The Cottingham Local History Society is delighted to announce that with the easing of Covid restrictions it can put on a first-rate series of talks for the new season and in a new venue, the Civic Hall. The talks are open to members and non-members.

October 6th. Hilary Byers will talk on 'The National Picture Theatre, Beverley Road, Hull. Securing a future for a bombed cinema'. This date is as close as we could get to the anniversary of the 1941 bombing. November 3rd. Colin Cooper, will talk on 'Hull's Golden Age of Public Transport 1874-1949'. December 1st. Dr Alec Gill MBE will entertain us with 'The games we used to play: an imaginative skip down Memory Lane'. Alec's talk will be an interactive one with the audience's own memories. Not to be missed! January 5th. Michèle Beadle will give us 'A glimpse of Edwardian life: Hull in 1901–1902, based on the Lady magazine'. February 2nd. Elaine Moll will give the Annual Stamp Lecture. Her topic is Cottingham's short-lived newspaper 'The Cottingham Review (1952–1954)'. March 2nd. Pete Walker, will draw on his own research into a piece of neglected history. 'Power beneath the pavements: a world's first for Hull's Victorian engineers' tells the story of Hull Hydraulic Power Co., which pioneered hydraulic technology to provide power to local businesses, by installing high-pressure water pipes under Hull's roads and pavements.

Our new venue is the Civic Hall, which is large enough for us to create seating with safe distancing. Talks will start at 7.45 p.m. The admission fee is £2 for a member and £3 for a visitor. Covid mitigation. Hand sanitisation will be available in the vestibule and we recommend wearing a mask.


## **Community Governor wanted for Bacon Garth School**

#### An Old Crock of a Beekeeper Local Beekeeper Neil Gower continues his quarterly review

#### **Old Crock**

The Beekeeping season has just come to a close for another year. It's been a particularly unusual season for me as I spent 8 weeks of it on crutches following ankle surgery, and unable to take as active a role as I would have liked. However, the crutches have now been discarded and although not fully back to normal, I'm far more mobile than I have been.

I tried to make sure in advance that I had prepared for the likely issues prior to my immobilisation, and luckily the timing meant that my unintentional lack of intervention was not critical to the bee's wellbeing. The colonies that had needed swarming had been taken care of, all had active queens and any treatment for pests/diseases had been carried out. Fortunately, the bees hadn't been briefed on my condition and had carried on with their lives as usual, blissfully unaware of my situation.

Knowing of my impending operation I'd made the decision earlier in the year not to harvest any honey this year. I have long held the view that I'll only take excess honey from the hives and on recent inspections I've seen that all the colonies are in good shape moving into the autumn/winter.

In a previous article I'd mentioned my foray into the world of beekeeping DIY and the fact that I had designed and was building a smaller hive. I have two in service now and both have worked well through the summer months. The next big test will be their ability to store enough food to feed the smaller colonies over the winter and whilst everything looks good at the moment, the proof of the pudding will be in the eating as they say. I should have a good idea how they are faring in time for my next article.

#### Asian Hornet Update.

I'm conscious that I haven't reported back to you in any detail recently on the Asian Hornet situation. I was reminded recently as the British Beekeeping Association always runs an Asian Hornet awareness week in September and I have been catching up with events. You may recall that a Hornet was found close to our location

a couple of years ago. Although it seems that it had been brought into the country already dead in the luggage of returning holidaymakers, we are still registered as having a sighting in this area. The Asian Hornet (Vespa Velutina) is one of the largest species of the wasp family and I have included a photograph to remind you of what it looks like.



The threat from this alien invader is still very real. The Asian Hornet was introduced by accident into France a few years ago and has caused devastation in its wake as it has travelled up through the country. It has spread through other parts of mainland Europe with equally devastating impact. In France it is now estimated that 30% of colonies have been impacted either by completely wiping them out or by weakening them so badly that the colony dies out as a result.

A single Asian Hornet can eat as many as 50 honeybees a day, so with a nest located in the vicinity of a hive, it doesn't take long for either scenario to play out.

The main UK fight against this predator has been taking place on the Island of Jersey. Although sitings have been made and nests destroyed along the south coast, it is Jersey where the real battle has been going on. The AH had got a foothold on the island and a small group of volunteers including beekeepers and non-beekeepers have been working tirelessly to try and defeat the threat.

All beekeeping regions in the UK now have an action team in place and the British Beekeepers Association and the Government department DEFRA coordinate activities and ensure a smooth flow of information and intelligence sharing. It was thought that the Asian Hornets progress further north would be thwarted by cooler temperatures, but that is now under review due to potential changes to the climate

I don't believe this is something that can be taken lightly due to its impact on the honeybee population and pollinators in general. As I have referenced in previous articles Albert Einstein is attributed with saying that if the Honeybee died out mankind would be wiped out in 4 years. No bees, no pollination. No pollination, no crops. No crops, no food. No food, no mankind.

Although not proven to have come from Einstein it is still a powerful and thought provoking statement.

As more information becomes available I will pass it on through his forum as I know by the number of people who stop and ask me, that many of you take a close interest.

#### Ready for Winter.

The bees will continue to venture out on warm days although as we move into late autumn/early winter these trips will be fewer. The threat from wasps trying to rob honey from the hives has passed and we now need to keep an eye on areas where Green Woodpeckers live. They will drill holes in the side of the hives to get at grubs and stores, so we have to wrap a layer of chicken wire around the hives to prevent their access. Beekeeping could never be accused of being boring!!



#### New exhibition coming soon to Beverley Art Gallery: 'Reflections of Japan in East Yorkshire'

pening on Saturday, 16 October at Beverley Art Gallery will be 'Reflections of Japan in East Yorkshire', a unique exhibition bringing together a selection of items from private collections across East Yorkshire and artwork by Laura Boswell.

The idea for the exhibition came about more than two years ago when the Japanese Embassy introduced the 'Japan-UK Season of Culture', a celebration of the many facets of Japanese culture in the UK.

Beverley Art Gallery was eager to participate in this national opportunity and is pleased to confirm that the upcoming exhibition is indeed one of the official events of the 'Japan-UK Season of Culture'

Originally, the exhibition was intended to show a unique collection of toys from the East Riding based collector, Jane Irisa. Then COVID came and the exhibition had to be postponed. During the long lockdowns, curator Helena Cox came up with an idea to widen the exhibition's appeal, and the gallery ran a call-out on social media, asking East Yorkshire residents to get in touch.

As a result, over the lockdowns, a group of Japan-lovers has been formed with members ranging from Japanese expats to art and craft collectors, those who worked and lived in Japan and who came back to East Yorkshire enriched and inspired by Japanese culture. The group met Helena and over Zoom during the lockdowns and shared their passion and stories about Japan.

Beverley Art Gallery curator Helena Cox explained: "As the lockdowns came to an end, we decided to change the focus of the exhibition and include a wider variety of Japanese items. The core of the exhibition will still be Jane Irisa's stunning collection of traditional Japanese toys, which she collected from all over Japan during her many journeys there. Jane previously worked in the Oriental and Japanese sections of the British Library, and therefore her collection is brilliantly documented and well researched.

"To accompany this collection, we will be showing a selection of items and stories from private collections, including rare items from the Imperial Court, calligraphy, and decorative items, as well as artwork inspired by Japanese culture and a stunning collection of Japanese vintage kimonos."

> One of the items, on loan from Beverley-born Philip Highy, is a calligraphy he obtained during one of his many visits to Japan, together with the Eton College Chapel Choir.

Helena Cox added: "The calligraphy reads 'Once in a lifetime experience' — we sincerely hope that this exhibition will indeed be a unique experience for our visitors, celebrating the rich connections between East Yorkshire and Japan".

To celebrate the mutual influence between Japan and Great Britain, the Gallery is delighted to present a selection of works by the renowned printmaker, Laura Boswell. Laura will be showing examples of her work capturing the stunning Yorkshire and wider British landscapes in the traditional Japanese medium of coloured woodblock prints.







#### **Malt Whisky**

want to go off piste this month (stop sniggering at the back!) and write about whisky. Malt whisky in particular.

. It's from Scotland, right? Stands to reason . . . it's why we ask for a Scotch!

Well, yes and no. Last time I looked there were 134 distilleries licensed to produce Scotch whisky. Yet, over the last few years, whisky connoisseurs have become increasingly enamoured with whiskies from Japan, many of them similar to single-malt Scotches in their methods and composition, but with a character all their own.

Three Japanese whiskies took top trophies at last year's World Whisky Awards: Suntory Hakushu, Single Malt 25 Year Old was named World's Best Single Malt, reclaiming the title it first won in 2018; while Fuji Single Grain and Ichiro's Malt & Grain also picked up gongs

Whisky, of course, is produced around the world and increasingly you're seeing more of them in your local supermarket, including some from England and Wales alongside the long-popular Irish whiskey (like the Americans they add an "e" to the spelling.

Penderyn, a Welsh single malt, is a common site; Cotswolds Single Malt won't be too hard to find either. But this month I was delighted to take part in a whisky tasting over Zoom for Filey Bay, the first single malt whisky made in Yorkshire.

The Spirit of Yorkshire Distillery is based at Hunmanby Grange, near Filey, and is a joint venture between two farmers: Tom Mellor, well known as the founder, with his late wife Gill, of Wold Top Brewery in 2003, and David Thompson.

The idea came to them a few years ago when they realised that Tom's farm was sending a lot of his top-quality malting barley to Scotland to make Scotch. With his own water source also on the farm, surely they could make whisky themselves, closer to home?

Spirit of Yorkshire was founded in 2016 and the first Filey Bay whisky went on sale in 2019 and has been going from strength to strength (interestingly 46 per cent alcohol by volume compared to the more usual 40 per cent) ever since.

The distillery boasts two copper stills, the largest outside of Scotland, and thousands of various cask types – including sherry butts and bourbon casks, all of which help create subtle, complex, flavours.

It's a complete field to bottle operation and I have to say the results are remarkable

The first point Joe Clark, Spirit of Yorkshire's Whisky Director (and, in essence, the Master Distiller) made at the tasting was young whisky can be absolutely brilliant. "Just because it doesn't have '10 years' on the bottle doesn't mean it's not good," he said.

We tasted six samples, five in the current Filey Bay range and one cask sample, and started with their flagship product, called, not surprisingly, Filey Bay Flagship, which currently sells at £54.99.

The first thing to say, and you'll have noticed already, is the price; obviously considerably more than the discount supermarket bargains. But it does reflect both the quality and the limited quantities currently being produced. When new releases are made it tends to fly off the shelves.

Matured it bourbon casks, it is creamy, light and fruity, with notes of citrus, honey and vanilla. This is a whisky to sip and savour.

Others we tasted were Filey Bay Moscatel Finish, which is the distillery's first-ever sherry-finished release (finished in Moscatel barrels after maturing in bourbon casks) and reflects the naturally sweet character of the sherry grapes along with some floral aromas and citrus elements. It leaves a lovely warming glow. This release sells at £59.99 a bottle.

Next up, and at the same price, was the STR Finish. Again, after maturing in bourbon casks it was "finished" in STR red wine barrels from the Rioja region of Spain. STR refers to Shaving, Toasting and Re-charring the casks which gives the resultant whisky a very special flavour - a sweet and oaky spiciness; even a hint of chocolate orange!

The current trend in whisky sales generally is towards "peated" varieties - you either love them or hate them (I love them) - and the Filey Bay Peated Finish (£59.99) is a good place to start for someone trying peat whiskies for the first time - it's lovely and light with a gentle twist of smoke rather than a "smack you in the face" style of some I could mention. This will be a limited release each year - 3,500 bottles were produced for the first batch and I guess will be hard to find by now,

All the four whiskies mentioned so far were distilled and bottled with 46 per cent alcohol by volume. By law, Scotch whisky must be bottled at a minimum of 40 per cent but increasingly, if you study the labels, more are being bottled at 46 per cent; particularly if they are not chill filtered (which Filey Bay isn't). In simple terms, the higher the strength the more intense and concentrated the flavour.

Which should have made the Yorkshire Day special release (on August 1) exceptional - bottled at 55 per cent. And it was - probably my favourite on the night. This was an intense, almost fruitcake-tasting, special brew - absolutely gorgeous. Only 1,500 bottles were produced, so once again they will be hard or almost impossible to find. If you are lucky enough you'll have to pay £84.99.

Finally, to give us a taste of a straight-from-the-cask whisky we were given a cask sample at 64.1 per cent. Only four years old and not available to buy, it packed a powerful punch indeed.

I first came across Filey Bay at the wonderful Spirit Specialist shop in Howden, but a good way to explore Filey Bay whisky is to take a one-hour distillery tour (£15), including three tasters and a free glass to take home. From the shop or online you can also buy a tasting box (£27.50), containing three different Filey Bay whiskies.






#### And Firstly . . . . Tali . . .

Park Street hospital. During the operation, the surgeon found a very small piece of stick that had lodged itself under the tongue. The piece was removed, cavity flushed and a small drain was sutured into place (this enables any surplus fluid to escape). It was not a pretty sight and poor Baxter looked like Frankenstein of the canine world.

On the 17th December the drain was removed and he had to continue on the antibiotics for a further week but sadly, when they returned 3 days later the area had swollen and burst. The following day, poor Baxter was admitted for an exploratory operation where a piece of stick, which had obviously migrated, was found under his tongue. A swab was also taken and sent to the laboratories to be tested for any further infection. So, our poor gentle giant spent his Christmas looking like a patch work quilt (which I hasten to add the hair did grow back perfectly). On the 27th December, 2 months after the swelling was first noticed, Baxter got the all clear.

#### **Motoring - with Roy Woodcock**



## Toyota has further increased its range of Yaris models by introducing a small SUV version, the Toyota Yaris Cross. Roy Woodcock investigates further . . .

In just over 20 years on our roads the Yaris has become Toyota's most important model in Europe, steadily increasing both its sales volume and its market share.

Following its launch in 1999 it became the first car from the Japanese brand to claim the European Car of the Year crown, with the second generation model becoming the first vehicle in its class to gain a top five-star rating in Euro NCAP's safety testing programme.

The third generation introduced hybrid-electric power to the small car market for the first time and in 2019 the Yaris shifted 224,000 units across the continent, making it Toyota's best-seller.

Expectations were high, therefore, when the fourth generation car went on sale late last year and were immediately proved right - the car scooping the European Car of the Year award yet again.

It was the first to be built on a new global platform that underpins a planned series of new models. And it's one of those we look at here; the Yaris Cross, an allp-new small SUV.

With prices starting from £22,515, there's a choice of trim levels called Icon, Design, Excel, Dynamic and a limited-run Premiere Edition which will be on sale for about a year.

There is also the option to upgrade to intelligent all-wheel drive on the high-end models for £2,360 extra.

At the heart of the car, which is built in France specifically for European customers, is a 1.5-litre, three-cylinder hybrid engine, which together with the electric motors, delivers 114bhp with 120Nm of torque.

The vehicle can complete the 0-62mph sprint in 11.2 seconds (11.8 seconds on AWD-i versions) and maxes out at 106mph. Running costs are impressive with models delivering up to 56.5mpg and from 112g/km carbon emissions on a combined run.

Compared to the standard Yaris city car, the Yaris Cross is 95mm taller, 20mm wider and 240mm longer with the same wheelbase. Customers can choose from 16, 17 or 18-inch wheels depending on trim level and all models are generously equipped with tech, along with excellent safety levels.

We tried the Yaris Cross Dynamic front-wheel drive model costing £26,465 – this price was bumped up a further £450 as there was a JBL premium sound system added to the mix.

When viewed from any angle, the Yaris Cross boasts quite aggressive SUV styling with twin front grilles, a black roof, chunky wheel arches, along with slim headlights and circular fog lamps at the bottom of the grille.

There are black wheels and door pillars, along with privacy glass and smart LED lights at the back with sequential turn indicators.

Moving inside, the Yaris Cross is very big on space with smart cloth upholstery and a clutter-free, yet feature rich cockpit.

The car sees the debut of the new Smart Connect Multimedia system with faster operation and additional functionality. There is the Touch 2 multimedia system with a nine-inch high-definition touchscreen, sat nav, DAB radio and wireless smartphone connectivity via Apple CarPlay and Android Auto.

It has a separate panel for the climate control and seat heaters, plus a neat screen behind the steering wheel that offers all manner of information about hybrid driving performance, speed and fuel levels etc.

The driver benefits from excellent all round visibility and the acceleration from the CVT gearbox is smooth and responsive with plenty of power on tap at all times. The car cruises at 70mph on motorways and is nice and agile in town centres where a new upgraded parking system makes light work of squeezing into tight spaces – even at night.

Out on the country lanes, the Yaris Cross offers confident grip through bends and the cabin is nicely refined with very little wind or road surface noise filtering through.

The driver can switch through drive modes called Normal, Eco and Power that alter the responses of the vehicle and there is an EV-only mode which is ideal when travelling through Congestion Charge zones. Extra energy is recouped through regenerative braking and this is sharper if the car is switched from D for Drive to B mode whereby the vehicle brakes as soon as you lift your foot off the accelerator.

Comfort levels are really good and there is enough room for a couple of passengers in the back provided the front seats are not pushed back too far. Add a third and it gets a little too cosy.

The boot can accommodate 397 litres of kit - a limit that increases to 1,097 litres with the 60:40 or 40:20:40 split-folding rear seats dropped flat. And there are a number of handy storage options scattered throughout the cabin too.

Although the Yaris Cross has yet to be tested for its Euro NCAP safety rating, the Yaris was awarded the maximum five stars and this latest version is packed with safety features.

It has all the second-generation Safety Sense features as standard across the entire range such as pre-collision system, lane trace assist, full-range intelligent adaptive cruise control, road sign assist and automatic high beam. Blind spot monitoring and rear cross traffic alert are options on the high-end models.

Toyota predicts the Design trim level will account for about 50 per cent of sales and, despite initially believing only three per cent of buyers would opt for AWD-i, initial pre-sales figures show that number to be nearer to 10-15 per cent.

All in all, Toyota has taken the compact SUV qualities from the RAV4 - which is now celebrating its 25th anniversary - and added lots of Yaris city car DNA to the mix to develop the allnew Yaris Cross making it big on style, appeal and performance.

## Passes needed at all household waste recycling sites: Reminder to East Riding residents

Residents in the East Riding are being reminded that passes will be needed to gain entry to any of the area's household waste recycling sites from Friday, 1 October.

The passes have been introduced by East Riding of Yorkshire Council to make the system fairer – to make sure the sites are only being used by East Riding residents.

Residents living in the East Riding will have already received their free passes, as thousands were posted out in July and August, together with new bin collection calendars, along with instructions of how to use them.

They can be used to gain entry to any of the council's 10 household waste recycling sites.

It is hoped the new scheme should also help to reduce the queues building up at some sites.

Other councils, including neighbouring Hull City Council, already use a similar system.

Councillor Chris Matthews, the council's portfolio holder for environment and climate change, said: "We are bringing these passes in to make sure East Riding residents are getting full use of the waste and recycling facilities available to them.

"Residents in the East Riding do a fantastic job with their recycling, which is there for everyone to see when the recycling league tables are released each year.

"I would encourage all residents to keep hold of their passes and prepare for the change coming from 1 October."

From that date, if a pass is not displayed in a vehicle, a site attendant will query whether that person lives in the East Riding and has a pass.

Alternatively, a valid driving licence, utility bill, council tax bill or bank statement showing the person's address can be used to prove that person lives at an East Riding address.


However, non-East Riding residents will be turned away.


The council won't replace any passes through loss or damage. If a resident misplaces their pass they can use the alternatives instead

All passes will be renewed just before the expiry date of December 2022.

ctober is here, which means Autumn is officially here too. The weather is cooler and the nights are starting to draw in. There is still plenty to do in the garden, some gardeners actually prefer the cooler conditions as they are more comfortable to work in. Remember that Autumn is the ideal season to plant all kinds of things in the garden from vegetables, seeding lawns, shrubs and perennials to evergreen, fruit, and deciduous trees. You can carry on mowing your lawn



through October depending on how much rain we have but it is advisable to raise your mower blade to a higher setting.

#### **Autumn Lawn Care**

Sowing a new lawn is best done during Spring (March - May) or in Autumn (September - Mid October)

We recommend using Gro-Sure Smart Lawn Seed (25sqm £10.99 or 40sqm £14.99)

#### For a new lawn:

Prepare the soil by clearing any debris and clear any perennial weeds and treat with weedkiller.

One a dry day dig soil to a depth of 20-25cm, break down any lumps and then tread it down to firm it over then rake over aiming for a flat even surface.

The day before sowing water the area thoroughly and leave to soak overnight.

#### For an existing Lawn:

Remove any weeds by hand or treat using a selective weedkilling treatment.

Mow the lawn closely before raking or scarifying to remove any moss and weed remains. If the ground appears

hard or compacted aerate using a garden fork.

Finally, spread Westland Lawn & Turf Dressing to fill any shallow holes and to level-out the surface.

#### **Sowing:**

Apply the seed at a rate of 40g per sqm (30g/sq.m for lawn repairs). As a guide one large handful is approximately 40g. Sprinkling the seed in 2 passes at right angles to each other will help spread the seed more uniformly. Lightly rake to gently incorporate the seed into the surface.

#### After sowing:

Rolling: The ground should be rolled or lightly firmed by walking over it and pressing the seed into the soil.

Watering: Water the lawn thoroughly using a fine-rosed watering can or a lawn sprinkler which produces a fine spray taking care not to wash the seeds away

Mowing: Grass can be cut for the first time when it is 5-8cm (2-3inches) high. A light trim will be sufficient initially. Gradually lower the cutting height to about 2.5cm (1 inch), which is ideal. Do not remove more than 1/3rd of the growth at any one time.

**Feeding:** After 10-12 weeks we recommend feeding your new lawn with Aftercut 3 Day Green Lawn Feed. Simply apply after mowing for quicker more visible greener results in 3 days.

#### What is Organic Gardening?

Gardening organically means growing plants without manufactured fertilisers and other synthetic chemicals for feeding, pest and disease control, soil conditioning or weeding. Although often regarded as an alternative to gardening with chemicals, many organic techniques are simply good practices and compatible with other forms of gardening.

Excluding manufactured chemicals when growing ornamental plants, lawns, fruit and vegetables brings some challenges.

On the plus side, organic gardening is beneficial to the environment, provides a more attractive home to wildlife and, by cultivating fruit and vegetables organically, you'll know your tasty produce is chemical free. So bearing all this in mind, you may choose to go wholly organic or to combine organic techniques with a reduction in chemicals, using them only as necessary to maintain soil fertility and deal with the most damaging pests, diseases and weeds.

#### **Organic Weed control**

Chemical weed killers are a very attractive and effective solution to eliminate weeds. There are not always better alternatives in the organic range that are as effective but they are a lot kinder to the environment and beneficial to wildlife and their habitats. You have to decide where you can use organic methods and where you can't and try and achieve the best balance you can.

Wherever possible, try to avoid weed killers by hand weeding or hoeing and try to tackle weed problems before they produce and disperse their seeds and heavy infestations develop. In addition, prevention is much better than cure, so carefully prepare sites prior to planting and incorporate weed barriers to reduce the chance of weed infestation.

**PREPARATION:** When preparing a planting site, ensure all perennial weeds such as couch grass, nettles and brambles are removed by digging out with a fork.

Remove annual weeds by hand or in dry weather use a hoe to cut off weeds from their roots.

**BARRIERS:** Different options are available to gardeners to help smother or prevent weed growth. Mulching with a 5–8cm layer of organic material such as garden compost, wellrotted farmyard manure, spent mushroom compost or cocoa shell helps smother annual weeds. Alternatively, plastic sheets, old carpet, carpet underlay or other fabricated material can be used to suppress annual and perennial weeds. In ornamental garden situations, ground-cover plants provide a more attractive weed-suppressing alternative. A barrier of heavy gauge black polythene can be sunk to prevent perennial weeds from growing into an area from an adjoining garden.

**ALTERNATIVE METHODS:** Paint-on gels are ideal for treating perennial weeds such as bindweed as the weed killer is absorbed through the leaves and down to the roots, without the worry of spray drift on to other plants. They are also the best way to treat odd nettles or brambles cropping up in a hedge or densely planted border, as you can apply them specifically to a certain area.

You'll have a balanced point of view that could help defuse a tense situation that may be building around you. Behave like everything is normal and others might follow your lead.

Laura's long-standing passion for Japan saw her undertake numerous study trips to Japan to emulate the technique. The result is a true meeting of the two cultures, presenting British landscapes with distinctly Japanese optics and aesthetic sensitivity.

The exhibition will also feature reproductions from a book called 'Omochabako' illustrated by Kawasaki Kyosen and published in 1924, which includes drawing of 100 traditional Japanese toys. The original book is in the collections of The British Library.


As an audio-visual feature, the exhibition will show a series of video presentations made by Japanese exchange students from Ochanomizu University (Japan) and Hull University, presenting the stories behind traditional Japanese toys and customs.

If you can't come to the show because you are feeling unwell with symptoms of Coronavirus, isolating or quarantining we will <u>of course</u> refund you for your tickets. ## What makes a Frogman bronze so special?

Tim Cotterill, aka "Frogman" is one of the most popular bronze artists working anywhere today. His iconic bronze sculptures are immensely prized by collectors around the world.

Commonly depicting frogs (although also featuring owls, birds and geckos), these elegant yet whimsical sculptures have captured the hearts of many. From their delicate detailing to perfect patinas and colourful characters, there's much to love. But what exactly is it that makes Frogman bronzes quite so special?

#### Why frogs?

The fascination with frogs came from Tim Cotterill's youth and early adulthood in the UK, exploring through secluded woods and sheltered ponds. Finding frogs and hedgerow creatures contentedly living in these shady spots inspired the artist. "Frogs are fun creatures! I have tried to capture their individual spirit, their fun and their joy. Life is fun!" says Tim.

#### How are Frogman bronzes made?

No two of Tim Cotterill's bronze sculptures

are the same. To create them, the artist employs an ancient and meticulous process known as the "Lost Wax" method.

After working on conceptual drawings and ideas, a pose will be created on a simple wire frame. This is created with filler, painstakingly layered on and sanded back repeatedly – until the sculpture emerges before being sent to the Frogman Foundry to be cast in bronze and finally finished with a decorative patina

#### What is the lost wax method?

It is a method of metal casting in which a molten metal is poured into a mould — initially created with a wax model. Once the mould has been created, the wax is melted and drained away. This leaves a hollow core, into which the bronze can be poured.

Whilst we can't go into detail on the entire meticulous process, we do know all of Tim Cotterill's animals are finished with a clean and polish, the intricate patina process before being individually signed and numbered.

#### Why Bronze?

Bronze has been favoured by artists (ancient and contemporary alike) for its versatility, toughness, rich colouring and ability to achieve the finest of detail.

Bronze makes highly detailed sculptures possible. It expands slightly whilst solidifying, allowing for every detail of the

mould to be captured. It then contracts slightly when cooled, meaning that the finished sculpture can be easily removed from the mould.

#### How are Tim Cotterill's sculptures finished?

No introduction to Tim Cotterill's bronze sculptures would be complete without discussing his unique, jewel-like patination. Now, for good reason — the exact process is kept a strictly guarded secret... but it does involve layers and layers meticulously applied to the sculptures.

With Tim Cotterill's unique patination technique, a unique sense of texture and depth is created — meaning that no two frogs will ever be exactly the same.

Tim Cotterill's beautiful sculptures remain at the top of any art lover's wish list. With their optimistic inspiration, meticulous creation and stunning decoration, it's not hard to see why they are so special and so highly valued.
