

during their visit.


Sewerby Winter Woodland will return from 8 – 22 December, with an all-new spectacular

Safeguarding Children & Young People

If you are ever concerned that a child is in immediate danger, please call the police on 999. Safeguarding children and young people is the responsibility of everyone. If you are a professional, young person, carer, family member or a member of the public and you are worried about a child or young person, who has or may be likely to suffer significant harm, you can contact the Safeguarding and Partnership Hub (SaPH), the front door to Children's Social Care. If you are a young person, family member, carer, or member of the public and you want to discuss a child that you are worried about, or make a self-referral you can contact the Safeguarding and Partnership Hub (SaPH) during office hours on: (01482) 395500 - Choose 'Option 1' and a social worker will be able to talk through your worries with you and discuss what happens next. If you have a worry about a child outside of office hours, the Children's Emergency duty Team (CEDT) operates to respond to emergency situations from 5pm until 8:30am Monday to Thursday and 4.30pm until 8:30am on a Friday and at weekends and bank holidays. CEDT responds to emergency situations that are unable to wait until the next working day. These will relate to children's safeguarding, potential placement, or family breakdowns and any other Children's Services statutory work. Your call will be taken by a Lifeline operator. The social worker will then make the decision if an intervention/additional information is needed that evening, or the situation can wait until the following morning when a children's social work team or the Safeguarding and Partnership Hub (SaPH) will follow-up with the person sharing the information the following day. You can contact the Children's Emergency Duty Team on: (01482) 393939. The sooner the staff have information about any concern the sooner a situation can be addressed. All conversations are in the strictest of confidence.

ASBESTOS RELATED DISEASE

GRAHAM & ROSEN: SUPPORTING YOU AND YOUR FAMILY

Debbie Schofield is a specialist solicitor at Graham & Rosen solicitors with many years of experience dealing with Asbestos Disease compensation claims. Debbie explains how Asbestos Diseases can happen and how compensation can be claimed:

"As one of the UK's major ports, in the decades following the war years, Hull received thousands of tonnes of raw asbestos through its King George Dock, destined to be used in building materials and insulation across the country for the railways, for shipbuilding and repair, in chemical factories, power stations, homes and other premises.

Asbestos is a fibrous mineral. It was considered to be highly useful because of its thermal and acoustic properties and so was used extensively. It was often used as a fire-retardant in buildings, for the insulation of pipes to maintain temperature or to absorb noise.

Unfortunately, asbestos is also highly toxic and can cause serious lung disease many years later if its fibres are inhaled. (It is important to note that asbestos is not considered a health risk if it is left intact and inhaling asbestos fibres will not necessarily cause health problems.)

Lung diseases caused by asbestos include:

- · Asbestos related pleural effusion
- Pleural thickening





East Riding Archives now living in a virtual world

t East Riding Archives, the first steps towards virtuality are being taken with a new 'Archives 360' virtual tour of their public spaces and conservation workshop. Based at the Treasure House in Beverley, the Archives' physical face-to-face service is currently closed for the Treasure House transformation, so the new online tour will help users maintain a connection with the service by enabling them to interact with the space in a virtual sense.

Visitors to the East Riding Archives website can navigate the immersive experience, based on Google Street View, by interacting with clickable 'hotspots', where they can learn about ongoing heritage projects, discover online local and family history resources, and stay up-to-date with service

Archivist Sam Bartle said: "The 'Archives 360' tour offers an intuitive way to find and access the various resources and service news that remain available to customers, such as digital archives and the 'What Was Here?' app and website, and it also gives an opportunity for us to work on new experiences, such as augmented reality."

East Riding Archives carries out a huge amount of outreach and engagement work beyond its public research space, and the tour enables its virtual visitors to discover and learn more about this.

Archivist Hannah Stamp said: "We currently have a number of community heritage projects in progress, including 'Travellers and Settlers', and the 'Archiverse' based around Minecraft. The online tour lets users learn more about the work we're doing here, and gives them an opportunity to discover current and upcoming online exhibitions as well.'

The virtual tour was created using 360-degree panoramic images captured by specialist photographers, approved by Google Street View and, to enhance the ambience of the tour, a group of volunteers were recruited to act as still-life models

Hannah Stamp added: "A huge thank you goes out to those volunteers, who approached their roles with such enthusiasm that they were able to remain rigid and motionless for up to


Happy Visit

Confusing world of buying a bottle of wine

Thether it's searching for the perfect accompaniment to a special meal at home, or perhaps trying to find the apt gift to satisfy the "bring a bottle" memo at a party, new research has highlighted how confusing many of us find picking the perfect bottle of wine.

When it comes to marching up and down the wine aisle, a quarter of adults (23%) admit they find it a rather stressful experience. More than half (51%) feel there are too many options available, while 46% don't know how to identify a good bottle from a bad bottle.

The new research by Lidl, who are running a festive wine tasting in the dark event series, also reveals over a quarter (27%) still assume premium labels are better quality, nearly 1 in 3 (31%) find "wine etiquette" snobbish and more than 1 in 10 find it intimidating, adding further confusion to the wine buying process

With all the options on offer, it appears we are creatures of habit. More than half (51%) of the nation tend to stick to what they know, and nearly a quarter (23%) have their own "go-to" bottle. Price also comes into the equation, as 45% default to whether the wine is on offer or discounted, 49% choose based on where it comes from and one in five (18%) decide based on the look of the label alone.

Many people see the world of wine littered with unwritten rules - in fact, the wine rules we are most likely to break are serving white wine only to accompany a fish dish (43%), drinking rose just in the summer months (39%), drinking champagne only from a flute (35%), red wine shouldn't be chilled (31%) and avoiding ice in wine (30%)

The average price we spend on a bottle of wine is between £7 and £8. However, hosting a Christmas party (44%) or when gifting someone else (56%), are the occasions when we're likely to push the boat out and spend more on a bottle of vino.

* The founder of Cloudy Bay, David Hohnen, has released a new Sauvignon Blanc brand in collaboration with the Marlborough Grape Growers Co-operative that aims to "redefine" the category.

The new brand, Marlborough Heartland, is a new venture that embodies the spirit of Marlborough's vineyards and the ethos of its growers. It's a partnership that sees a return to the original heartland of Marlborough, something which David Hohnen has been longing to do for years, he said.

The co-op's farmers have vineyards throughout the Marlborough heartland, in the lower valleys of the Wairau, Awatere, and Waihopai. The combination of careful plot selection and precision winemaking creates this intense and flavourful style, bursting with zesty gooseberry and lime notes, it claims.

Marlborough Heartland Sauvignon Blanc 75cl launches in 419 Sainsbury's Supermarkets retailing for £12.50 a bottle.

* UK specialist retailer Majestic has expanded its own label "Chosen by Majestic" range, which was introduced in June as a tier below its established "Definition" range, as it refreshes the range and bolstering its fine wine options

The "Chosen By" range, which initially featured 11 wines from Europe, has been expanded with the addition of "winter warmer style" richer whites and savoury reds the retailer said, comprising five reds and three whites. Additions include a Chardonnay, Corbières from Maison Jeanjean, a Viognier, Zinfandel, a fruit-forward Chianti from Piccini, and a Côtes du Rhône.

A Malbec from Mendoza, by Grupo Peñaflor is also being added to the range, landing before Christmas

The range, which at sub-£10 sits below the retailer's Definition range, was introduced to include customers' favourite wine styles, regions and varieties and provide a more "affordable option". It includes Majestic's first own label Greek white wine, a blend of Malagousia, Roditis and Assyrtiko from the Kintonis family, and an Austrian Gruner Veltliner made by Winzer Krems, along with the existing Muscadet, Vinho Verde, Picpoul de Pinet, Rioja Crianza, Valpolicella Superiore and Beaujolais Village,

"We have a range of customers who love classic wines (Bordeaux, Corbières, Côtes du Rhône, and Chianti) as well as those who like bold new styles (Zinfandel and Malbec), so there is something for everyone in the range," a spokesman said. Motoring - with Roy Woodcock



A small car with a big difference - that's the new DS 3. Roy Woodcock reports . . .

If you're in the market for a new small SUV that's a little out of the norm and fancy being cosseted with a little luxury, then the DS 3 could be the car for you. It has oodles of personality, bags of premium features and an eyecatching design.

Not for nothing are the DS initials interpreted as Different Spirit or Distinctive Series. The first DS made its debut at the 1955 Paris Motor Show, strutting its stuff like a fashion show model on the catwalk.

This is the haute couture of the motoring world, so it's very apt that the French car company unveiled the new DS 3 at the start of Paris Fashion Week before its world premiere at the most recent Paris Motor Show.

It certainly turned a few heads during the week it spent on East Riding roads and I really enjoyed every minute driving the car.

DS is now part of the giant Stellantis group and this car shares its underpinnings with a variety of other SUV siblings from the likes of Citroen, Peugeot and Vauxhall. That said, it's dressed inside and out in the most distinctive way.

The DS 3 was originally launched as the Citroen DS 3 in 2009 before being rebranded when the DS division became more independent. Interestingly, the company has outsold Lexus in Europe since 2020 ands that's a measure of where it stands.

More recently, previous iterations of the car have been branded as the DS 3 Crossback - this latest, much better, model simplifies things even further by dropping the Crossback name.

The car is now offered with a choice of two petrol engines (a 1.2-litre offering either 99 or 128 horsepower) and one fully-electric powerplant and five trim levels. Diesel is no longer an option.

Entry-level Performance Line models get Alcantara upholstery, rear parking sensors, climate control and a 10.3-inch infotainment screen loaded with connected tech. Stepping up to Performance Line+ nets you LED headlights, a navigation system, keyless start and larger alloy wheels while a small jump to Rivoli trim brings leather upholstery and a glitzier body with extra chrome trim.

Added just last month and available for delivery in November, is the DS 3 Esprit De Voyage, based on the Rivoli specification, but with added individual design touches, inside and out.

Finally, at the top-of-the-range, the Opera specification

gets all the tech DS can cram into it, with a wireless phone charger, heated and massaging front seats, a heads-up display, reversing camera and some more sophisticated safety tech.

Only the entry-level model has the lower-powered 1.2-litre engine fitted as standard (with the more powerful 128bhp version as an option) - all other versions, including the Performance Line + model tested here, come with high-power engine, mated to an eight-speed automatic gearbox. It delivers a 0-62mph time of 9.2 seconds and a top speed of 124mph.

There are three driving modes, Normal, Eco and Sport, and out on the road the car handled really well; smooth in operation, quiet and holding the corners well. Economy is in the mid-40s mpg. From the outside, the DS 3 looks the part. It won't be mistaken for anything else thanks to a bold front end with a large grille, a usefully lofty ride-height, and a distinctive kick in the window-line on the car's profile.

The car's party-piece - the flush-fitting door handles pop out when you unlock the car - is a really nice touch, while the facelifted DS 3 stands out thanks to its pair of vertical LED strakes on either side of the grille.

Things are just as interesting inside. The interior is a cacophony of tactile materials and geometric shapes with key features controlled by touch-sensitive diamond-shaped "tiles" rather than buttons. It looks unlike anything else on the market and although certain operations take a little time to get used to, these differences are what sell the car to me.

Space-wise, perhaps the rear seats and boot are a little disappointing, but this DS 3 is a fun car and one that stands out from the crowd. Prices start from £25,940.

Houseplants

At this time of year it's nice to add colour to your garden and your home with flowers and foliage. There's nothing better for brightening up an indoor environment than a well-grown houseplant and they are available in a vast range of forms from tiny gems suitable for the smallest windowsill to rampant growers for the largest hallway. They offer lush foliage, beautiful blooms and interesting forms. Some thrive in damp bathrooms, others need a sunny spot, so make sure you choose a houseplant that will tolerate the conditions in which it is to grow. Ask our staff for advice on the best choice. Once you've made your purchase, take care when transporting houseplants to protect them from cold, drafts, wind or excessive heat. Failure to do so can lead to plant deterioration or even death, and the effects may not fully show themselves until some time after you've bought it.

Once your new houseplant is safely home, you need to care for it correctly to ensure that it remains in pristine condition – and this largely depends on how well it is watered. Too little or too much watering can cause problems.

Overwatering: Giving too much water can be as dangerous as under watering. The roots not only require moisture but also air, so overwatering leads to the forcible removal of air from the potting compost so the houseplant's roots are killed by suffocation.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. There is still time to plant Spring blooming bulbs for the early part of November
- 2. Transplant trees and shrubs
- 3. Prune evergreens to shape
- 4. Cover strawberries two inches deep with straw or hav
- 5. Increase feed and provide plenty of fresh water for the birds
- If you haven't already feed your lawn with a fall or winter feed
- 7. Rake leaves from the lawn and compost them
- 8. Drain your hoses and put away over winter
- 9. Finish weeding and tidying up beds
- 10. Clean up and cover you garden furniture to protect over the Winter



Best Practice: Watering little and often is the best advice, taking into account the growing environment and the seasons. Watering from below is the best approach as some plants can suffer from rotting or sun scorch if water is directed onto their stems, root systems or foliage.

Drainage:

The best method is to stand the pot (which must have drainage holes in the bottom) on a suitable sized saucer into which a small amount of gravel has been placed.

Fill the saucer to about 1/3 of its depth with water and leave the plant standing for 30 minutes.

If all the water has been taken up you can repeat the operation until uptake stops, then any surplus water should be tipped away but of course retaining the gravel.

Pests & Diseases

Healthy Habit: Plants that are well-fed and watered are less likely to suffer from pests and diseases, so prevention is always better than cure. However, keep a look-out for common houseplant pests. Pick off any visible pests from the stems, leaves or soil, clean leaves with water and use a chemical spray available from our garden centre, or try an organic or biological control.



New East Riding bus service improvements to launch in November

ew improvements to six bus services are to launch as part of a new scheme to boost the East Riding's public transport network to support both urban and rural communities.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council is to fund new evening and weekend bus services, extensions to existing routes, to help local passengers and strengthen the network.

Some services have already started or will start operating on 5 November, including:

New Friday, Saturday evening and Sunday services on the Goole Town Bus network,

New Friday, Saturday evening and Sunday services on service 747 between Pocklington, Full Sutton, and York,

A new Sunday 361 service between Goole and Scunthorpe,

Friday, Saturday evening and Sunday 55 Services between Hull, Brough, Gilberdyke, and Goole,

An additional weekday service 143 between Withernsea and Beverley.

A new Saturday service between Allerthorpe, Melbourne, Aughton and York.

The improvements are the result of the council being awarded £2.28 million in funding from the Government over two years, running from September 2023 to September 2025.

The Department for Transport announced £160m Bus Service Improvement Plan Plus funding for local authorities across the UK in May.

The funding can only be used to support, enhance, or start new bus services and introduce fare initiatives.

As a result of the award, the East Riding of Yorkshire Enhanced Bus Partnership board has approved a programme of service enhancement to support local passengers and improve the frequency and scope of the current transport services already available.

The bus partnership is made up of the council, local bus operators and other stakeholders.

The new services were announced at an East Riding of Yorkshire Enhanced Bus Partnership Forum event held at Bishop Burton College, near Beverley, on Friday 13 October.

Councillor Paul West, the council's cabinet member for environment and transport, said: "Thanks to this Government funding and thanks to the work of the partnership, we've been able to support the bus network with these six new services.

"We really hope these new and more frequent bus services will be a big difference to local passengers."

The partnership is due to announce more service improvements beginning in January, including services in Bridlington and Beverley, and further enhancements to rural bus routes.

"One of the key advantages of the VR multi-directional treadmill is its ability to simulate various scenarios that patients may encounter in their day-to-day lives, like a trip to the shops or a walk in the country. The VR multi-directional treadmill is a ground breaking addition to the hospital's comprehensive range of therapies for people with acquired brain injury who need help with both their physical and mental rehabilitation.

"The advanced technology harnesses the power of virtual reality to create an immersive and interactive environment for patients, and by combining the benefits of movement with the engaging elements of gaming, this novel approach aims to motivate patients while promoting their physical well-being and coordination."





Also used to create scenes within the movie industry, the multi-directional treadmill boasts numerous features designed to enhance the patient experience. With its advanced motion sensors and responsive control systems, it can adapt to users' movements, providing an unparalleled level of freedom and fluidity.

Patients aren't required to wear any special shoes. Instead, textile overshoes are used, that are worn above regular shoes. They can walk, jog, or run in any direction, challenging themselves at their own pace while being guided by the virtual reality experience.

Additionally, the system incorporates real-time feedback and progress tracking, enabling the medical staff to monitor patients' performance and tailor their rehabilitation plans accordingly.

The team on Castle Hill's Complex Rehabilitation Ward are aiming to start using the equipment with patients

when the bespoke VR apps are ready, and look forward to witnessing the positive impact this state-of-the-art technology will have on patients' recovery from brain injury.



Nero has gone home!

Following a huge process to help this very complicated young horse learn how to feel differently about all aspects of life with humans, Nero has finally gone home.

I wrote previously about the huge impact imprinting has on horses when hand rearing a foal is not done sensibly, Nero was all caught up in that vicious circle.

He arrived into my care as a very dangerous individual back in July. None of the dangerous behaviours he displayed were his fault, he had no way of knowing that what he was doing was unwanted. He came with a nervous disposition, running over you, running at you and running through you!

He was hard to stable as he immediately spun around barging straight back out over the top of you. He had a big history of barging through field gateways. As a grown up 4 year old, standing at 16.1 hands high, all he knew was that he had been experiencing changes with humans. They were rejecting him! However, imprinting meant that humans represented maternal nurture, safety and a need for closeness. Over the last couple of years, humans had been trying to push him away which had made him very conflicted and had only served to increase his need to stay close, all mixed in with anger, conflict and rage. He resented the changes. This situation is where so many people find themselves with hand reared horses- they turn into aggressive individuals and very many are lost along the way.

Teaching him to become a ridden horse was only part of his journey with me. Changing his feelings about life with humans was simply the biggest part. Encouraging him to become more independent and more confident in himself and in whatever environment he was asked to be in or face. One of most important protocols to implement (without causing anger), was a cue from us that there was no reinforcement to find in our presence out in the fields. I taught him a space signal- he stays there, we stay here. By shear repetition, he learned to move away from us and go back to grazing while we worked on the land. He would immediately come flying up then stop a few feet away, think about it and eventually move off and do something else.

Leading him safely required us the put up a protected contact space between us. He stayed 4 feet away from us while we led him in and back out again.

I encouraged his seeking system in the stable by always having a handful of pony nuts hidden somewhere inside for him to go and find. This stopped him turning back on us and barging his way out. Over time, this has worked a treat! It stopped his predictable and dangerous habit and he became so calm and content inside as a direct result. He would go find the nuts, we could get out safely, he would be happy and we would be safe. His stress at the stable door stopped, his need to escape stopped and he would just relax and eat from his haynet while taking a normal calm interest in what ever was happening on the yard.

We trained 4 steps of "Go back" at the door, always rewarded with a handful of nuts so that this became a conditioned response to our arriving to halter up and come back out quietly. He learned to stay back with us with the door wide open, no longer needing to charge his way out. He would wait quietly and be asked to join us coming out politely.

These 4 protocols changed so very much with him over time. Emotionally he was no longer conflicted. He was calm, happy and had clarity over the behaviours we wanted – no more confusion, frustration, anger or worry.

Clicker training is a marvellous tool when used correctly with horses. Hand feeding a hand reared horse would send most professional trainers into a melt down as the biggest "No No" ever. I understand that completely and I agree that humans needed to disassociate themselves from being a food giver. However, marker training done well requires the horse to always understand that the food only comes contingent to them performing a behaviour we want and that the food comes to them- they do not move towards the food. It's a huge task at first and must be made so simple for them to grasp the concept without frustration or conflict. Once in place its fantastic and a game changer for horses. We can shape all the training moves incrementally, with calmness and clarity and he loved it. Using traditional pressure training on a horse like him is why so many are lost along the way because they hate it, fight it and it escalates rage.

Over time he learned to have me alongside him and behind him with long reins on. Eventually he learned to wear a rider ontop of him and had clarity over all the forwards and flexion movements with clear cues in place. He learned about putting his own bridle on himself, not us forcing it on him. He was calm to saddle up. He learned to stand himself up in position for mounting, all done with clicker training. He learned about roads and traffic. He learned about being ridden with another horse and bit by bit this lovely young horse was successfully started under saddle.

His owner came to work with us and learn about how to use this form of training with him. She successfully rode him out and learned all about the clarity needed for ground handling.

As of yesterday, Nero is now back home in Wakefield. I'm not quite sure how I feel! I'm delighted of cause but oh boy, am I going to miss him! He was an all-encompassing project which took me way longer than any "normal" horse to achieve the results we needed. A safe, calm, and no longer conflicted young horse.
