Re-dedication Ceremony for the Memorial Gardens

The refurbishment of the Memorial Gardens is well underway and with more treework and planting planned for the next few weeks it is hoped that residents have noticed and approved the improvements to the Gardens.

The Rolls of Honour plaques will then be replaced with the new plaque, honouring those who gave their lives in the service of their country since 1945, also being erected.

The Council, together with all the Churches in the village, will hold a Re-dedication Ceremony at 2.30pm on Friday 11 November 2011. The ceremony will be conducted at the Memorial Gardens and is open to the public – we look forward to seeing you there. More detailed information will be available in the next newsletter

Planning

Some time ago the Parish Council discussed and recommended refusal of planning permission for the erection of four dwellings on land east of 86 King Street, Cottingham; the East Riding of Yorkshire Council Western Area Planning Committee agreed and planning permission was refused. However, following an appeal by the applicant to the Planning Inspectorate the decision has been overturned and permission has been granted.

Councillors were very disappointed that, despite the stated intention of the Localism Bill to 'devolve greater powers to councils and neighbourhoods and give local communities more control over housing and planning decision' the Parish Council's views, which were supported by the ERYC, have been totally ignored by the Planning Inspectorate.

Councillors agreed to write to David Davis MP for his support in bringing pressure to bear on the 'powers that be' to give more weight to the views of the local community in planning matters.

Finance

Councillors were very pleased that internal and external audits for the financial year to 31 March 2011 have been successfully completed.

Residents Group – Keswick Gardens

Following a very successful project to clear the ten foot to the eastern side of Keswick Gardens the residents have agreed to form a residents group to further manage the area and ensure the problems do not re-occur. The group of committed and enthusiastic residents will work with both the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and bordering Hull City Council to address other issues in the area. The Parish Council wish them every success.

Councillors resolved to support the project and committed the Council to serving Fairtrade tea and coffee at its meetings.


















Proposed Supermarket Plans for Station Road, Cottingham

Plans for the Proposed Supermarket on the Station Road site in Cottingham can be seen at the Public Consultation Exhibition in the Cottingham Methodist Church Hall, Hallgate on Thursday 20th October between 5.00 pm and 8.00 pm, and Friday 21st October between 12 noon and 8.00 pm, where members of the public can meet and discuss any concerns with the developer.

Simon Dixon the Developer has supplied the following information regarding the site.

- * Store size: 45,000 sq ft store which is slightly smaller than Waitrose in Willerby and Morrisons at Beverley. 300 car parking spaces will accompany the site and also include electrical charging points.
- * 300 new jobs
- * 90% of Cottingham people shop outside of the village for their weekly spend
- * £22m is spent by Cottingham people but only 2.1m is spent in Cottingham
- * New petrol filling station helping to reduce petrol costs in Cottingham
- * Eco-store design
- * Design significantly reduces flood risk
- * Introduce up to one acre of soft landscaping
- * Improved bus stop and route
- * Upgrade to all footpath links to village centre and across railway line
- * Improve highways junction at Station Road to Beck Bank
- * New roundabout at Beck Bank and Thwaite Street
- * Removal of Stoneledge to an alternative site would take 40 HGV movements per day away from Cottingham's transport network, add Boards to the equation and this figure more than doubles.

In the Kitche

umpkins belong to the Cucurbitaceae family, which includes cucumbers, melons, squash, and gourds. Within this family is the genus Cucurbita which includes all varieties of pumpkin.

Pumpkins are available in all shapes, colours and sizes, but one of the best known is the Jack 'o Lantern pumpkin C.Pepo, which can weigh as much as 100 pounds and is popular for carving at Halloween.

Origins and History of Pumpkins

The word pumpkin comes from the Greek pepon for a large melon. The English named it pumpion or pompion, a term which dates back to 1547.

Cultivated Pumpkins are believed to have originated in Central America and seeds from related plants found in Mexico date back to 5500 B.C. When the first settlers landed in the US, they found Native American Indians using pumpkin as a staple in their diets. It soon became a staple in the settlers' diets, too and the seeds were brought back to Europe, where pumpkins soon became popular. The origins of wild form is uncertain.

Halloween and Pumpkins

As folk lore would have it, the Jack 'o Lantern was named after a man called Jack, who was an infamous drunkard and trickster. He tricked Satan into climbing a tree then carved an image of a cross in the tree's trunk, thereby trapping the devil up the tree. He made a pact with the devil that, if the devil would never tempt him to wicked ways again, he would promise to let him down the tree.

However, after Jack died, not only was he was denied in to Heaven because of his previous evil ways but was also denied access to Hell because he had tricked the devil. The devil instead gave him a single ember to light his way through the darkness. This was placed inside a hollowed-out turnip to keep it glowing longer.

Halloween spread throughout Europe in the seventh century and began with "All Hallows Eve", the "Night of the Dead" (31st October) . It's not certain when turnips were replaced by pumpkins, but this was probably because they were larger and much easier to carve. European custom included the lighting of pumpkins with scary faces to ward of evil spirits who roamed abroad during All Hallows Eve.

Pumpkins in Cooking

Pumpkin flesh has no cholesterol, is low in fat and sodium and rich in vitamins, in particular beta carotene and vitamin A. A truly versatile fruit, yes, it is a fruit not a vegetable, it can be used in both savoury and sweet dishes.

Pumpkin Soup

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp Butter
- 250g/9oz Onions, finely chopped
- 1 Garlic Clove, crushed
- 450g/1lb Pumpkin, deseeded, peeled and chopped

1 large Tomato, peeled and chopped 600ml/1pt Chicken Stock Salt and White Pepper 150ml/5 fl.oz. Single Cream A few drops Tabasco Sauce

Instructions

- 1. Melt the butter in a large saucepan, add the onion and fry gently until soft and transparent.
- 2. Add the garlic, pumpkin, tomato and stock, bring to the boil then simmer for 30 minutes
- 3. Cool slightly, then pass through a sieve or process in a blender until relatively smooth.
- 4. Return the soup to the pan together with the cream, tabasco, salt and pepper. Reheat gently and serve hot.

Pumpkin Pie

Ingredients:

250g/9oz Shortcrust Pastry

325g/12oz Pumpkin, peeled, deseeded and cubed

2 Eggs, beaten

50g/2oz Soft Brown Sugar

60ml/2fl.oz. Double Cream

Ground Cinnamon

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C, 400°F, Gas Mark 6.
- 2. Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface to approximately 6mm/1/4 inch and use to line a fluted flan tin.
- 3. Lightly prick the base of the pastry with a fork and line with greaseproof paper and fill with baking beans.
- 4. Bake in the oven for 10 minutes. Remove the greaseproof paper and baking beans and return the pastry case to the oven for a further 5 minutes.
- 5. Meanwhile, bring a large pan of lightly salted water to the boil, add the pumpkin and cook for 10-15 minutes or until tender.
- 6. Drain the pumpkin very very well, transfer to a food processor and process until smooth. Allow to cool.
- 7. Place the purée in a mixing bowl together with the eggs, brown sugar, cream and cinnamon and mix thoroughly until well blended.
- 8. Spoon the pumpkin mixture into the pastry case and level the surface with a palette knife.
- 9. Bake in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes until the filling is set, firm and golden brown. Serve hot or cold.

NB If the pumpkin puree is very wet, place in a dry pan and gently heat until bubbling for 5-10 minutes to evaporate the excess liquid, stirring occasionally. Remove from the heat and allow to cool. Then continue from




road (Millington) and take the next road on the right (Warter) and walk along this road for about 200 metres and then turn right, cross a stile and walk with the fence on your left. This path skirts round Huggate Sheepwalk.

We originally had ten dentists for this return trip but that dwindled to six. It is a real shame but Teresa who came last year has got a chest infection and is not well enough to travel. And so there were five. My dental colleagues are all top notch people who have a passion for gentle dentistry so it is no surprise that they have successful practices. I'm looking forward to working with them

Like I say, I am a bit nervous. I do hope that the kids will take to us. I know that the adults will welcome us as they are a very hospitable lot. They don't have a lot but they are more than willing to share with you what they have. Thanks again to all the generous people who have donated sponsorship money, it means a lot.

This is a beautiful unspoilt part of the world. But there is a big road being built and holiday villas planned. I do hope that it is not ruined and does not ruin the local indigenous communities.

n the Garden



lthough we had some cooler days over September, the autumn is now definitely here for real, and it feels colder. It's a beautiful time of year, with the trees changing colour. Sometimes it may seem pointless raking, when the wind blows even more leaves onto the lawn, but just think of all the lovely leafmould you can make! It's also time to start preparing for early frosts.

Lawns

In many colder areas, this month is the last opportunity to scarify. aerate and top dress lawns. Scarification removes layers of thatch and can be done with either a spring-tine rake or a powered scarifier.

Afterwards apply an autumn lawn feed; these are low in nitrogen, so discouraging lush green growth that would only succumb to cold and diseases over the winter months.

Planting and moving

October is an ideal time for moving and planting trees, shrubs and climbers, as well as for hedge planting.

Bare-rooted deciduous trees and shrubs, as well as root-wrapped evergreens, become available towards the end of the month, so you could think ahead and prepare the ground for them now. They are cheaper than containerised plants, and are the perfect choice whenever large numbers are needed - perhaps for a new hedge, woodland or rose bed.

You can still order containerised trees and shrubs, and large semi-mature specimens, for planting over the winter.

Pruning and training

Last chance to trim deciduous hedges to keep them looking tidy

Prune bush roses now, if not done already, as reducing their height will prevent wind rock. These plants are generally shallow-rooted and can become loose in the soil if buffeted by strong winds.

Climbing roses should be pruned now if not done last month.

Shrubs normally pruned hard in the spring such as Buddleja davidii, Cornus alba, and Lavatera, can be cut back by half now, to prevent wind rock and to neaten their appearance.

Propagation

Take hardwood cuttings of plants such as Rosa, Cotinus, Salix and

Check softwood and semi-ripe cuttings taken earlier in the season. They may need potting on, or selective removal of individual plants that have succumbed to rots (in order to prevent cross-infection).

- 4. Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into the greenhouse
- 5. Plant out spring cabbages
- 6. Harvest apples, pears, grapes and nuts
- 7. Prune climbing roses
- 8. Order seeds for next year
- 9. Last chance to mow lawns and trim hedges in mild areas
- 10. Renovate old lawns or create new grass areas by laying turf




Lifestylers 'Daisy Chains' link with KGV Community Trust

Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

Hello and welcome again anglers to this month fishing news: the date is 20th September '11. Have you been on our local River Hull yet? Well if not and you are participating in the big survey match on the 16th October, then it is time to start getting your gear ready and your eye in. The reports are still very good from nearly all stretches, right the way from Ennerdale to right past Hull Bridge at Tickton.

The tickets for this survey match are still available from all of our tackle shops at £2.00 per ticket.

This last month has seen some good weights reported from Risby Park Ponds, with the Folly Lake fishing the best. Apparently match bags to 65lb have been coming out very regular, with good back up weights as well. Pleasure bags have been estimated to be more productive than the match bags. A customer fished the Folly overnight and had 32 fish over 8lb, with the largest Carp being just short of 18lb.

The most productive baits being used at the moment are hair rigged pellet at distance, fished feeder style, alternatively, paste on the pole closer in. The Tench Lake is fishing well too, using the same tactics.

Another pond that is fishing extremely well is Mill Farm at Leven, or more commonly known as Ray Fosters. The Carp are feeding very well and can be found round the island and in the road channel area of the lake. The large Bream (which run well in to double figures) are similarly coming from deeper water fairly regularly.

Once again the productive method being used is the hair rigged pellet between 10/14mm. On the pole and waggler lines, both maggot and caster, over chopped worm is doing very well. Roach and Rudd are being caught up to 3lb on nearly every session.

Please keep all reports coming in to me at Catchmoore Tackle so that I can share them with all of you.

For all fair weather anglers out there who are now thinking of putting their gear away, "Do not do it!" not yet, I will tell you why. Firstly, the temperatures are still quite reasonable and the fish need to pack on the weight ready for winter.

Due to not having had a good summer they need to start feeding heavily soon. Not only that, but do you remember last winter? It was very long, so keep at it until you are forced to stop, and let us hope we do not have another winter the same for some time to come.

Sea Scene: by the time you read this article we should be selling in store live bait; Lugworm, Rag worm and Yellowtails. At times there will be live Black Gulleys available. In addition we have a massive selection of frozen baits to choose from. Please book your bait early to avoid disappointment as spare live bait is not always available.

The coast at Albrough seems to be producing some early season Cod to 6lb. We think this is due to a large amount of Herring running down our coast. As well the Herring, there is plenty of Whiting coming in. Not many other reports have been coming in apart from Hornsea North Beach and Cannon Wall Bridlington, which are producing Whiting and Flatties.


The Humber is seeing some Flatties but not in any great numbers as yet, and beware there are still a lot of crabs about, make sure you take plenty of bait for your session.

I hope and expect there to be a lot more reports from the sea scene next month.

Solar Panels - Making your property generate money for you

ith ever rising energy bills and interest rates at an all time low for those that have savings stood in accounts generating very little, there are ways to make your property work for you and bring about guaranteed returns that can give generous returns.

By now you will probably have heard of or maybe even seen a property nearby with solar panels fitted to the roof. This is because of a government initiative brought about to try and reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by at least 80% in 2050 relative to levels in 1990. This will not be a simple task, and the government has brought about a number of incentives to help achieve this goal.

This has seen the emergence of solar panels and Feed In Tariffs (FIT), which in the South of

England has been very popular seeing large growth both domestically and commercially and the trend is sweeping its way up to the north of the country.

How does it work?

Looking at the FIT in its simplest form, you pay to have a solar panel installation at your property, and by doing so you receive a number of benefits. Financially the biggest benefit is the Feed In Tariff itself, which is a guaranteed income for 25 years. You receive payments in 3 parts; from the electricity you produce the biggest source of income is being paid for every Kwh of electricity you generate, additionally you then receive a payment for the electricity that you do not use that is fed back to the grid, and finally you also have the benefit of not having to pay for the electricity that you generate and use, protecting you from ever increasing energy costs.

A return of 12% on these installs is achievable and the payments you receive from the FIT are Tax Free. Importantly the other benefit from the panels is that you reduce your carbon footprint at the same time as making money. Over a Tonne of CO² emissions are saved by having these on your average property.

Cost

It stands to reason, the more panels you install the greater the cost, installations can be anything from £5,000 - £20,000 typically on domestic property. However, the bigger the system you install the greater the returns. Depending on the system you choose, payback can be as little as 5 years to recover the cost of the installation depending on the system and location of your property.

Who can benefit?

Potentially anyone who owns a property can benefit from this scheme. The installation costs are quite significant, however it is possible to borrow money from banks to finance the cost and still make

Landlords are also switching onto the returns that can be made on their investments, generating them additional income from their roofs and really enhancing the returns on their investments. This is two fold as the benefit also extends to the tenants who receive cheaper electric bills, creating a happier tenant who is likely to stay longer in the property, and there has to be a value attached with that in terms of the rent that can be charged.

In Association with HomeLink

It sounds too good to be true, so what is the catch? With the tariffs guaranteed for 25 years, and the performance of the panels guaranteed for 25 years your income looks a pretty safe bet. There are some considerations before you go head first into this though and a reputable installer will be happy to go through this with you. You need to consider the guarantees of the panels themselves and the inverter that essentially takes the energy from the panels and turns it into usable electric for the home as they can have varying guarantees from 5 years up to 25 years, and you need to factor in that you may have to replace the inverter at some point during the 25 years.

You should also consider whether the panels are covered under your buildings insurance?

In it for the long haul – To make this investment worthwhile you really need to envisage having the property for at least the time it takes to repay what you have spent installing the panels. There has been no hard and fast evidence of what value it adds to your property or indeed what additional rent you can gain, however, if you have two identical properties for rent or for sale, one has a solar panel system that is paying approximately £1,000 a year to the owner and cheaper fuel bills to a tenant, which one would you choose?

Indeed Philip Sellwood, chief executive of the Energy Saving Trust, said that the findings were good news for the UK's emerging onsite renewables sector. "It seems Britons are willing to pay more for a home with a renewable energy source, so investing in a solar panel or a wind turbine could add to the resale value of a property and be as attractive to house hunters as a new kitchen or solid wood

There is a planned reduction at the end of March 2012 to the tariff by about 3p, so if it is something you are considering now is the time.

Who can install the systems?

hacking horses, young stock which are simply growing old enough to train (store horses) and any damaged/complicated ones - are simply cannon fodder in this economic climate. It costs as much to keep a horse in work over winter as it does one that is not ride-able or in work

I have had at least eight "in house" training jobs cancelled this summer as owners have felt the squeeze financially. Jobs lost were the main reason. This is just so sad for the people and so sad for the horses that do not get the chance to be fixed. This scenario repeating itself makes it difficult for me, or any yard owner in this climate, to keep in business. Insurances are sky high on top of rising feed, veterinary, bedding and fuel increases.

I listen intently to the news and am convinced that we are a good two years away from any real improvement. Heaven help us all. I wish the politicians who impact our every move, lived on the same planet as the rest of us. Don't let anyone get me started on my opinion of the banks and their obscene policy of huge bonuses, especially as we, the tax payers, have just baled them out in the first placeas a direct result of their greed. Soap box over....sorry!?

Hay is now an expensive commodity of which horses need vast amounts. When you feed those large round bales out in the field it really does need to be contained inside some sort of feeder ring otherwise 1/3rd of it will be wasted by the selective way horses eat! They will also pee on it, roll in it and sleep on it!....not quite what one intended. Metal rings are really expensive to buy and can pose a threat of injury as wear and tear causes bending and fracture.

I have two and am vigilant in monitoring their state of repair. These particular items have really held on to second hand value and are hard to find too as more horsey people than ever need them....again because of unaffordable waste. I have just seen on the internet an elastic wrap designed to hold large hay bales in control whilst out in the paddock. I am going to invest in one to see how it works and to see if it does what it says on the tin. It will be worth every penny if it saves me buying more metal hay rings.

A couple of months ago I wrote about a little Arabian gelding called Ivan. He came in to me from Manchester to be broken in. This was not a straight forward task as he had been trapped in a stable fire which had killed three others and he escaped with a burnt face, neck and legs. We spent weeks helping him to put to bed all the held on to phobias and panicky episodes.

He was a fantastic success and is such a sweet heart now.....however his owner has disappeared off the face of the earth....abandoning him with me and leaving a large unpaid bill. Despite all my attempts at contacting her by email, phone, text and recorded letters. She has simply walked away from her baby and left me totally stuffed. I now have a young horse out there that needs a new home which will be impossible to find at this time of year. He is another mouth to feed and one more for me to be responsible for. This is a sign of the times I was not reckoning on.






