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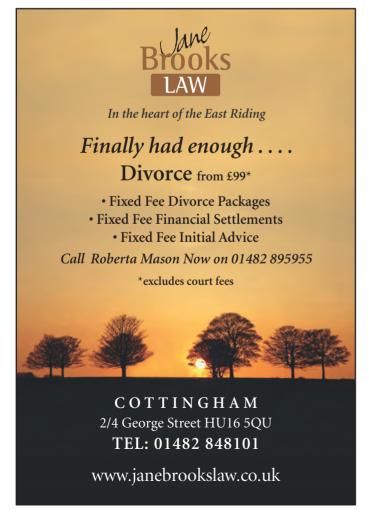

Property News from Martin English of Homelink

Fire Safety Regulations in Rental Property

Vollowing October the 1st 2015 and the introduction of the 'The Smoke d and Carbon Monoxide Alarm (England) Regulations 2015' all rental properties have specific regulations concerning smoke and CO alarms.

HMO (House in Multiple Occupation) have additional safety and fire regulations to follow with the Fire Safety Order 2005 requiring landlord to perform certain duties including a Risk Assessment on their HMO in respect to fire safety.

Do landlords need to fit a smoke alarm in a rental property?

Following the introduction of The Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Alarm (England) Regulations 2015 from the 1st October 2015 smoke alarms and in certain circumstances, Carbon Monoxide Alarms are a mandatory requirement.

What are the smoke and carbon monoxide alarm requirements?

A rental property requires a minimum of one smoke alarm per floor, alongside this landlords and agents are required to have a Carbon Monoxide monitor in any living area where a solid fuel burning appliance is located.

What happens if you don't comply?

If a landlord fails to comply with the new regulations they could face a fine of up to £5,000

The complication comes in the detail of the legislation. For instance, what happens where a tenant disconnects or takes out the batteries in the new fire alarm? Is it really the landlords' responsibility to ensure that the property is regularly inspected to ensure that the fire alarm is working or has not been disconnected, and if so, how often should a landlord inspect the fire or carbon monoxide alarm and does a landlord have to ensure that their letting agent does the same? Your agent should be able to advise you on how to handle these type of circumstances

What type of smoke alarm should I install?

The legislation is not prescriptive about what type of fire alarm or carbon monoxide alarm needs to be fitted. Prior to the new regulations properties built before 1992 landlords were allowed to install battery operated alarms. Residential buildings built or refurbished after 1992 are required to have a mains wired smoke alarm

Who is responsible for testing and maintaining the fire alarms?

Landlords need to include a document possibly in their tenancy pack with the clear instruction that tenants need to test and be responsible for the replacement of any batteries required by the fire alarm. This instruction sheet should be included alongside the copy of the tenancy agreement, the property inventory and any appliance operating instructions, or emergency procedures information as part as a moving in pack given to tenants.

It is important for landlords to determine who is responsible for the testing and maintaining of the smoke alarms, whether the landlord, letting agent or tenant. If the letting agent is to be responsible, this should be noted in the management contract. If the tenant is to be made responsible for this then, adequate warnings must be given in writing by the landlord that this is the

It is however the Landlords responsibility to ensure that any supplied detectors are working at the start of a tenancy from the 1st October 2015. The emphasis placed here is that the detector is working at the start of the tenancy and documentation to state that this has been tested as working is highly recommended as part of your move in process.

Fire Extinguishers in a Rental Property

There is no compulsory requirement for landlords to provide fire extinguishers or fire blankets in normal tenanted properties, but again, this may be a wise precaution by landlords, in areas such as the kitchen.

It is important to remember if you do make the commitment to provide fire extinguishers to a rental property, you need to be aware that a 12 monthly service of the equipment needs to be carried out. By providing a fire extinguisher it becomes your responsibility to have it regularly serviced.

Regulations on furniture in a rental property

Regulations on fire safety do apply to any furniture and furnishings in a rental property and you should always check to ensure that any soft furnishings contain a fire safety label.

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Minimum Wage Rises - Alex Green, Employment Lawyer at Graham and Rosen Solicitors www.graham-rosen.co.uk looks at the National Minimum Wage and the effect of the new Living Wage on workers and employers.



National Minimum Wage was introduced by the Government in 1999 as a way of making sure that all workers received a basic standard wage. When the NMW was introduced the adult rate was £3.60 per hour. Over the years the rates have increased on a regular basis and from 1 October, they are rising again. The new NMW is £6.70 per hour for workers over 21, £5.30 per hour for 18 to 20 year olds and £3.87 for 16 to 17 year olds. The apprentice rate is £3.30 per hour.

All employees are entitled to receive these minimum wage rates from 1 October.

The Government has announced a further change to the NMW from April 2016. Workers aged 25 and above will be entitled to receive at least £7.20 an hour and there is a target of increasing this to £9.00 per hour by 2020. This rate will apply to both part time and full time workers.

The increase for over 25's is part of the Government's policy of introducing a National Living Wage, defined as a wage which is high enough to maintain a normal standard of living.

If employees are paid below the minimum rates, they are entitled to take legal action against their employers to recover the shortfall. Also employers can be subject to enforcement action by HM Revenue & Customs. HMRC enforces minimum wages and can issue a formal Notice of Underpayment to get employers to comply. If employers ignore the Notice, they can require the employer to pay a penalty of up to £20,000. HMRC can also "name and shame" underpaying employers.

Some employers have warned that increased wages will lead to job losses and it remains to be seen whether the National Living Wage achieves the Government's ambition of benefiting workers or whether it will have a detrimental effect on small businesses.

Windows 10 News and Updates

indows 10 news. Well it's been two months since the launch of the new Windows version from Microsoft. Feedback from new users has been generally very positive, and certainly an improvement on version 8. But the dilemma whether to upgrade or not continues, as the upgrade process on existing computers is still not problem free. Main issues tend to be around printers and scanners, email and in a few cases graphics, where the screen goes haywire! So my advice on balance would still be to hold off until manufacturers of printers etc. get up to date with new driver software. If you're not too worried about that or ready to buy a new printer anyway, then you may be ok, but it's still a bit of a lottery with some of the other issues mentioned above.

So what's good about Windows 10? It's quite fast, and the Start button/menu of course, with Windows 8 type apps clinging to the side of the menu, but you can customize or remove these to your taste. Only one Desktop, not a start screen as well. The Windows 8 'upside-down' version of Internet Explorer has gone, to be replaced by a new browser called Edge with the address bar in the normal place. The only slight annoyance I find is that when you launch Edge (still a blue e icon), it comes up with a bar saying 'where to next' and when you start typing it disappears whilst the rest of the page loads, so it seems you have to wait a second or so. If you use Chrome or Firefox, these work exactly the same as they always did. If you like using voice capability like Apple's Siri etc., then Windows 10 comes with Cortana, a built-in voice activated assistant. Once set up by answering a few questions using your keyboard or mouse, it is activated by saying 'Hey Siri' and then your question.

In case you do go for the upgrade now, check you also have the latest apps and program versions. Ones that I know are compatible with Windows 10 are: Microsoft Office 2007, 2010 (but NOT the free 2010 Starter edition) and of course 2013 and 365. ESET v8, Malwarebytes latest, Adobe Reader X, Google Chrome & Earth, Firefox 37.02 and CCleaner. If you have any other anti virus product, or any other programs that you don't want to lose it would be a good idea to check with the software company first.

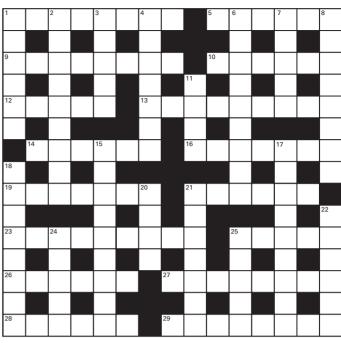

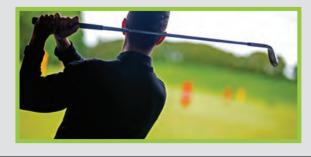
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Bramley Apples are widely considered to be the cook's choice for cooking apples and have become one of the most popular cooking apples used in the UK, available to buy all year. They have a tart flavour which is generally not suitable to eat raw plus the added bonus of an excellent texture when cooked. They also have a higher acidity which lends for a stronger more "appley" taste.

History of Bramley Apples

The Bramley apple hails from Nottinghamshire UK. A young girl called Mary Ann Brailsford who lived in Southwell, Nottinghamshire is believed to have sown some apple pips in her garden between 1809 and 1813 one of which grew into the first Bramley apple tree. Unfortunately, it isn't known from where she got the original pips, however the nature of sowing seed from fruit is that they often don't mirror the original plant so it is safe to say that the original fruit from where she took the pip bore little resemblance to today's Bramleys.

By 1837 the tree was bearing its first fruit and in 1846 Matthew Bramley, a local butcher, bought the cottage complete with garden and tree. It was whilst he was there that a local nurseryman called Henry Merryweather recognised the commercial potential of the fruit and asked if he could take cuttings from the tree which would reproduce true to type specimens. Mr Bramley agreed, with the proviso that the apples should be named after him.

2009 was the bicentenary of the Bramley apple, marking 200 years since the pip which grew into the first Bramley apple tree was sown and apparently, the original tree is still bearing fruit today.

Apple Crumble

Ingredients
450g/1lb Cooking Apples, peeled and cored
75g-100g/3 - 4oz Sugar
Water
For the Crumble
175g/6oz Flour
75g/3oz Butter
100g/4oz Sugar

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C, 375F, Gas mark 5 and grease an ovenproof dish.
- 2. Cut the apples into 2.5cm/1-inch chunks then place in a saucepan with 2-3 tablespoons of water. Sprinkle over the sugar (according to how sweet the fruit is) and cook over a low heat for 10 minutes, stirring from time to time.
- 3. Meanwhile, in a large mixing bowl, rub the butter into the flour with your fingertips until it resembles breadcrumbs then stir in the sugar and mix well.
- 4. Taste the apple mixture and stir in a little more sugar if necessary, then transfer to the greased ovenproof dish and top with half the crumble mixture pressing firmly.
- 5. Sprinkle the remaining crumble mixture evenly over the top and bake in the oven for 20-25 minutes until crisp and golden brown. Serve hot or cold.

Traditional Apple Pie

Ingredients

225g/8oz Plain Flour

A pinch of Salt

100g/4oz Margarine

675g/11/2lb Cooking Apples e.g. Bramleys

100g/4oz Brown Sugar

1/2 teasp Ground Cinnamon

1/2 teasp Grated Nutmeg

1/4 teasp Ground cloves

50g/2oz Sultanas

1 Egg Yolk

A little Milk

1 tbsp Caster Sugar

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400F, 200C, Gas mark 6.
- 2. Sieve the flour and salt into a bowl and rub in the butter until it resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add enough water to make a firm dough.
- 3. Peel, core and thickly slice the apples into a bowl. Add the brown sugar, spices and sultanas and mix well. Place in a buttered pie dish and sprinkle with 2 tbsp of water.
- 4. Roll out the pastry and cover the pie dish, trimming any excess pastry off with a knife. Decorate the top with leaves or other shapes made out of the pastry trimmings. Brush with the egg yolk and milk mixture, sprinkle with caster sugar.
- 5. Cook in the centre of the oven for 20 minutes. Reduce heat to 350F, 180C, Gas mark 4 and cook for a further 20 minutes.





Ratatouille

Ingredients

- 2 Large Aubergines, (eggplant)
- 2 large Courgettes, (Zucchini)
- Salt and Pepper
- 120ml/4 fl.oz. Olive Oil
- 2 Large Onions, thinly sliced
- 3 tbsp Tomato Puree
- 3 Garlic Cloves, chopped
- 2 Large Capsicums, (sweet peppers) cut into thick strips
- 4 Tomatoes, skinned and chopped
- ½ tbsp Freshly chopped Coriander
- A pinch of cinnamon
- 1 teasp Freshly chopped Basil

Instructions

- 1. Cut the halved aubergines (eggplant) and courgettes (zucchini) across in slices about 2.5cm/1 inch thick and arrange in layers in a colander, sprinkling each layer with salt. Top with a weighted plate and leave to drain for 1 hour.
- 2. Heat the oil in a pan, add the onions and gently fry for 5-8 minutes until soft and transparent. Stir in the tomato puree and cook for a further 3 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 3. Rinse the aubergines and courgettes under running cold water then dry on kitchen paper. Add to the onions together with the garlic and peppers. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes.
- 4. Add the tomatoes, coriander, cinnamon, basil, salt and pepper. Mix well then cover and leave to cook for a further 40 minutes. Remove the lid for the final 5-7 minutes to allow the sauce to reduce if necessary. Serve hot.



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Braised Pork Chops with Apples

Ingredients

- 4 Pork Chops
 - Salt and Pepper
 - 1/2 teasp dried Thyme
 - 2 Apples, peeled cored and cut into eighths
 - 2 Onions, cut into rings
 - 25g/1oz Butter
 - 1 tbsp Olive Oil
 - 90ml/3 fl.oz. Water
 - 2 Teasp Worcester Sauce
 - Fresh Parsley to garnish

Instructions

- 1. Season the meat with salt and pepper and brown on both in the melted butter and oil.
- 2. Add the water and Worcestershire sauce and thyme and cook for 10 minutes turning once.
- 3. Add the apples and onions, reduce heat, cover and cook for a further 30 minutes.
- 4. Serve garnished with parsley.



Herby Tomato Bruschetta

Ingredients

- 450g/1lb Ripe Tomatoes, chopped
- 1 tbsp freshly chopped Basil Leaves
- 1 tbsp freshly chopped Marjoram
- 1 tbsp freshly chopped Parsley
- 2 Garlic Cloves, finely chopped
- 1 tbsp Balsamic Vinegar
- 1 tbsp Olive Oil
- 1 teasp Lime or Lemon Juice
- Salt and Black Pepper
- 8 x 2.5cm/1-inch thick slices of Baguette, toasted

Instructions

- 1. Place the tomatoes, herbs and vinegar, oil and lime juice in a large mixing bowl, season with salt and pepper and mix well.
- 2. To serve Place the toasted bread on a serving platter and spoon the tomato mixture over the top. Serve at room temperature.

New Zealand's Sauvignon Blanc

I mentioned a couple of months ago in this column how Sauvignon Blanc had become the most popular grape variety among wine consumers in the UK. And although there are great examples from all over the world (in that column, I was highlighting the Sauvignon Blanc-based Bordeaux wines produced in France), by far the most popular Sauvignon Blanc here comes from New Zealand.

In fact, the grape has become synonymous with that country's wine. Its success put New Zealand well and truly on the wine map as a major producer and shows no sign of abating.

Sauvignon Blanc is New Zealand's most widely-cultivated grape variety and Marlborough, situated at the north-eastern tip of the South Island, is the country's most important wine region. Home to a host of brilliant winemakers, including the iconic Cloudy Bay winery, the Sauvignon Blanc from here has intense, unmistakable, flavours of gooseberry, passionfruit and tropical fruit. There's hints of pepper and other notes include fresh cut grass, tomato stalks or limes.

I often describe a glass of New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc as like diving into an old-fashioned country hedgerow on a summer's day.

The explosive varietal that awoke the world to New Zealand wine is a relatively modern phenomenon - the first Marlborough vines were only being planted in the early 1970s, with the first commercial quantities of the wine following by the end of the decade. By the early 1990s, however, NZ Sauvignon Blanc was riding an international wave of success.

Here, when dining out or ordering a glass of wine in the pub we're most likely to ask for Sauvignon Blanc, much in the same way as we did Chardonnay in the 1980s.

If you read Marlborough on a bottle of Sauvignon Blanc chances are you won't go wrong but there are some great brands to look out for. I've already mentioned Cloudy Bay (well over-priced, I have to say, simply because of the reputation it has garnered) but I love Wither Hills, The Ned and, if you can find it, examples from the Isabel winery.

Villa Maria is another brand you can't go wrong with and this month the Cottingham Times has secured a case of six bottles of their Sauvignon Blanc to give away to one lucky reader. 100 per cent New Zealand and family-owned, Villa Maria has been New Zealand's most awarded winery for more than 30 years.

The winery's flagship wine is the Villa Maria Private Bin Sauvignon Blanc and it's bottles of the new 2015 vintage which has just been released in the UK that can be won in our free-to-enter competition.

Each year the eagerly-awaited new vintage of this wine displays the results of the harvest – the most exciting but often the most challenging time of the winemaker's year. A time of celebration at the Olive Garden Bistro in Cottingham

t's been a time of celebration at Cottingham's Olive Garden bistro. The popular Hallgate eatery goes from strength to strength, reflected by a change in ownership which has seen former head chef Giovanni Calvia take full control of the business.

Giovanni succeeded previous owner Ben Bazmi as summer began; but there was more joy marked by a brief return to Italy for his marriage to Stefania. Together they now have big plans to take the Olive Garden to a whole new level.

"It's my first restaurant in the UK and I really want to stamp my personality on the place," he told the Cottingham Times. "I want people to enjoy the experience of coming to the Olive Garden. I want us to be the busiest and best bistro in the Cottingham area.

"I have lots of plans and ambitions but a restaurant is like a baby . . . it has to grow slowly and develop with lots of love and attention. That's what I think I can bring - I have all the technique and the knowledge from years of working in restaurants here and in Italy. But apart from a small, seasonal, restaurant in my home town, this is the first time I have had full control and can put my ideas into practice," he said.

As a popular all-day destination, the Olive Garden can offer breakfasts from 10am every morning, except Mondays when it is closed, a bistro menu offering Italian dishes and lighter meals at lunchtimes and a more adventurous dining menu in the evenings. In between, there's always tea, coffee, cakes and snacks on the go.

Fully licensed, the Olive Garden also offers a full range of beers and wines.

"We want people to come and see what we have to offer in the confidence that they will enjoy the experience and return again and again," said Giovanni. "This is my life; it's not just about making money and my approach is to treat the customer as if they were a guest in my own home.

"I want people to feel that we have time for them and can sit and chat. In Italy we are renowned for being



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really friendly and welcoming and that's what I want the Olive Garden to be known for as well as the good food we offer," he said.

For at least the next month, to tempt people in, the Olive Garden has a lunchtime special offer, with all pizza and pasta dishes priced at just £5. "You could go to the supermarket and buy a sandwich and drink and pay just as much, if not more, so we want people to come here and experience good food and relax as they take time out during their busy day," Giovanni said.

He told us: "Our pizzas are made following my family recipe using only Italian flour, water, mother yeast and extra virgin olive oil. We leave the dough resting more than 48 hours before using it, to make it very crispy, light and easy to digest."

Evenings see an ever-changing "specials" menu; on the day we called there, there was monkfish with courgette cream and baby broccoli (£12), scallops with dry tomato paste and artichokes (£10), linguini with clams, fresh tomatoes and white wine (£11), pork liver with caramelised onion and mushrooms (£10) and cod tempura with mozzarella (£10) among other offerings.

"I have been able to change all our suppliers and buy as much as we can locally to ensure the freshest and best ingredients," said Giovanni.

At last month's Cottingham Food Festival, and with the sun doing its best to draw the crowds, the Olive Garden was proving a big draw, with both the outside terrace and the restaurant drawing a constant stream of customers. Giovanni was doing his bit too, opening the festival's food theatre with a cookery demonstration.

"I love Cottingham and Cottingham people and it was a great opportunity for me to get involved in village activities," he said.

Remember, Remember, the 5th of November

Lean't believe we are already into October. After enjoying the long hot days of summer, we now awake to dark, misty mornings and end the day with just as dark dreary nights. Where has the rest of the year gone? My late mum always used to say, as you get older time goes by more quickly and she couldn't have been more right. As a child (and subsequently, my 3 daughters), I used to look forward to Hull Fair, followed by Halloween, Bonfire Night, (and the Cottingham Lights) and finally the excitement of Christmas...all over a period of 3 months and that to me was an eternity. Now, I hardly have any time at all after the summer period to even think about these forthcoming events let alone prepare for them but with 3 grandsons paving the way to excitement, I am sure I will be swept along with things.

It was whilst thinking about all this, my mind wandered to November 5th as it brought back so many happy childhood memories of excitement and wonder watching the bright miracles that unfolded into the night sky. I was more in awe of the spectacle bursting above our heads than the loud bangs which penetrated our ears but how that as changed, due mainly to being a pet owner. What a shame this spectacle isn't just confined to one night as the history books had written. After all, the intention was to celebrate the foiling of Guy Fawkes gunpowder plot to burn down the





Houses of Parliament on 5th November 1605. A once a year celebration I am sure we could all cope with, so why is it now spread across the following two months up to New Years Eve? I wish I had the answer but it is because of this long stretch of continuous 'BANGS' and 'SCREECHES' and the knowing of how animals react to such noises we, as responsible pet owners, tend to dread the next few months.

Firstly, we have to recognise the symptoms of stress. Some are obvious, for example, shaking, hiding, panting or seeking constant attention from yourself. Others may be destructive like my first dog who bit through a wooden stool or may show aggression and as in the case of dogs, barking endlessly. As a rule an animal exposed to a variety of sights and sounds from an early age is better prepared to cope with all experiences. There is however no guarantee that they will not show a fearful reaction later in life.

We can now plan ahead over this month ready for the event. Please come and talk to one of our many experienced nurses at KINGSTON about pheromone diffusers. These plug-ins disperse calming agents into the room and may be a good option in the case of your dog or cat. We also have many similar products which give an equal effect. You could also provide a 'safe haven' being a quiet area or a chosen room. It should be a place where your pet feels in control so please don't interfere with them when they are in this area. Train your pet to associate this area with positive experiences such as leaving toys, swapping them regularly and putting them away when not in use so your pet does not get bored with them. In time they will become accustomed to this, treating it as being safe play so when the 5th comes it will realise no harm will come to them. It is very important that access to this haven is available when you are not at home

What can we do to help ease the anxiety/fear it causes in our beloved pets when the season begins? Uppermost is the hiding place followed by....

- a) At dusk close all windows and curtains and put on the TV. These will mask and muffle all sound and sights outside.
- b) If your pet shows any sign of fear, try to ignore their behaviour. I know this could be difficult when your dog is doing a fantastic impersonation of Long Johns parrot on your shoulder but they do not understand the English language. They pick up our signals and emotions so a "There there don't be afraid" can be translated to "Help I need you to guard me". By ignoring your pet and carrying on with your usual evening routine, it will help to instigate a calm aura around the house.
- c) Never punish or over fuss with your pet when it is scared. This will only make matters worse.
- d) Ideally pets should be micro-chipped but more so around this season just in case they are frightened and escape.

Please also do not forget our very small friends ie: Rabbits, Guinea pigs etc. Invariably they are usually kept outside so move them, if possible, inside (shed/garage), and cover the hutch to blot out any bright lights.

Finally in the case of dogs, they will likely need a walk before dusk. If this is the case, please be aware of the most probable dangers in using an extending lead. I know I have mentioned in past articles, the dangers and hazards these leads may cause when used on public footpaths but it is highlighted even more at this time of year. It is so difficult to control a 'bolting' dog on the end of 4 metres of string after a sudden loud BANG! The pavements are very close to the road so both dog and car do not stand a chance. Please try to use a normal lead whenever possible and keep the extending one for the park.

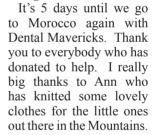

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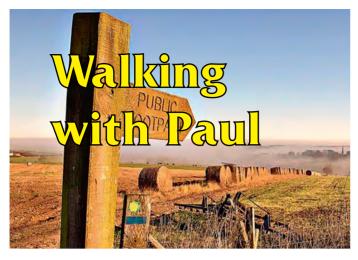

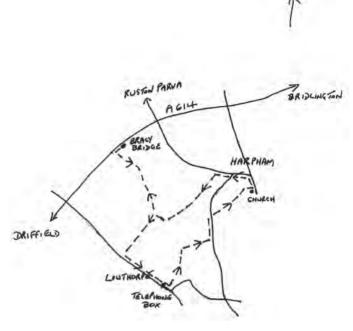

Start at GR.TA 077620 Bracey Bridge Lay-by. Distance 5.0 Miles.

eave the lay-by via a Kissing Gate adjacent to a metal gate on the south side of the lay-by and follow a farm track for about 300 metres and then locate and pass through a

Kissing Gate on the right and continue along a grass track.

On reaching the next Kissing Gate, pass through and turn right (sign posted Lowthorpe Church). Pass through another Kissing Gate adjacent to two metal gates and eventually emerge onto Lowthorpe Road and turn left.

Follow the road into the village of Lowthorpe and on reaching a red telephone box, locate a Kissing Gate in the hedge on the left and pass through the gate and proceed across the middle of this field and pass through another Kissing Gate and cross a wooden footbridge to enter a field. Walk across this field aiming for a Kissing Gate and turn left immediately after passing through the gate and then after about 100 metres turn right and walk along a path with fences on both sides and a belt of trees on the right. Path can be overgrown in summer)

At the end of this enclosed path, enter a field and walk with the hedge on the left and then on reaching a dyke, keep this on the left until reaching a wooden bridge, cross this and then almost immediately cross a timber foot bridge over a stream (Lowthorpe Beck) and follow the path to emerge on Harpham road. Turn left and follow the road for about 300 metres to where the road bends to the right.

Locate a Kissing Gate on the right and after passing through head diagonally across the field aiming for the church, cross a wooden foot bridge and continue in the same direction to pass through a kissing Gate, then turn left and keep the hedge to the left, pass the Well and continue to pass the Tennis Courts on the right. Immediately after passing the Tennis Courts turn right and pass through two metal Kissing Gates to emerge onto a cul de sac and then onto the road. Turn left and follow this road to the cross roads and turn left.

Walk through the village passing the St. Quintin Arms Inn and Station Road. When the road bends to the left, take the farm access road on the left and pass the farm buildings keeping them on the left. Further along cross a bridge spanning Lowthorpe Beck and continue along the track. On reaching the end of the track, pass through a Kissing Gate on the right and walk diagonally across the field to pass through another Kissing Gate. After passing Bracey Bridge Mill on the right, pass through a Kissing Gate and follow the track back to the lay-by.

ctober is here, which means Autumn is officially here too. The weather is cooler and the nights are starting to draw in. There is still plenty to do in the garden, some gardeners actually prefer the cooler conditions as they are more comfortable to work in.

Remember that Autumn is the ideal season to plant all kinds of things in the garden from vegetables, seeding lawns, shrubs and perennials to evergreen, fruit, and deciduous trees. You can carry on mowing your lawn through October depending on how much rain we have but it is advisable to raise your mower blade to a higher setting.



Hedging guide

Now is the perfect time to plant hedging. Hedging is great to create walls, shape and texture in your garden. They are also good for wildlife as birds love nesting in them.

Here is our easy step guide to planting a hedge devised by our horticultural manager

- 1. Dig a trench 1 ft by 8 inches deep the length of your hedge
- 2. Feed soil with bone meal and dig in soil improver such as rose, tree and shrub planting compost
- 3. Place your plants 12 to 18 inches apart for 2 Litre plants and 18 to 24 inches apart for larger plants
- 4. Plant your hedge making sure that the root ball is no more than ½ inch below soil level
- 5. Give plants a good watering (approximately a 5 Litre watering can per plant) after initial planting
- 6. Water morning and evening in dry conditions for the 1st year

What is Organic Gardening?

Gardening organically means growing plants without manufactured fertilisers and other synthetic chemicals for feeding, pest and disease control, soil conditioning or weeding. Although often regarded as an alternative to gardening with chemicals, many organic techniques are simply good practices and compatible with other forms of gardening.

Excluding manufactured chemicals when growing ornamental plants, lawns, fruit and vegetables brings some challenges.

On the plus side, organic gardening is beneficial to the environment, provides a more attractive home to wildlife and, by cultivating fruit and vegetables organically, you'll know your tasty produce is chemical free. So bearing all this in mind, you may choose to go wholly organic or to combine organic techniques with a reduction in chemicals, using them only as necessary to maintain soil fertility and deal with the most damaging pests, diseases and weeds.

Organic Weed control

Chemical weed killers are a very attractive and effective solution to eliminate weeds. There are not always better alternatives in the organic range that are as effective but they are a lot kinder to the environment and beneficial to

wildlife and their habitats. You have to decide where you can use organic methods and where you can't and try and achieve the best balance you can.

Wherever possible, try to avoid weed killers by hand weeding or hoeing and try to tackle weed problems before they produce and disperse their seeds and heavy infestations develop. In addition, prevention is much better than cure, so carefully prepare sites prior to planting and incorporate weed barriers to reduce the chance of weed infestation.

PREPARATION: When preparing a planting site, ensure all perennial weeds such as couch grass, nettles and brambles are removed by digging out with a fork.

Remove annual weeds by hand or in dry weather use a hoe to cut off weeds from their roots.

BARRIERS: Different options are available to gardeners to help smother or prevent weed growth. Mulching with a 5–8cm layer of organic material such as garden compost, well-rotted farmyard manure, spent mushroom compost or cocoa shell helps smother annual weeds.

Alternatively, plastic sheets, old carpet, carpet underlay or other fabricated material can be used to suppress annual and perennial weeds. In ornamental garden situations, ground-cover plants provide a more attractive weed-suppressing alternative. A barrier of heavy gauge black polythene can be sunk to prevent perennial weeds from growing into an area from an adjoining garden.

ALTERNATIVE METHODS: Paint-on gels are ideal for treating perennial weeds such as bindweed as the weed killer is absorbed through the leaves and down to the roots, without the worry of spray drift on to other plants. They are also the best way to treat odd nettles or brambles cropping up in a hedge or densely planted border, as you can apply them specifically to a certain area.

October's plant of the month is conifers. 26th September -3rd October - National Conifer Week

This week is all about celebrating conifers. From a small balcony with room for a container, to acres of grounds with space, conifers can add something truly special to any garden. Conifers are also a wonderful way to bring gorgeous colour, structure and drama to a garden all year round, whether as a backdrop, a standalone feature, or in a border with other plants. They are extremely versatile, coming in an amazingly diverse range of shades, textures, shapes and sizes. Being hardy, easy to care for and long-lasting, conifers are the ideal choice for the gardener looking for a low maintenance but high impact plant.

From the early days of climbing in their branches, to the family pilgrimage we took to the Californian giant redwoods. 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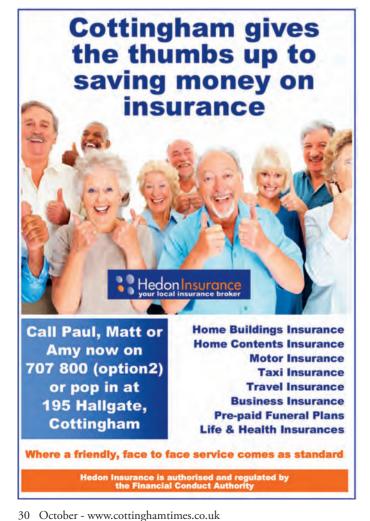

nitters of all abilities who would like to meet like minded people in a friendly, fun and social setting are invited to join a new 'Knit and Natter' group which has been launched at East Riding Carers Support Service.

The aim of the group, which meets every Monday from 10am-12noon, is to give carers who knit and craft the chance to socialise, indulge their creative sides, and support a good cause.

Evelyn, known affectionately by her family as 'granny knit', said: "It's all about doing something which we already enjoy doing but helping someone who perhaps is less fortunate than yourselves at the same time."

Evelyn, 78, cared for her husband until he recently moved into residential care and now she says the knit and natter group is an essential part of her life after caring.

Fellow Knit and Natter group member Berris Robinson, 71, who is also a carer and is cared for, said the group is a vital outlet for her too

Berris said: "What I love about our Knit and Natter group is the fact that I'm doing something for a good cause.

"If I wasn't doing this I would be stuck in the house because I don't get out, so this gives me the opportunity to get out, to socialise and to create something that we hope makes a difference to others."

So far the knitters have created a whole range of items, including comfort blankets, trauma teddies for babies who have been particularly brave in hospital, and dresses for 'angel babies' who have passed away.

Jess Laughton, who founded Tiny Treasures said: "The support from people either making items to donate, helping fundraise or donating supplies to make the items has been absolutely fantastic and has far exceeded my expectations. Without these people we wouldn't be able to support the hospitals like we do.

"Although the primary aim of Tiny Treasures is to send the items needed to the hospitals I know we have also managed to help a lot of people find a purpose again, myself included, and it is lovely to see that happen."

Anyone who is unable to attend the group but would like to support their work can donate items such as unwanted wool, ribbons, and buttons. Anything surplus to requirement is sold to raise money to cover the cost of posting the items to hospitals.

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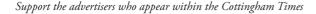

An essential piece of Young Horse Training

Toung horses are no different than very young children when it comes to learning about life, boundaries, social interaction and its acceptable behaviours. They have not yet learned to control emotion driven impulses. Life should be filled with inquisitiveness and exploration. Learning life skills through rewarding experiences rather than punishing ones. They will be quick to frustration, as are children, when working out what is or what is not wanted or being asked of them. Learning how to handle their impulses and accept the boundaries being taught, is one big section in development.

I see a lot of young horses who, for whatever reason, cannot stand still. This is a skill which can take a long time in us all, animals and pets being no different. Calmness comes with the patience learned from good experience and lots of repetitions. If that young horse who cannot stand still is on a rope from its handler then there is inevitably rather a lot of tugging and pulling back on the rope in order to gain or regain control. (Negative).

Take that rope off and you have no chance of training them to stand still when asked or to remain calm and relaxed.....or do you?

If you decide to take the "Clicker or Marker" training route then it certainly is possible to train them to stand in such a way, with the added bonus of being able to build in a voice cue for stand too.

I have recently had 2 young horses in...Rainy (a Shire horse yearling) and Fifi (a 2 year old Sports horse). Both young horses displayed all the usual, innate behaviours of any young horse and at their arrival time neither had a handle, nor the information, as to how to stand quietly and calmly when asked to do so.

Using a marker noise at the precise second in time an animal does something you would like repeating, followed very quickly by a reinforcer of high value to the individual (small pieces of apple or carrot, a few pony nuts etc. for horses) it is possible to train still feet and build in a calm mind.

One way is to use a mat of some description. A bit of carpet, a car mat or piece of rubber matting.... anything visual and, or, tactile.

The secret is in the timing of course and a sound knowledge of this form of training but it is worth its weight in gold. Once standing still on a mat is developed that mat can be taken anywhere you would like the horse to learn to stand quietly and calmly. For instance, later on in a horses training that mat can be next to a mounting block when training quiet rider acceptance work.....backing and mounting. Slowly introducing equipment like clippers. Farrier work on their feet.....there are 100 ways of utilising this one facet of Clicker/marker training.

Because that station point has been built on a solid, reward based history, the young horse feels great about life and will be far more willing to participate in quiet stand still type training. (Positive).

New taxi legislation will affect East Riding residents

hanges to taxi legislation which come into force in October affecting private hire services could mean the firm you've booked isn't the company picking you up.

The changes come into force on 1, October 2015 and will allow private hire firms based in the East Riding to sub-contract customer bookings to other companies outside the county.

This means that if you make a booking with a firm in the East Riding, that company can pass your booking onto a firm in another area, such as Hull, Scarborough or Selby to come and collect you.

As the customer may not know who is going to be picking them up, East Riding of Yorkshire Council's licensing team are urging people to follow the following advice:

- tell the operator when booking your journey that you wish to be collected by a driver from their company only
- be sure to check if a driver turns up they are licensed and they have your details – do not give this information to the driver yourself
- if you are unsure ring the company you made the booking with to check if it's the right vehicle
- if your journey is sub-contracted to another firm without your permission and you are not happy, next time use a different company and always confirm you do not want your booking sub-contracted to another firm.

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and local partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "We want to make people aware of these important changes as I'm sure people who book with a particular firm do not expect to be picked up by another company they may not

know or trust.

"Licensed drivers in the East Riding are subject to rigorous checks to ensure they are safe and suitable to transport people home

"If you book with an East Riding operator, you have the right to ask for that company to pick you up, which should be requested at the time of booking."

Nippon Gohsei launches new apprenticeship scheme

ippon Gohsei has launched a new apprenticeship scheme to help train its workforce of tomorrow.

The Hull-based chemicals business has taken on its first-ever maintenance apprentices, building on the job creation successes of its operations apprenticeship scheme.

Following an in-depth selection process and working in conjunction with Humberside Engineering Training Association (HETA), Sam Brett, of Cottingham, and Thomas Spencer, of Dunswell, both 16, will start their training in September.

They were chosen from a shortlist of 16 selected from 70 applicants, following an awareness day with HETA at KC Stadium in Hull.

"The calibre of shortlisted candidates was excellent, and that of the applicants in general very high," said Stephen Harrison, maintenance engineer at Nippon Gohsei, who is supervising the new intakes.

"Clearly, there is an appetite from young people in the region to work in the sector and grasp what is a fantastic opportunity to progress careers in a successful, multinational business.

"For us, it gives us access to enthusiastic young people who will become the skilled technicians we need to ensure the smooth running of our business."

The new maintenance apprenticeships, covering mechanical and instrument roles, include 15 months with HETA and Hull College and 18 months training with Nippon Gohsei. In all, including their time as apprentices, the new starters can expect to receive a total of five years training.

Sam, who went to Cottingham High School, said he'd always had an interest in technology and jumped at the chance of working at Nippon Gobsei

"All the way through school and growing up I've liked fixing things and seeing how they work, taking them apart and putting them back together again," he said.

Engineering is high up the list of things to do for Tom, who's ridden and maintained his own Quad bikes since he was 12.

"I wanted to do the apprenticeships as I would learn, earn and get experience at the same time," said Tom, who opted for an apprenticeship over sixth form.

"I generally find it more interesting to do something rather than listen to someone."

The launch of the latest apprenticeship scheme piggybacks off Nippon Gohsei's successful operations apprenticeship scheme, which has seen the addition of at least one apprentice each year into the business since it was launched in 2008.

Nine of the company's 36 operators and shift team leaders have come up through the apprenticeship programme, creating full-time roles in manufacturing positions.

Gary Hyde, Nippon Gohsei's manufacturing support manager, who helped set up the scheme seven years ago with HCF Catch and Hull College, said: "Having maintenance apprenticeships is a new departure for us, but the existing scheme has been so successful in providing us with skilled, reliable full-time operators it seemed the logical next step.

"Before we joined forces with other local Companies for this project there weren't any schemes specific to our industry in the region."

There is currently one apprentice on the operations side, Joshua Thompson, with Liam Watson and Harvey Rayworth having recently completed their apprenticeships and now full-time employees.

The next, new operations apprentice, Luke Whybrow, will be joining the scheme in September.

Nippon Gohsei produces Soarnol, the trade name for ethylene vinyl alcohol (EVOH), which is commonly used as a barrier layer in food packaging and a host of other applications.

It is the UK's only producer of Soarnol and one of only two worldwide and started manufacturing the product at Saltend Chemicals Park in 2004.

It employs 120 people, the majority at Saltend, the remainder at Marfleet Environmental Technology Park facility.

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Residents offered free electric blanket safety checks

Residents thinking about reaching for electric blankets to beat the autumnal chill are being urged to make sure they are safe.

Over the next month, officers from East Riding of Yorkshire Council's trading standards team will be at various locations offering free electric blanket checks.

The safety check will take place at:

Beverley – Tuesday, 20 October between 9.30am to 5.30pm at Beverley library.

Last year, 244 electric blankets were tested as part of the council's continuing programme electric blankets safety checks. Of those checked 44 blankets failed the safety test and were found to be dangerous to use.

The most common reason blankets fail is, that due to their age, a fault has developed in the wiring or they don't have an overheat protection system which is found in modern blankets.

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and local partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Electric blankets are often used by older or vulnerable people so it is important to make sure they are safe.

"Residents may be using dated or dangerous blankets without realising the potential danger they are putting themselves in.

"Industry guidelines recommend a safety check every three years, unless the blanket is damaged or worn but for peace of mind over the winter months I would urge people to take advantage of these free checks."

It takes six minutes to check each electric blanket and it is free of charge to residents but people must make an appointment.

Residents can bring more than one blanket but in order for them to be tested correctly, all controls, cables and plugs must be brought too.

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Anyone who would like to have their electric blankets checked must ensure an appointment is made for each blanket they wish to bring.

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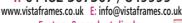
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Rotary Club of Holderness Craft Fair, Saturday 24th October from 10.00 am to 4.00 pm

Residents invited to have their say on Council Tax Support Scheme

The council is inviting residents to have their say on the council tax support scheme which is due to be implemented in the 2016/17 financial year.

Council tax support came into force in April 2013, replacing the former national council tax benefit scheme. Local authorities must review their schemes annually and are required by the Government to carry out a public consultation.

Since then, the maximum amount of support available to working age households in the East Riding is 75 per cent, which means every they are required to pay at least 25 per cent of their council tax bill. There are no plans to change this.

However, the council is proposing to follow the Government's proposals of freezing components within working age benefits for the next four years, removing the family premium and limiting the backdating of housing benefit claims to four weeks rather than six months.

Pension age households will be excluded from any changes and will continue to receive help under a national scheme.

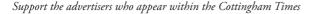
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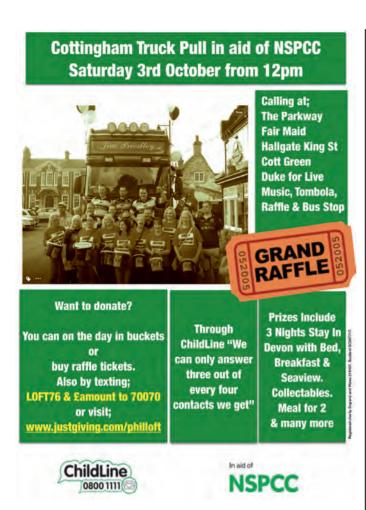
