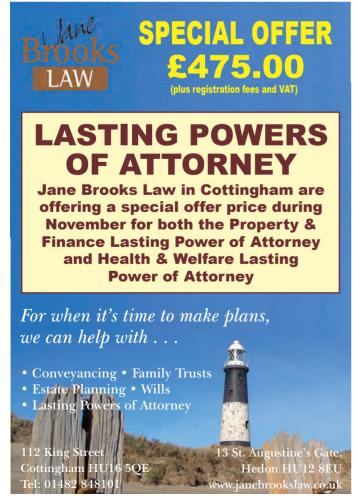

Smart Home Technology and Fibre-optic broadband

Smart Home Technology – is one of the biggest growth areas in technology. There is a plethora of devices available already, covering everything from doorbells to TVs. Also known as *IOT* – the *Internet of Things*, which basically means a network of connected devices designed to automate tasks with minimum human intervention. So what makes a device 'smart?' No surprise really that is that it connects to the internet and is therefore able to upload and download information and be controlled from an app. Ann app being a small program that can run on a phone, tablet, computer etc.

So let's take a look at some of these devices, and see what you might already have. To start off with you need a Smartphone that can use all the apps required by these devices. This can be an Apple iPhone, or one that runs the Android operating system such as those made by Samsung, Huawei, Google etc. Once set up and connected to the internet, you can then download all the apps you need. Smart doorbells, like the ones made by Ring, connect to an app on your phone and show you who is ringing your doorbell by video feed, and two-way sound. In the home you may have a voice assistant like an Amazon Echo, also known as Alexa or a Google Mini. These clever little devices can be used to access information from the internet, play your favourite music or radio station, as well as controlling lights, heating etc. Hive is the smart thermostat from British Gas, which works from an app and can be controlled by Alexa just by saying 'turn thermostat up to...' etc. Smart Plugs work in a similar way and then can be switched on and off by voice command. Smart TVs also connect to the internet by cable or WIFI and can download catch-up services, movies etc. We recently bought a new model that can be switched on and off by Alexa too. Another advantage of all this connected technology is that you can be in control wherever you are, home or abroad, as long as you have an internet connection. You can monitor your home's CCTV system, or just a single camera, check if the heating or hot water is on, switch lights on for security purposes, whatever you have set up will work remotely. Full-fibre broadband: What is it and how does it work? Ever since the inception of dial-up broadband (remember that?), connections have been by the same Victorian era copper wire! But now you have the choice of upgrading to the much faster and importantly, more stable, fibre optic connection. In this area of course we have our own telecoms provider Kcom, and their fibre system is called LightStream. This is normally delivered direct to your home by a fibre optic cable into a box outside your home. It then connects to your WIFI router and provides very fast and stable internet speeds. As mentioned above, this replaces the traditional copper wire, that now only supplies your landline telephone service. However, in a few cases where it is not possible to run a fibre optic cable right to the property, the service is delivered from a LightStream cabinet along the road by copper wire. This is not quite as fast as full-fibre, but still much faster than traditional broadband. For instance, in Cottingham, traditional broadband speeds were around 7 to 11 Mbps, but with LightStream the average speed is more like 50Mbps., but can go up to over 200 depending on the package you opt for. And the good news is that it is not usually any more expensive than the package you are paying for at the moment.

Is your computer slowing you down? Talking about broadband, some customers have remarked that they didn't think *LightStream* is any faster than their previous service. But that could be down to the computer. If your computer is very old, it may not be capable of going online any faster! To get the best speed and experience, you really need to be using up to date kit, be it a PC, laptop or tablet.

Toad in the hole, with Swiss chard & mustard cream sauce

Preparation time: 20 minutes
Cooking time: 40 minutes
Total time: 1 hour. Serves: 4

Ingredients

454g pack 8 essential Waitrose Pork Sausages, pricked with a fork

2 essential Waitrose Red Onions, peeled, trimmed and cut into 6

120g plain flour

2 essential Waitrose Medium Free Range Eggs, beaten

100ml whole milk

100ml carbonated natural mineral water

- 2. Meanwhile, place the flour in a bowl, making a well in the centre, and whisk together the eggs and milk in a jug. Gradually whisk the egg mixture into the flour until you have a thick batter. Gently stir in the water and pour into the hot pan of sausages, return to the oven for a final 20 minutes until golden and puffed up.
- 3. Meanwhile, gently fry the chard with the olive oil, adding a couple of tablespoons of water to the pan to encourage it to wilt, until the leaves have softened and the stalks have started to become transparent. Just before serving, stir in the cream and mustard, and serve with the toad in the hole.

Cook's tip Need a meat-free option? Use vegetarian sausages. Roast them with the onions and a little oil, adjusting the cooking time in step 1, until cooked through.

200ml red wine

400ml beef stock

320g pack puff pastry sheets

1 medium Waitrose British Blacktail

Free Range Egg, beaten

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C, gas mark 4 and have a large casserole dish with a lid ready.
- 2. Toss the steak in the flour until well coated, and then season with salt and pepper. Heat the olive oil in the casserole dish over a medium heat and fry the meat until brown all over. Remove from the pan using a slotted spoon and set to one side.
- 3. Keep the casserole dish on the heat and add the bacon lardons and crushed garlic. Fry for 2-3 minutes until the bacon is crisp, then add the shallot halves and mushrooms, and stir to combine.
- 4. Stir in the tomato purée, red wine and beef stock, then return the steak to the pan. Bring the mixture to the boil and use a wooden spoon to scrape the bottom to get all the flavours into the filling. Cover with the lid and bake in the oven for $2 \frac{1}{2}$ 3 hours.

5. When the filling is cooked, transfer into a large pie dish and allow to cool briefly. Turn the oven up to 200°C, gas mark 6.

6. Cut a large circle out of the puff pastry just big enough to cover the pie dish. Lay the pastry over the filling and crimp the edges onto the dish. Pierce a hole in the centre for steam to escape and glaze the pastry with beaten egg before baking for 20-25 minutes until golden brown and crisp on top. Serve with mash and fresh veg.

Ingredients

50g unsalted butter, melted, plus extra for greasing

150g digestive biscuits

2 x 280g tubs Philadelphia full fat soft cheese

100g icing sugar, sifted

200g Greek yogurt

300g whipping cream

1 tsp vanilla bean paste

2 x 150g packs Waitrose Blueberries

2 tbsp maple syrup

1 cinnamon stick

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 150°C, gas mark 2. Grease and line the base and sides of a 20cm springform tin with baking parchment. Put the digestive biscuits in a freezer bag, seal, then bash to crumbs with a rolling pin. Pour into a bowl and mix with the melted butter. Press into the base of the tin and bake for 15 minutes. Set aside to cool.
- 2. Beat the soft cheese, icing sugar, yogurt and a pinch of salt together with a wooden spoon. In a separate bowl, use a balloon whisk to whisk the whipping cream and vanilla paste to soft peaks, then gently fold the cream through the soft cheese mixture. Pour onto the cooled base and chill for at least 4 hours or ideally overnight.
- 3. Meanwhile, heat 1 pack blueberries in a pan with the maple syrup and cinnamon. Bring to a simmer and cook gently for 3-4 minutes, until the berries burst. Tip in the other pack and take off the heat to cool to room temperature, then chill. When ready to serve, discard the cinnamon stick and spoon over the chilled cheesecake.

Malbec the go-to wine for pairing with a meal

as Malbec become the go-to red wine for pairing with a meal. I eat out a lot and love people watching as well as perusing restaurant wine lists and I see a lot of people choosing this versatile grape variety to accompany their meal.

In fact, with my wife suddenly switching her allegiance from white to red I've been ordering quite a lot of

A soft and fruity wine beloved of beef eaters, it is gaining popularity in the UK with many restaurants offering at least a couple of examples on their lists - one at an entry level and another at the higher end.

I've mentioned beef, but you could say Malbec is the meat lover's perfect wine, as it also compliments rich proteins such as dark chicken meat, pork and lamb; even something as "exotic" as ostrich. It also pairs extremely well with smoky and earthy herbs and spices such as thyme, rosemary, smoked paprika, and

And on top of that, Malbec will bring out the flavours in roasted veggies, mushrooms, kale and chard. It also pairs well with blue cheese and goats milk cheese

Although originally grown in France and used as a blending grape for Bordeaux blends as well as being the grape responsible for the "black wine of Cahors", Malbec is regarded largely as a New World wine these

Its susceptibility to rot and disease turned French growers away from relying on the Malbec grape; luckily wine makers in Argentina discovered that the heat and higher altitudes of the country prevented the grapes from failing and thanks to its success in the region, Argentina is now responsible for around 75 per cent of Malbec production.

While South Africa, Australia, Chile, and the United States also successfully grow Malbec grapes, the output from those nations is nowhere near the same capacity as Argentina's Malbecs

Malbec is typically a medium to full-bodied, dry red wine with plenty of acidities and relatively high tannin and alcohol levels. Dark, inky purple in colour and ripe flavours of plums, black cherry, and blackberry can give this wine a decidedly jammy character.

However, the overall flavour profile of Malbec is largely dependent on the region in which it is grown. Therefore, Malbec from Argentina has a noticeably different taste from its French equivalent. Argentinian Malbec is fruit forward with flavours of dark fruits such as blackberry, plum, and black cherry. This is followed by hints of chocolate, leather, and tobacco.

French Malbec on the other hand has far less pronounced fruitiness. Instead, expect strong tastes of leather, pepper, current, and spices.

But regardless of the growing region, pretty much all Malbecs are full bodied and have medium tannins and acidity

And finally, before you go off and enjoy a glass, here's a tip worth trying. Bearing in mind I wrote recently about the best temperature to serve particular wines and the fact that "room temperature" means a whole lot different in this modern age compared to the days when the advice about serving certain wines at room temperature was first coined, I feel you should serve your Malbec at slightly below modern room

That being the case, try putting your bottle in the fridge for about half an hour before uncorking and

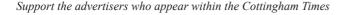

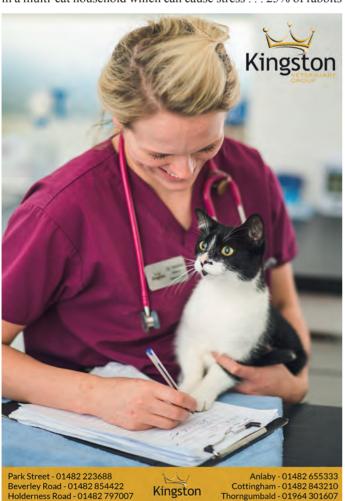


A nation of animal lovers

hoosing a pet can be an emotional decision. Pets we had as a child, pets we know through family and friends, or those we see in the media can all influence our decisions.

The UK is a nation of animal lovers, 95% of dog owners, 93% of cat owners and 91% of rabbit owners say that owning their pet makes them happy. That will winter bring this year? The weather has been remarkably unpredictable over the last few months making it impossible to make any garden plans. What we do know is that November is sure to have a few sunny days were we can get out into the garden and tidy everything up ready for the spring. Plus when the days are dark and dreary we can cheer our gardens up with bursts of colour. There's something especially valuable about shrubs which flower in winter. Seeing these delightful and resilient flowers putting on a show through short, dark days and taking frost, rain and snow in their stride lifts our spirits and encourages us to get outside. Many can also be cut for indoor winter posies, and many are fragrant.



Houseplants

At this time of year it's nice to add colour to your garden and your home with flowers and foliage. There's nothing better for brightening up an indoor environment than a well-grown houseplant and they are available in a vast range of forms from tiny gems suitable for the smallest windowsill to rampant growers for the largest hallway. They offer lush foliage, beautiful blooms and interesting forms. Some thrive in damp bathrooms, others need a sunny spot, so make sure you choose a houseplant that will tolerate the conditions in which it is to grow. Ask our staff for advice on the best choice. Once you've made your purchase, take care when transporting houseplants to protect them from cold, drafts, wind or excessive heat. Failure to do so can lead to plant deterioration or even death, and the effects may not fully show themselves until some time after you've bought it.

care for it correctly to ensure that it remains in pristine condition – and this largely depends on how well it is watered. Too little or too much watering can cause problems.

Overwatering: Giving too much water can be as dangerous as under watering. The roots not only require moisture but also air, so overwatering leads to the forcible removal of air from the potting compost so the houseplant's roots are killed by suffocation.

Best Practice: Watering little and often is the best advice, taking into account the growing environment and the seasons. Watering from below is the best approach as some plants can suffer from rotting or sun scorch if water is directed onto their stems, root systems or foliage.

Drainage:

The best method is to stand the pot (which must have drainage holes in the bottom) on a suitable sized saucer into which a small amount of gravel has been placed.

Fill the saucer to about 1/3 of its depth with water and leave the plant standing for 30 minutes.

If all the water has been taken up you can repeat the operation until uptake stops, then any surplus water should be tipped away but of course retaining the gravel.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. There is still time to plant Spring blooming bulbs for the early part of November
- 2. Transplant trees and shrubs
- 3. Prune evergreens to shape
- Cover strawberries two inches deep with straw or hay
- 5. Increase feed and provide plenty of fresh water for the birds
- If you haven't already feed your lawn with a fall or winter feed
- 7. Rake leaves from the lawn and compost them
- 8. Drain your hoses and put away over winter
- 9. Finish weeding and tidying up beds
- 10. Clean up and cover you garden furniture to protect over the Winter





Pests & Diseases

Healthy Habit: Plants that are well-fed and watered are less likely to suffer from pests and diseases, so prevention is always better than cure. However, keep a look-out for common houseplant pests. Pick off any visible pests from the stems, leaves or soil, clean leaves with water and use a chemical spray available from our garden centre, or try an organic or biological control.

Croxby Primary - Things have been changing at this local primary academy

fter being placed into 'Special Measures' by OFSTED in December 2016 with SAT results around 30% below the national average and in the bottom 10% nationally for progress, a turnaround has taken place.

Croxby Primary, which is now part of 'The Consortium Academy Trust' (TCAT), has been on an exciting journey over recent years.

Kerry Mason, Assistant Head-teacher for Teaching and Learning says 'Since the Trust has taken over we have overhauled the curriculum at Croxby. We introduced a 'Croxby Way' curriculum which focuses on the skills and knowledge Croxby children need.'

Croxby's curriculum includes a wide variety of learning opportunities. All children in Key Stage 2 are learning to play two musical instruments. All children receive a 10-week block of musical theatre each year and there are over 70 children representing the academy in inter school sports events.

The new curriculum has had an impact on results as the Assistant Head-teacher for Standards, Mike Copley explains, 'The way we teach has dramatically impacted on results at the end of Key Stage 2. Since becoming an academy with TCAT, results have just been above the national average with this year's reading and writing progress measures placing the academy in the top 18% nationally, with maths progress in the top 10% nationally.'

Local Beekeeper Neil Gower Continues his quarterly review ot the Beekeeping world

Do It Yourself Beekeeping

Build your own

fter several years of using the rear of my garage to store junk and various bits of paraphernalia I've finally got round to clearing it out and have created a useable workshop area.

This is good news for my beekeeping as I plan to use it for carrying out repairs to my ageing beehives and to build some of my own equipment from now on.

The majority of my hives are made from cedar but I must admit I was seduced some years ago to try the high quality polystyrene versions for their lighter weight and their insulation factors. These have been very good in practice but their benefits also come with a huge downside in that they are virtually indestructible and certainly not recyclable. A large part of my beekeeping ethos is around conservation and polystyrene hives no longer form part of my plans. Over the summer I have re-purposed my polystyrene equipment. The grooves have been used to create long term insulation in my greenhouse, the broodboxes have been used for a solar powered wax extractor and also for creating cold frames in the garden. These will not rot or decay, but will be re-used year after year. The wax extractor allows me to recycle beeswax from the hives.

Whilst I'm happy that I've been able to put the polystyrene to good use without damaging the environment, it leaves me with a shortage of hive equipment which was the driver for my clear out.

Plans for building beehives and other related equipment are readily available and I'm all set to give it a go. I'll keep you posted on progress in forthcoming articles.

Asian Hornet.

In many ways I wish that I didn't have to provide an

update on the threat of the Asian Hornet but it continues to raise its ugly little head.

The Island of Jersey appears to be at the forefront of the UK's battle against this non-native species that has wreaked havoc across Europe. The Hornet first arrived in Jersey in 2016 and 3 nests were located and destroyed. In 2018 that figure went up to 55 and so far this year almost 70 nests have been located and destroyed on this tiny island. There have been 3 mainland sightings this year and recently a nest was destroyed in Christchurch in Dorset.

Next years Queens are produced in September and October before hibernation in November, so the last few months have now become a busy time for beekeepers in our efforts to keep on top of this threat.

New methods for destroying nests are now being deployed after a UK pest controller was attacked and badly stung by Asian Hornets while dealing with a nest. Previously the nest would have been wrapped in two bags before being removed and frozen, but chemical fogging is now the preferred option.

To date members of the public have been very helpful in Asian Hornet sightings so if you do come across one and are able to get a photo on your phone, please email alertnonnative@ceh.ac.uk, but remember to be careful as they do have a nasty sting.

The bees

The weather plays a huge part in whether or not honeybees have a successful season and as I started to write the last article I was hopeful that August and September might have been shaping up to be better than it turned out. I measure a successful season as being one where I have healthy bees who are thriving and have enough stores to last them through the winter. If I'm able to harvest excess honey, then I class that as an added bonus. I've been quite conservative this year and have only taken honey from two of my largest hives and I always err on the side of caution. It's better to let the bees have their stores than take them away and regret it later.

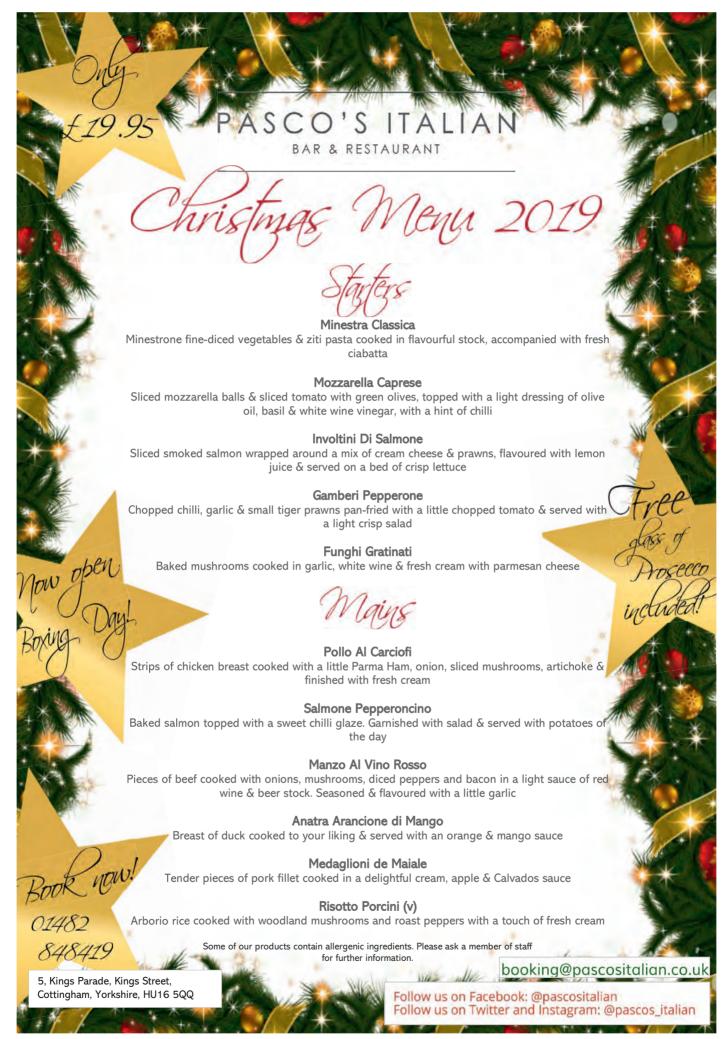
My chief honey taster was pleased with what we did take off and I'm going to put some aside this year to make mead. This is allegedly the oldest alcoholic drink in history dating back to 1500 BC and is made by fermenting honey and water. This will be my first attempt and if successful, I'll share the recipe with you.

The bees are still venturing out for short periods on warmish days but that will reduce as the temperature cools down. I've reduced the size of the hive entrances to prevent wasps and other bees from robbing honey. The smaller entrances are easier to defend in the autumn when other insects are on the look out for easy pickings.

The next job will be to put on the mouse guards which I didn't secure properly last year and ended up losing a colony as a result. It's then just a case of keeping an eye on the hives over the winter to make sure the mouse guards remain in place, the entrances don't get blocked from any snowfall, and I don't suffer from any mindless vandalism.

I'll be back in 2020 so wish you all the very best for now.

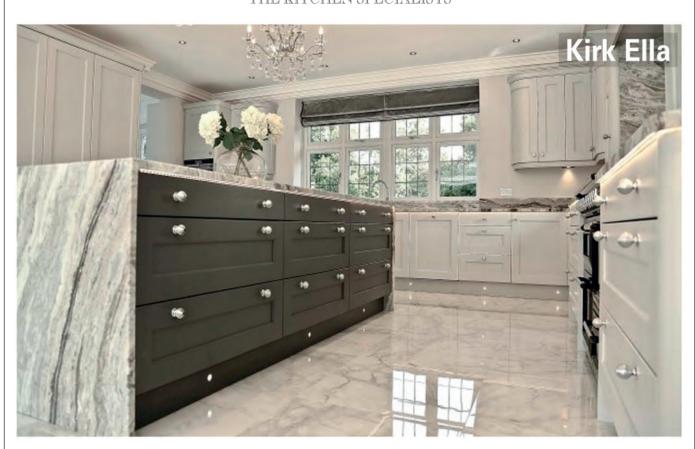

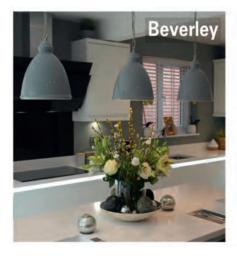

How can you help a reactive horse?

his is a question I am often asked by frustrated or anxious horse owners. The answer is in the question really. Reactive means that the horse is often anxious about certain stimuli entering its direct environment. This could be a sudden movement which causes nervous reaction - wind moving the branches, a fluttering plastic bag in a hedge or maybe even a pterodactyl perceived type of sparrow! Perhaps a new type of noise came into its hearing range? Someone power washing a driveway or vehicle, Hammering, roadworks or a million other stimuli.

The very fact that a horse feels the need to react will result In quick, sharp or downright dangerous avoidance behaviour. The behaviours on offer will be to shy away, spook, flee, jump away, spin, plant or freeze and just a few. They show that this horse lives on the edge of fear all of the time. The fear system is an innate, hard driven system. It is all about survival after all and it is present because the reptilian part of the brain is being used.

This part of the ancient brain triggers all the flight, freeze and fight responses. Cognitive learning and rational thinking ability has flown out the door as the horse remains in a state of survival.

I hope you now understand what is happening to this horse under stress and why the horse has no control over its reactions without our help.

Mostly, the first commonly used reaction from a rider is an aggressive one. "Make the horse walk forwards" by increasing aversive aids. Tell it off for being "stupid". Pull its head around by its tender mouth to "move its feet". Hit it with the whip you are allowed to carry. (Strange scenario really. We have banned the use of whips on humans. Slapping our children is now classed as assault. We have banned the use of whips on dogs. Circus acts are no longer allowed to use whips on Tigers and Lions to force them through hoops of fire because the general public don't like seeing

it, yet no one minds seeing riders hit their beloved horse to make it move. They even buy pretty looking whips for their children to use on their beloved ponies!)

It does not need to be this way. We can change so very much through structured training protocols using systematic desensitisation, counter conditioning and reward based marker training.

Leasehold and Freehold Property

he terms 'freehold' and 'leasehold' refer to the two main different ways in which properties in England and Wales can be owned

This article explores the differences between freehold and leasehold, and provides an outline of some of the main issues surrounding leasehold, the more complex of the two.

Freehold

If your property is freehold, you own it, and the land on which it is built, outright. When you die, it is part of your estate and can be begueathed to your heirs. Your entitlement to do with it as you please is limited only by planning and other laws. Any necessary repairs are your responsibility, but you can generally choose not to carry them out if you so wish.

For these reasons, freehold properties (or, in the case of a flat, a property with a share of the freehold) are usually more desirable than leasehold ones, and so are often worth more.

Leasehold

(

Though houses can be leasehold, this type of ownership applies more usually to flats. Under a leasehold agreement, you own your property only for the period stated in the lease. The freeholder (who, as we have seen, owns the property outright) grants you the right to do so, and ownership reverts to him when the lease expires.

The length of a lease, naturally, diminishes over time; its initial term can be up to 999 years. Not surprisingly, the duration of the lease purchased has a direct bearing on a property's

value. In some cases, leaseholders have the right to extend their lease or even buy the freehold.

Because leasehold is, in effect, a form of tenancy, an annual fee (known as ground rent) is payable to the landlord (that is, the freeholder or his managing agent). Ground rent may be a nominal sum. A maintenance (or service) charge is also levied, to cover things like managing the building, external redecoration and repairs, gardening, window cleaning, buildings (though not contents) insurance, and so on. Such charges may rise annually without limit, but they are required by law to be

The leaseholder usually owns everything within the walls, including the floorboards and plaster, while the freeholder owns the structure, the land on which it is built, and the common parts (which include communal entrance halls, staircases and so forth). The freeholder may be an individual, a company, a local authority, a housing association or a residents' management committee, under which leaseholders join forces to buy the freehold of their building

Leasehold's main advantage is that it assigns clear responsibilities for upkeep and repairs, protecting individual leaseholders in the event of, say, a leak from a flat above. On the downside, it can be more difficult to obtain a mortgage on a leasehold property; much will depend on the length of time the lease will have left to run after the end of the mortgage term.

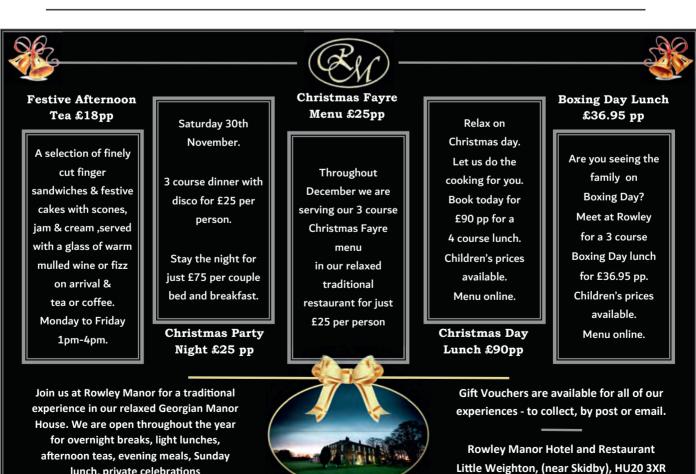

Sailing to Senegal to volunteer as a Ward Nurse on the *Africa Mercy*

iz Findley from Cottingham, East Yorkshire is preparing for a 2-month trip to the West African nation of Senegal where she will be volunteering as a Ward Nurse (Paediatric ICU).

The 58-year-old is travelling to the *Africa Mercy*, the world's largest charity-run hospital ship, which provides healthcare and training to developing countries.

"My personal goal is to spend my semi-retirement from the NHS in a productive way. After furthering my knowledge by completing a Diploma in Tropical Nursing in Liverpool this year, I looked for suitable volunteering opportunities. The amazing work of Mercy Ships impressed me in particular. People who desperately need healthcare or surgery can not only be affected physically and emotionally but due to their conditions may be unable to work, go to school or may even face the isolation of stigma in their communities.

Mercy Ships not only deliver healthcare and surgery but train local medical professionals in the latest health and surgical techniques and aim to improve the local infrastructure. This is very important to me as I hope in the future their success could see themselves out of a job!"

The floating hospital is staffed almost entirely by volunteers from over 40 different nations who work in a variety of roles to help change the lives of some of the world's poorest people.

In sub-Saharan Africa, 93% of the population do not have access to safe and affordable surgery when they need it. This results in over 18 million people dying each year from treatable conditions. That's more than die from TB, Malaria and HIV combined.

Mercy Ships addresses this global surgery crisis within Africa by sending hospital ships crewed by volunteers to the places where surgeons are needed most. These surgeons also train local medical professionals who will stay in their home countries, effecting change long after Mercy Ships departs. 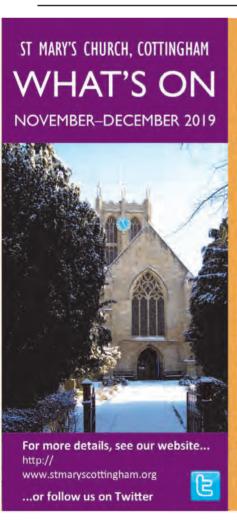

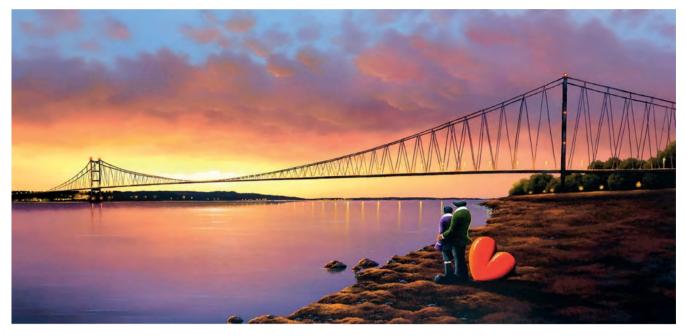

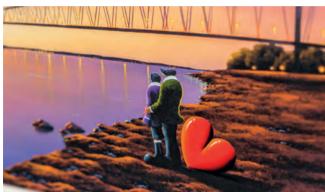
