WHATIS PROBATE?

I often get asked this question by clients. I need Probate, what does this mean?

A Grant of Probate is a document that is issued by the Court which gives the Executors of a Will the legal authority to deal with the deceased's estate.

If you die without a Will, this is called Intestacy. You may still need a Grant but in an Intestate estate it is called a Grant of Letters of Administration from the Court.

Many of my clients say 'my mother's or father's Estate needs to go to Probate!' This just means that the institutions where their parent held assets will need the official document from the Court to be able to sell or transfer that particular asset.

A Grant of Probate is nearly always required for the sale or transfer of a property.

When someone passes away, it is usual to obtain the value of the deceased's estate and determine whether or not the Grant of Probate is required.

All property of the deceased would usually be valued and then an application for the Grant of Probate would be sought from the Court.

After the Grant of Probate (the official document) has been received, you can then proceed with the realisation of the Estate.

Executors do have to take care that they protect themselves from claims and also distribute the Estate in accordance with the Will, or if the deceased died without a Will, then under the Intestacy Rules, which were amended in 2014.

The process of dealing with someone's estate can be traumatic but some of my clients see it as the grieving process. That said however, it can still be a distressing experience and by asking a lawyer to deal with the matter this can greatly assist in dealing with all aspects of the Estate, including protection of any claims against the Executors by any creditors and dealing with any persons trying to make a claim.

Having drafted Wills for over 18 years, I have assisted clients all the way through the process, from making their Wills to dealing with Probate after sadly losing loved ones. A compassionate approach is needed to deal with this type of legal work to guide and help the clients through the legal process, as well as being there for clients whilst they are going through the grief process, which can greatly assist along the way.

Kcom Lightstream, Office 2019 and Laptops

Kcom Lightstream continues its rollout across the area. If you're not familiar yet with this yet, it is the fibre-optic internet service. Far superior to the standard service delivered over copper telephone wires in both speed and stability, and all for about the same price you are paying Kcom now. So it is recommended. One thing worth mentioning before installation. Because a new (more powerful) router will be installed by the Kcom engineer and they normally make sure your PC or Laptop is working before they leave. However, they won't connect up all your devices, so before installation takes place, make a list of items that connect to your existing Wi-Fi, so you know what you will need to re-connect to the new router. This could include your printer, smart TV and set-top boxes, iPads or other tablets, Smartphones, Amazon Echo (Alexa) etc. Also, you may find your new router is in a different place to the original, so coverage can sometimes be an issue. Call if you need your items set up and advice on extending coverage etc.

If you purchased Office 2016 don't worry, it will carry on working as normal. If you're on an ongoing subscription to Office 365, you should see your software gradually updated with new features. drive, and can be swapped out if necessary. However, recently I have come across one or two laptop models that use an 'eMMC' which is an embedded memory card, meaning that it is just like another chip on the printed circuit board that cannot be replaced. Google Translate is a brilliant tool for translating to/from virtually any language! Just type Translate into Google and you will get a page enabling you to type in, or easier still copy & paste whole sentences and choose the language you need.

Tip! A new bank 'Confirmation of payee' service will be introduced in 2019 meaning that when customers using internet banking want to transfer money to a new payee, the name of the account holder entered will have to be checked by the bank **to ensure it agrees** with the sort code and account number entered. Previously this was not the case, so that fraudsters could fool people into paying money into their own bank account even though their name was not the one the customer thought they were paying.

If you have an Apple ID, or a Microsoft account (Hotmail, Live etc), take time to check what personal contact information they have saved for you. Sign into your account and review security information, and make sure they have an alternative email address and a mobile or landline number. The reason for this is that if you ever forget your password and get locked out of your account, they will have a means of sending you an account recovery code.

Question & Answer section

Q: My computer screen has turned sideways (or upside down). What do I do?

A: Try pressing Ctrl + Alt + UP Arrow Key, or try Ctrl + Alt + and a different Arrow Key. If that does not work: Right-click on empty Desktop > Graphics Options > Rotation.

Q: I keep getting an annoying Eset firewall warning about webcam access, allow or block.

A: This is being fixed in a new release of Eset software (version 12), which should be rolling out by this month.

Just make sure you uninstall any existing anti virus you may have, even if it has expired. For prices, upgrades and licences – just give us a call.

Telephone scam – yes, I must mention this again. There has been another spate of unsolicited calls to computer users in this area purporting to be from Microsoft or Windows (who they are not) offering to fix problems with your computer (which they won't) and then fraudulently taking money for their non-existent services. If you get such calls, and they can be very persistent, tell them you are not interested, or that you have a local computer specialist, or that you don't have a computer!

Remember to look on my website for copies of the current and two previous articles where they can be read, downloaded or printed. And if you are considering investing a new computer you will also find on there my popular article on 'things to consider when buying a new computer.



WITH ROY WOODCOCK

Our thoughts turn to our Christmas tipple

o, we're in November and a time when any serious wine drinker's thoughts turn to Christmas; not just what they'd like to give or receive but, even more importantly, what they'd like to be drinking. And thinking ahead now means you can take advantage of the bargains as and when they come along. As they surely will, more so now than at any other time of the year.

As a malt drinker I couldn't resist a bottle of that superbly peaty Laphroaig recently, on offer at Morrisons for £25, a full £10 below what I would often expect to pay. That said, I also tracked down my absolute favourite Islay single malt, Smokehead, and had to pay £43 - the difference is, it's a brand not stocked (as far as I know) by any supermarket and I had to go to a specialist wine outlet.

Notwithstanding that, the message has to be there are genuine bargains to be had and expect to see them on all styles of wines, including fizz, in all of the High Street stores as they chase sales in what is the most important trading period of the year.

When considering what wines to be drinking come Christmas day, one will most surely feature in my house - Chablis. It can fit the bill with all sorts of foods during the day, whether it be a light, fishy starter or your main course of turkey or goose - it suits both very well.

In this day and age when uniformity and homogeny of style are accusations levelled at wine producers around the world, Chablis stands out as being different. It also bucks the anti-Chardonnay trend which disappointingly still seems to be prevalent, because Chablis is, of course, made from 100 per cent Chardonnay grapes and many of those who turn their noses up at Chardonnay will still profess a love of Chablis.

The difference, however, is that the impact of oak ageing will be limited or non-existent because traditionally the Chardonnay grapes were aged in stainless-steel casks. As wine writer Curtis Marsh commented: "A Chardonnay purist will relish the ethereal clarity of Chablis; a wine infused with flinty minerality and a saline quality that speaks so loudly of the soils it hails from it's unmistakable. Then there's the slippery, silky texture, largely unadulterated by oak, it's glassy, lubricous, tantalisingly tangy palate invigorated by exhilarating steely acidity, a wine bursting with energy and freshness."

Chablis is the northernmost region of Burgundy - a region, of course, famous for its red wines - and it is that colder climate that produces these gorgeous dry white wines with a steely mineral edge.

There are four different grades of Chablis: Petit Chablis, the most ordinary Chablis; plain Chablis, which is a wine that comes from grapes grown anywhere in the Chablis district; Chablis Premier Cru, which is a very good quality wine that comes from specific high-quality vineyards; and Chablis Grand Cru, the highest classification and the most expensive because of limited production.

There are only seven vineyards in Chablis entitled to be called grand cru.

A good Chablis is greenish-gold in colour. When fermented in vats, it is light and fresh. When fermented in casks, as some now are, it is richer and more full-bodied. Most Chablis have a floral bouquet, but sometimes they also offer aromas of apples, almonds, hazelnuts or hay. They are vigorous and have a characteristic bite to them.

Most Chablis is designed for immediate consumption. However, premier and grand cru Chablis age magnificently. Indeed grand crus, sustained by a core of acidity, will often outlast their richer, more illustrious (and expensive) neighbours from the Côte de Beaune. The wines do go through mid-life crisis when four or five years old, so drink them young or be prepared to hang in there for the long haul.

Watch out . . . There's a mouth about!

o write an article about Christmas in October may seem slightly strange and early to some but it was whilst thinking of what presents to buy my ever increasing circle of grandchildren, 'HAZARDS' sprung to mind.

My family of seven grandchildren ranging from the ages of two to seven years old, buying presents involve many toys that include small pieces ie: Lego, dolls house with furniture, small toy cars, etc., but it is the Christmas decorations such as tinsel, baubles and Christmas tree lights that will be amongst the many potential dangers for them. We, as parents/grandparents, often take care in buying the toys that are presumed safe for little fingers, watching out for parts that can easily be consumed if they fall into the wrong hands but how many of us pet owners go along the same line of thinking?

Like I have mentioned in previous articles, if we can all apply the 'parents' way of thinking and this time look around our homes for any potential 'hazards', then you maybe surprised.

Every child loves chocolate and to see the various array of sweet items dangling from the Christmas tree can be so tempting, but more so to our canine friends. Human chocolate is highly toxic in dogs, especially dark chocolate because the cocoa beans contain a substance called Theobromine. Found in chocolate, it is small enough that it can be safely consumed by humans. In domestic animals, the amount metabolises more slowly so they can easily consume enough to cause toxic poisoning. The most common victims are dogs for which it can be fatal. The toxic dose for cats is even lower but are less prone to eating chocolate since they are unable to taste

the sweetness. Everyone likes a Christmas cake even if its just for the icing and marzipan but please be very careful as two of the ingredients namely raisins and currants, can be potentially poisonous and is highly toxic to a dogs kidneys.

So far it has been our canine friend but our felines do not get off that lightly. Tinsel can be so decorative around the tree and also a playful attraction to small children but in a cats eyes its especially exciting. After all, it's shiny, dangles and is something new in their environment so few cats can pass this up. Playing with the tinsel is not the problem, it is when it gets wrapped round their tongue or is swallowed when the nightmare begins and can cause an obstruction in their digestive tract which may then involve major surgery. Cats may also be attracted to baubles which then may shatter, splinter and cut their paws. In the case of real Christmas trees, beware of the sharp pine needles.

Twinkling lights are a big attraction to any toddler and can be so mesmerising but obviously DANGEROUS to a cat or young puppy..... lights have electrical wires which are a major hazard when chewed not only for them but a potential fire risk too. Please bear all these in mind when decking out your halls.

Holly, Ivy or Poinsettia in the house? They are toxic to our furry friends PLUS mistletoe and amazingly, lilies! These are all my favourites but are now kept well out of reach of inquisitive paws. Turkey bones (although tempting to give as a treat) can cause choking, constipation as well as seriously damaging internal organs. I know the next one may seem silly but alcohol should never be given to a pet. I'm not saying you will be offering a 'tipple' on Christmas day morning but if a glass is within easy reach to our four legged friends then they could be just that bit too inquisitive. If drank it could lead to coma and eventually death.

We do not recommend getting a new pet for Christmas. It is better to leave it until after the festive season when things in the household are just that bit more calm but if you happen to have a new addition, please make sure they are identichipped. With all the hustle and bustle in the house, an escaped pet may go unnoticed for a few hours which may then be too late. It may only cost the price of a couple of bottles of wine but is for life so what better way of giving you that extra peace of mind. Some of the nicest things at this time of year are the smells of potpourri pots which give off the amazing smell of Christmas. I used to like them around the house but since two little dogs were admitted to our Park Street surgery with poisoning after eating one of these pots, they are now kept well out of reach. They contain two substances namely essential oils and cat-ionic detergents which can cause severe ulceration and chemical burns to your pets skin and their digestive tract.

So there we have the HAZARDS of Christmas but please remember, they are only hazards when they are within the reach of inquisitive paws, mouths and not forgetting little fingers!

I have been through so many poo bags but annoyingly could even go through many more picking up other dogs faeces. Why do a handful of dog owners think it is acceptable to leave the said offending pile on a place to be trodden in or more so letting them go on other peoples gardens? Where I live the gardens are open plan but not to the public as some may think. As for lead walking? Our walks are fun and games, so many things to sniff, dogs to greet, so much so you will see us manically zig zagging down the street which will hopefully be corrected with more training (another story). I must say Tali's recall is amazing...she will bring things back to me and come in from the garden when called but I have learnt to give lots of praise rather than a treat. 

Every child got a toothbrush and toothpaste. In addition we did something new for us. We did SDF therapy,

SDF, What Is SDF?

Well, SDF stands for Silver Diamine Fluoride. It a liquid that is applied to tooth decay to stop it in it's tracks. Apparently it has been used in Japan for about 80 years but I only came across it this year and I'm a bit of an anorak.. It is a quick and easy technique to try and stop and is very good



varnish or gel. The draw back is that it stains decay and even early decay black. We are collecting data and working with Kings College London and Harvard University on the use of SDF. Now, if do not remove the decay

we cannot place conventional filling to restore form and function. What it does allow is for us to see many people in an attempt to stop disease and prevent further disease, pain and infection.

A Massive Thank You

A big thank you to everybody who has donated and supported Dental Mavericks over the last 8 years. It's been incredible. Above is some knitting done by our patients and a local Knit and Natter group who are very prolific. All this stuff goes directly to where there is need. That will winter bring this year? The weather has been remarkable unpredictable over the last few months making it impossible to make any garden plans. What we do know is that November is sure to have a few sunny days were we can get out into the garden and tidy everything up ready for the spring. Plus when the days are dark and dreary we can cheer our gardens up with bursts of colour. There's something especially valuable about shrubs which flower in winter. Seeing these delightful and resilient flowers putting on a show through short, dark days and taking frost, rain and snow in their stride lifts our spirits and encourages us to get outside. Many can also be cut for indoor winter posies, and many are fragrant.



Houseplants

At this time of year it's nice to add colour to your garden and your home with flowers and foliage. There's nothing better for brightening up an indoor environment than a well-grown houseplant and they are available in a vast range of forms from tiny gems suitable for the smallest windowsill to rampant growers for the largest hallway. They offer lush foliage, beautiful blooms and interesting forms. Some thrive in damp bathrooms, others need a sunny spot, so make sure you choose a houseplant that will tolerate the conditions in which it is to grow. Ask our staff for advice on the best choice. Once you've made your purchase, take care when transporting houseplants to protect them from cold, drafts, wind or excessive heat. Failure to do so can lead to plant deterioration or even death, and the effects may not fully show themselves until some time after you've bought it.

care for it correctly to ensure that it remains in pristine condition – and this largely depends on how well it is watered. Too little or too much watering can cause problems.

Overwatering: Giving too much water can be as dangerous as under watering. The roots not only require moisture but also air, so overwatering leads to the forcible removal of air from the potting compost so the houseplant's roots are killed by suffocation.

Best Practice: Watering little and often is the best advice, taking into account the growing environment and the seasons. Watering from below is the best approach as some plants can suffer from rotting or sun scorch if water is directed onto their stems, root systems or foliage.

Drainage:

The best method is to stand the pot (which must have drainage holes in the bottom) on a suitable sized saucer into which a small amount of gravel has been placed.

Fill the saucer to about 1/3 of its depth with water and leave the plant standing for 30 minutes.

If all the water has been taken up you can repeat the operation until uptake stops, then any surplus water should be tipped away but of course retaining the gravel.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. There is still time to plant Spring blooming bulbs for the early part of November
- 2. Transplant trees and shrubs
- 3. Prune evergreens to shape
- 4. Cover strawberries two inches deep with straw or hav
- 5. Increase feed and provide plenty of fresh water for the birds
- If you haven't already feed your lawn with a fall or winter feed
- 7. Rake leaves from the lawn and compost them
- 8. Drain your hoses and put away over winter
- 9. Finish weeding and tidying up beds
- 10. Clean up and cover you garden furniture to protect over the Winter





Pests & Diseases

Healthy Habit: Plants that are well-fed and watered are less likely to suffer from pests and diseases, so prevention is always better than cure. However, keep a look-out for common houseplant pests. Pick off any visible pests from the stems, leaves or soil, clean leaves with water and use a chemical spray available from our garden centre, or try an organic or biological control.

An Unwanted Visitor

Asian Hornet threat

From the questions I get asked about the Asian Hornet I know that many of you are concerned with its potential impact, so I was pleased to receive notification from the British Beekeepers Association (BBKA) that it would be running an Asian Hornet awareness week aimed at highlighting the risk of this non-native species to the public at large. With experience now gained from incursions in the Channel Islands and the south west of England the timing of the campaign was to coincide with the period when sightings would be likely to occur. Advice on what to look for and who to call was being made available on posters, leaflets and in newspaper articles. In early September the inbox of my email account was full of reminders that Monday 10th September to Sunday 16th September was "Asian Hornet Awareness Week".

On the morning of Monday 10th I received an email that I had not been expecting....An Asian Hornet had been discovered by members of the public in the Hull area. The National Bee Unit (NBU) had confirmed its authenticity and I had only just finished reading the information when my phone started ringing. I was told by the Bee Inspector that my bees were within a 2 Km radius from the site and could he and a colleague meet me there immediately. At this point Bee Inspectors from all over the north of England had descended on the area and a full scale operation was already in progress with many of my local beekeeping colleagues being contacted.

At my apiary site we checked for any signs of hornets and the inspectors baited and set traps which I was asked to check daily.

The BBKA and NBU have been engaged with local beekeepers on Jersey for a couple of years now and for

the last 12 months in the south west of England in the fight against this predator, and were obviously using the knowledge gained there to run this operation. The key issue is to locate the primary and secondary nest sites and destroy them before the next generation of Queens emerge. Since the first sightings on Jersey more than 30 nests have been destroyed and whilst an operation was being carried out in our area a similar task was being undertaken in Cornwall.

The need for fast action was put into context by a recent article in the BBKA newsletter which stated that in the Galicia region of Spain between 2012 and 2016 the number of Asian Hornet nests rose from two to well over 10,000.

I have checked the traps on a regular basis and can advise that no hornets have been captured and whilst no final conclusion has been reported we may have been lucky on this occasion. Not so I'm afraid in Cornwall where two nests were destroyed in the Fowey area and other sightings have been reported around Liskeard. I will let you know the outcome in the next article.

The Manuka saga

I occasionally return to the subject of Manuka honey in an attempt to prevent readers from being parted with their money fraudulently. Some time ago I reported that sales of Manuka honey worldwide was three times that which is actually produced, highlighting the issue that profiteering is abound. The most recent figures are much worse with sales now peaking at more than six times the actual Manuka honey produced.

This has prompted the New Zealand Government to impose strict testing on honey claiming to be Manuka prior to export in order to try and maintain the brands integrity.

This saga rumbles on.

The bees

And finally to the bees. Bees born in the autumn that will see the colonies through to next spring now occupy the hives. I've treated them against the Varroa mite using a thymol based product and a couple of smaller colonies have been fed with syrup to supplement food stores. This mixture of sugar and water will be converted into honey in time for the winter, and I'll continue to check food stores right the way through until next spring. I've left honey on all main colonies and removed the queen excluder so that the bees can all move up from the brood box to the food as and when required. The weather this summer was very advantageous for the bees and I did actually manage to harvest some honey against all my expectations. As I write this article the bees continue to forage on late flowering plants and are still bringing pollen into the hives; their cycle continues.

In the coming weeks I'll move some hives to overwinter them away from the apiary. I don't think I could face the prospect of what happened last Easter and although I've managed to build up a reasonable stock of bees this season I'm still way behind where I was this time last year.

The threat of the Asian Hornet became quite real for East Yorkshire beekeepers this autumn and even more vigilance will be required in the future both from beekeepers and the public in general. As my next article is scheduled for February I wish you all a merry Christmas and look forward to writing next seasons diary of a local beekeeper.





Fake Tax Refunds

HMRC claims to have successfully prevented half a billion phishing e-mails from reaching their targets. But tax scamming is still a real problem. What advice can you give to staff?

Background. A recent press release from HMRC reveals that it's removed 20,750 malicious websites during the last year, but it wants us to stay alert to the threat from online fraudsters. The National Cyber Security Centre confirmed that HMRC was the most abused government department in this respect. Fraudsters are regularly using e-mails and texts to get individuals to unwittingly provide their bank details to receive tax refunds, or to encourage them to sign up to websites charging them for services which are in fact free if the bonafide government alternative is used.

Protection. HMRC has implemented a verification system called DMARC which checks whether e-mails are from a genuine source. So far it's successfully stopped half a billion phishing e-mails from reaching taxpayers. In a similar vein, HMRC has also used technology to stop scam text messages being delivered, resulting in a 90% drop in the last year.

For employees. Whilst it's encouraging that HMRC has been so successful in tackling fraud, it's very hard for it to be one step ahead of the fraudsters, so what messages should you cascade to employees?

- · government departments like HMRC will never ask for bank details, PINs or passwords
 - HMRC never offers tax refunds by e-mail or text
- · don't click on links/attachments in e-mails that weren't expected.

For businesses. One of the commonest ways that businesses are defrauded is via customer payments. Criminals pose as a regular supplier claiming their bank account details need to change. The fraudster controls the new account and when the invoice is paid, they keep the money. The other common approach is when the fraudster contacts you pretending to be from your bank or the police and claims there's been fraud or suspicious activity on your account. They then try to gain your trust and say you need to transfer your money to a "safe account" to protect it.

HMRC never offers tax refunds by e-mail or text. Make sure employees know what to look out for and not to click on links/ attachments.

Presenting at the National Association of Veterinary Physiotherapists annual conference

longside my hands-on work with training horses, I also write many articles for online and hard copy magazines and newspapers. I run courses for the greater understanding of equine behaviour and the choices we humans have in our repertoire to use during, or with the intension of, behaviour modification. This area also explores the possible emotional fall out in the animal if force/dominance/pain/threat of pain etc, is applied. I should add at this point that human dominance is the most commonly used approach across common species and the pet industry.

I also present my work to conferences, both animal based and human based. I always thoroughly enjoy presenting the proven, science based concepts I use which can then be applied to any species of animal, including training us humans! however I obviously specialise in horses so equine ethology is usually my thing.

I lead my audience to explore the use of applied behavioural science and of the concept of giving full choice to the animal alongside the use of positive reinforcement and marker training, to make significant changes to emotions and behaviours. Videos always speak louder than words of course, so I include various examples per my talk topic.

I was recently asked to present at the National Association of Veterinary Physiotherapists which was a wonderful opportunity to share my work and concepts with these highly skilled people who are out there treating horses in pain and in rehabilitation programmes.

I listened to highly respected speakers who were passionate about their topic, career choices and skill sets. The speaker before me was a lady called Janet Lloyd-Jones (www.lightworksclinic.co.uk) who is an expert practitioner with low level laser therapy for open wound healing, soft tissue damage, ligament and tendon tears, burns and cell regeneration from disease. Her talk was so

interesting having worked out in Africa with extremely endangered vultures - who commonly suffer wing and feet burns from poorly insulated electricity wires; smashed bone injuries caused by poachers, gin-traps, gun shots, and catapult shootings; or collisions with pylons and other man made obstacles where they causing further injuries when they crash to the ground.

After all of this fascinating stuff, she then went on to list from A-Z (Aardvarks to Zebras) a myriad of Zoo animals she has worked with. You name it, she has treated it! The section of treating open wounds under elephant feet really caught my attention because it brought my world and my talk to my mind.

There she is, working with all these captive species who are all willingly and of free choice, allowing her to treat their various poorly appendages. I put that into my mind for later for during my presentation where I show a video of my rescue pony Magic standing stationary at a target with no halter or rope, allowing me to daube cream into horrendous wounds inside his hind legs after sarcoid removal surgery.

At that exact moment in time I asked her if she had been in protected contact while working with the zoo animals - as in, was she the other side of bars or fences where the animals had been trained (using positive reinforcement and behaviour shaping) to come on call, station themselves at a given point and then present (on cue) the area to be treated? She answered "Yes of course!" How else would she be able to treat or handle the animal? The elephant had presented its own foot up onto a platform when asked and had stayed there, quietly and for duration, while she laser treated the underside of its sore feet.

The same went for the gorilla, the ardvaark, or the wing presentations and bumble foot sores in many bird species etc. That training is exactly what I do with my horses. I train them to voluntarily allow veterinary procedures to occur yet be free to leave at any time. We pay them for staying with the promise of highly reinforcing food which is earned by them for their recall behaviour/duration behaviour/voluntary participation behaviour/stationing behaviour and staying calm throughout.

It was so lovely to hear about her successes with all these different species ... directly because of the positively reinforced preparation training that had been implemented within the zoos.

How cool was that? - That one statement from Janet resonated around the room when the audience watched Magic get his horrific wounds treated or when Toby pony came on call and voluntarily wormed himself or when they saw blind, facially paralysed Headway pony standing stationary on a piece of carpet having his feet dressed by his formerly terrifying farrier. Each animal was in full control of the situation and the absolute opposite of force was used in preparation.

So many brilliant behaviours can be shaped using clicker (marker) training with any animal for any situation they may one day find themselves in. After all, most horses do not fear the injection, the wormer, the farrier, the vet, the loading into transport or the clipping......they fear the process they have experienced with each of those scenarios! It really does not need to be that way at all.

As a Clinical Support Worker, Sue carries out roles to support nurses by cannulating patients for blood transfusions and fluids, carrying out observations while they are undergoing chemotherapy treatment.

She works Monday, Tuesday and half a day on a Friday, looking after her two great grandsons Riley, 4, and 18-month-old Ollie on her days off. She also has a six-month-old grand-daughter Paisley.

"I don't think I could retire," she said. "I wouldn't know what to do at home.

"I look after my two great grandchildren when I'm not working so putting my feet up isn't my thing."

To mark her birthday, Sue's workmates held a party for her on the unit, bringing along a cut-out of her favourite singer Gary Barlow to help in the celebrations.

Lynsey Wood, Senior Nurse in the Chemotherapy Day Unit, said: "Sue or Super Gran as I like to call her, is truly an incredible person. She is loved by all her colleagues and patients.

"She brightens up all of our days with her sense of humour, supports us all and picks us up if anyone has a low mood.

"Sue truly is a role model and represents everything that the NHS stands for."

A winter checklist for landlords

This year we've enjoyed a blistering hot summer and a warmer than usual Autumn, indeed it is the only time I can recall going to Hull Fair and seeing people in shorts and tee shirts, however winter is upon us. The days are getting shorter, the cold is setting in, and the Christmas decorations are starting to go up. Every year we see many weather related property incidents at this time of year, and there is a lot that can be done to safeguard against this.

As a landlord, winter poses some unique problems. Your property is at its most vulnerable during the coldest months, and you need to take steps to protect it. As well as helping you fulfil your obligation to provide reasonable accommodation to your tenants, these simple steps will help to ensure that you avoid major problems further down the line.

Check the pipes

Frozen pipes can cause major damage to your property. Pipes are more likely to burst when they are frozen, and this can cause flooding and water damage. This is an expensive prospect.

You can minimise the potential for damage of this kind by making sure that all outside pipes are properly clad. You can clad pipes yourself, and the material to do so is cheap and readily available from DIY shops.

If you notice cracks or fissures in pipes, make sure they are dealt with as a matter of urgency. These will only get worse, particularly in cold weather.

Service the boiler

(()

You have a range of legal responsibilities when it comes to the boiler in your property, including a requirement to secure an up-to-date Gas Safe certificate. In addition, though, you must make sure that this piece of equipment is fully functional - and this never more important than during the winter months.

You should consider having the boiler serviced before the winter. As well as keeping your tenants warm, a properly working boiler will help to ensure that your pipes do not freeze

Instruct your tenants

Properly informed tenants are your most useful tool in the battle against winter. By making sure that your tenants have the information they need you can significantly reduce the potential for damage. Consider preparing an information pack that outlines things like how the boiler works, and the location of the stopcock. You should also suggest that they leave the heating on at a low setting if they intend to leave the property empty for a few days, for example over Christmas. This will help to ensure that the pipes do not freeze.

Consider void periods

An empty property can begin to degrade remarkably quickly over the winter. If you are currently suffering from a void period, make sure that you visit the property regularly to do some simple maintenance. Windows should be opened to air the property, and the heating system should be turned on regularly. Some systems feature automation that will perform this task for you. You should also make sure that the pipes have not frozen, and that the taps work correctly.

Clear the gutters

Blocked gutters can cause water to accumulate, and ice to form. This in turn can increase the chances of overflows or frozen pipes. You should therefore make sure that the gutters around your property are clear of leaves and other detritus, particularly if you anticipate heavy rain or very cold conditions.

Winter property maintenance might seem like a hassle, but it is very much part of the landlord's job. By taking a few simple steps before the cold weather sets in, you can help to minimise the potential for bigger problems later on.
