Microsoft Office 2013 to be launched soon . . .

icrosoft Office 2013 will be launching soon. Indications are that it will be primarily a subscription-based service from around \$99 annually for up to 5 home users. In its news blog Microsoft announced that anyone buying Office 2010 from October 19 onwards, will be able to get a free one year subscription to the same 2013 product. Watch out for more details soon.

Sir Tim Berners-Lee, the founding father of the World Wide Web (that's where www comes from), in an interview recently denied there was an 'off switch' for the internet. He went on to say that it would take all the governments in the world to collude together for this to become a reality. Thoughts of a giant red switch mounted in a James Bond villain-style secret base somewhere spring to mind! Reminiscent also of the spoof email doing the rounds a few years ago giving advance warning that the internet was going to be closed down for a week for cleaning and maintenance. Heaven forbid what we all do without it??!

Tip: If you want to quickly maximise or minimise a window, just double click on the bar at the top. If you want to stretch a window, move your cursor to the bottom right hand corner, and when it turns to a double headed arrow, just click and drag. To move a window, just click and hold the top bar and drag & drop it.

The inventor of the first laptop, Bill Moggridge, has died in California, aged just 69. Designed back in 1980 the 'clam shell style computer' went on sale in 1982 for over \$8000, and was even carried on-board early Space Shuttle

missions. He was named the winner of the 2010 Prince Philip Designers Prize, as his basic concept has stayed pretty much unchanged to this day.

Tablets have been over a couple of years now, pioneered of course by the *Apple iPad* in mid-2010. Since its launch, Apple has sold an estimated 60 million of the little beauties, now on its third generation at £399. And now there is a whole plethora of similar devices at a wide range of prices. Amazon will shortly be

launching in the UK their Kindle Fire which is a 7" tablet for only £129 and an HD version for £159. The Google Nexus 7 (pictured) is already on sale from £159. The massive numbers prove just what demand there is for hand–held internet connected devices that can also store music, photos and movies, and play them in amazing quality. Stop Press: we have a limited number of 7" Go Tabs at only £89 – please phone for details.

Tip: If you are completing an online form and you get stuck in a box and can't seem to click out of it, try pressing the Tab button on your keyboard. This will let you jump to the next box.

You may have read recently that 4G is going to be launched by the end of the year. Being much faster than the existing 3G mobile network service, it will mean that anyone with a 4G enabled device (i.e. mobile phones, tablets etc. initially on the Orange & T-Mobile networks) will enjoy super-fast internet download speeds. And for once Hull is included as one of the list of cities getting it first! See www.ee.co.uk.

Tip: If you need to find out what your IP address is (that's the unique number of your computer on the internet), just go online to http://www.whatsmyip.org/ and it will be displayed at the top. There are some other useful tools on this site like a random password generator amongst others.

Amazon has launched a new deals service called Amazon Local. Going up against the likes of Groupon and Living Social the service will target its customers with local and national deals every week.

Another interesting enhancement from Amazon is the new *Cloud Player*. Customers who have purchased and downloaded music from them are offered free storage of all those tracks that can be played on any internet connected device. And the best bit is that it finds all the tracks you bought in the past and keeps them all organised in the player, under your account name.

Google has also made a change in terms of online storage. Its previously called Google Docs service is now called Google Drive, (basically similar to Microsoft SkyDrive), and this is where all your documents and other data can be uploaded and stored in. All you need is a free Google or Gmail account.

We are all used to Google as a noun and a verb, but did you know the meaning of the word google is a number with a million zeros.




Summer fun reaps money for special educational needs children

Pive Cottingham ex-Westfield pupils spent most of their summer holidays thinking up whacky ways of raising money for the special needs pupils of Frederick Holmes School on behalf of the "Lifestyle" project. Called 'Something Different' these eleven year olds baked and sold buns, along with organising a toy and a bric-a-brac sale outside our own Co-Operative.

They overcame their nerves to busk in the village centre and were roped in as impromptu face painters at a charity event at Beverley Fire Station. All this helped them raise a tidy sum, but the cherry on the cake was the Olympic-style triathlon which was a sponsored cycle ride from Sutton to Hornsea Police Station, along the disused railway line, followed by a quick swim in the North Sea (they must have been mad) the finale being a race along the prom. Being budding entrepreneurs they also collected unwanted clothes from friends and relatives which they then converted into cash at Cash4Clothes.

Delicious Autumn Warmers

Tomato soup

50g/2 oz. Butter

100g/4 oz. Bacon, rinded and diced

225g/8 oz. onions, peeled and chopped

1 kg./2lb. tomatoes, skinned and roughly chopped

2 teaspoons cornflour

300ml/1/2 pint chicken stock

1 bay leaf

Pinch of nutmeg

2.5ml/1/2 teaspoon sugar

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Melt the butter in the saucepan, add the bacon and fry gently until just turning colour. Add the onions and tomatoes. Cover and cook gently, stirring occasionally for 5 minutes. Stir in the cornflour and gradually add the chicken stock, stirring constantly. Add the bay leaf, nutmeg, sugar and seasoning and bring to the boil. Cover the pan and simmer for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove the bay leaf and put vegetable mixture through a sieve or blender.

To freeze: Cool quickly and pour into rigid containers, in usable quantities. Cover, seal and freeze.

Chicken casserole

50g/2 oz. butter

15ml/1 tablespoon oil

6 chicken portions

2 medium-sized onions, peeled and sliced

100g/4 oz. mushrooms, washed and sliced

4 carrots, peeled and finely chopped

1 green pepper, cored, seeded and sliced

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

5 ml/1 teaspoon dried mixed herbs

25g/1 oz. cornflour

150 ml/1/4 pint dry white wine

60ml/4 tablespoons chicken stock or water

396g/14 oz. of tomatoes

Melt the butter with the oil in a frying pan, add the chicken portions and fry them on both sides until golden brown. Transfer the chicken to a heavy casserole. Add the vegetables to the frying pan and fry for 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Sprinkle the seasoning, herbs and cornflour over the vegetables and cook for 1 minute, stirring constantly. Stir in the wine, stock or water and tomatoes and bring to the boil, stirring constantly. Pour over the chicken portions.

Cover the casserole and cook in a fairly hot oven (190°C/375°F or Gas Mark 5) for 45-50 minutes or until chicken and vegetables arc tender. To freeze: Cool quickly, cover, seal and freeze. To serve: Thaw, covered, overnight in the refrigerator. Reheat, covered, in a fairly hot oven (200°C/400°F Mark 6) for 1 hour or until heated through.

Honey lemon cream pie

50g/2 oz. butter

100g/4 oz. digestive biscuits, crushed finely

25g/1 oz. soft brown sugar

Small can evaporated milk, chilled

Finely grated rind and juice of 1 large lemon

15ml/1 tablespoon clear honey

30ml/2 tablespoons water

15g/1/2 oz. gelatine

Gently melt the butter in a saucepan, remove from the heat and stir in the biscuit crumbs and brown sugar. Press around the base of an 18cm./7in. loose bottomed cake tin. Place in the refrigerator to chill for 30 minutes.

Pour the evaporated milk into a large bowl, and whisk until very thick and creamy. Add the rind and juice of the lemon and the honey and whisk well. Place the water in a small bowl, sprinkle on the gelatine, stir once and leave until spongy, then place the bowl in a pan of hot water and stir until dissolved. Strain into the honey lemon mixture, whisk well and pour into the biscuit crust, smoothing the surface with a knife. To freeze: Open freeze. When frozen, remove the pie from the cake tin, wrap in foil, seal and return to the freezer. To serve: Unwrap and thaw for 1-2 hours at room temperature. Decorate with grated chocolate.







Bang in the Night!!!

The sun is shining with not a cloud in the sky, it's beautiful and warm ...so why am I thinking of cold nights? November 5th!! The night we either love because, like myself, it brings back all of my and subsequently my daughters, happy childhood memories of 'wonder' and 'awe' or, dread, because of the distress it brings to our pets. What a shame it isn't just confined to one night as the history books had written.

Afterall, the intention was to celebrate, once a year, the foiling of Guy Fawkes gunpowder plot to burn down the Houses of Parliament on 5th November 1605. A once a year celebration I am sure we could all cope with, so why is it now spread across the following two months up to New Years Eve? I wish I had the answer but it is because of this long stretch of continuous 'BANGS' and 'SCREECHES' and the knowing of how animals react to such noises we, as responsible pet owners, tend to dread the next few

Firstly we have to recognise the symptons of stress. Some are obvious, for example, shaking, hiding, panting or seeking constant attention from yourself. Others may be destructive like my first dog who bit right through a wooden stool or they may show aggression and as in the case of dogs, barking endlessly. As a rule an animal







exposed to a variety of sights and sounds from an early age is better prepared to cope with all experiences. There is however no guarantee that they will not show a fearful reaction later in life.

We can now plan ahead over the next month ready for the event. Please come and talk to one our many experienced nurses at KINGSTON about pheromone diffusers. These plug-ins disperse calming agents into the room and may be a good option in the case of your dog or cat. We also have many similar products which give an equal effect. You could also provide a 'safe haven' being a quiet area or a chosen room. It should be a place where the animal feels in control so please don't interfere with your pet when its in this area. Train your pet to associate this area with positive experiences such as leaving toys, swapping them regularly and putting them away when not in use so your pet does not get bored with them. In time your pet will become accustomed to this, treating it as being safeplay so when the time comes it will realise no harm will come to them. It is also very important that your pet has access to its safe haven at all times when you are not at home.

What can we do to help ease the anxiety and fear it causes to our beloved pets when the season begins?

Firstly make sure your pet always has somewhere to hide if they want to (if no safe haven has been previously provided) and make sure there is access to this place at all times. For example, this could be under some furniture or in a cupboard.

- At dusk close all windows and curtains and put on music and TV to mask and muffle the sounds and sight of fireworks.
- If your pet shows any signs of fear, try to ignore their behaviour. I know this is difficult when your dog is trying to impersonate Long Johns parrot but they do not understand the English language. They pick up on our signals and emotions so a "There there don't be afraid" can be translated to "Help, I need you to guard me". By ignoring your pet and carrying on with your usual evening routine, it will help to instigate a calm aura around the house.
- If your pet wishes you clould play with them, ignoring all the noises, but do not insist if your pet is not interested.
- Never punish or over fuss with your pet when it is scared. This will only make matters worse.
- Ideally all pets should be microchipped but especially so around this season just incase they are frightened and escape.

Finally in the case of dogs, they will most probably need a walk before dusk. If this is the case, please be aware if you intend on using an extending lead. I know I have mentioned in past articles, the dangers and hazards these leads may cause when used on public footpaths but it's highlighted even more at this time of year. It is so difficult to control a 'bolting' dog on the end of 4 metres of string after a sudden loud BANG! The pavements are very close to the roads so both dog and car do not stand a chance. Please try to use a normal lead whenever possible and keep the extending one for the



Alishaan revisited . .



Noted food writer Roy Woodcock was editor and restaurant critic of
The Journal magazine for 17 years.
We invited him to visit popular local eatery,
Alishaan in Hallqate, Cottingham ...

family-run restaurant that has put Cottingham on the map for discerning diners in search of quality Indian food, continues to go from strength to strength.

The father and son team behind Alishaan, in Hallgate, pride themselves on the quality and consistency of their food, which attracts custom not just from the village and the immediate Hull area but further afield too.

It was Faruk Miah who established the restaurant almost 15 years ago, joined more recently by his son Fahim. Both exhibit a passion for their food and customer service that shines through in everything they do.

"We have a mission to demonstrate what real Indian cuisine is all about," Fahim told me. "We pride ourselves on the authenticity of our food and we love nothing more than talking with our customers, finding out their likes and dislikes, and making suggestions about dishes they might want to try."

Alishaan serves predominantly Bangladeshi cuisine with the emphasis on what Fahim calls "home-style" dishes. "It's the sort of food we would eat at home and we try to keep it as authentic as possible," he said.

So there are all the old favourites you might expect to find - korma, rogan josh, Dhansak, Bhuna, Madras etc. - but a whole range of other dishes that set this restaurant apart. Fish, so important in the Bangladesh diet, is particularly strong at Alishaan and way above what you might find elsewhere.

Goan crabs or mussels freshly cooked with garlic and medium spices and served with a pancake, for example, is a particularly delicious starter, which I tried. And how about the Bengali fish Rupchanda, a speciality of the chef, as a main course?

"We import supplies of this fish every week as it is native to our region and you can't get it in Britain," Fahim told me. "It is grilled and presented as a whole fish and served with rice. It is a chunky fish and exquisite to eat; rich in proteins. The nearest equivalent would be fresh salmon.

"Once people try it they love it," said Fahim. "One of the good things is that there is only one bone, running through the middle of the fish, so it is very easy to eat, although we will, of course, fillet it at the table if people want us to."

The great thing about Alishaan is that meals can be cooked virtually bespoke to a customer's requirements - nothing is pre-cooked or frozen, everything is cooked to order. So, the Rupchanda can be ordered mild, medium or very hot.

Fahim's preference, and mine too, would err on the side of milder dishes. "There's a misconception about Indian food, perhaps perpetrated by less authentic restaurants, that it has to be really hot," says Fahim.

I find myself it utter agreement; too often I am disappointed when eating out in an Indian restaurant to be served dishes so hot that it destroys any

semblance of real taste. I love spices and spicy food; I just want to be able to taste them and not have my tongue so coated with some proprietary curry sauce that I can't actually taste what I'm eating.

Dining at Alishaan was, therefore, a real pleasure and one I shall be repeating again and again.

Asked to suggest other Bangladeshi specialities from the menu, Fahim pointed me in the direction of the Balti fish curry, made with halibut steak and grilled first in a clay oven before being brought to the spices in the pan. I must say it sounded delicious; as too did the Gost Ohmuri - tender lamb, this time, cooked on the bone for an hour, then sliced and cooked Balti style with cardamom pods and bay leaves and served with roasted Indian potatoes.

"We have dishes that have been associated with us all the time we have been in Cottingham but we are always innovating and introducing new things," said Fahim. "Our strength is our consistency brought about by my father's great skill and knowledge and the team he has built up. We are proud, for instance, of having the same head chef as the day we opened but my father loves nothing more than being in the kitchen, working with him, creating new dishes.

"We listen to what our customers want and say and then go away and experiment. Often those new dishes are introduced on to our menu - it is a never-ending challenge to come up with exciting new tastes alongside the old favourites." A recent example of a new dish on the menu is Bhatera - baby quails marinated overnight in a special selection of spices and then slow roasted in a tandoori oven before being topped with a secret sauce. "That's what I would describe as a family dish. Something we would have at home on a Sunday - very homely," said Fahim.

The menu really is mouth-watering and I was impressed, too, by the range of set meals from one to four people, including a Royal Bengal seafood dinner. A special festive Royal Banquet is already in the planning stage for Alishaan diners over the Christmas and New Year period.

The restaurant itself seats 70 people in two distinct areas - the tables are a good size and well spaced, which encourages a relaxing atmosphere where good conversation can flow. There's a small bar and seating area as you walk in, which caters, too, for takeaway custom. It's all nicely painted and decorated with Indian pictures filling the walls at regular intervals.

Alishaan is open seven days a week, from 5.30pm to 11.30pm (12 midnight on Friday and Saturday). Currently, special deals include an Early Bird Menu - three courses for £8.95, Monday to Thursday, 5.30 to 7.30pm - and a Sunday Banquet - four courses for £9.95 throughout the day, alongside the a la carte menu.

I really enjoyed dining at Alishaan; my three course meal with wine costing a very reasonable £60. Talking to Faruk and Fahim impressed me with their passion, enthusiasm and commitment to a tried and trusted business. Fahim, a law graduate, who returned to his first love after leaving university - he first worked in Cottingham as a 13-year-old washing glasses - is determined to help his father achieve even greater heights.

Cottingham, and East Yorkshire, in fact, are lucky to have them. Do try them - you won't be disappointed.

ctober is here, which means Autumn is officially here too. The weather is cooler and the nights are starting to draw in. Hedging guide

Now is the perfect time to plant hedging. Hedging is great to create walls, shape and texture in your garden. They are also good for wildlife as birds love nesting in them.

- 1. Dig a trench 1 ft by 8 inches deep the length of your hedge
- Feed soil with bone meal and dig in soil improver such as rose, tree and shrub planting compost
- 3. Place your plants 12 to 18 inches apart for 2 Litre plants and 18 to 24 inches apart for larger plants
- 4. Plant your hedge making sure that the root ball is no more than 1/2 inch below soil level
- Give plants a good watering (approximately a 5 Litre watering can per plant) after initial planting
- 6. Water morning and evening in dry conditions for the 1st year

What is Organic Gardening?

Gardening organically means growing plants without manufactured fertilisers and other synthetic chemicals for feeding, pest and disease control, soil conditioning or weeding. Although often regarded as an alternative to gardening with chemicals, many organic techniques are simply good practices and compatible with other forms of gardening.

Excluding manufactured chemicals when growing ornamental plants, lawns, fruit and vegetables brings some challenges.

On the plus side, organic gardening is beneficial to the environment, provides a more attractive home to wildlife and, by cultivating fruit and vegetables organically, you'll know your tasty produce is chemical free. So bearing all this in mind, you may choose to go wholly organic or to combine organic techniques with a reduction in chemicals, using them only as necessary to maintain soil fertility and deal with the most damaging pests, diseases and weeds

Organic Weed control

Chemical weed killers are a very attractive and effective solution to eliminate weeds. There are not always better alternatives in the organic range that are as effective but they are a lot kinder to the environment and beneficial to wildlife and their habitats. You have to decide where you can use organic methods and where you can't and try and achieve the best balance you can.

Wherever possible, try to avoid weed killers by hand weeding or hoeing and try to tackle weed problems before they produce and disperse their seeds and heavy infestations develop. In addition, prevention is much better than cure, so carefully prepare sites prior to planting and incorporate weed barriers to reduce the chance of weed infestation.

PREPARATION: When preparing a planting site, ensure all perennial weeds such as couch grass, nettles and brambles are removed by digging out with a fork. Remove annual weeds by hand or in dry weather use a hoe to cut off weeds from their roots.

BARRIERS: Different options are available to gardeners to help smother or prevent weed growth. Mulching with a 5–8cm layer of organic material such as garden compost, well-rotted farmyard manure, spent mushroom compost or cocoa shell helps smother annual weeds. Alternatively, plastic sheets, old carpet,

carpet underlay or other fabricated material can be used to suppress annual and perennial weeds. In ornamental garden situations, ground-cover plants provide a more attractive weed-suppressing alternative. A barrier of heavy gauge black polythene can be sunk to prevent perennial weeds from growing into an area from an adjoining garden.

ALTERNATIVE METHODS: Paint-on gels are ideal for treating perennial weeds such as bindweed as the weed killer is absorbed through the leaves and down to the roots, without the worry of spray drift on to other plants. They are also the best way to treat odd nettles or brambles cropping up in a hedge or densely planted border, as you can apply them specifically to a certain area.



ello and welcome fellow anglers to this month's fishing news. We hope you are all well and still enjoying my favourite sport, fishing. The date is 18th September.

I suppose most of you club anglers are finished now and are looking forward to your presentation nights; good in it! Then, there are those of us whom fish right through the year. Some anglers say it is too cold, but believe me if you have the correct clothing on it is brilliant. Plus if you know where to go in the colder months, the fishing can be as good if not better than in summer.

Talking of fishing for a club, if you do not already do so, you should maybe consider it. There are a lot of advantages that you may enjoy. Firstly you gain new friends with your fellow club members, and you all share a common interest. This is great as most of my funniest memories are to do with fishing with my club mates. We all still talk about certain incidents in the shop now, from 20 years ago!

Then there is the social aspect too, as I mentioned before you have presentation evenings or other social gatherings and you meet respective partners of club members. Plus you have

fishing venues that you have never fished before. The big one for me is help is always at hand when you need it, be it to help carry your gear, your car has broken down and you need a lift or maybe learn new fishing techniques and skills. Go on give it a go, you never know you may really enjoy it, and it does not matter if you have never match fished before.

Now some fishing news: First of all I am really pleased to report that our beloved River Hull is still fishing its head off, for well over two months now, the best and most productive spots seem to be in between Enerdale Bridge and Kingswood Twin Bridges. Along this stretch there have been plenty of very good mixed bags of fish including Barbell and Trout.

The coarse fish such as Roach, bream and Chub etc. are being caught in good numbers when the tide is on the slack. Shipyard and Tickton are also fishing better at top tide, but it is nearly all Perch at these spots at the moment. Here is one for you; do you remember Tiger Lake at Bransburton? Well, it is under new management and open once again for a day ticket. The new name for this lake is Hempholme Lake. Check it out, it is still producing, and as far as I am aware the new manager has some good plans for the future so good luck to him.

It is nearly time to start to scale down on your terminal tackle once again. This should see you gaining more bites if you do so. Do not be afraid of it, as long as you set your drags on your reels or go onto lighter elastics in your pole top kits you should not have many problems. Because it is not really cold yet and the water temperatures are still reasonable don't be afraid to keep the feed rate up. Little' n often is always good, give yourself a good head start by putting a good bed of bait down in each swim to kick it off.

Sea scene: there are more of you going on our beach which is great. In the Humber the reports are coming in almost daily which is fantastic so thank you to everyone who keeps telephoning or popping in the shop with reports and photos etc. keeping on the subject of the Humber, good bags of flatty's are being reported everywhere with an odd Bass trout and Eels. The elusive Cod do not seem to be in yet but by the time you read this article they may be. On the coast mind you every species including the Cod seem to showing. Easington and surrounding beaches seem to be producing the most fish on medium night tides. Crab, Lug, Squid and Rag are the key baits but what is new there then?

Just a little reminder once again, could you please order your live sea baits as early as possible. Live Lug is available now with Rag Worm coming as soon as the demand gets better, thank you.

It is now time from me, Chris, and the Catchmoore Crew to wish you all "tight lines".



The really "really" exciting world according to Sid! . . .!

OW! No one warned me just how much there was to learn in order to be a good polite and well mannered riding horse......I was so sure that I knew it all already! From my point of view I am a big, strong 3 year old Irish Draught stallion and perfectly capable of looking after myself. How wrong was I! On reflexion I guess now that I am no different to any normal human teenager...they seem to know it all too!

It did take me a little time to settle into my new life at Skidby with all the hustle and bustle, comings and goings. There are quite a few horses which live out in the fields and who come in during the day to learn the lessons that they are here to learn. Some of them try to bully the humans because they are angry, some are very frightened of humans because they have known pain or cruelty and some don't even know how to be a rational thinking horse in their own skin....Talk about neurotic! I think it all very sad to meet horses who feel this way because life has always been kind to me and my human Janet has always looked after me so well. She is like my own personal member of staff in reality but don't you tell her I said so!?

When I first arrived at Skidby I was a bit frightened and slightly angry too.... only because I had no idea what was going to happen to me. Am I really glad to say that life here is good.....So long as I behave myself, don't barge or bite and be in a good attention to my trainer then I get to be free to join in with the training rather than rules being forced on me. I am learning consequence to actions and am discovering that there is a whole new world to investigate providing I stay calm, relaxed and be obedient. I am naturally inquisitive anyway so I find it great fun to look into human gardens and up their driveways. ?

So far I have learned that I can understand human's words really well. I'm not really sure it's the actual words I understand, more the way they are said and sound. I can walk, trot, canter and halt on circles when asked. I can reverse on command too!

I firstly learned to wear a big wide strap round my girth area with soft padding on my back. Then there were side reins attached to the metal "bit" in my mouth from the sides of the big strap. These jangled about as I moved so that the bit moved softly in my mouth. I found out that they helped me to carry myself with better balance. I liked the feel of them because they were never tight or painful.....they taught me to recognise the feel that later became my riders hands...all soft and subtle

Next Melanie fitted a saddle on my back. This big leather chair felt funny up there because it was quite hard and rigid. I thought it funny to play a game with Melanie. I would wait till she moved round to my

other side to check the girth then I would sneak my head round and pull it straight back off with my teeth...apparently Melanie didn't see the funny side of my game when she saw the saddle disappear! Oooops! Me and my teeth!

Anyway, by this time I was apparently "working well" in the school! One day Carlie sneaked a second rein round behind my bottom...well it did feel strange! I shot forward and kicked back at it ...well you would... wouldn't you? After a few minutes I realised that nothing hurt and that Carlie could turn me away from her and then bring me back....all good really as I like this training because I am always thinking about my responsibilities!

She started to walk behind me and drive me forward round the school changing directions all the time. It was cool when she then took me round a paddock where I walked over ditches and up onto ramps! I could be ahead of her out there facing stuff on my own with no one at my head to give me confidence. I felt so brave and special. I believed her when she kept telling me what a good boy I was being! ?

Over the next few days I was driven up the village in amongst all that traffic where I had become quite happy in hand. This was a bit scary though because I found that out in front, all on my own I was not quite as brave as I had originally thought.

I was so glad that Carlie, Sacha or Melanie were still there behind me, urging me on and giving me the confidence to go and face the world. I realise now that when a rider is up on me then it is just the same. They are behind my eye line and I have to trust them so much to keep me safe. On refection now I realise that all this training was preparing me so well.......

From that day on someone started climbing about on my back....jumping up on one side, jumping off on the other! I must admit that at first I felt a bit cross about such an invasion of my privacy. I sometimes felt that because I am a stallion I should have more of a say in stuff....my teeth itched to bite any bit of her leg or butt I could reach!? Instead of getting too cross at me these humans offered me small pieces of carrot if I flexed my head round their knee! That way I could accept that there was a rider up there behind my eye line and I decided that it was actually okay for them to be up there after all!

I am amazed to say that life on a training yard turned out to be great fun after all. Now I am a big, strong Irish Draught Stallion who goes out riding just like any other horse. I've been taught how to jump. I strut my stuff out in public now and make heads turn to look at me!

Humans cannot help it because I am stunning to look at, clever inside my head, trainable in my attitude and my own personal human Janet looks really cool up on board my back......I really, really like my new world....according to me.....SID xxx.

new service that specialises in re-homing surplus toys has come to Cottingham. East Yorkshire charity Mr Hoggle Doggle, launched last year, has already distributed over 11,000 toys donated by the public via drop-off boxes in Beverley, Market Weighton, Driffield, Brough and Hessle. Now The Co-operative Store at Cottingham is a collection point too.

All toys donated to Mr Hoggle Doggle are distributed free to Yorkshire children suffering poverty, disability or illness. Many of the toys are passed to social workers and children's centres in Hull, to support families living in some of the UK's most deprived localities.

Co-founder of the charity David Allan expects the new Cottingham facility to be a success. "This simple scheme is proving a hit with all concerned" he said. "It encourages children to help others. It promotes recycling. It's a real help to child care professionals struggling with reduced budgets. Parents love the idea of giving surplus toys directly to local children in need (rather than to charity shops for resale), and our own volunteers just love the work.

"I'm sure families in Cottingham will feel the same and donate lots of toys. The service operates all year round, and we're receiving more and more requests for toys. Many children have literally no toys, and no hope of any, yet millions of perfectly good ones are thrown away each year. It's tragic, but now there's an answer ... Mr Hoggle Doggle!"

Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell

Then I first told people that we were moving to Spain, most of them asked if it was for a better life. Well I think the phrase "better lifestyle" might be more appropriate, as we had a great life in Cottingham where we have a nice house, good friends and a great social life and I was heavily involves with the Christmas lights, Cottingham Day and the Business Association. Cottingham is a great place to live, but after closing my business in 2010 I have felt the shopping centre of the village was really struggling in the economic down turn, with more shops closing and being left empty.

Spain is also suffering a serious economic crisis, with fuel prices the highest they have ever been, property prices the lowest and still over 2million properties for sale and unemployment running at 30%. We have seen many towns, villages and large shopping centres with empty shops and bars, worse than I have seen in the UK. The Government has raised vat from 18% to 21% on a lot of goods, increasing living costs for everyone. The vat increase for my family though has really being swallowed up by the improved euro rate for our currency exchange.

We budgeted at 1.15 euro to the pound but due to an European crisis we now achieve 1.25 euro, not like the heady days of 1.50 euro to the pound, but a step in the right direction. Anyway as I said earlier, the move to Spain was mainly for a better lifestyle.... great weather, slower pace of life, great food, cheap property and a chance for us all to learn the third most spoken language in the world. So far, on most counts it seems to be ticking all the boxes and none of us have any regrets about doing it, other than leaving family and friends behind.

More guests and a visit to the circus

During August, my wife Rita had her sister and husband come to stay with their 10 year old twin girls for a week. They were all looking forward to some sunshine after the wet weather in England. During their stay it averaged around 100 degrees most days. We all had a great time doing lots of

The "ringmaster" introduced all the acts to the Benny Hill theme tune and although it was all in Spanish the kids really enjoyed it as did the rest of the 100 people or so in the audience. The next day we saw it setting up in the next village, so I guess it must be visiting most of the small villages during the school holiday.

Village Fiesta

August is the month for the main fiesta in the village. Usually in the middle of the month, over 4 nights and with the exception of the bars everything else closes down. It's a bit like a small version of Cottingham Day except longer; it doesn't start until 10pm and finishes around 4am each day. The village square is filled with tables and chairs, a stage and a couple of extra-long bars down each side. There is also a small funfair, food stalls and wine tasting and by 10.30pm you would be lucky to find an empty table.

On the final day (Sunday), its paella day with free paella and drinks for the entire village and as we are trying to integrate, we all had a go! It was a fantastic afternoon, really busy and the paella was lovely. I have never seen such a huge paella pan and it was all cooked over a log fire and even when everyone had been fed, there were still a few portions left. We then spent the rest of the afternoon going from bar to bar for a few more beers and plates of tapas, before walking back to the house. A really great day and a wonderful way to enjoy the Spanish lifestyle.

Guardia Civil

I had my first run in with the police during July when we were driving through the next village. We still had our UK registered car at this time and they pulled us over and asked to see all our documents for the car, which you have to carry with you by law. Electrical safety for rental property - (Part One)

andlords obviously have a responsibility for the electrical safety in their buy-to-let properties. They do in fact have a duty of care to their tenants. The Landlord & Tenant Act 1985 requires that the electrical equipment is safe at the start of every tenancy and maintained in a safe condition throughout the tenancy. The chances of an accident involving the electrics in your property are thankfully small, but it can happen. There were approximately 30 deaths last year caused by faulty electrical supplies.

Legislative Obligation of Landlords

There are a number of current pieces of legislation governing electrical safety in rental properties together with setting out a landlords legal obligations. Unlike gas safety in rental properties, landlords are not currently required to carry out annual safety check. The current bits of electrical safety legislation potentially affecting landlords renting property are contained within legislation which includes:

- Landlords and Tenant Act 1985
- · Housing Act 2004
- Management of Houses in Multiple Occupation (England) Regulations 2006 and Management of Houses in Multiple Occupation (Wales) Regulations 2006
- Part P of the Building Regulations
- Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order
- Electricity at Work Regulations 1989

Electrical appliances

I was recently contacted by a Landlord wanting some clarification on his legal responsibilities over the replacement of a new electric hob. As this was the 'replacement' of an existing hob, the work doesn't come under the legislation covered by Part P of the Building Regulations. This bit of EU inspired legislation means that even installing a 'new' electrical socket in your buy-to-let would need it installed by a 'competent person', which effectively means that they need to be a member of one of the trade organisations such as the NICEIC. If you don't have it installed by a 'competent person' you would have to go to all the extra expense of making an application to your local authority under the building regulations.

Testing your electrical appliances

A landlord does need to ensure that the electrical system and all appliances supplied are safe - failure to comply with the Electrical Equipment (Safety) Regulations 1994 and the The Consumer Protection Act 1987 is a criminal offence and may result in:

- A fine of £5,000 per item not complying
- Six month's imprisonment
- Possible manslaughter charges in the even of deaths
- The Tenant may also sue you for civil damages
- Your property insurance may be invalidated

Getting acquainted with your Fat Friends (and Foes)

hether fat is your friend or foe, the better acquainted you are with each type, the better off you will be health wise.

Let's face it, fat is a part of life. There is good fat and there is bad fat. Fat adds more flavor to food and that is what makes it so appealing to the taste buds. But fat has many negative points that can reek havoc on your efforts to stay healthy and be slim and trim.

Let's take the time to get better acquainted with fat, shall we? The more you know about fat the better able you will be to make the right food choices. Fat can be broken down into four different types. These include:

- Monounsaturated fat (good)
- Polyunsaturated fat (good)
- Saturated fat (bad)
- Trans fat (bad)

Monounsaturated fats are healthy fats that are associated with a lower risk of developing cardiovascular disease. These fats when at room temperature are in liquid form but they turn a cloudy consistency when put in the refrigerator. Plant oils such as canola oil, olive oil and peanut oil are some of the most common sources of monounsaturated fat. Other sources include avocados, sesame seeds, pumpkin seeds and nuts (such as almonds, hazel nuts and pecans).

Polyunsaturated fats are composed of essential fatty acids called the omega-3's. You have likely heard of omega-3 before. The body cannot make omega-3 on its own and that is where this unique kind of fat comes into play. Polyunsaturated fats can be found in fish, flax seed, flax seed oil, corn oil, sunflower oil, soybean oil and walnuts. Polyunsaturated fats remain liquids both at room temperature and in colder temperatures.

Now we turn to the flip side and look at those sneaky and not-so-nice bad fats

Saturated fat increases the body's low-density lipoprotein level (LDL). This is what most of us know as bad cholesterol. Having bad cholesterol means having too high a percentage of it in relation to good cholesterol (HDL). This increases your chances of falling victim to a heart attack and other cardiovascular diseases. The primary sources of saturated fat are red meat, whole milk dairy products and tropical vegetable oils (such as coconut oil and palm oil). The less you consume of these food items the better it is for your health.
