Life for horse riders on today's roads. The law has been changed

There is not one rider anywhere who would choose to ride on a road at all, it is simply that we have no choice.

The instances of RTA's with horses across the UK has quadrupled in recent years. Rider fatalities or with life changing injuries is huge. The numbers of horses killed and maimed is more, they suffer the most as vehicles collide with the animals first. This has become such a vast problem that we FINALLY now have a new law in place requiring road users to pass horses at least two metres away and at a speed no higher than 15 miles an hour -10 October - www.cottinghamtimes.co.uk



10 mph is better.

It has always been law that you should drive at an appropriate speed according to the conditions - well approaching horses from both in front and behind is a dangerous condition which needs notice, awareness and appropriate speed alteration required - for your sake as well as ours.

If only that were the case. I don't understand why any driver could fail to see the huge risk to themselves when approaching an unpredictable horse? Much of my working life is training horses to become calm and confident with cars, tractors, lorries and buses. Motor bikes really frighten horses due to the volume of noise they produce. Sometimes I am working with horses who have never experienced roads before though, most commonly, I am trying to repair a horse emotionally who has been frightened and who is associatively scared.

It is a huge undertaking considering the vast amount of traffic we now have on our roads and also dealing with drivers who have no conception of either, how vulnerable a horse and rider is, or how vulnerable they are behind that wheel. Everyone is in such a hurry these days. Lack of consideration for other road users, including cyclists, has never been so bad.

Last week I started riding out a baby horse who I have had in for training. We had invested so much time and effort preparing him for the roads over several weeks. This wonderful soul had accepted the Piccadilly Circus of Skidby's Main Street with stoicism and trust in us that we were keeping him safe. He lead out beautifully and long reined out nicely. It was time to ride him out. I was horrified at the stupidity, selfishness and outright dangerous driving of some individuals.

A BMW driver one Sunday afternoon was going 60 in our 30 - when asked with correct arm signals to slow down, he simply tore past us successfully scaring this honest young horse. The next day, an ERYC white bus which collects residents every day in Skidby, squeezed past him so close we could touch the sides - and all because he would not wait for the oncoming traffic to pass first- idiot. Don't you realise that your actions have consequences? If you scare that horse, you damage it emotionally which can then lead to it becoming a danger to other road users!

Every time riders go out on roads, we take our lives in our hands.

All road users have a duty of care to all other road users. PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE pass horses slow and wide. OUR LIVES ARE IN YOUR HANDS AND YOUR ACTIONS DICTATE THE OUTCOMES BOTH GOOD AND BAD. Simply always pass us really slowly and a minimum of two metres away.

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Free First Aid Training for Cottingham

Tony Dean is the "Chair" of the East Yorkshire section of the Vintage Motorcycle Club (VMCC). After hearing how useless a lot of his motorcycling chums were, faced with trauma at road traffic accidents, he thought he could do something about it. Inevitably, when it comes to bikers and solid objects, the latter invariably wins! It, therefore, becomes a matter of concern for those around the casualty at these times – "Should I leave well alone" or "How can I help?"

Coinciding with the Yorkshire Air Ambulance (YAA) being Tony's charity of choice for the year, he made enquiries with other first-aid training agencies about training for his merry band of biking mates, and mate-esses?? He was dismayed to discover charges in excess of £60 per person for an awareness course lasting half a day. He then also noted that his grandchildren were not trained in school either, and nor were the majority of the populace of this fair Parish, come to that.

Undaunted, Tony set about contacting a friend of his son's, Antony Rodgers, who is the lead trainer for Hull NHS Paramedic team, and a Cottingham resident. Antony was enthusiastic and willing to give his time freely for the cause of "Free Training". He was swiftly followed by enthusiastic support from YAA (give generously when possible), The Cottingham Village Trust (Civic Hall) with free use of the hall, and Cottingham Parish Council with help in design, admin and small funding, along with other help from local businesses with printing.

Ian Start, chair of the Cottingham Village Trust, helpfully pledged to organise a "Fish & Chip Supper QUIZ" in aid of the YAA on Wednesday, 18th October at the Civic Hall, as a lead up to the First Aid Training Day.

Also, a chance remark at this point from Ian, indicated that a recent TV article had pointed out that St. John's Ambulance were

to begin free first-aid training in schools and for named groups. Good news!

So, should Tony wait for a positive eventual outcome for Cottingham? No, he should not, and with the help of all members of the above little group, plus members of the Red Cross, now also firmly on-board, the date of Friday, 10th November is fixed for Cottingham's inaugural Free First-Aid Training Day.

Put your name down to take part in the October Quiz and help us raise much needed funds for the YAA, and enjoy fish and chips and convivial company. Hopefully the questions won't be too hard!

All are welcome between the ages of 12 and 120! Help save lives by learning CPR, defibrillator use and much, much more!







The Trust's re-accreditation means that 160 NHS providers across England are now Veteran Aware accredited and the alliance aims to have all Trusts accredited by the end of the first quarter of 2024.

The Trust is a leading provider of integrated health services across Hull, the East Riding of Yorkshire, Whitby, Scarborough and Ryedale, delivering health and social care services to a population of 765,000 people.

With a general population in Yorkshire & Humber of 5,480,800 it is estimated that 596,546 (11%) are from the armed forces community.


During work on its re-accreditation, the VCHA could see that the Trust had built upon its original accreditation, through the development of a "Why Ask" booklet, which encourages staff to ask more qualitative questions about an individual's protected characteristics and/or health inequalities; through the development of a Champion role called Armed Forces Community Navigator, all of whom become members of the Trust's Veterans forum where speakers attend the forums to share knowledge, skills and experience; and the sharing of patient/carer stories at Trust Board and Council of Governors and through global communications within the Trust.

Chief Executive Michele Moran said: "Our Trust is delighted to have once more received the Veteran Aware accreditation. I would like to thank and recognise the whole team for their exceptional work in gaining this honour. Ensuring our services are accessible and understanding the experiences of veterans is paramount to our inclusive approach to services."

VCHA Regional Lead Mandy Stokes said: "Humber Teaching NHS Foundation Trust has clearly imbued the ethos of Veteran Aware accreditation. Some of the work it has developed has been hugely encouraging and I commend them for this. It has been a pleasure working with the Trust Leads for this work and I look forward to continuing to work with them as their agenda moves forward."

VCHA Chairman, Prof Tim Briggs CBE, said: "More and more Trusts are seeing the value of Veteran Aware accreditations as seen through the numbers of Trusts that are now accredited. We now stand at 76% of NHS Trusts across England, which is a testament both to the dedication of my team and to the wider NHS family who work tirelessly on behalf of the military community despite the many pressures they will be under. 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


Paw Prints on our Hearts

ON THE GRAPEVINE

WITH ROY WOODCOCK

International Grenache Day

ne thing I learned during September and, in a sense, jumping on the bandwagon of a day for everything (let's not mention World Ukulele day or even Work Naked Day) was that September 15 was designated International Grenache Day. It was a time for producers to highlight the versatility of this black grape.

Known for producing wines with high alcohol, low tannins and colour, Grenache is difficult to pin down in terms of a definitive style but it's often a popular blending partner. Its natural homeland is the Southern Mediterranean, especially France and Spain, where it is called Garnacha, but there are some fine examples from Australia, California and Washington State. It's a great wine for this time of year.

Wine descriptions of this grape will often refer to it as full-bodied and it is perfect for stews: long slow cooked roasts of pork or lamb that may even be a little bit fatty (shoulder of lamb and lamb shanks, for example). It suits daubes and stews with dark, winey sauces, too.

A simple Grenache or Grenache blend like a Côtes du Rhône is also a versatile match for many British pub classics like sausage and mash, shepherds pie or steak and kidney pie. Its absence of tough tannins also make it a more accommodating match for cheese than many more structured reds, especially cheeses such as Cheddar and Red Leicester.

Grenache also pairs well with cooked dishes like macaroni cheese and with veggie bakes and lentil or bean-based dishes. Lighter, fruitier styles such as cheap Garnachas from Spain make good barbecue drinking - Grenache seems to like a bit of smoke.

A serious Grenache-dominated red such as Châteauneuf-du-Pâpe is good with richer and gamier birds - I think it makes a great match for the Christmas turkey but you could also pair it successfully with guinea fowl, pheasant or pigeon, especially if accompanied by caramelised roast root vegetables like carrots, beets and parsnips.

And if any of that has whetted your appetite, do seek out a bottle; open, let it breathe and then sit back and enjoy!

While on the subject of Grenache grapes it's also worth pointing out that there are white Grenache grape varieties - usually from France or Spain - that again produce full-bodied white wines and dry rosés good partners for charcuterie and Spanish classics like paella and pork and beans.

Now then, the other thing I discovered during the month was the new-look, revamped, Waitrose store at Willerby - always a decent choice for a good bottle or three but now boasting an increased display area, with more excellent wines in the upper price bracket (and some knowledgeable staff - don't be afraid to ask) as well as an increased and extended selection of spirits.

As an enthusiastic acquirer of single malts, I was delighted to see the extended range on offer, although it might be a case of wishing and hoping, rather than buying, those on offer at the top end of the price scale - I noticed an 18-year-old Macallan Double Cask costing £325 and a 23-year-old Glenfiddich Grand Cru Style malt at £236 (now where did I put that lottery ticket!)

I've often mentioned the number of celebrities entering the world of wine; so it was I saw recentlyretired Manchester City footballer David Silva turning more of his attention to his Gran Canaria winery. Nowadays, he is channelling his energy into making a success of Bodegas Tamerán, a winery and

six-hectare vineyard he bought four years ago in his home island.

Situated 600-700 metres above sea level on south facing slopes with sandy volcanic soils, Silva's vineyard is planted with local grape varieties including Verdello, Marmajuelo, Baboso Blanco, Vijariego Blanco, Malvasía Aromática, Malvasía Volcánica and Vijariego Negro.

Wines are made following organic farming practices, under the guidance of winemaker Jonatan Garcia, who also owns the Suertes del Marques winery in Tenerife. Garcia said that when the footballer reached out to him on Twitter about starting up a wine business he thought it was a hoax.

"He sent me a message in 2019, when he was playing for City," Garcia was reported as saying. "He congratulated me about one of my wines he was drinking. I was so shocked, I thought it must be a fake account. But we talked and that's when our friendship developed and we started working together."

Silva says that he first got into wine when playing at Valencia. "I started to buy wines from Madrid that I got sent over to Manchester. Then I met Jonatan and from that moment on it was like 'Wow!'. From that day my mind was like 'it's amazing to discover this wine world'. I bought the vineyard four years ago, but back then I didn't have the cellar. It was only the vines. Then we built the cellar."

According to Silva, he helped out with the harvest this year, picking grapes in the vineyard, located in San Bartolomé de Tirajana, in the south east of Gran Canaria.

Tamerán's wines are imported by Indigo Wine in London, which says that the winery aims to produce "refreshing, mineral wines which speak to the unique microclimate, volcanic soils and native grapes of the island.'

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Cober is here, which means Autumn is officially here too. The weather is cooler and the nights are starting to draw in. There is still plenty to do in the garden, some gardeners actually prefer the cooler conditions as they are more comfortable to work in. Remember that Autumn is the ideal season to plant all kinds of things in the garden from vegetables, seeding lawns, shrubs and perennials to evergreen, fruit, and deciduous trees. You can carry on mowing your lawn



through October depending on how much rain we have but it is advisable to raise your mower blade to a higher setting.

Autumn Lawn Care

Sowing a new lawn is best done during Spring (March -May) or in Autumn (September - Mid October)

For a new lawn:

Prepare the soil by clearing any debris and clear any perennial weeds and treat with weedkiller.

The day before sowing water the area thoroughly and leave to soak overnight.

For an existing Lawn:

Remove any weeds by hand or treat using a selective weedkilling treatment.

hard or compacted aerate using a garden fork.

Finally, spread Westland Lawn & Turf Dressing to fill any shallow holes and to level-out the surface.

Sowing:

After sowing:

Mowing: Grass can be cut for the first time when it is 5-8cm (2-3inches) high. A light trim will be sufficient initially. Gradually lower the cutting height to about 2.5cm (1 inch), which is ideal. Do not remove more than 1/3rd of the growth at any one time.

Feeding: After 10-12 weeks we recommend feeding your new lawn with Aftercut 3 Day Green Lawn Feed. Simply apply after mowing for quicker more visible greener results in 3 days.

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What is Organic Gardening?

Gardening organically means growing plants without manufactured fertilisers and other synthetic chemicals for feeding, pest and disease control, soil conditioning or weeding. Although often regarded as an alternative to gardening with chemicals, many organic techniques are simply good practices and compatible with other forms of gardening.

Excluding manufactured chemicals when growing ornamental plants, lawns, fruit and vegetables brings some challenges.

On the plus side, organic gardening is beneficial to the environment, provides a more attractive home to wildlife and, by cultivating fruit and vegetables organically, you'll know your tasty produce is chemical free. So bearing all this in mind, you may choose to go wholly organic or to combine organic techniques with a reduction in chemicals, using them only as necessary to maintain soil fertility and deal with the most damaging pests, diseases and weeds.

Organic Weed control

Chemical weed killers are a very attractive and effective solution to eliminate weeds. There are not always better alternatives in the organic range that are as effective but they are a lot kinder to the environment and beneficial to wildlife and their habitats. You have to decide where you can use organic methods and where you can't and try and achieve the best balance you can.

Wherever possible, try to avoid weed killers by hand weeding or hoeing and try to tackle weed problems before they produce and disperse their seeds and heavy infestations develop. In addition, prevention is much better than cure, so carefully prepare sites prior to planting and incorporate weed barriers to reduce the chance of weed infestation.

PREPARATION: When preparing a planting site, ensure all perennial weeds such as couch grass, nettles and brambles are removed by digging out with a fork.

Remove annual weeds by hand or in dry weather use a hoe to cut off weeds from their roots.

BARRIERS: Different options are available to gardeners to help smother or prevent weed growth. Mulching with a 5–8cm layer of organic material such as garden compost, well-rotted farmyard manure, spent mushroom compost or cocoa shell helps smother annual weeds. Alternatively, plastic sheets, old carpet, carpet underlay or other fabricated material can be used to suppress annual and perennial weeds. In ornamental garden situations, ground-cover plants provide a more attractive weed-suppressing alternative. A barrier of heavy gauge black polythene can be sunk to prevent perennial weeds from growing into an area from an adjoining garden.

ALTERNATIVE METHODS: Paint-on gels are ideal for treating perennial weeds such as bindweed as the weed killer is absorbed through the leaves and down to the roots, without the worry of spray drift on to other plants. They are also the best way to treat odd nettles or brambles cropping up in a hedge or densely planted border, as you can apply them specifically to a certain area.

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Motoring - with Roy Woodcock



The updated Suzuki Swace has genuine family car credentials. *Roy Woodcock spent a week on the roads of East Yorkshire putting it to the test . . .*

nce you've got over - and your tongue around - the unusual name, there's lots to like about the Suzuki Swace in its new, much-improved and updated version for 2023.

The car was first introduced in 2020 as the result of a collaboration between Japanese car-makers Suzuki and Toyota and is built at Toyota's factory in Derbyshire. And if it looks familiar that's essentially because it's based on the Toyota Corolla; although the Swace is only available as an estate and therefore the comparison is with the Corolla Touring Sports.

The first thing to say is that as much as this collaboration benefits the car companies - the costs associated with developing a car from scratch are phenomenal - it also, very much, benefits the consumer.

What the Suzuki buyer gets is a model with a proven pedigree and impeccable reliability, and, accepting the range offers much less choice, a current like-for-like saving.

For 2023, Swace is offered in two models - Motion and Ultra - and just one engine - a 1.8-litre petrol-electric hybrid. Motion will cost you £28,999 on the road; Ultra £30,799 - the Toyota Corolla Touring Sports range starts at £31,560 and goes all the way up to £36,875 (the top speed model is offered with a 2-litre hybrid engine).

For this 2023 upgrade, this Suzuki comes with a punchier Hybrid engine, more equipment and an improved cabin. The engine has an increased maximum power output of 140PS (up from122PS) with a 0-62mph time reduced to 9.4 seconds from 11.1 for the previous model.

Standard specification now makes even better reading - the new Motion model includes Emergency Driving Stop system, LED rear lamps, seven airbags, Dual Zone automatic air conditioning, eight-inch LCD colour information screen, heated front seats, heated steering wheel, Smart phone link for wireless Apple CarPlay and wired Android Auto device connectivity, rear parking camera, new digital instrument cluster with three display modes, type C USB port and Dynamic Radar Cruise control.

The new Ultra grade, which I was driving, adds updated Bi-LED projector headlights, Safe Exit Assist, Smart Door locking, Front and Rear Park distance sensors, Blind Spot 30 October - <u>www.cottinghamtimes.co.uk</u> Monitor, Rear Cross Traffic Alert, interior ambient lighting, and centre console tray with wireless charger.

Sleek looking, with a certain restrained elegance, the Swace is one of the roomier mid-size estates with good legroom front and rear and impressive cargo space. The lowset rear platform can soak up almost 600 litres are luggage with a secret compartment beneath the floor to house any valuables.

For added versatility, the rear carpeted floorboard can be placed in a lower position to store taller objects and is also reversible with a resin backside that can be used for stowing wet or dirty items.

The compartment can be easily expanded into a fully flat space by using the remote folding lever to fold down the second-row seats. Privacy needs are addressed with a detachable tonneau cover that can be retracted with a single touch, and the luggage compartment is equipped with autoilluminating lights and DC12V accessory socket for added convenience.

Convenient storage spaces can also be found throughout the cabin, offering ample room for storing small items such as phones and drinks in both the first and second rows. There's also integrated roof rails for simple roof carrier mounting, and 16-inch alloy wheels.

The cabin I really liked - it was a nice place to be; comfortable with plenty of room for driver and passengers as, like the Corolla, the rear cabin comfort and legroom is among the best in its class – it is a proper five-seater.

Suzuki may have missed a trick by not offering the bigger, 2-litre, powerplant available in the Toyota, but for a big car it's still quick enough when needed, for overtaking. It's comfortable and stable with fairly responsible handling, helped by a low centre of gravity and finely tuned suspension.

The Swace is equipped with three modes - NORMAL, ECO or SPORT - and there is an electric-only option for covering short distances, which can be useful in urban environments. Suzuki claims that the Swace will deliver up to 64.2mpg on the combined cycle, so I was quite pleased that I achieved just a fraction short of that in everyday driving that included short trips and longer motorway stints.

Overall, the Swace is a lovely practical and good-looking family car that delivers a lot of bang for your bucks.

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Have your say on new design code for the East Riding

People in the East Riding of Yorkshire are being invited to have a say on a new design code that will help shape the way their neighbourhoods look in the future.

The council held a public survey in March 2022, encouraging people to share what was important to them in



terms of design and where they live. That survey received more than 1,600 responses.

The council has now created a draft design code for the East Riding, and residents are invited to give their feedback as part of a formal public consultation, running from Monday, September 11, to Sunday, 22 October.

The Government is introducing design codes across the country as part of the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill, which is currently going through Parliament.

The codes aim to create beautiful, sustainable, and liveable communities, guiding things such as architecture, local building materials and street layouts.

In March 2022, East Riding of Yorkshire Council was one of 25 planning authorities chosen as "pathfinders" for the new design code policy.

The council received £160,000 from the Government to help create a code outlining the requirements that planning agents, developers and applicants must follow for new developments in the East Riding.

At full council meeting in July, Councillor Leo Hammond, portfolio holder for planning, communities and public protection, said it was "a mammoth task" but that the team at the council had produced an excellent document.

The East Riding design code has been created with input from the public, planning agents, specialist officers, developers, architects and parish and town councils.

It includes requirements that apply to all developments in the county, and others that apply to certain place types, such as town centres, villages and neighbourhoods.

Cllr Hammond said: "I was very happy to see that many of the issues that are regularly raised by planning committee members are addressed in this document, such as parking, tree-lined streets, transport links, garden sizes, and crucially, encouraging better housing designs rather than little red boxes.

"I think this code is a very exciting development for the East Riding and gives us an even stronger hand to ensure development is the best it can be for our area."

The public consultation runs until Sunday 15 October, and the feedback will feed into a final draft design code, which should then come into force early

next year.



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Commuted Sums help refurbish a play area in Swanland

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wanland Playing Fields Association have been awarded £91,147.13 from East Riding of Yorkshire Council as part of Commuted Sums from local housing developments to refurbish the play area on the playing fields. Swanland Parish Council will also be contributing £9,873.60 towards the £98,736 project.

The improvement works will include two Cradle Swings, two Flat Swings, an Adventure Trail, a Wheelchair Access Roundabout, an inclusive Springer, a Daffodil Roundabout, an Alpha Multi Play Unit with Two Towers, ladders, a fireman pole and a slide and a Tri-Box Multi Play Unit with climbing frames and a slide. New fencing will also be installed to separate the play area from the car park

Alan Smith, Swanland Playing Fields Association Chair, said: "The Swanland Playing Field Association (SPFA) administers the playing fields on behalf of the Parish Council, relying upon volunteers, selfgenerated funds and a relatively small grant from the Parish Council.

"The play park is just one part of the activities available, but a very important part. The cost of new equipment has been prohibitive and as a result much of the equipment is over ten years old. This year alone, the repair costs for existing equipment amounted to over £20,000 which again was beyond the SPFA budget, meaning priorities would have to be made and some equipment even taken out of service.

"The awarding of the Commuted Sums means a huge upgrade to the play park with new rides and amenities bringing it up to the 21st century, a wonderful amenity for the people of Swanland and the surrounding areas. The new equipment should be installed and ready for use in the Autumn. The SPFA would like to thank Lea Anne Wright and her amazing team at the council for all their help and assistance in achieving the award."

Councillor Leo Hammond, portfolio holder for planning, communities and public protection, said: "Once again, Commuted Sums from local housing developments as a condition of their planning approval are making a real difference in Swanland. This play area will be transformed by these improvements, and its very pleasing that we have been able to facilitate them."
