





# Investing in property abroad

ore and more people are adding international investment property to their portfolios. It's changing the way we think about financial planning. Over the past 10 years or so, interest rates and stock market returns have been low. Many investors have started to acknowledge that their home is their highest performing asset. They've started to ask the ques-

"What if my portfolio of investments contained more property than just my home? What if it had two, three, four or more properties?'

Many workers are looking at overseas property as an alternative to pensions. With all the UK pension scandals, like miss-selling and shortfalls within the funds, consumers have lost confidence and want more control over their own hard earned savings. The fact the government introduced a tax on pension funds has further highlighted the concerns the public have on pension

The key to effective and profitable overseas property investment is to know which property to buy and when to buy it and in what location. An investor should ask themselves - how much would I need to invest, how much return could I get, and how easy will it be to realise the profit when I want it?

As well as choosing the right property in the right location, buying 'off-plan' is a valuable investment option - usually offering significant discounts on built prices. It requires lower short term capital outlay, and offers potential for excellent returns.

Buying 'Off Plan' is a familiar concept to many property investors. It is best described as investing in a property when it is on the drawing board, as opposed to a completed building, often before a brick has been laid. At this stage, final planning and

building permissions will have been granted, but the building work will either not be completed or has not been started. The price of a property at this stage is discounted substantially below the final completed price.

The payment arrangements for buying Off Plan would usually be by a deposit at the point of contract exchange - followed either by staged payments or by a one-off payment at completion. With limited initial capital investment, and typical build times of 12-24 months this can result in impressive financial returns.

Of course everyone has heard horror stories about unwary investors buying abroad - but these are the exception rather than the rule. The wise investor will always take sensible precautions to protect themselves - just as they would when buying in the UK.

Investors should always make sure that their deposit monies are protected by a bank guarantee or similar arrangement - most reliable developers will have these in place. Reliable legal advice is also essential - to check that the contract with the developer is watertight, to conduct rigorous searches on the property, and to ensure that that all necessary planning consents etc are in place.

Obviously Off-Plan properties can experience minor modifications, but it is not unusual for Off-Plan investment property to yield between 30-70% gross returns within an average two year period.

Many investors choose to keep their investment properties once they are built. With lower interest rates often on offer overseas, and income generated through holiday lets (another consideration when choosing the location), a well chosen property will pay for itself. The investor can continue to see their equity grow - and enjoy their own holiday home in the sun!





## Rich Reynolds makes outstanding debut for East Riding

ich Reynolds, of Manor Garth, Skidby, made an outstanding debut for East Riding in their Yorkshire Inter-District Union League match against Teesside at Cleveland last

The 22-year-old amateur, who is a member of the Beverley and East Riding, where he works for club professional Alex Ashby, won his call-up to the team after showing tremendous form this season in which he made a significant contribution when the Westwoodbased club retained their Division Two status in the 36-hole Yorkshire Team Championship at Bradford's Hawksworth course

Officials were disappointed that the East Riding's slim title hopes finally ended when they failed to beat struggling Teesside at Cleveland, but they could not disguise their delight at "rookie" Reynolds' outstanding performances in a match in which the points were shared.

Jeff Lambert, the union president - whose Cottingham-based plumbing and heating engineering company, with headquarters in Inglemire Lane, bears his name - was very impressed with Reynolds' performance at the long and tough Cleveland links course, where the rough was savage, and where neither of his matches went further than the 14th hole.

"He partnered his club colleague Michael Helyard in the foursomes when they took every opportunity to work out a game plan for their singles", said Lambert. "They did not fall into the trap - as inexperienced youngsters often do - of looking to gain an advantage by trying to smash the ball out of sight from the tee. Rich showed a lot of composure, and played every shot after serious appraisal of the situation. an old head on young shoulders", added the official.

Reynolds was also invited to play in the following league match, against champions Bradford at Brandesburton's Hainsworth Park on August 19, but had to decline the invitation because of work commitments while Ashby was on holiday.

But as East Riding continue a re-building programme following the loss of many of their star players to the professional ranks, there is no doubt that the Skidby youngster will add to his representative honours.

Time spent - two hours in the village, half an hour on the telephone and one hour at the Skidby Mill sorting out the


Money spent - not as much as you would think.

## **Ingredient of the Month**

## **Oranges**

ranges belong to the Citrus family which includes other fruit such as lemons, grapefruit, tangerines, mandarins and kumquats. They are popular in many parts of the world both for eating and as an ingredient in recipes, with all parts of the fruit being used in various ways.

## **Origin and History**

There are two main types of oranges: Sweet and Bitter. Citrus aurantium the bitter orange, originated in China where it was well documented in writings by 300BC and by 100BC bitter orange seeds had made their way to Europe. The sweet orange, Citrus sinensis, is also believed to have originated in South East Asia (India, China and Indo-China). They had certainly been cultivated in China for centuries although the name "orange" comes from the Sanskrit word "narangah "which means fragrant.

Columbus is credited for taking first seeds to the New World in 1493 and for having established plantings in Hispaniola. The first plantings of sweet orange in what is now the United States were established in Florida between 1513 and 1565.

## **Types and Cultivation**

Of the bitter varieties, Seville oranges are possibly the best known and most widely available. These are not really suitable for eating raw and are often used in the making of preserves, in particular marmalade

Sweet oranges are easily categorised into four groups: round, navel, blood and acidless oranges. There are many varieties of Round orange and these are the ones most of us can buy readily from supermarkets and greengrocers. Navel oranges were so named because of the small secondary fruit embedded in the end of the fruit which often resembles a navel (belly button). Blood oranges are so called because of red colouring in the flesh, the intensity of which varies from a few streaks to almost complete. Acidless oranges are characterised by a sweet, but bland flavour.

Orange trees grow to 7 metres/22 feet in commercial orchards although they can be larger if not pruned. Even though orange trees will often come true from seed, as it takes between 8 and 15 years for the tree to start bearing fruit, the most common practice for commercial growers is by budding or grafting onto desirable rootstocks, which start bearing fruit within three years. Most cultivated varieties are self-pollinating however. Commercially, much of the harvesting is still done manually by hand. Once the fruit have been picked they are sent to packing houses where they are washed and graded before being shipped for market.

Because most of the fruit you buy has come from budded or grafted trees as described above, their seed will probably not produce fruit of the same quality. Therefore if you want to grow oranges at home it's best to buy citrus plants and only grow oranges from seed for ornamental purposes. Orange plants cannot tolerate frosts so unless you live in a frost free area, they will have to be grown indoors preferably in a conservatory or greenhouse.

## **Buying and Storing**

Select fruit which are firm, well-coloured and feel heavy. Store oranges at room temperature to keep them at their juiciest. They should keep well for close to two weeks. Alternatively, store unwrapped in the refrigerator. When buying navel oranges, select those with small sized navels as larger navels indicate that they were overripe when picked.

#### Oranges in Cooking

Oranges are a versatile fruit which can be incorporated into sweet and savoury dishes. The flavour goes well with cinnamon, mint, chocolate and almonds as well as many fish, meats and poultry. All parts of the orange are used in cooking: the juice, flesh and rind, altogether or separately.

When using the rind, try to pare it thinly to avoid incorporating the white pith which can sometimes give a slightly bitter taste.

When juicing oranges, more juice can be extracted if the oranges are at room temperature. If they are cold, pierce the skins with a fork in several places then place in the microwave for 20-30 seconds. Alternatively, place in a bowl of boiling water for 30 seconds.



## **Pride of England Pie**

## Serve hot or cold

A scrumptious pie using two of England's favourite ingredients: Bangers and Apples.

Don't bother going for an expensive sausage - just your ordinary banger will do - making it very economical too.

Prep and cooking time: 70mins

## Serves 4 - Ingredients

400g/14oz Shortcrust Pastry 450g/1lb Ordinary Pork Sausages or sausage meat 2 teasp Mixed Herbs 2 Small Dessert Apples, peeled cored and sliced Salt and Pepper Beaten Egg to glaze

## Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 220C, 425F, gas mark 7. Divide the pastry in half and use the first half to line a 20cm/8inch pie plate.
- 2. Skin the sausages then place in a bowl together with the mixed herbs, salt and pepper and mash well with a fork. Spread half the mixture over the pastry, then add the sliced apples and finally top with the remaining sausage meat.
- 3. Dampen the edges of the pastry with a little beaten egg then use the remaining pastry to cover the pie. Press the edges together firmly, knock up and flute with your fingers or decorate with a fork.
- 4. Brush the top with beaten egg to glaze and decorate with pastry leaves if desired. Make a small hole in the centre of the pie then place in the oven for 15 minutes.
- 5. Reduce the oven temperature to 170C, 325F, gas mark 3 and continue to cook for a further 35-40 minutes.

Serve immediately or leave to cool then refrigerate and serve cold.



# In the Garden



## Fruit and Vegetable Garden

## **Apple Fruit**

Pick apples and blackberries for use in pies and desserts.

Pick autumn raspberries as they start to ripen.

Cut out fruited canes of summer raspberries and tie in new canes that will fruit next year. Select strong, healthy canes and cut out weak, forked or misplaced ones (such as those growing out into the paths).

Blackcurrants are often pruned commercially this month (straight after harvesting), but it is better for home gardeners to wait until the leaves have fallen, and to prune the plants while dormant during the winter. Valuable time is best saved for more urgent jobs that cannot wait beyond this month.

Water any new strawberry beds planted this season. If you have not yet planted new beds, this is really the last chance to do so, and only then in milder parts of the country. New plants need to establish before the cold sets in.

Lift and pot up rooted strawberry runners from vigorous plants.

New trees can be planted once the autumn sets in and the dry weather is over. The soil will still be quite warm in September even if the weather is cool, and the roots of new plants will benefit from this. This is particularly important for peaches and nectarines. Other fruit trees may have a higher tolerance of cold at the roots, and can be planted later.

## Vegetables

Continue to sow vegetables for overwintering, to mature next spring: turnip, spinach, winter lettuce, Oriental vegetables and seed of overwintering onions, both salad and bulb types.

Plant overwintering onion sets in late September.

Spring cabbages that were sown last month are probably ready for planting out. Cover them with horticultural fleece or netting to stop the pigeons shredding them.

Remaining outdoor tomatoes should be picked by the end of the month and ripened indoors. The whole truss can be cut off to allow the fruits to ripen 'on the vine', perhaps under a cloche or on a windowsill. Any green fruits can be used in chutneys.

Lift onions and shallots once the foliage has started to die back. Do not be tempted to bend over the tops by hand as this can reduce their effective storage time. Allow them to dry on the soil surface if weather permits, otherwise dry in a well-ventilated shed and store in a moisturefree place. Thick-necked onions should be used rather than stored, as they may be prone to rots.

## Top 10 jobs

- 1. Divide herbaceous perennials
- 2. Pick autumn raspberries
- 3. Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy
- 4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them
- 5. Net ponds before leaf fall gets underway
- 6. Keep up with watering of new plants, using rain or grey water if possible
- 7. Start to reduce the frequency of houseplant watering
- 8. Clean out cold frames and greenhouses so that they are ready for use in the autumn
- 9. Cover leafy vegetable crops with bird-proof netting
- 10. Give evergreen hedges a final trim



## Flower garden

Sow sweet peas in a cold frame or the greenhouse for early summer

Sow other hardy annuals (e.g. Consolida, Calendula, Centaurea, Limnanthes and poppies) in situ. If you have very heavy clay soil, you may get better results by sowing under cover in containers or plug trays, as the seedlings are less likely to rot.

If you sowed any spring-flowering biennials such as Viola, Digitalis (foxglove) or Erysimum (wallflowers), earlier in the summer, they will now need planting out.

This is a good time of year to plant new perennials, especially towards the end of September, as the soil is still warm, but moisture levels are increasing. There is still time for them to establish before the real cold

Bring inside any tender perennials, such as Fuchsia, Gazania, Lantana and Abutilon, before frosts cause damage.

Wait for the first frosts to hit dahlias and cannas before lifting the tubers or rhizomes. In warmer regions, they may be alright left in the ground, but do cover the crowns with a protective layer of straw or brack-

Buy spring-flowering bedding plants, such as Bellis, Primula, wallflowers, and violas.

Buy or order spring-flowering bulbs. Try to plant daffodils (Narcissus) by mid-September for the best results. Tulips are best left until November. Remember that there are many other bulbs to choose from: Muscari (grape hyacinths), Chionodoxa (glory of the snow), Scilla, Ipheion and crocuses are all possibilities among many others.

Continue to deadhead plants such as Dahlia, Delphinium, Rosa and Penstemon to prolong the display and give colour well into the month.

Continue cutting back perennials that are fading and dying down.

Now is a good time to divide any overgrown or tired looking clumps of alpines and herbaceous perennials such as crocosmias. This will invigorate them, and improve flowering and overall shape, for next year.

Continue collecting and storing seed from perennials still forming

Take cuttings of tender perennials, such as Pelargonium and Osteospermum. These plants often do better grown from new cuttings each year, rather than being overwintered in pots as adult plants. If you do not have a greenhouse, then use a light windowsill to grow them on.

## Lawns and meadows

Mow less frequently, and raise the height of cut as the growth rate of the grass slows down. This will help the lawn to withstand the last of the warm, dry weather, and also keep it resistant to treading as the wet weather arrives.

You can now start to think about autumn lawn care, including scarifying, aerating and top dressing.

This is an ideal time of year to create new lawns from turf or seed. (Reproduced by kind permission of www.rhs.org.uk)

## Computers on holiday and some handy hints

irst of all apologies to those who looked out for the article in the August issue and found it absent. Normal service is now resumed.

The aftermath of the June floods continues for many of us and has raised host of problems to sort out, not just damaged equipment, furniture and belongings, but the paperwork involved in insurance claims and moving house. One useful site in this regard is www.royalmail.com/changeofaddress This free service lets you build a list of organisations to inform of your new or temporary address. You can also arrange for Royal Mail to redirect your mail by completing a form and handing in at the Post office and paying the

If you're travelling around or are away on holiday, sometimes you might want to use a computer to get information or perhaps check your email. This is always possible through an Internet café or even the local Library sometimes. Email is normally quite easy to do, certainly if you have a Hotmail, Yahoo or Googlemail address, you can just use any computer to log in to your account as normal (make sure none of the boxes are ticked to do with saving user names or passwords when using public computers). If you have another provider like Orange (was Freeserve), Tiscali etc., you can just go online and go to their homepage and then click on the link for email and again log in as normal, you will then be able to view messages, reply or even send new ones. For Karoo customers, just go to the newly designed homepage at www.karoo.co.uk and click on Webmail, and sign in using your Karoo email address and password. When you return home all the incoming messages will still be downloaded to your own computer via your normal email program; Outlook Express for instance.

Talking of holidays, whilst away recently, we found the hotel lifts a bit unreliable and usually very slow. It got me wondering with today's technology what the fastest lift is like. The answer is that the express lifts inside Taipei 101 (currently the world's tallest building at an impressive 508m), travel at an incredible 37 mph and cost a cool US\$2m each. They are manufactured by Toshiba, better known for their Laptops and other computer equipment. In order not to compete with white-knuckle theme park rides, the lifts are aerodynamically shaped and come complete with acoustic tiles and insulating shrouds and the world's first pressure control system to prevent ear-popping! Going up . .

Memory sticks, pen drives, USB drives, call them what you will, are the latest way of storing and moving data around conveniently. Instead of a suitcase full of floppy disks, one little stick the size of a key fob does the same job but quicker. Storage capacity is increasing all the time starting at 512kb to at least 2Gb - that equates to thousands of photos, or even music tracks etc. You need Windows XP or Vista to use them, but they just plug in

to any USB socket and are ready to go. They come in a range of colours and even some new fun designs aimed at children and students, and we now keep them in stock.

If you are running Windows Vista just a reminder about the 'ReadyBoost' feature. This lets you increase the available Ram on your PC or laptop just by plugging in a memory stick or even a memory card like SD for instance. When you do, Vista will ask if you want to speed up your system and the check the drive for performance, if it passes, voila your computer will go faster!

Back to basics tips. Many people are often confused when starting to use a mouse, about the different clicks ñ i.e. left click, double click and right click. They are in that order because the primary use of course, is the single left click used to launch programs from the Start Menu or changing pages on the Internet etc. Double clicking is used open icons or folders on your Desktop or any other place where they are grouped together like in My Computer or Windows Explorer. The speed of double clicking can be set in Control Panel and Mouse Properties. Finally the right click is only ever single, and is used to open a menu to perform such tasks as to rename a file, copy or delete it. In other words many of the things available on the File or Edit drop down menus at the top of the screen. Once you have opened a menu you only use a single left click to do any of those tasks.

To practice this, click on Start and My Documents and in a suitable empty spot away from the icons, right click and then click New, and Folder and then while it is highlighted in blue, type a name on the keyboard and press Enter. Then right click on that folder and click Rename, and type a new name on the keyboard and press Enter. You could then use this folder to save documents into, or if you decide you don't want it, just right click on it, and this time click Delete. Remember if you delete a folder it will include all the contents, and will go to the Recycle Bin.





## Hallgate Schools

any people have personal memories of Hallgate Schools but not many go as far back as the Barker brothers, .Harold and Albert - both have passed away but both told me some of their memories of the 'lads' department prior to the first wold war.

Harold started school at three years old in common with others as described in the July issue. Mrs Moorby was the Head Mistress - "a nice lady, strict but fair - she taught us the sounds of letters like a,b,c,d, and how to make words from them."

## **Stone Throwing**

Harold was born in 1906 in one of a pair of houses where the Bargains 4U shop is now. He vividly remembered one incident when the new boys only school was being built, between 1911 and 1913. Some boys were throwing rubble at each other despite being given strict instructions to keep away from that area. One boy named Dale threw some at a boy named Stabler and blinded him in one eye. That, plus Mr Moorby's cane, effectively put an end to venturing on to the site.

Harold also felt the weight of Mr Moorby's cane one day. He and some others had 'pinched' some carrots off a cart being loaded in Station Yard. Mr Fisher, who's cart it was, reported them to Mr Moorby who applied the usual deterrent!

Because he favoured the very short 'back and sides' haircut, Harold gained the nick-name 'Gerry' from the Prussian style that was popular at the time.

#### On the school roof

Albert was a few years older than his brother. He told me the following story. Apparently, Mr Moorby sometimes went to the Education Department at County Hall in Beverley on a Friday afternoon. On this particular Friday lunch time Albert decided that he would see a lot more of Cottingham if he climbed onto the school roof. So he 'shinned up" a drain pipe and proceeded to make his way to the top; this was close to the little snicket that runs from Hallgate at the back of the school - the old boys' end. He was busy giving an account of what he could see to a group of admiring pals below, when he heard footsteps coming along the snicket beneath - horror f horrors - it was 'Gaffer Moorby.' Clearly, he had not gone to Beverley that afternoon!

Albert's hurried movements above caught the ear and eye of the Headmaster who ordered Albert down immediately and told him to report to his room.

"Now Barker, you know what you are going to get don't you?" "Yes sir."

"Right - bend over," and Albert received 'six of the best'.

"You know why I have punished you Barker don't you?" enquired Mr Moorby.

"Yes sir - 'cos I climbed on school roof."

"Partly Barker, partly; but not only did you do wrong in going up there, you could have had a nasty accident - you could have fallen - broke an arm or a leg or your neck, you silly lad. Perhaps now you will think about the consequences of your actions before you do anything stupid again."

It was a lesson that Albert never forgot; he was wounded twice in the first world war but he claimed that it was not his fault - the Germans were to blame that time!

#### Founder of Barkers

Albert was the founder of Barkers shop in Hallgate and was over 100 years old when he died; in later years he lived down Kirby Drive, close to where he had once ventured on to the school roof to 'get a better view' so many years before.

On 22nd May 1905, 204 boys were present and - "Mr Ness called also Sergeant Martin in reference to some stone throwing in the

bogs some days ago. I warned all boys against this reprehensible practice."

The 'bogs' was an area of low marshy ground which extended from the end of the footpath at the back of the present Creyke Close up to Station Yard or Road as it is called now. One path branched left to the back of Donkin's Mill, while another went straight across 'bogs' to where a rail goods line ran up an incline parallel with Station Yard. This was the way home for those of us who lived on New Village Road or the Cottingham end of Endike Lane and had been for years. Eventually the area was filled in and the Danish Bacon Company was built there.

"15th June 1905. I had several complaints made against Ernest Grantham who seems absolutely unable to keep his fists away from other boys whenever and wherever he meets them. Hardly a day passes without some complaint made against him for striking, bullying, interfering etc. both on school premises and off."

Mr Moorby again -

"the superabundance of apples this year is giving considerable trouble in school. Boys and apples seem absolutely indissoluble!

In the girls department most of the pupil teachers had passed their Article 50 and became assistant teachers and Elsie Boothby and Edith Ness were passing their annual pupil teacher exams and gaining confidence and experience. A Miss Mumby from Fountain Road School joined the staff as assistant after having passed her Article 50. Six girls asked permission to take their next Labour Exam for Certificates to give them total exemption from school.

An H.M.I.'s report on 17th August 1906 for the girls department states -

"The order is good and the school maintains it's position with the aid of a hard working staff, though some of the work should be better organised in the lower classes and that of Standard 1 taken on broader lines. the room where this class is frequently taught is over the furnace room and becomes close."


In 1906 reference is made to the Rev. Wolstencraft visiting the department on behalf of the Authority; they proposed to start evening classes in the village and possibly hold them in some of the school buildings. Pupils were asked to deliver circulars to every house in their streets.

On the 25th September -

"Rev Minton called in reference to caterpults and stone throwing and window breaking."

Vandalism is nothing new!

By 1907 or 08, the number of children on the roles was growing quickly and the old National School building on the corner of King Street and Finkle Street was opened up once more to take an overflow of boys who were all ex-standard V11. 'Gerry' Barker remembered going there and playing on Market Green at lunch time at the back of the Reading Rooms and Mortuary on the opposite corner! Consequently the Education Authority began to plan for a new building opposite the School Board building, but of a similar design; this was to house all the boys from seven years old and upwards, while the girls and the infants would be spread among the vacated classrooms.

# Matt's Monthly Motivation

2007 has been a bit of a strange year. Heavy floods and an ever sporadic weather system have resulted in a rather depleted, arguably non-existent summer. With the darker nights rolling in and the increasing unlikeliness of brighter weather many of us have suffered with morale and self-motivation. What a lot of people are unaware of however, is that we may be suffering from a mild form of Seasonal Affective Disorder.

Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) is a depression endured by an individual over the winter months. According to the SAD Association (www.sada.org.uk), the condition is caused by "a biochemical imbalance due to the shortening of daylight hours and the lack of sunlight in winter". The support group go on to say, 'for many people SAD is a seriously disabling illness, preventing them from functioning normally without continuous medical treatment. For others, it is a mild but debilitating condition causing discomfort but not severe suffering. We call this subsyndromal SAD or winter blues.'

Awareness of this mental condition has existed for more than 150 years, but it was only recognised as a disorder in the early 1980s. Many people with SAD may not be aware that it exists or that help is available.

SAD can be a debilitating condition, preventing sufferers from functioning at their best. It could affect their personal and professional lives, and seriously limit their potential. It is important to learn about the symptoms, and to know that there is treatment to help people with SAD live a productive life year-round.

Unfortunately, SAD can be difficult to diagnose, since many of the symptoms are similar to those of other types of depression or bipolar disorder. Even physical conditions, such as thyroid problems, can look like depression. Generally, symptoms that recur for at least 2 consecutive winters, without any other explanation for the changes in mood and behaviour, indicate the presence of SAD. They may include:

- \* change in appetite, in particular a craving for sweet or starchy foods
- \* weight gain
- \* decreased energy
- \* fatigue
- \* tendency to oversleep
- \* difficulty concentrating
- \* irritability
- \* avoidance of social situations
- \* feelings of anxiety and despair
- \* loss of libido

The symptoms of SAD generally disappear when spring arrives. For some people, this happens suddenly with a short time of heightened activity. For others, the effects of SAD gradually dissipate.

There are ways in which we can combat SAD without seeking professional advice. For example, choosing to work in brighter environments or sitting by a window when inactive should contribute to the reduction in symptoms as should obvious pointers like regular exercise and a healthy well-balanced diet.

The SAD Association state, 'Light therapy has been shown to be effective in up to 85 per cent of diagnosed cases. That is, exposure, for up to four hours per day (average 1-2 hours) to very bright light, at least ten times the intensity of ordinary domestic lighting.' They go on to explain, 'light treatment should be used daily in winter (and dull periods in summer) starting in early autumn when the first symptoms appear. It consists of sitting two to three feet away from a specially designed light box, usually on a table, allowing the light to shine directly through the eyes.'

Light boxes arenít available through the NHS but can be purchased through specialist retailers for approximately £100.


