The new Apple iPhones 5C and 5S, and Microsoft announce the end of Office 2003 in 2014

pple have been hogging the headlines recently with the launch of two new iPhone models, the 5C & 5S and a revamped operating system for iPhones and iPads called iOS7. What's that got to do with computers you might ask. Quite a lot when you consider these handsets do virtually everything a computer will do and cost in excess of £500, and they have almost a cult following with some devoted followers queuing for days to get their hands on the latest Apple gadget. There is talk that the C in 5C stands for China; a market that Apple wants to gain more market share in. Given that just one the networks in China has 750 million customers, you can't fault their intentions!

Apple's new refreshed iOS7 has caused quite a stir, especially on launch day when users worldwide were all trying to download it at the same time. By now things have calmed down, so if you have an iPhone 4 or iPad 2 or later, you should be able to update to the new without any problem. It does work very well with a very clean, streamlined look to it.

Microsoft meanwhile has ramped up its mobile phone business by acquiring Nokia's handset division. Nokia smart phones are one of the few manufacturers running Windows software and Microsoft are keen to get more of their share of this burgeoning sector.

the system is a wall-mounted iPad-like device. The screen has Skype, which allows carers to regularly check in with patients. It also has a planner for patients or carers to record up-coming events and provides spoken reminders about daily tasks, such as when they need to take medicine. There are also motion sensors that pick up if you are in the room or open a door, and send out alarms, for instance if the stove is left on for more than 15 minutes. Strange but true...

When inserting a memory stick into your computer or laptop, you normally usually have to rotate it 3 or 4 times before it goes in correctly!

Turn it off and turn it on again. Not magic, but with most computer related equipment it works 9 times out of ten!

When you're in a hurry to do something, invariably updates will appear and shut down & restart your computer, saying: 'please wait'.....aaaarghh!!

Upgrade or replace? That is the question....I am often asked, and am happy to give advice on this thorny dilemma. In respect of upgrading to a **later version of Windows**, the answer generally is that unless your computer is only a year or two old (or of a very high spec), it is better to go for a new one when you're ready, as to upgrade costs about £150 - £200. If you are thinking of new, a useful guide to the latest all-round specification is an Intel i3 or i5; 4GB or 6GB of Ram, and a 500GB hard drive (or more if you intend to store large amounts of data). Call us for a no obligation quote.

An interesting alternative to a standard Windows laptop would be a Chromebook. You may be familiar with the Google Chrome web browser on your own computer. Well this was developed last year into a 'mini operating system' for custom built laptops called Chromebooks. These are designed for any user that wants mainly internet and email access and is not concerned with having lots of other software on their machine, and the inconvenience of lots of updates! They cost just over half the price and boot up very fast ready for use. They are available online at sites like Amazon. Read the reviews before buying to see if it is right for you.

Office 2003 has been added to the 'end of life' list along with Windows XP in April 2014. Basically it means there will be no more support or security updates and fixes from Microsoft for either product. Office 2013 is now available in various editions for those wanting to upgrade.



Bursary project launched to help young musicians in **Hull and East Riding**

project has been launched to give financial help to young talented musicians in Hull and the East Riding so they can develop their musical skills.

The Rotary Club of Humberside, working in partnership with Hull City Council's Music Service, is planning to raise sufficient money to provide bursaries – each worth £1,000 – to help the youngsters to achieve their musical ambitions by receiving specialist tuition.

The Club is raising money by staging a concert at the Hull City Hall on 19th October and also securing sponsorship from businesses and grants from charitable trusts in the area.

George Tarbotton, chairman of the Rotary Club's Major Events Committee said: "This all stems from a presentation Chris Maynard, head of the Music Service, gave to our Club last year. Following several conversations with him it became apparent some financial help was needed to help youngsters with talent to develop further. We were also impressed by the purpose of the Music Service which is 'to enrich and enhance the lives of children and the community by actively supporting and developing education through music'.

"Hopefully those who receive bursaries will be able to achieve their musical ambitions, develop a greater all round interest in education and make a positive impact in

the community. Without financial help many of them will not be able to progress their musical talents."

The Council's Music Service will, in conjunction with participating schools identify the young people who would benefit from a bursary which is aimed to run for five years – subject to satisfactory progress. The number of bursaries awarded will depend on the funds raised by this and subsequent concerts in future.

Chris Maynard, Head of the Music Service said: "This concert will be a fine example of partnership working and we are delighted that the Maureen Hunter Singers will be joining us on what will be a fabulous evening of music, showcasing some of the best young music making in the area. The outcome of the concert will hopefully be that more young musicians from less affluent families will be able to realise their musical potential".

George Tarbotton added: "Rotary has always been involved in supporting local communities and this project is very much in keeping with our 'New Generations' theme of supporting the development of young people".

The City Hall Concert "Autumn Notes" will feature The Maureen Hunter Singers, The City of Hull Youth Orchestra and the City of Hull Youth Choir and will include music and songs from Godspell, Star Wars, The Beatles and many more well known pieces. Halloween

The history of Halloween can be traced back over 2,000 years and for most of this time, food of some kind or another has been closely associated with it.

The earliest celebrations were among the Celts who not only worshipped a Sun God but also Samhain who was the lord of the dead. They believed that Samhain called up the souls of the dead who would take the forms of animals and roam over the Earth through the night of the 31st October. It was called the Vigil of Samhain.

Many years later All Saints Day or All Hallows Day celebrated by the Roman Catholic faith on 1st November was established as a means of replacing the pagan Vigil of Samhain however with the increased practising of witchcraft, 31st October became known as the Night of the Witch and later All Hallows Even or The Night of the Dead. Through time, the name was shortened firstly to Hallowe'en and eventually to Halloween.

So what do pumpkins have to do with it?

The hollowed out pumpkin (Jack 'o Lantern) was named after a man called Jack, who was an infamous drunkard and trickster. He tricked Satan into climbing a tree then carved an image of a cross in the tree's trunk, thereby trapping the devil up the tree. He made a pact with the devil that, if the devil would never tempt him to wicked ways again, he would promise to let him down the tree.

However, after Jack died, not only was he denied into Heaven because of his previous evil ways but was also denied access to Hell because he had tricked the devil. The devil instead gave him a single ember to light his way through the darkness. This was placed inside a hollowed-out turnip to keep it glowing longer. How exactly the pumpkin came to take its place is still a mystery.

So where does "trick or treat" come into all of this?

If you thought trick or treating was a US invention then think again. Its origins can be traced back over 2000 years, not only to the Celts, but also the Chinese, Egyptians and Aztecs. Still closely tied with the night of the dead, it was believed that spirits required food and drink to placate them and so people would leave out morsels of food for their consumption. Not to do so may encourage them to enter your house, cause havoc and help themselves.

As time went on, people began dressing as spirits and performing antics in exchange for food and drink. It is this practice, called "mumming", which evolved into the present-day trick or treating.

So what can you do with all the pumpkin flesh afterwards?

One of the easiest things is to make soup – very welcome now the nights are drawing in.

Leek, Pumpkin and Sweet Potato Soup

Ingredients

2 tbsp Olive Oil

1 Leek, chopped

1/2 Onion, chopped

1/2 Stick Celery, chopped

1 small Carrot, chopped

1 Sweet Potato, peeled and diced 675g/1-1/2lb Pumpkin flesh, chopped

1 Garlic Clove, crushed

480ml/16fl.oz. Fresh Chicken Stock

120ml/4fl.oz. Double Cream

1 Bay Leaf

1 teasp freshly chopped Sage

A large pinch Ground Cloves

A large pinch Ground Nutmeg

A large pinch Ground Cinnamon

Salt and Black Pepper

Instructions

- 1. Heat the oil in a large saucepan, add the leeks, onion, celery, carrot, sweet potatoes, pumpkin, and garlic, and sauté until they start to brown.
- 2. Add the bay leaf, stock, and cream, mix well and bring to the boil stirring constantly.
- 3. Reduce the heat and simmer for 15-20 minutes or until all the vegetables are tender.
- 4. Add the sage, cloves, nutmeg, cinnamon, and salt and pepper and continue to cook for a further 5 minutes.
- 5. Remove the bay leaf and allow to cool slightly then transfer to a food processor or liquidiser and process to a puree.
 - 6. Return to the rinsed out pan and reheat until hot.





ince the beginning of the 20th century, parties featuring 'scary' foods coloured black, purple or red, have been a hit with the young and the young at heart. Dishes are often given names like 'witches cauldron' (red pepper and tomato soup), and 'fried brain' (walnut halves sautéed in paprika). Sandwiches are cut into spooky shapes like witches' hats and eyeballs, and drinks may contain 'squashed bugs' (actually flattened raisins or grapes).

Whilst the British can't take credit for having invented the sausage, they do hold a special place in the hearts of many Britons. There's even a British Sausage Appreciation Society which boats over 7,000 members.

According to the Agriculture and Horticulture Development Board Meat Services, 90% of British households buy sausages, 50% at least every four weeks, every day, five million Britons will eat sausages but despite being known world-wide for their wonderful cooked breakfasts which often include sausages, 46% of the total amount of pork sausages consumed are eaten in the evening.

Favourite British Sausages

Although there is thought to be over 470 recipes and flavours for sausages in the UK, plain pork sausages are the ones people buy most often especially for use in recipes such as toad-in-thehole. However, many of the regional speciality sausages have now become popular throughout the country. Some of the favourites which are readily available in many supermarkets include:-

Cumberland

A pork sausage seasoned with a variety of herbs and spices but predominantly pepper and made in a continuous spiral. It is traditionally sold by length rather than weight

Yorkshire

A pork sausage flavoured predominantly with pepper, mace, nutmeg and cayenne.

Lincolnshire

A herby sausage traditionally made with pork, bread and sage Pork & apple (West Country)

A pork sausage often cider or scrumpy and flavoured with sage.

Interesting Sausage Facts

The Sumerians were making sausages 5.000 years ago.

In 320 A.D. the Catholic Church banned the eating of sausages due to their association with Pagan festivities

Sausages were first divided into links in Britain during the reign of Charles I (1600-1649)

'Bangers' which is the British nickname for sausages, originated from the Second World War when the high water content made them tend to explode during cooking as the water turned to steam.

Sausage machines can fill sausages at a rate of 1.5 miles an hour.

Toad in the hole with Sage Batter and onion gravy

Thick juicy sausages, cooked in a light sage batter, served with a rich onion and beer gravy.

Ingredients

125g plain flour

Salt and pepper

3 eggs

300ml milk

1-2 tbsp sage leaves, finely chopped

6 Thick sausages

For the onion gravy

30g/1oz unsalted butter

2 onions, peeled and sliced

1 sprig of thyme

1 tbsp wholegrain mustard 2tbsp onion gravy granules

150ml beer

300 ml beef stock Salt and pepper





Instructions

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to 220C/425F/Gas 7.
- 2. To make the batter, place the flour into a large bowl and season generously with salt and pepper. Beat the eggs in a separate bowl with a splash of milk. Pour the eggs onto the flour and beat together until smooth. Gradually whisk in the remaining milk until you create a smooth batter. Stir in the chopped sage.
- 3. Sauté the sausages in a hot pan with a little oil for approximately 8-10 minutes, turning occasionally until they are evenly browned. Meanwhile, place a 1 litre ovenproof dish in the oven to heat
- 4. Remove the dish from the oven and arrange the sausages into the dish, along with the excess oil. Return to the oven for a few minutes until the dish is piping hot. Pour over the batter so it comes 1/2 of the way up the dish. Return to the oven and cook for 20-25 minutes until golden brown and well risen. (Be careful not to overfill the dish as the batter will rise during cooking. It may therefore be necessary to discard any remaining batter, or save for a separate use).
- 5. To make the gravy, heat the butter in a pan and sweat the onions and thyme for 5-6 minutes, until golden. Add the wholegrain mustard, gravy granules and stir together. Pour in the beer and allow to reduce by half. Add the beef stock and bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 10-12 minutes until thickened. Season to

am delighted to announce that not only my 2nd grandson was born over the past 3 months but also a 3rd, Joshua, was born last week. My eldest grandson, Jacob, is now 22 months and the difficult stage of putting him on his own in the nursery at night for the first time has now passed but not without anxiety from my daughter, Jenni and son-in-law, Adam. My eldest daughter, Kath and partner Matt, will now be going through it all for the first time with their 3 month old son, Noah.

To all the grandparents out there, we know what a worrying time our children will be going through. Like the sayings go 'old head on young shoulders and hind sight is a fine thing' do spring to mind and it is so difficult on us 'oldies' to take a back seat (as I am finding out as you can imagine).

It would be lovely if there was a manual to refer to, for every stage of a youngsters life and even better if, what ever is suggested, became an instant remedy. Sadly, life's not like that but there is support and help

Do they start as they mean to go on or gradually ease them into the family. Communication is the key word. When a new baby arrives, the soothing voice of their parents, whispering against their cheek, eventually brings harmony to the household. With November looming, I would like to talk about Guy Fawkes night. You will be, quite rightly so, wondering why I have gone off on such a tangent but the link will hopefully become clear.

Asking any responsible pet owner, I can imagine the response to 5th November would be filled with dread. FINALLY, in the case of our canine friends, they will most probably need a walk before dusk. If this is the case, please be aware if you intend using an extending lead. It is so difficult to control a 'bolting' dog on the end of 4 meters of string after a sudden loud BANG! The pavements are very close to the roads so both dog and car do not stand a chance. Please try to use a normal lead whenever possible and keep the extending one for the park.

She had been described as a marvellous aged virgin but many images of her are as a younger woman. She had a cult following and almost all churches and cathedrals on the continent had likenesses of her.




The Big Move



This month his destination is Snainton


The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

Map:- EXPLORER OL27


Start at GR.SE915824 On small cut through from A170 to B1258. Distance 6.0 Miles.

Leave the cars and cross the A170 and turn right. Immediately after passing the Fire Station turn left into Cliff Lane and on reaching the surfaced road continue straight ahead. After about 200 metres locate a way-marker on the left and pass through a wooden gate and walk through the field with the hedge on the right,

On reaching a metal gate, pass through the gate and turn right walking with the hedge on the right heading towards a small copse of trees. On reaching the trees, bear left and continue on a well defined track and descend into a shallow dale and then turn right, again following a well defined track.

Follow the track as it veers left near a stone wall and barn (known as Hog Pasture Buildings), pass through a metal gate and then turn right keeping a low stone wall on the right. At the end of the field, turn left again keeping a low stone wall on the right. At the next field corner, turn right and pass through a small copse of trees and walk with the wall on the right. Pass into the next field and walk with the hedge on the right heading for Malton Cote Farm. On reaching the farm, turn right keeping the farm buildings to the left. After passing the buildings, turn right and after about 50 metres turn right and walk with the wall on the left. At the end of the field turn left and keep a low wall and line of trees on the left.

On reaching the farm approach road, turn right to emerge on the Snainton road. On reaching the road, turn left and then after about 200 metres, turn right and pass through a metal gate leading to Moorsome Farm. Bear right to pass the farm buildings on the left. After passing the buildings, continue ahead and pass through a metal gate following the farm track to a wall and belt of trees then bear right.

Follow this track and, on reaching a grass field, walk diagonally to the left across the field to metal gate at the corner of the field. Pass through the gate and turn right then immediately left and walk with a stone wall on the right. At the end of this field turn right and walk with a wall on the left. At the end of the field continue straight ahead to the next field. At the end of the second field pass through a wooden gate into a small wooded lane (can be overgrown). Emerge onto a farm track, continue straight ahead, pass through a wooden gate, emerge onto a surfaced lane and continue straight ahead.

At Headon Farm and immediately after passing a building with a letter box in the wall, turn right. After 50 metres turn left, pass through a wooden kissing gate and walk down a concrete drive. Pass through a wooden gate on the left and continue with the Tennis Courts on the left (Wydale Hall) Continue through a wooded area descending to a farm track and turn left. At the bottom of the hill turn left, pass through a wooden gate and bear right and contour up the hill. Pass through a wooden gate and walk with the hedge on the right. After two fields emerge on a farm track and continue ahead. As this becomes a surfaced road continue ahead. On reaching a country road, turn left and then on reaching the A170 turn right and walk back to the cars.

ctober is here, which means Autumn is officially here too. The weather is cooler and the nights are starting to draw in. There is still plenty to do in the garden, some gardeners actually prefer the cooler conditions as they are more comfortable to work in. Remember that Autumn is the ideal season to plant all kinds of things in the garden from vegetables, seeding lawns, shrubs and perennials to evergreen, fruit, and deciduous trees. You can carry on mowing your lawn through October depending on how much rain we have but it is advisable to raise your mower blade to a higher setting.



Hedging guide

Now is the perfect time to plant hedging. Hedging is great to create walls, shape and texture in your garden. They are also good for wildlife as birds love nesting in them.

Here is our easy step guide to planting a hedge devised by our horticultural manager.

- 1. Dig a trench 1 ft by 8 inches deep the length of your hedge
- 2. Feed soil with bone meal and dig in soil improver such as rose, tree and shrub planting compost
- 3. Place your plants 12 to 18 inches apart for 2 Litre plants and 18 to 24 inches apart for larger plants
- 4. Plant your hedge making sure that the root ball is no more than ½ inch below soil level
- 5. Give plants a good watering (approximately a 5 Litre watering can per plant) after initial planting
- 6. Water morning and evening in dry conditions for the 1st year

What is Organic Gardening?

Gardening organically means growing plants without manufactured fertilisers and other synthetic chemicals for feeding, pest and disease control, soil conditioning or weeding. Although often regarded as an alternative to gardening with chemicals, many organic techniques are simply good practices and compatible with other forms of gardening.

Excluding manufactured chemicals when growing ornamental plants, lawns, fruit and vegetables brings some challenges.

On the plus side, organic gardening is beneficial to the environment, provides a more attractive home to wildlife and, by cultivating fruit and vegetables organically, you'll know your tasty produce is chemical free. So bearing all this in mind, you may choose to go wholly organic or to combine organic techniques with a reduction in chemicals, using them only as necessary to maintain soil fertility and deal with the most damaging pests, diseases and weeds.

Organic Weed control

Chemical weed killers are a very attractive and effective solution to eliminate weeds. There are not always better alternatives in the organic range that are as effective but they are a lot kinder to the environment and beneficial to wildlife and their habitats. You have to decide where you can use organic methods and where you can't and try and achieve the best balance you can.

Wherever possible, try to avoid weed killers by hand weeding or hoeing and try to tackle weed problems before they produce and disperse their seeds and heavy infestations develop. In addition, prevention is much better than cure, so carefully prepare sites prior to planting and incorporate weed barriers to reduce the chance of weed infestation.

PREPARATION: When preparing a planting site, ensure all perennial weeds such as couch grass, nettles and brambles are removed by digging out with a fork.

Remove annual weeds by hand or in dry weather use a hoe to cut off weeds from their roots.

BARRIERS: Different options are available to gardeners to help smother or prevent weed growth. Mulching with a 5–8cm layer of organic material such as garden compost, well-rotted farmyard manure, spent mushroom compost or cocoa shell helps smother annual weeds.

Alternatively, plastic sheets, old carpet, carpet underlay or other fabricated material can be used to suppress annual and perennial weeds. In ornamental garden situations, ground-cover plants provide a more attractive weed-suppressing alternative. A barrier of heavy gauge black polythene can be sunk to prevent perennial weeds from growing into an area from an adjoining garden.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Plant Spring blooming bulbs
- 2. Plant Herbaceous Perennials

- 4. Introduce fat balls for the birds as well as fresh water

ALTERNATIVE METHODS: Paint-on gels are ideal for treating perennial weeds such as bindweed as the weed killer is absorbed through the leaves and down to the roots, without the worry of spray drift on to other plants.

They are also the best way to treat odd nettles or brambles cropping up in a hedge or densely planted border, as you can apply them specifically to a certain area.

Plant of the month

October's plant of the month is the beautiful Callicarpa.

A lovely deciduous shrub with delicate pink, purple, white or red flowers in summer and large clusters of stunning violet bead-like berries in autumn and through winter. The young foliage is often bronze-purple, becoming dark green in summer before turning golden purple in autumn. The bare branches laden with berries look gorgeous in flower arrangements. This shrub is perfect to brighten up a late autumn border. The Callicarpa is also a great plant to have in your garden to attract wildlife particularly birds.

This shrub is fully hardy and prefers fertile and well-drained soil.

Hello everyone and welcome to my monthly column.

hope nobody hates me after saying this but this month I'm going to start by mentioning the C word... Christmas! There, I've said it, it's out in the open, everyone has read it now and we all know it's

Christmas at Waitrose Willerby is actually really enjoyable. It's an absolutely crazy time, which for us starts around the beginning of October. However, it's the culmination of everyones hard work that makes it so rewarding and I know that this year will be no different.

I mention Christmas now because over the next two months I shall recommend some great wines to go with everyones Christmas dinner and if I can fit it all in I'll also discuss whisky which is a perfect gift around this time of year for any spirits lover.

This month though I'm going to talk about Beer. More specifically, Ales. Ales differ from Lager in that they are more complex and robust and have developed many styles over the course of the years. In fact Ale dates back before the Celts.

I've chosen four different styles of Ale to try to suit everyone and to give a brief overview of the quality and range of tastes and aromas that can be produced from just four simple ingredients - Water, Malt, Yeast and Hops. Enjoy!

First up is Bath Ales Gem (£1.97 – 4.8%, 500ml). A gorgeous bitter which is made using Maris Otter barley and Goldings hops from Kent. It has a wonderful copper and amber colour when poured, with a rich biscuity aroma. There are hints of vanilla on the nose and on the palate you can pick up toffee which is really well offset by a bitterness that comes from the hops. A fantastic bitter from a top producer. Try this with some strong cheeses.

Hook Norton Double Stout (£1.97 – 4.8%, 500ml) has a long history. The brewery actually stopped making it back in 1917 due to the style of beer falling out of fashion. Almost 80 years later they recreated the original recipe and brought it back to life. It uses a blend of malts to give it its rich flavour, including Black malt which adds a massive whack of roasted coffee aroma. The palate is crammed full of coffee and bitter chocolate tastes with a good dry finish. A perfect match for a dark chocolate mousse.

My third choice is Innis & Gunn Original Oak Aged (£1.79 - 6.6%, 330ml). I have never tasted a beer that suits food as well as this does. I've tried this with loads of different dishes and it matches them brilliantly, from bangers and mash to crème brulee. The reason for this is more than likely due to its slightly dry edge sitting alongside a great depth of fruit flavour. Most notably, flavours of toffee, vanilla and dry oak. All of which comes from its maturation over the finest American oak. We also sell a Rum cask version as well which exudes a sweet molasses aroma and is worth trying too!

Last but by no means least we have Thornbridge Wild Swan Pale Ale (£2.08 - 3.5%, 500ml). I have the pleasure of visiting Sheffield on a regular basis (don't worry, I have my jabs before I go!) and it was there that I first discovered Thornbridge, who are based in Bakewell in the Peak District. It was to my delight that we started stocking there beers at

Waitrose soon after. The Wild Swan is a Golden or Blonde ale which is full of fresh lemon and stone fruit flavour, followed by a pleasant hoppy finish.

Thank you for reading; I hope you give them a try. If there is anything you would like me to discuss in my column please speak to me next time you're in Waitrose Willerby or if you ever need help selecting a beer, wine or spirit I shall be around to help!



Here is the latest article from Chris Catchmoore who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

ello and welcome fellow anglers to this month's fishing news. Today's date is the 16th September.

Well as you know it is that time of year again, the kids are back at school and the nights are drawing in. Now normally I would be advising you to start scaling down your gear i.e. use lighter elastics 'n' hook lengths and smaller hooks but the warmer weather keeps holding on. Therefore the fish are still feeding quite well and they have not slowed down when it comes down to the fight they give you.

A lot if not most of the club matches have finished for this season but those who are still going are informing me of some terrific weights. Plus the pleasure anglers are singing off the same hymn sheet.

The best venues at the moment seem to be Risby: Tench Lake. Sam Hosticks: Kingfisher. Fitlin: both ponds. Newbridge: Twin Island.

The big Carp are still on the feed and good reports are coming from Majestic at Weel and Rainbow at Burstwick. Give them a ring and check out the availability and give it a go before winter sets in. OUCH! Did I say "winter", oh well at least I did not say Christmas, oopps, sorry.

Anyway back to the fishing, can you believe River Hull has been fishing, once again this month, it's brilliant.

From Ennerdale to Kingswood there are loads of Silvers being caught such like Roach, Skimmers and Ide, plus quite a few Eels, Perch and Flatty's. Further up at Deans and Shipyard lots of bonus

Perch to 2 1/2lb are being reported. There are still some small Barbell being caught here and some of the larger Ide. One tip here though is that you need to feed heavily constantly. You cannot turn up here with just I pint of maggots if you are planning to stay more than an hour. Now that is a clue, to fish it properly you may need to feed up to a pint of maggots per hour, but the results will be worth it.

Here is another thing I see all the time form inexperienced stick anglers. Our river is very fast compared to most others so you need to have a large enough float to take a fair bit of shot, something like a chubba or avon style that takes 12 number 4 shot or greater. The shotting pattern is also important. I advise a bulk shot about 2 ½" to 3" from the hook and a couple of number 6 shot spread out just above your hook length. And fish over depth by about 18".

If you are feeder fishing the river do not over complicate things. Have a fixed paternoster rig with 2"-3" hook length and feed regularly on your inside swim about one rod length out and two rod lengths downstream. Let the feeder drift inside and wait. By doing this you will find you will pick up less debris than you would if you fished the main flow or far bank.

Here is one for you to try in your feeders as well so you don't have to use quite as many maggots. Try filling half your feeder with ground bait of some description. This will save you money and still attract more fish. Don't overdo it if you use bread though as the Roach etc. can become very full very quickly on bread. Personally I would use 50/50 crumb and a good quality Roach or River ground bait. Try it and once again you should "Catchmoore".

Well now you are all experts on river fishing so why not give the Hull or Derwent Championship Match a go! These matches will be held on Saturday 12th October on the Derwent and Sunday 13th October on the Hull. Tickets are £5.00 to enter with optional pools on the day. There is a first prize on both days of £1000 and a grand total of £5400 without optional pools. Not bad for £5.00 or £10 if you decide to fish both days, eh?

Tickets are available to purchase in our shop. You know the one Catchmoore Tackle opposite the new Farmfoods on Greenwood Avenue. Good luck.

Sea scene: here is some good news. I have heard that the Whiting are back in town. They have been reported right from Spurn to Bridlington. There are still good Bass being caught and Cod from almost anywhere. Close in gully's on high water seem to be the best for the Cod.

Fresh bait is still available on request and I will start stocking Rag worm as well as the Lug worm in about three weeks. Please order to avoid disappointment.

Truly sorry to bring it up but from the day of writing this article there is only 100 days left to Christmas. So if you want some fishing gear for Christmas start dropping hints now and if you don't know what to buy the angler in your family vouchers are always available from us.

Anyway till next month, I would like to wish you all "tight lines"

Teachers sought to be wind energy champions

eachers from Hull, East Riding and Teesside schools are being sought to become wind energy champions as Forewind, developer of the Dogger Bank zone, launches the next stage of its innovative education initiative, Champions for Wind.

Ten teachers will be awarded bursaries to develop and implement wind energy careers related activities for their students as part of the initiative being run by Hull-based Humberside Engineering Training Association (HETA).

Champions for Wind began late in 2011 with the recruitment of 10 teachers from Hull and East Riding of Yorkshire as "wind energy champions". In mid-2012 a further 10 teachers were selected in Teesside. Applications are now open for the third cohort of teachers from across the areas, to express their interest in taking part.

More than 2000 students to date have been involved with the programme and this latest phase will mean up to 1000 more young people will have the opportunity to learn about offshore wind energy and the wide range of careers offered by the industry.

The champions selected will work with careers advisors to design and develop curriculum-based resources that are relevant to their students, schools and local area. Hull, East Riding of Yorkshire and Teesside were chosen for their proximity to the proposed landfalls, onshore infrastructure and grid connections of the Dogger Bank development.

By facilitating careers education for young people living near Forewind's proposed onshore infrastructure, it is hoped motivated young people will be encouraged to join this growing industry while at the same time local community expectations will be met.

The programme was designed by HETA to: develop gender balance, roundedness of the industry, pride, a sense of ownership and skills in the local area, innovation and a vision for the future, while also building on existing programmes which foster teacher development.

Letting to Tenants with Pets

Can I let to tenants with pets?

f a landlord owns the freehold, there is no problem letting to tenants with pets. It's entirely up to the landlord. It is a commercial and management decision for them to decide and at times distinctly a matter of personal preference.

However, if the landlord is a leaseholder, as many landlords are; then there is a big issue as to whether you will be allowed to let to them in

Landlords will need to check their title deeds and the terms of the lease to find out whether they are allowed to: (a) sublet in the first place; (b) sublet to tenants with a pet.

Often the lease will either prohibit the keeping of pets or require the landlord to obtain permission from the freeholder (landlord).

Pros & cons of letting to tenants with pets

Assuming that you are legally able to let to tenants with pets what are the pros & cons?

One of the pros is that those landlords who are prepared to take tenants with a 'little animal' friend are often rewarded with a grateful tenant, who might have faced rejection by a number of previous landlords along the course of their property search.

These grateful tenants are glad that they have found a landlord who is accommodating to their fury friend, and can often end up as a trusty companion to the landlord for many years. This can result in a long term tenant who sticks in the rental property and reduces the chances of void periods between tenants.

Happy pet, happy tenant, happy landlord.

In addition, a landlord might be able to negotiate a small rental premium with a tenant, on the basis that the extra rent will cover the potential damage and extra wear and tear on the rental property

The obvious Con of letting a property to a pet is the risk of a pet causing damage to the property, for which it is difficult to obtain insurance against and a pet also causing a nuisance to neighbouring properties which is likely to increase the amount of 'management time' a property requires.

Ways of a landlord protecting their interest

There are a number of things that a landlord can do if they decide to let to tenants with pets, alongside upping the rent:

A landlord can consider including a pet clause in the tenancy agreement. The clause should refer to a comprehensive pet policy which can be incorporated as a schedule to the tenancy agreement.

Other ways of a landlord safeguarding their interest would be:

A landlord could choose to take a higher deposit. This would help protect the landlords financial risk as damage caused by pets are not covered by most landlord insurers. If this is acceptable to the tenant then this should be enough to cover the potential damage caused by the tenants pet during the tenancy.

Another suggestion is that a landlord takes an upfront pet payment to cover the cost of a professional clean at the end of the tenancy. This payment is non-refundable, and not a deposit. The fee is taken as an upfront charge which the tenant accept that they will not get back, as payment for a thorough clean at the end of the tenancy. However, care needs to be taken that it should not be considered as a deposit under the new regulations, potentially opening up landlords to an expensive fine. What a landlord needs to do is to have a carefully worded agreement to ensure no confusion over the intentions behind the payment.



The Breeding Lottery

I'm sat here licking my emotional wounds as I plan to take my 6-year-old home-bred horse Ralph to be put down in the morning. I have been trying so hard all summer to stop his pain but all treatments have failed and there is no more treatment pathways to offer up.

It's such a pity that with all the advances in veterinary science these days sometimes we get beaten back. My horse suffers from acute pain in his sacral joints on the top of his rump......and all due to the way his body has grown and developed.

The problem is he simply grew too tall with his legs being far too long for his body......as such he has to graze like a long legged new born foal. This contortion puts his frame under huge stress and places his body in an acute position which simply perpetuates the cycle.

The bones of the sacrum are now so diseased that they are unable to re-generate, in fact the opposite is the case. This degeneration has now reached the point of affecting his temperament in general and he is getting visibly thinner day by day, despite a fantastic diet and access to good quality forage 100% of the time.

Ralph stands at 17.2 hands high. His full sister Samsara stands a full hand shorter and is compact and stocky. Ralph is the total opposite.....all legs and a narrow frame/body width. As different as chalk and cheese.

Investigating skeletal problems in horses is now started by using bone nuclear scintigraphy.

Ralph was found to have increased levels of the tracer all along his spine and sacral joints as well as highlighting his stifle joint (knee) on his off side hind leg. There was also an issue of him not quite having full feel or awareness of his near side fore leg.....which would give way sometimes unexpectedly.

Pain is the first thing to attack in any of us so therefore the spine was injected with steroid from front to back, followed by a course of Extra-corporeal Shock Wave Therapy. This non invasive treatment can produce very real anti-inflammatory benefits over a course of 4/5 sessions. Pain relief was also given orally for months.

Because he was losing weight he was given muscle build up enhancers using amino acids to help regenerate muscle mass.....

Local anaesthetic was injected to coat those deep down sacroiliac joints and give temporary relief from inflammation. We followed very strict work programmes designed to help build him up and strengthen his entire frame.

Over six months a vast amount of money has been spent in various ongoing treatments and physio sessions......all to no avail. My poor boy just cannot cope with his own body anymore and I have had to make myself stop now. There is nothing left to do, bar make sure he no longer has to suffer living in such pain.

He was my last foal I bred back in the days when I was showing young stock and training them for competition. He is the closing of an era for me and I wish him peace now

Making a decision like this for an animal so huge and seemingly so invincible is no harder than for a much loved dog, cat or rabbit. We have the love and the power to take a life for the right reasons and at the right time.......

I recently met a local lady who supports an extra ordinary Donkey charity in the Holy land.......called "Safe Haven for Donkeys". These beasts of burden suffer hugely through over work, ignorance and starvation. When the people themselves are so poor it is an inevitable spiral of events. However, like "The Brook" horse charity in India and Pakistan, they do amazing work, not just with the veterinary treatments to the animals but they also help to support and educate their hard suffering and desperately poor owners.

She asked me if I could ask all you horse owners who read this to donate any old head collars, bandages or unwanted equipment.......which are desperately needed. Instead of throwing it away or putting it on Ebay for a quid, please could you drop it into my yard in Skidby or ring me to collect.......01482 875141. Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell

Malaga Airport

ver the years that we have been coming to Spain, the airport at Malaga has gone from being a small, one terminal airport with very few decent facilities for the traveller, to being a huge travel centre with 3 terminals, its own railway station and decent shops and restaurants.

It now accounts for 70% of all incoming and outgoing flights in Andalucia and this June a total of 1.5 million people passed through the airport, which was a small increase on the year before. As a comparison, the second busiest airport in Andalucia was Seville, which had just over 335,000 travellers in June.

Malaga airport now serves around 125 destinations and 69 companies now use it as a base.

As well as the improvements to the airport terminals, the car parks have been improved with specific drop off areas, short stay and long stay car parks next to the terminal and a huge car park for car rental pickup and drop off. There is a huge choice of car rental companies based on the airport or on the approach to the terminals so if you are thinking of a visit, check the internet for the cheapest price.

In the last few weeks the new approach road has opened and this now takes you right up to the departure drop off area and the car parks, making access much easier.

The British and German markets are the two most common countries of origin for travellers at the airport with visitor numbers on the increase.

For people flying in from the UK, you are spoilt for choice as to which airports and airlines you can use in the UK to get to Malaga and once there you have the whole of Andalucia to explore.


On a personal note, we are situated inland towards Granada and only 1hr by motorway from the airport.

Hotel Occupancy

Hotels in Andalucia have enjoyed an increase of over 4% in room occupancy for July 2013 as more visitors from home and abroad enjoyed a holiday in this part of Spain. Its estimated that hotels in Southern Spain had 1.6 million travellers use

them in July and half of the guests were Spanish, according to the Tourist Board. This figure made Andalucia the third most popular tourist destination in Spain, behind the Balearic Islands and Cataluna and is the third consecutive month in which hotels occupancy has increased over 2012.

It's a good job that tourists keep coming to Spain otherwise I think the recession would be even worse than it is. As far as we are concerned, with our little holiday business, August and September have been really busy with guests. We had our guests, Stephen and Annmarie, put the newly refurbished casitas bedrooms to the test for the first time and everything seemed to be OK and we look forward to their return visit next year.

Andalucia beaches stripped of Blue Flag

Although the number of visitors to this part of Spain has increased, many of whom will holiday on the coast, a number of beaches have had their Blue Flag status revoked.

In all a total of 15 beaches have been affected, with the most common reasons being the lack of lifeguards and cleanliness. Although you might think this a lot of beaches, there are still hundreds, if not thousands along the Andalucian coast line that are fantastic and offer a great place to holiday, swim and sunbath.

Obviously, being 65 miles inland from the nearest beach (none of which are affected) this doesn't make much difference to us or our guests enjoyment of a holiday with us.

Jellyfish Problem

Staying on the subject of beaches, there has been a surge in the number of jellyfish on Spanish beaches this summer. It has been blamed on over fishing which has left more food for the jellyfish, who can reproduce in a very short time. Greenpeace says that Spanish fishermen have pulled in three times more fish than they are suppose to, which has aggravated the problem. In some areas of the Mediterranean there are up to 40 jellyfish per square metre of sea. The usual breeds of jellyfish in the Med do not sting, but the rise in sea temperature has led to stinging





jellyfish travelling from the Red sea and up the Suez Canal and into the Med. This increase has led to the Spanish government introducing warning flags on some beaches to warn holiday makers of any presence of jellyfish in the sea.

Record Debts

Despite a feeling that the recession over here might be ending, bank loans have reached a record high. Bad debt mainly caused by defaulting property loans, now accounts for over 11% of the country's total credit, the highest level since November 2012. Despite this news, many economists feel that Spain is over the worst and could return to growth later this year.

In our village of Tocon, it is obvious how the recession has affected local businesses. At the moment the village has 9 bars, 2 small supermarkets, a bread shop, fish shop, hairdressers, a couple of hardware stores and a large builders merchants. However, as you drive around the village there are 2 closed bars, a closed bank and 6 closed shops as well as many houses for sale or half built. I don't think Tocon is any different to numerous small villages in Spain (or the UK) who have all suffered badly over the last 5 years or so. Lets hope the recovery comes sooner rather than later.

Fiestas

Our village had its last fiesta of the season on the 8th September, kicking off with a procession around the village, followed by plenty of drinking and dancing in the village square. Despite the apparent lack of money, there were plenty of people about, all having a good time.

My daughter and family came out for a couple of weeks in September so we all went to the big fiesta in Huetor Tajar were they have a fun fair, food stalls, market stalls and plenty of live music. Once again the place was really busy and, of course, the next day many of the businesses in that town stay closed as the fiesta doesn't finish till the early hours.

An 'Insurance Survival Guide' for homeowners in Cottingham

ix years on, the legacy of the 2007 flood is still causing an insurance nightmare for many residents of Hull and Cottingham according to local insurance broker, Anne Walters of Hedon Insurance. Refusal of cover, high excesses and, in some cases, refused claims (due to failure to disclose the flooding risk) have all been encountered by local residents. Few Insurance firms are better placed to comment on the subject than local broker, Hedon Insurance, having insured a fair number of the properties affected by the 2007 storm. Anne has helped produce this article for readers of the Cottingham Times.

It still seems amazing, but in a 24 hour period between 25th and 26th June 2007, 100mm (about 4") of rain fell on Hull and the surrounding district, causing devastation to almost 9 000 homes. It was likened at the time to 20 Olympic sized swimming pools falling on the town every second.

'It was a terrible time. People who we had insured for years, their homes devastated. Claims systems were in meltdown. Trying to keep everybody happy. It was frustration on a grand scale' recalls Anne.

The cost of property insurance claims locally was enormous, running into hundreds of millions of pounds. It wasn't therefore surprising, that despite scientific declarations that it was a 'one in a hundred years event', in the face of so many claims most of the UK's leading insurers needed some convincing that it would be another 99 years before those conditions would be seen again!

Naturally, insurers would need to view the risks posed by properties in the region differently and they would need to reflect the recent local claims position in premiums going forward, but many reacted poorly and unfairly in the years following the flood and some have continued to do so since.

'What happened is very difficult for insurers to legislate for' explains Anne 'Floods tend to be caused by high sea levels or rivers and streams breaking their banks – this flooding was caused by a failure of the region's drainage system, on a scale which has rarely been witnessed'

'Insurers ask questions such as: 'Do you live near water?' or 'has your home ever flooded?' or 'is it at risk of flooding?' A lot of people in our area would have to answer 'yes' to one of those questions now.'

And so the problems begin. 'Failure to disclose a known flood risk is likely to invalidate your property insurance in the event of a claim – so, don't be tempted to 'gloss over' the subject - as you really will be wasting your time and money as, in the event of a future claim, the insurer will check previous flood data and will then refuse your claim.' Anne warns.

'A lot of 'online' insurance quote systems will either not ask about flood risks specifically, or if a question about flooding is included the system will typically decline to quote, if you answer yes – so, people just change their answer to get a quote! Unbelievable. But true 'Anne adds.

The key to getting the best terms for cover that will stand up to the test of a claim is to be absolutely honest when answering all the questions on the insurance proposal form. If you have made a claim previously – remember to mention it and include the important details

People who live in an area that has flooded in the past or is known to be prone to flooding – such as Cottingham - really should consider utilising the services of a good local insurance broker, someone who understands local factors and the 'attitudes' of insurers.

Even with a previous claim for flooding or secondary flooding, there are now companies that will offer reasonable terms to customers of Hedon Insurance, because the staff at Hedon Insurance have taken the time to explain the local factors to underwriters in order to get some insurers to look at quotes on a 'case by case' basis. 'With few exceptions, we can still get competitive cover for customers in affected areas. 'Anne adds, reassuringly.






