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

New Season at Sewerby Hall and Gardens

ewerby Hall and Gardens has now entered its winter period, which means free entry to the grounds from 1 November until 25 March, 2022.

The Clock Tower Café and the zoo are open daily, offering opportunities to see the new baby llama; Pickle the

handreared new baby penguin; and Rosie, the world's oldest Humboldt penguin.

The house itself is open at weekends, including the exhibition, 'A Brief History of Underwear', looking at how women's bodies in particular have been manipulated into shape over the years by means of underwear, through the corset, bustle, girdle, brassiere and crinoline.

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




Mrs. Rene James of Beverley knits 150 poppies for Hallgarth Residential Home

On his latest visits, Allen, an artist based in North Lincolnshire who specialises in unique hand-carved wood sculptures, has created a fairy tower, gnomes, a pixie baby, elves, fairies, a dragon and a unicorn.

Allen had earlier completed logs on a wildlife theme, including puffins, dolphins, gannets, fish, crabs, and seals. He had already transformed the wood from the monkey puzzle tree which fell in the severe weather of March, 2018 into 13 new wood panels, which are also on display in the gardens at the venue

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

Cork recycling and wine by-products in skin care

Here's an interesting development as the world becomes ever-more conscious of environmental concerns. For retailer Majestic, who have an outlet in Beverley, has recently announced that it plans to collect corks at its 190 stores, to be used as trial mulch for Cornwall's Eden project.

Majestic hopes the initiative will be embraced both by customers and other retailers. Individual collection points are being set up at all 190 stores and the collected corks will be then delivered to the Eden Project in Cornwall where they will be used, on a trial basis, as mulching for Mediterranean plants.

The project's goal is to recycle over one million corks per year, offsetting the equivalent to 309 tonnes of CO2 emissions

A 2018 study by PricewaterhouseCoopers stated that corks were the most environmentally friendly form of wine closure, more than 20 times more environmentally friendly than screw caps, while Europe's natural cork oak forests are a haven for biodiversity and sustainable agriculture, capturing CO2.

However, unlike other countries, the UK does not had a nationwide cork recycling scheme, making Majestic's scheme the first of its kind.

Majestic CEO, John Colley, said cork represented "a perfectly circular, environmentally friendly industry" from cork oak to bottle but that the final link in the circle – what happens after the wine has been drunk – was missing.

He commented: "By working with the Cork Association, we're squaring the circle by giving our customers and stores the opportunity to continue a natural cork's journey at The Eden Project.

"I'm sure not only will this give our customers another reason to enjoy a great bottle of wine, but also another reason to visit us in-store – with their pockets brimming with corks."

Carlos de Jesus, APCOR campaign director, said it was an exciting and unique project. "Cork is about so much more than simply a closure. It's a fabulous, natural product which has a story and history all of its own. The fact that we can add another chapter to that story, with hundreds of thousands of corks collected from right across the UK to be used at such an iconic site, is really thrilling."

* TV celebrity chef James Martin, known for shows such as Saturday Kitchen, is launching his own range of wines into the UK.

The wines, which Martin has been heavily involved in sourcing, selecting and blending, includes a red Corbières and white Vin de Pays d'Oc sourced from the Languedoc area in the south of France and is produced as part of the Signature Chefs range in the village of Névian near Narbonne in the heart of the Corbières region.

The Signature Chefs wine range, produced by Wines & Brands, is an initiative that partners 11 chefs with their own selected styles of wines to help amplify the link between wine and culinary excellence.

Martin said: "We hand-picked a wine producer with the help of local partners, and after much work, we narrowed it down to just two outstanding wines which truly reflect the quality on offer in the Corbières region. I've always loved the food and drinks produced in that part of France and these wines are no exception."

Each bottle of wine will be sold with a neck hanger containing a recipe created specifically by Martin to match the style of the wine. The recipe can also be accessed via QR code linked to a video of Martin cooking the two dishes.

The wines will become available in the UK this month exclusively via the family-owned importer Buckingham Schenk.

* And here's another good reason to drink wine! Pelegrims, a new British skincare brand, has incorporated by-products from local winemaking in Kent to create a beauty range rich in antioxidants. The range, a limited edition 2020 Vintage collection, utilises waste grape seeds, skins and stems to create extracts containing polyphenols – an ingredient high in antioxidant properties.

Grandads Park



Now, that dreaded time of the year all pet owners' dread... November 5th. Whether you own a dog, cat or rabbit, they all can be affected by the noise and lights. It is so worrying for pets as they do not understand what is going on and the 'fright and flight' sets in. It shall be especially difficult not only for my daughter Natalie who's dog Dexter has the most distressing phobia but also my other daughter Jenni with her puppy, Max who shall have his first experience. Here are a few tips:

Communication is the key word. When a new baby arrives within the family, the soothing voice of their parents, whispering against their cheek, eventually brings harmony to the household. As the weeks turn into months and progresses into the first year, the baby responds more to words of comfort rather than 'sssshhhhhhh'. This is where the similarity starts and finishes with our pets.

With November on the horizon, you will be quite rightly thinking why have I gone off at such a tangent but the link will hopefully become clear. Also why talk about it when it is upon us as you read this article. Well, it just doesn't stop at Guy Fawkes night but carries on to New

Year....so there is no time like the present to begin training and making your home a safe place to be.

Asking any responsible pet owner, I can imagine the response to 5th November would be filled with dread. The thought of pacifying our pets whilst the bangs, hissing, bright lights are going on outside, just doesn't bare thinking about. There is the odd pet who is not afraid, like our late dogs Teal and Charlie, but the majority are terrified...so what do we do? Our first response is to cuddle our pets, just like we do our children when they are afraid of sleeping alone. Cuddling and reassuring them that everything will be alright. This works ideally for the child who understands or the baby feeling the closeness but what about a terrified animal? They do not understand as we would, so soothing them with "There there do not be afraid" can be translated to "Help, I need you to guard me!". By ignoring your pet and carrying on with your usual evening routine, will help instigate a calm aura around the house. If they sense you are not frightened, then they are calm.

Make sure your pet always has somewhere to hide if they wish (if no safe haven has been previously provided) and make sure there is access to this place at all times. For example, this could be under some furniture or in a cupboard. If your pet would like, you could play with them, ignoring all the noises but do not insist if your pet is not interested.

Never punish or over fuss with your pet when it is scared. This will only make matters worse. Closing the curtains, putting on the television, or playing the radio will help mask and muffle the sights and sounds of the fireworks.

Ideally all pets should be micro-chipped but especially so around this season just in case they are frightened and escape.

Please also do not forget our very small friends, i.e.. rabbits, guinea pigs etc. Invariably they are usually kept outside, so move them inside a shed/garage if possible and cover the hutch to blot out any bright lights.

Finally in the case of our canine friends, they will most likely need a walk before dusk. If this is so, please be aware of the most probable dangers in using an extending lead. It is so difficult to control a bolting dog on the end of 4 metres of line after a sudden loud 'BANG'! The pavements are very close to the roads, so both dog and car do not stand a chance. Please try to use a normal lead whenever possible and keep the extending one for the park.

ello again, I hope that you are safe and well. As I write the nights are drawing in very quickly. It's pitch dark at 6-30 and the clocks haven't gone back yet. The cycle of constant change eh. I've got to put my daylight lamp on in a morning as well now to help me get out of bed and on with the day. It does help.



Something and nothing

I've put the title as "something in the air" but it may have been a better title as "Nothing in the air." Hang on, he's going or gone mad, you may be thinking. Stick with me and it will make more sense. It's really about clean air which is about reducing or having no particles, harmful gases, aerosols or germs. Last year when all the lock

down thing hit hard and we had to close I did a load of research on air filtration. I have a NASA paper on it. We invested in air purifiers that filter the air and we measured the air quality with particle meters that also measure for some bad gases. I am really happy to say that it has been great success and my team and patients have felt safe and been safe because of it.

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

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Some great news

Some research at Addenbrooke's hospital in Cambridge has been done on the COVID ICU and wards to test the air with and without air filtration using HEPA filtration units. The results showed no virus detected in the air with the filtration units switched on. Not only that but there was a reduction in other organisms that cause hospital acquired infections like e.coli and staphylococcus aureus. These bacteria were not even thought to spread by aerosols in the air! **WOW.** Korean hospitals were using filtration systems with added UV light that kills viruses and bacteria and they seemed to have much fewer COVID outbreaks in hospitals. That's one of the reasons I started to research it quite early on.




Now for some geeky stuff HEPA stands for High Efficiency Particulate Air. The filter doesn't just work like a sieve where things that are smaller than the holes get through. It's way more complicated so I won't go too deep. The filter is made up

of a criss-crossed fibre network. The picture shows bacteria caught up in one.

It works in four ways (see right). As it works and traps stuff it becomes a better filter. As it does not work like a sieve it can trap things much smaller than it pore sizes, including very small viruses. So, relatively inexpensive true HEPA filtration systems can really improve health by preventing disease.

NASA had an equation for it all.



Well, that's way above my head The units we use at work in clinical situations have a 6-stage process so can clean the air very quickly and effectively. This is a bit easier to understand.

$$E_T = 1 - (1 - E_I)(1 - E_D)(1 - E_R)(1 - E_{DR})(1 - E_G) . \tag{1}$$



Filtration systems have been shown to be good for asthma as well. It's all food for thought and every little helps.

Motoring - with Roy Woodcock



Solving the mystery behind the changes at Spanish car-maker SEAT, which has seen Cupra become a stand-alone brand, Roy Woodcock takes a look at the new super-quick Cupra Leon . . .

You've probably seen it as the sponsor of one of those ITV mystery dramas, but there's no mystery behind the Cupra Leon; the first Leon to carry the exclusive Leon badge.

There was a time when Cupra was simply the sportier, more aggressive trim level on SEAT models but these days it's a brand in its own right and it's making quite an impact.

The new Cupra Leon for 2022, available to order since July 1, is testament to that with bold styling, a wealth of technology and performance stats that will make any driving purist sit up and listen. It would be fair to say the car is a hot hatch with attitude.

It's available in hatchback or estate body styles in trim levels called VZ1, VZ2 and VZ3. Customers can choose from a range of punchy petrol engines and there is also a new e-HYBRID model that introduces lots of tax savings to the mix and can complete 34 miles in electric-only mode. And with high levels of standard equipment including full LED front and rear lamps, bucket seats, sports suspension, keyless entry and ambient lighting to name just a few, it's a vehicle that offers great value in the highly competitive segment.

The 2.0 litre TSI petrol engines is available in 245PS, 300PS and 310PS (exclusively available for the estate) power outputs to deliver real on-the-road performance - the plug-in hybrid variant is rated at 245PS

Tested here was the 2.0-litre TSI hatchback in range-topping VZ3 trim delivering 300PS of power and 400Nm of torque, priced at £36,760.

It could complete the 0-62mph sprint in 5.7 seconds, maxed out at 155mph and, according to official WLTP figures, could deliver a combined 35.8-37.2mpg with carbon emissions of 172g/km.

Viewed from any approach, the Cupra Leon is a real attention grabber with lots of copper-coloured detailing that is synonymous with Cupra styling.

The brand logo sits proudly in the centre of the main grille and there are larger air intakes giving the car a more aggressive look, along with quad tail pipes, a rear spoiler, black brake calipers and 19-inch aerodynamic machined black and silver alloy wheels.

When you open the doors, there are puddle lamps that display the Cupra logo onto the ground and the interior of the car is very sports-themed with black leather sport-style seats, a flat-bottomed steering wheel and some neat copper-coloured

contrast stitching.

There is plenty of high-end technology to explore too with a 10-inch touchscreen with navigation, Bluetooth audio streaming, full smartphone connectivity via Apple CarPlay or Android Auto and a DAB radio.

On the downside, the minimalist, clutter-free approach means there are very few physical buttons, so you tend to have to navigate the touchscreen for the simplest of tasks which can be a distraction while driving.

But that gripe aside, the Cupra Leon is quite the complete package. And when it comes to performance, it certainly ticks all the right boxes.

The acceleration is blisteringly quick and the seven-speed direct shift automatic transmission is perfectly timed with steering wheel mounted paddles for added driver engagement.

The car sits lower on its axles than its SEAT stablemate and that results in a lower centre of gravity, and that in turn means assured handling through tight bends.

It cruises on motorways, is agile in busier town settings, but is at its best when unleashed on the quieter country lanes.

The driver can switch through drive modes called Comfort, Sport, Cupra and Individual that alter the car's reactions quite considerably and, in addition, you can shift the gearstick back to engage a Sport mode for even more fun.

Comfort levels are good up front and there is room for a couple of adults in the back provided the front seats are not pushed back too far. And back seat passengers get two Type C USB ports as well as two up front, so people can stay connected to their devices on the move.


The deep boot can swallow 380 litres of luggage – a limit that is increased further with the 60:40 split-folding rear seats dropped flat and there is a ski hatch to make carrying longer items possible without lowering the rear seats. There are also a number of handy storage options scattered throughout the car, including front and rear cup holders, a glovebox, central cubby, door bins and seat back pockets.

Recently, the Cupra Leon was awarded the maximum five stars when tested for its Euro NCAP safety rating, scoring exceptionally well in the Adult Occupancy, Child Occupants, Vulnerable Road User and Safety Assist categories.

On-board safety systems on our car included autonomous emergency braking, traffic sign recognition, high beam assist, traffic jam assist and pre-crash assist. There is front assist (with vehicle, pedestrian and cyclist detection), emergency steering assist and junction assist, lane assist, emergency e-Call and seven airbags.

All in all, the Cupra Leon is further proof that the split from SEAT is not simply a case of rebadging existing models. These cars will be featuring their very own identity and further ventures into electrification are on the way too.



care for it correctly to ensure that it remains in pristine condition – and this largely depends on how well it is watered. Too little or too much watering can cause problems.

Overwatering: Giving too much water can be as dangerous as under watering. The roots not only require moisture but also air, so overwatering leads to the forcible removal of air from the potting compost so the houseplant's roots are killed by suffocation.

Best Practice: Watering little and often is the best advice, taking into account the growing environment and the seasons. Watering from below is the best approach as some plants can suffer from rotting or sun scorch if water is directed onto their stems, root systems or foliage.

Drainage:

The best method is to stand the pot (which must have drainage holes in the bottom) on a suitable sized saucer into which a small amount of gravel has been placed.

Fill the saucer to about 1/3 of its depth with water and leave the plant standing for 30 minutes.

If all the water has been taken up you can repeat the operation until uptake stops, then any surplus water should be tipped away but of course retaining the gravel.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. There is still time to plant Spring blooming bulbs for the early part of November
- 2. Transplant trees and shrubs
- 3. Prune evergreens to shape
- Cover strawberries two inches deep with straw or hay
- 5. Increase feed and provide plenty of fresh water for the birds
- If you haven't already feed your lawn with a fall or winter feed
- 7. Rake leaves from the lawn and compost them
- 8. Drain your hoses and put away over winter
- 9. Finish weeding and tidying up beds

Pests & Diseases

Healthy Habit: Plants that are well-fed and watered are less likely to suffer from pests and diseases, so prevention is always better than cure. However, keep a look-out for common houseplant pests. Pick off any visible pests from the stems, leaves or soil, clean leaves with water and use a chemical spray available from our garden centre, or try an organic or biological control.

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Cyclotron delivery lifts Daisy Appeal into UK top tier for medical scanning and research

charity which is working to develop "dose-on-demand" radiotracers with improved detection and personalised treatment for patients with cancer, heart disease and dementia has taken a big step towards its goal with the delivery to Castle Hill Hospital of a consignment of UK-leading PET-CT scanning and research equipment.

The cyclotron components arrived at Castle Hill Hospital, Cottingham, and were transferred in a series of crane lifts over the roof of the admin building to the loading bay at the new Molecular Imaging Research Centre (MIRC).

The pieces will be assembled in the new building over the next two weeks and the cyclotron will become operational early in 2022 as the latest piece in a jigsaw which Prof Stafford has been working on since he launched the Daisy Appeal in 2000.

The Daisy Appeal Medical Research Centre opened at Castle Hill Hospital in 2008 and was followed, in 2014, by the opening of the Jack Brignall PET-CT Scanning Centre, housing the first in a new type of Siemens scanner in the country.

The Daisy Appeal has raised more than £20m to fund cuttingedge research and state-of-the-art equipment and facilities. Hullbased construction company Hobson & Porter built the Jack Brignall Centre and the new MIRC, which is due to be formally handed over to the charity later this year.
