell them you are not interested, or that you have a local computer specialist, or that you don't have a computer!



Blue is the colour, wine making is the game

lvis Presley may have been ahead of his time by 60 years when he released "Blue Christmas" in 1957, for the rather startling news of late has concerned blue fizz being produced in time for the festive season.

This most unlikely of trends has emerged with the launch of a sparkling wine called Eden. It's made from Chardonnay grapes from Provence and is medium sweet with 38g/l of sugar added.

Selling for £45 a bottle, it is not cheap but follows on from other blue sparklers launched earlier this year.

In May, Italian company Saracini Wines introduced Blumond, a seven per cent by alcohol "wine" made from a blend of Prosecco, blue curação and peach while in August English entrepreneur Chris Arbery launched a blue "Cava" in the UK called Skyfall.

Described as fresh and crisp, Skyfall is made in Sant Sadurni d'Anoia in Barcelona using only natural ingredients, combining four grapes: Macabeu, Parellada, Xarel-lo and Chardonnay.

Each bottle is aged for three years, turned by hand, with a blend of natural flower and fruit extracts added towards the end of the production process to create the turquoise hue. Labelled by hand, it has an ABV of 12 per cent.

Like Eden, this blue fizz doesn't come cheap and is currently selling for 39.99 a bottle on the Skyfall website (www.skyfalluk.co.uk)

And should you want to try Eden for your very own blue Christmas then that, too, can be bought online via www.sparklingeden.com

Me? I think I'll stick to all things traditional. So, I won't be investing, either, in what Lidl describes as a "hangover-free" Prosecco launched last month. Their Organic Prosecco Spumante, which is said to boast "bright aromas of pear and white peach", has gone on sale for £7.99. The retailer claims that because the fizz is low in sulphites, imbibers are less likely to get a hangover from it.

"We've all had that shocking wine hangover. This is sometimes attributed to the sulphite preservatives used in wine to keep them fresher for longer. Generally, organic wine producers use a lower level of sulphites in the production process, which means they are less likely to contribute to hangovers," said a spokesman for Lidl.

Meanwhile, Aldi has announced that it will expand its alcohol range this month, stocking a chocolate-flavoured dessert wine with notes of "figs, toffee and caramel" in time for Christmas.

The Rubis chocolate non-vintage wine uses a base of fortified Tempranillo, more commonly found in Rioja, and is infused with chocolate essence. It can be served at either room temperature or chilled over ice, according to the winemaker's website.

The wine, which has flavours of "raisins, figs, dates, toffee and caramel," has proved popular with industry leaders. It won the Silver award in 2015's International Wine and Spirits Competition and took the IWSC's Silver award again last year.

The fortified wine, which has a deep ruby colour, has notes of "mocha with a hint of freshly ground coffee beans, plus overtones of red fruit and cream," according to the IWSC.

"Flavours of raspberry and cherry come forth on the mid palate, giving way to notes of creamy milk chocolate. Climaxing with a lingering a luxurious and silky finish."

The unique Tempranillo has received positive reviews from retailers. The Whiskey Exchange describes the drink as "a very off-the-wall alternative to Port".

While Rubis' dessert wine is priced at around £13 online, Aldi will sell the bottles for £9.99. The company said the drink "would make the perfect end to a festive feast".

* If you're reading this before Bonfire Night you might like to try this recipe for mulled wine. Most recipes are variations on a theme but this one calls for: Bottle of red wine (Cabernet Sauvignon, Pinotage or Carménère would work well), 60g/2oz demerara sugar, 1 cinnamon stick, grated nutmeg, an orange halved, dried bay leaf and 60ml/2fl oz of sloe or damson gin or port (optional).

Put the wine in a saucepan with the orange, sugar, bay leaf and the spices. Heat gently until the sugar has dissolved. Taste to see if you want the wine sweeter, and add more sugar to taste. Take off the heat and stir in the added alcohol if you are using it. Strain into heatproof glasses and serve at once.

And if you've already had your fireworks, the wine will taste equally as good at any time through the winter!

* Finally, just a note to say Roberts & Speight's annual wine and food tasting takes place at Longcroft Lower School in Beverley on Wednesday November 15th, 6.30 to 9.30pm. It's a chance to try over 150 wines, beers and food at your leisure. Tickets cost £15.



I must say it is amusement most of the time but on the odd occasion when he heads, on a determined mission, towards Noah's Lego, Star Wars figures or even an attempt of tasting one of Baxter's dog biscuits disrupting whatever is in his path, is another matter. Looking around the house, there are a lot of potential dangers for tiny fingers, toes and mouths so my daughter Kath and partner Matt, have had quite a task in making everything 'Alfie' proof. Are the plug sockets covered, is everything high and out of the way or are there any wires he can easily pull? At the moment everything is virtually sound but what about when the festive season begins? The bright lights and colourful parcels around the tree, the smell of Christmas pot pourri and the ever-seasonal plants are a magnet to any child let alone an inquisitive 18th month old but what about our pets? We as parents/ grandparents, often take care in buying toys that are presumed safe for little fingers, watching out for parts that can easily be consumed if they fall into the wrong hands but how many of us pet owners go along the same line of thinking?

Every child loves chocolate and to see the various array of sweet items dangling from the Christmas tree can be so tempting but more so to our canine friends. Human chocolate is highly toxic in dogs, especially dark chocolate because the cocoa beans contain a substance called theobromine. In general, the amount of this substance found in chocolate is small enough to cause toxic poisoning. The most common victims are dogs for which can be fatal. The toxic dose for cats is even lower and are less prone to eating chocolate since they are

The majority of us enjoy a slice of Christmas cake even if it's just for the icing and marzipan but please be very careful as two of the ingredients namely raisins and currants, can be potentially poisonous and is highly toxic to a dog's kidneys

So far it has been our canine friend but our felines do not get off lightly. Tinsel can be so decorative around the tree and also a playful attraction to small children but in a cats eyes it is especially exciting. After all, its shiny, dangles and is something new in the environment so how many cats can pass this by. Playing with the tinsel is not the problem, it is when it gets wrapped round their tongue or is swallowed when the nightmare begins. Objects that are swallowed can cause an obstruction in the digestive tract which may then involve major surgery to be removed. With the tree still in mind, cats may also be attracted to the baubles which then may shatter, splinter and cut their paws. In the case of the real Christmas trees, beware of the sharp pine needles. Twinkling lights around the tree is a big attraction to any toddler and can be so mesmerizing but obviously extremely DANGEROUS, even to a cat or young puppy.....lights have electrical wires which are a major hazard when chewed not only for them but a potential fire risk too. Please bear this in mind when decking out your halls.

How many of us have holly, ivy or poinsettia in the house? Me for one, but did you realize they are toxic to our furry friends? Also on the list are mistletoe and surprisingly, lilies! They are all my favourites but are now kept well out of reach of inquisitive paws. Turkey bones (although tempting to give as a treat) can cause choking, constipation as well as seriously damaging internal organs. I know the next one may seem silly but alcohol should never be given to a pet. I am not saying you will be offering a 'tipple' on Christmas day morning but if a glass is within easy reach to our four-legged friends then they could be just that bit too interesting. If drank it could lead to coma and eventually death.

New pets......we do not recommend getting a new pet for Christmas. It is far better to leave it until after the festive season when things in the household are just that bit more calm but if you happen to have a new addition, please make sure they are identichipped. With all the hustle and bustle, coming and goings in the house, an escaped pet may go unnoticed for a few hours which may then be too late. It may only cost the price of a couple of bottles of wine but is for life so what better way of giving you that extra piece of mind. Some of the nicest things at this time of year are the smells....logs on the fire, baking in the oven or potpourri pots which give off the amazing smell of Christmas. I used to like them around the house during the festive time but since two little dogs were admitted to our Park Street Hospital with poisoning after eating one of these pots, they are now kept well out of reach. They contain two substances namely essential oils and cationic detergents and it is the latter that is the most concerning. It can cause severe ulceration and chemical burns to your pets skin plus their digestive tract.

Something that is not in the house but associated with the cold weather..... anti freeze. Please keep this well away from inquisitive paws. The sweet taste can be so tempting but fatal!!!!

So there we have it The HAZARDS of Christmas ... but please remember, they are only hazards when they are within the reach of inquisitive paws, mouths and not forgetting little fingers and if you think that working for a vet we know better....how wrong can you be. If you have read the past exploits of my wonderful dog Teal, you will realise that I, for one as a pet owner, are not immune....from eating a full Christmas fruit loaf to a Chocolate Advent Calendar also not forgetting the time she ate a box of Thorntons chocolates plus 6 mince pies. Yes, Teal and I have spent many a day and night at our Park Street surgery so as you can see , it can happen to ANYONE.






It Felt Like Being On Top Of The World

Early development plans for Cottingham Parks

About Cottingham Parks

The land which now forms the Cottingham Parks complex was first acquired by the Wiles family in the 1940's for farming purposes. Over the years the family has expanded the use of the site, often in response to the changing economic climate, and various additional uses have been

The equestrian centre has been running since 1990 and the most significant change took place in 1994 when a golf course was formed on an area of 125 acres. This has successfully matured over the intervening years. To support this a health and leisure club based around the club house was added in 2000. Recent years have seen the further development of 20 holiday lodges on land adjacent to the main access road.



In line with this long term measured diversification, and to support the ongoing success of the established existing elements of the business, the family are now looking to the future and hope to make new investments in the facilities.

This will help to ensure the ongoing sustainability of the golf and leisure facilities and preserve and increase employment opportunities in the local area as well as providing an opportunity to enhance and improve existing facilities.

The golf club market

Recent years have seen a significant trend towards reduced demand for golf facilities across the county amongst consumers. Golf as an industry is under pressure from other leisure pursuits and in the present economic climate, membership fees are often seen as

As a consequence there have been an increasing number of golf course closures in the last 10 years both locally and nationally. This does put pressure on to the operators of courses and many have had to seek alternative income streams in order to maintain revenues.



The hotel will also play an important role in securing the sustainability of the full range of leisure facilities at the complex. Helping to sustain the the golf and leisure facilities, protecting the existing 60 jobs and creating further

an upper 3 star/lower 4 star hotel of up to 70 bedrooms, supported by a mix of new and improved back of house facilities. It is likely that hotel guests will come from a mix of mid-week corporate and golf related occupancy along with private leisure guests and wedding parties at weekends.

Upgrading the existing facilities

Along with the hotel development, the proposals intend to allow for the redevelopment and extension of the existing clubhouse to improve the facilities available to golf and leisure club members.

These works would increase the size of the kitchen, the health and beauty area, the catering and bar areas, create a dedicated function room and outdoor space, and also allow for significant improvement to be made to the golf shop and

hat will winter bring this year? The weather has been remarkable unpredictable over the last few months making it impossible to make any garden plans. What we do know is that November is sure to have a few sunny days were we can get out into the garden and tidy everything up ready for the spring. Plus when the days are dark and dreary we can cheer our gardens up with bursts of colour. There's something especially valuable about shrubs which flower in winter. Seeing these delightful and resilient flowers putting on a show through short, dark days and taking frost, rain and snow in their stride lifts our spirits and encourages us to get outside. Many can also be cut for indoor winter posies, and many are fragrant.



Houseplants

At this time of year it's nice to add colour to your garden and your home with flowers and foliage. There's nothing better for brightening up an indoor environment than a well-grown houseplant and they are available in a vast range of forms from tiny gems suitable for the smallest windowsill to rampant growers for the largest hallway. They offer lush foliage, beautiful blooms and

interesting forms. Some thrive in damp bathrooms, others need a sunny spot, so make sure you choose a houseplant that will tolerate the conditions in which it is to grow. Ask our staff for advice on the best choice. Once you've made your purchase, take care when transporting houseplants to protect them from cold, drafts, wind or excessive heat. Failure to do so can lead to plant deterioration or even death, and the effects may not fully show themselves until some time after you've bought it.

Once your new houseplant is safely home, you need to care for it correctly to ensure that it remains in pristine condition – and this largely depends on how well it is watered. Too little or too much watering can cause problems.

Overwatering: Giving too much water can be as dangerous

as under watering. The roots not only require moisture but also air, so overwatering leads to the forcible removal of air from the potting compost so the houseplant's roots are killed by suffocation.

Best Practice: Watering little and often is the best advice, taking into account the growing environment and the seasons. Watering from below is the best approach as some plants can suffer from rotting or sun scorch if water is directed onto their stems, root systems or foliage.

Drainage:

The best method is to stand the pot (which must have drainage holes in the bottom) on a suitable sized saucer into which a small amount of gravel has been placed.

Fill the saucer to about 1/3 of its depth with water and leave the plant standing for 30 minutes.

If all the water has been taken up you can repeat the operation until uptake stops, then any surplus water should be tipped away but of course retaining the gravel.

Pests & Diseases

Healthy Habit: Plants that are well-fed and watered are less likely to suffer from pests and diseases, so prevention is always better than cure. However, keep a look-out for common houseplant pests. Pick off any visible pests from the stems, leaves or soil, clean leaves with water and use a chemical spray available from our garden centre, or try an organic or biological control.

Local Beekeeper Neil Gower Continues his quarterly article on Beekeeping

The Newspaper Method

I knew as soon as I had submitted my last article that I had tempted fate by praising the weather. A warm Spring then gave way to a typical British Summer with lots of showers interspersed with some sun, and a cool breeze that never seemed far away. It was disappointing for those hoping for a chance to get out the loungers and enjoy the extended daylight. We only managed a handful of evenings sat outside with a nice cool drink, as the wind seemed omnipresent.

That said, the bees didn't seem to mind too much and they were able to leave the hives between the showers to forage. Last year I moved my Apiary to a new location, and this is their first full season at their new base. They have settled in well and have enjoyed the varied mixture of forage available to them from their new surroundings. My plan for this year was always to increase the number of colonies that I manage, and by splitting colonies and breeding new Queens I was able to accommodate this increase with good results. In the last article I wrote about harvesting the early crop of honey and as a result of the bees hard work I harvested the second crop of honey towards the end of August. I'm delighted that 2017 has been my best honey harvest for a few years and my honey extractor hasn't had to work so hard for some time. I've also made sure to leave each colony enough honey to feed them into the winter.

After the final honey harvest I always take stock, look at the health of the bees, begin pest management, assess the size of each colony and decide whether they are large and strong enough to get through the winter. I was satisfied that after some Varroa treatment all my

colonies were in a good position to meet those criteria, and I went off on holiday. Upon my return I was able to take advantage of some warm Autumn sunshine and give my colonies a late inspection, during which I found that one of my most prolific hives no longer had a Queen. Each colony can have a different temperament which is pretty much dictated by the Queen. I was particularly disappointed as this Queen had a very calm temperament and I had used her eggs earlier in the year to breed from. Losing a Queen in this way happens from time to time and there can be a number of reasons. As it was too late in the year to be able to breed and mate a Queen I took the decision to unite two of my colonies. In this process, the hive without a Queen and a hive with a Queen are joined together. Whilst this reduces the total number of colonies it means that the resultant colony is bigger and stronger and the best food stores from both can be utilised

Bees are very good at navigating home from a foraging session and instinctively know which hive to land on. As the Oueenless colony has to be moved in this operation it is important that it is done gradually so that the flying bees can get used to the new hive location and can find their way home. Fortunately my two hives were situated quite close together, so this was not a problem. I used what is known as 'the newspaper method' and I waited until any remaining eggs in the Queenless colony had hatched. One evening I carefully opened the brood box of the colony with the Queen and placed a sheet of newspaper over the frames which I weighed down with a Queen excluder. I then placed the brood box without a Queen over the top and left them alone. The scents of the two hives immediately start to mingle and curious bees from both brood boxes start chewing through the newspaper. As more of the newspaper is chewed away the bees from the upper brood box come down into the brood box containing the Queen and make contact with her, immediately picking up her pheromones. When all the bees from the upper brood box have completed this the unification is complete. I left them for just under a week and when I returned I was pleased with the result.

On another note I had hoped to close by announcing that there had been no further sightings of the dreaded Asian Hornet on the British mainland. Unfortunately there have been two confirmed sightings in Devon towards the end of the summer which gives cause for concern. The resources that were directed at those nests found earlier in the south west of England are not sustainable and the FERA based National Bee Unit have indicated that should the Asian Hornet become established in this country, they will step back to a purely advisory role. This comes on the back of recent university modelling based on the Hornets' march through France which indicate that establishment is likely and eradication would become impractical. Potentially worrying times for British beekeepers....... and British bees!



Water Damage - Who Pays? - Part I

The risks of a leak in an apartment block

The nature of apartment blocks are that as an owner of one of these apartment you have neighbours above and below you as well adjoining your property unless your are lucky enough to have invested in the penthouse. This can cause massive problems should you have a leak in your property. Lets face it landlords constantly face issues with leaking boilers, showers and baths where the seal has gone between the tray and the wall. Water has an uncanny knack of finding the gap, fissure, hole and gravity does the rest. This means that your leak or problem very rapidly becomes your neighbours problem too. You also should be aware of a landlords water responsibilities.

How to spot a water leak?

Water leaks can be difficult to spot. Where you have a poorly fitting plumbing joint. Plastic plumbing pipes and joints have revolutionised the plumbing industry in the speed and ease of fitting and avoiding the need to solder joints but they have a terrible habit of the screw joint to 'thread' if not screwed together correctly. The result is a small leak which can go undetected for years. Over a period of time this small amount of water can cause damp and the rotting of timber or damage to plasterwork. In an apartment block this damage from a faulty plumbing joint can cause damage a distance below the actual leak. This all makes the detection process of spotting a leak much more difficult.

Where there is a significant leak it will be much more obvious. A landlord is likely to hear the sound of running water, there will be standing areas of water, water pressure in your system may fall. Where there is a leak in your gas central heating system then you will find that the water pressure will be constantly fall resulting in having to keep re-pressurising the system.

A landlords experience of water leaks

A Landlord had a problem with their residential investment which had

suffered a major water leak. The buy-to-let property was a top floor flat. The result was that damage had not only been caused to the carpet in their flat but also to the carpet of the tenanted flat below. In addition to the carpet, the ceiling in the flat below had also been damaged resulting in the plaster bubbling up and falling off.

The Legal responsibilities of a landlord

Firstly, before getting into the details of the insurance policy a landlord should be clear about their responsibility for maintenance of their buy-tolet property under the terms of any tenancy.

One of the most important pieces of legislation governing repairs is that contained within Section 11 of the Landlord & Tenant Act 1985 and which applies to leases or tenancy agreement granted on or after 24th October 1961 for less than seven years

The vast majority of Assured Shorthold Tenancy Agreements are periodic or for terms of less than seven years and therefore Section 11 applies to these tenancy agreements.

The landlords implied obligations under Section 11 are:

- To keep in repair the structure and exterior of the dwelling (including drains, gutters and external pipes) to fulfil the tenancy agreement.
- To keep in repair and proper working order the installations in the dwelling for the supply of water, gas, electricity and sanitation (including basins, sinks, baths and sanitary conveniences) to fulfil the tenancy agreement.
- To keep in repair and proper working order the installations in the dwelling for room and water heating to fulfil the tenancy agreement.

In the example given above the landlord would be responsible for the repair of the ceiling as it is part of the structure of the building. The reality is that the ultimate responsibility may not lie with the owner of the leasehold flat. This is because the landlord themselves may only be a leaseholder and it could well be that it is their landlord, the freeholder or any appointed management company that will ultimately be responsible for carrying out the repair work



Council launches new e-bike rental scheme

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council's Wheels to Work Scheme will launch a new range of e-bikes available for rent from October

Designed to help local residents get to work, training, college, or simply to become more healthy and active on a bike, the pilot scheme will initially launch with 14 bikes to hire.

The e-bike launch is part of the council's £1.4 million Get Active East Riding project, which received a £700,000 contribution from the Department for Transport's Access Fund.

The e-bikes, which are regular cycles with an electrical assist, will be available to anyone aged 16 years or over and aim to encourage more people to travel using sustainable modes.

Eligible East Riding residents will pay £35 a month and will receive an e-bike, for up to one year, as well as a helmet, hivisibility jacket and cycle lock. Free bikeability training and bike maintenance courses are also available to all who join the scheme.

Erika Spight, project manager for Wheels to Work, said: "We're really excited to be launching these new e-bikes and they offer a real alternative to our popular scooter loan scheme, plus an opportunity to try out an e-bike before you commit to buying one

"E-bikes are popular with people young and old and this mode of transport is already taking off all over the UK. We're envisaging a high number of applicants for the e-bikes, so I'd encourage people to apply sooner rather than later."

Councillor Andy Burton, cabinet portfolio holder for economic investment and planning delivery, said: "Given the rural nature of the East Riding, Wheels to Work is one of the council's most popular initiatives and supports our residents get out and about on two wheels.

"These new e-bikes will be a welcome addition to the scheme and will be ideal for those who live in parts of the East Riding with hills or those who have a bit further to travel but don't qualify for a moped."

2,000 Flapjacks for the Hull Marathon runners


