



The Internet has been instrumental in bringing about many changes, and one area that has really evolved is trav-L el; now the whole world is just a click away! The massive growth of budget airlines, hotels and tours online has made us all more independent. The TV signal is different in the US (NTSC), so although you are not likely to want to cart home a 50" flat screen, items that connect through like DVD players, and even video cameras and games machines normally only use that same system

Visiting a huge Apple Mac store in one of the shopping malls, I found it absolutely buzzing with people. There were good savings to be made on the latest generation of iPods and sound systems, but just like here, no iPhones in stock! I couldn't resist the new iPod Touch, (which looks just like the iPhone), but if you just thought they were for playing music through those distinctive white earphones, think again. Internet Explorer 8 is now available in beta form. Remember though as it is still being tested, it would not be a good idea to rely on it as your main source of Internet browsing. See it at: www.microsoft.com/ie8

Spam continues to fill many of our email inboxes, as mentioned last month. One of the latest subjects is greetings card, so if you receive one or more of these and you don't know anyone that has sent you one, just delete it. There has also been a spate of bogus anti virus emails, with names like XP or Vista anti virus, which of course there is no such thing.

Laptops sales continue to enjoy a massive growth factor. This has been helped to a large degree by the mini-laptop or sub-note-book, like the EEE PC from Asus and now other manufacturers have brought out similar models.

This also is driving the popularity of mobile broadband. I was asked about this on my Radio Humberside feature recently, and the answer is, yes it is a good idea. For those not familiar with this term, it is basically Broadband Internet access via the mobile phone networks. Sounds expensive? — Not anymore. You can sign up for a contract from only £10 per month and get a free USB modem (also known as a dongle), then you can access the Internet anywhere on a laptop or computer without a telephone line. Obviously the amount of time you spend online or more importantly the amount you download will determine how much you should spend, so do check with the provider first.

Microsoft Office has been reduced in price recently, so it is a good time to buy if you need Word, Excel or PowerPoint. The Home & Student version also allows for up to three computers in one household to run it. Call us for details.

Brindisi in Italy

Situated at the Southern heel of Italy in the area known as Apulia, what a super little town Brindisi is, amidst a very pretty harbour, this was another port of call we have the pleasure of visiting on my anniversary cruise.

Before arriving, any write up, had shown the port in a very bad light and not the place anyone would wish to visit, other than for the purpose of catching a ferry over to Greece. Our ship docked only a short stroll from the historic centre which has a wonderful flat promenade ideal for anyone with walking difficulties, plus the main street is complete with ramps for wheelchairs on all of the street corners. Betty's Café is a great place to stop for a coffee and an ice cream and watch the world go by.

Having arrived on a Sunday the town is quieter with only a few news stands and craft shops open, a lovely day for a walk as it is not too busy. The streets where spotless for us too as the Pope is due to visit next weekend and it is obvious they have been getting ready for their big event!

Over the centuries Brindisi has been a main port in Europe with major sights depicting the various rulers. We headed off on our own adventure armed with a map. We cut through several little alleys that emerged into small squares – in one we found a lady filling a pail from a Well.

The Roman Columns are the oldest remaining structure. One has lost its top but still towers way above the buildings whilst the other one is not so intact.

The City has old walls running around its original perimeter and a fort to go with it, that is still to this day in use by the military.

There are many churches in the centre, one a Norman church from the Napoleonic times was open and had an exhibition of times gone bye and glass panels in the floor showing even older foundations. The Cathedral is an elaborate building both on the inside and outside and built alongside one of the main gates to the old city.

The grand square has a huge memorial depicting sadder times, children where enjoying running around whilst older locals where enjoying passing the time of day on a shady bench. As many citizens seem to live in apartments I am sure this open area is well used throughout the year.

After all the mornings walking, the afternoon was spent strolling along the promenade with many Italians looking at the glamorous yachts and the small fishing boats with fisherman mending their nets.

The afternoon was rounded off with a huge ice cream in Betty's before we sailed out of the harbour with the biggest crowd on the quay turning out for the event, to wave farewell as we sailed off into the distance.

Dealing with the Changed

he announcement by the Chancellor Alistair Darling about the changes to the personal allowance and the basic rate tax band for 2008/09 took HMRC by surprise as much as everyone else. It has taken a few months to work out how to tweak the PAYE system so everyone pays the right amount of tax in 2008/09.

HMRC have now decided not to reissue every single PAYE code. Instead employers will have to add 60 to every PAYE code that has an L suffix. This means code 543L will become 603L. For all other letter suffixes you must wait for a new PAYE code to be issued. L is the most frequently used suffix, so you as an employer are effectively doing HMRC's work, and picking up the costs incurred by the Chancellor's change of mind.

The new codes should be applied from the first payday on or after 7 September 2008. The PAYE tables, or your payroll computer system, will ensure that monthly paid employees, who are on the basic rate of tax will receive a tax reduction through the payroll of around £60 over the remainder of the tax year. This will normally reduce the employee's total tax deductions for the month, but in rare cases it will create a refund for the employee of tax he has paid earlier in the tax year.

Where a refund of tax is due you should deduct the amount needed to make the refund from the total of PAYE, NICs, CIS and student loans due to be paid over to HMRC for that period. If this total is not large enough to cover the refunds due to your entire workforce, you can ask for funding directly from HMRC.

Do this by contacting the relevant HMRC Accounts Office by post or fax. You also need to inform the HMRC Accounts Office that there is no PAYE payment to make for the period, by telephoning 0845 366 7816 with your payroll details or online at: http://www.hmrc.gov.uk/howtopay/paye nil.htm

HMRC are sending out new PAYE tables and guidance to all employers included on an employers' CD-ROM in August. You will also be able to order paper versions of leaflets and forms from the HMRC orderline (08457 646 646) after 12 August. If you have any questions about how to treat new employees, dealing with student employees or related matters do ask us.

August Question and Answer Corner

Q. I have a large collection of music CDs that I built up over twenty years. I am now gradually selling these CDs online and through magazines, as many are rarities. Do I have to report the money I make to the tax office?

A. If your CD collection was purchased for you own enjoyment and not with the aim of selling the individual items, you are not trading as a CD dealer, you are just disposing of some surplus personal property. The money you receive is not subject to income tax as you are not trading, and as long as each CD sells for less than £6,000 there is no capital gains tax to pay.





Ingredient of the Month

Mushrooms

Mushrooms are not a vegetable, but the fruiting body of a fungi, starting life as microscopic spores which are so small that they are not visible to the naked eye. It is believed that they have been in existence on earth for 90 million years, and whilst many ancient cultures used and revered them, particularly for medicinal purposes, it wasn't until the 1650s that they started to be cultivated in limestone caves on the outskirts of Paris and it was to be 200 years later in 1891 that the first book on mushroom growing would be published.

Medicinal Uses

Today mushrooms are eaten worldwide primarily as a culinary food ingredient with most of us having forgotten their medicinal and nutritional value. They have been used for medicinal purposes in oriental medicine for over 7,000 years and the ancient Egyptians recognised their healing powers over 6,500 years ago. They were also acknowledged in the writings of Hippocrates, he of Hippocratic Oath fame, and the herbalists Pliny (Roman), Dioscorides, and Galen (greek).

Some of the current medicinal drugs derived from fungi include Statins which control cholesterol levels, Cyclosporin which stops rejection in transplant patients and, of course the 40's wonder-drug, penicillin. Recent reports have shown mushrooms to be a "superfood". Varieties are a good source of phosphorus, magnesium, potassium and selenium, three essential B-vitamins: riboflavin, niacin and pantothenic acid and are one of the few natural sources of vitamin D. Mushrooms are the favourite of many chefs and cooks due to their versatility and variety. They are suitable for all methods of cooking including microwaving and larger specimens are excellent when stuffed with the filling of choice then baked.

Most mushrooms do not need to be peeled. Simply trim the stem end if necessary and wipe clean. They can then be cooked whole, cut in halves or quarters, sliced thickly or thinly or chopped before cooking. Larger stems can be separated from the caps before cooking by either twisting off or cutting.

Commonly Cultivated White and Brown Mushrooms

The white Agaricus bisporus mushroom, discovered in 1932 by Lewis F Lambert in Pennsylvania, accounts for 95% sales in Britain. It is picked at four stages (grades) of its growing cycle, these are button, closed cup, open cup and large flat.

Baked Garlic Mushrooms

Ingredients

20 Open Cup Mushrooms (about 5cm/2-inches in diameter)

3 tbsp Olive Oil

75g /3oz Butter, softened

3 Garlic Cloves, finely chopped

1 tbsp Freshly Chopped Thyme Leaves

1 tbsp Freshly Chopped Parsley

1 tbsp Lemon Juice

50g/2oz Fresh Breadcrumbs

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 200C, 400F, Gas Mark 6. Remove the stalks from the mushrooms and set aside. Heat the oil in a large frying pan until very hot, add the mushroom caps in one layer cap side down and fry for 1 minute only.
- 2. Remove the caps from the frying pan with a slotted spoon or tongs and

arrange in a shallow ovenproof dish cap side down, in one layer.

- 3. Chop the mushroom stalks finely then place in a bowl together with the butter, garlic, herbs and lemon juice and mix well.
- 4. Divide the garlic butter mixture evenly between the mushroom caps, sprinkle over the breadcrumbs, lightly pressing them into the butter then bake for 10 minutes. Serve hot.

Mushroom Quiche

Ingredients

225g/8oz Shortcrust Pastry

2 Shallots, finely chopped

14g/1/2 oz Butter

100g/4oz Button Mushrooms, sliced

1 tbsp Lemon Juice

1 tbsp Freshly chopped Parsley

Salt and Pepper

1 Egg

1 Egg Yolk

180ml/6 fl.oz. Single Cream

3 tbsp Freshly Grated Parmesan

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas mark 4. Roll out the pastry to 5mm/1/4inch and use to line a 20cm/8inch flan tin. Line with grease-proof paper and baking beans and bake in the oven for 15 minutes.
- 2. Melt the butter in a pan and simmer the finely chopped shallots until soft and transparent. Add the mushrooms to the frying-pan with a squeeze of lemon juice. Toss over a moderate heat for a further 3 minutes until slightly softened. Remove from the heat, stir in the finely chopped parsley and season with salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste.
- 3. In a bowl, put the whole egg and egg yolk with the cream and freshly grated Parmesan cheese beat with a fork until thoroughly blended. Season to taste with salt and freshly ground black pepper.
- Spread the mushroom mixture over the base of the pastry case. Very gently pour in the cream mixture, being careful not to disturb the mushrooms
- 5. Bake the quiche for 25 30 minutes or until the filling is well puffed, set and a rich golden colour.

Serve hot or cold.

ross the street and take the road heading north west. After a short distance, cross Cliff Road and enter Hall Garth Park through ornate

Immediately on entering the park, bear left across the grassed area heading for the corner of a car park. Pass this car park on the left and bear slightly to the right to emerge on Eastgate opposite the school gates and turn left.

On reaching the next junction, cross the road and turn right to a point where the road swings hard right. At this point turn left and walk down Mount Pleasant to reach the B1244 road. On reaching this road turn right and walk along the footpath.

After about one mile and when the road swings hard left, locate and cross a footbridge on the right and walk up the field with the hedge on your right. Follow this hedge round to the left and pass Brockholme farm on the left.

On reaching the end of the field, turn left at the hedge and after about one hundred metres turn right and walk with a narrow plantation on the left. Pass Buttercup farm on the left and maintain the same direction to meet Bewholme Lane. On reaching the lane turn left and on meeting the main road (B1244) turn left. After one hundred metres, cross the main road and walk down a tree lined lane towards Wassand Hall.

Continue along this road passing Home Farm on the right and pass through three wooden gates. After passing through the third wooden gate, immediately turn left and pass through a kissing gate. Cross a field and pass through another kissing gate and cross a footbridge. Pass through a further three kissing gates and a further three fields with the hedge on the right. Eventually walking with a high bank on the right and the Mere close by on the left. Pass through a further wooden gate, cross the field and pass through a wooden gate to emerge on the road (Hull Road).

Turn right and walk up the hill and at the old railway bridge turn right and follow a path for about one hundred metres and then descend to the old railway track which has been surfaced. Turn left along the track heading back into Hornsea. On reaching a footpath, turn right and then immediately left. On reaching the roundabout, cross over and climb back up to rejoin the old railway line (signed Hornsea Rail Trail) and continue back to the start.

In the Garden





Fruit and vegetable garden

Cut out fruited canes of summer raspberries and tie in new canes that will fruit next year. Select strong, healthy canes and cut out weak, forked or misplaced ones (such as those growing out into the paths).

Blackcurrants are often pruned commercially this month (straight after harvesting), but it is better for home gardeners to wait until the leaves have fallen, and to prune the plants while dormant during the winter. Water any new strawberry beds planted this season. If you have not yet planted new beds, this is really the last chance to do so. New plants need to establish before the cold sets in.

Lift and pot up rooted strawberry runners from vigorous plants.

New trees can be planted once the autumn sets in and the dry weather is over. The soil will still be quite warm in September even if the weather is cool, and the roots of new plants will benefit from this. This is particularly important for peaches and nectarines. Other fruit trees may have a higher tolerance of cold at the roots, and can be planted later.

Vegetables

Continue to sow vegetables for overwintering, to mature next spring: turnip, spinach, winter lettuce, Oriental vegetables and seed of overwintering onions, both salad and bulb types.

Plant overwintering onion sets in late September.

Spring cabbages that were sown last month are probably ready for planting out. Cover them with horticultural fleece or netting to stop the pigeons shredding them.

Dig up potatoes before slug damage becomes a problem. Regularly pick fast maturing vegetables, such as French beans, runner beans, courgettes, cucumbers, peppers and tomatoes, to prevent them becoming stringy, tough or bitter and to encourage further crops.

Remaining outdoor tomatoes should be picked by the end of the month and ripened indoors. Harvest sweetcorn as it becomes ripe. Push a fingernail into the kernel when the tassels at the end of the cob start to shrivel and brown. If the liquid looks milky, they are ready.

Marrows, pumpkins and squashes may be ready for harvesting. Leave them in the sun, or in a greenhouse/garage, to let the skins harden and dry off, before storing them in a cool, dry, dark place.

Flower garden

Sow sweet peas in a cold frame or the greenhouse for early summer blooms next year.

Sow other hardy annuals (e.g. Consolida, Calendula, Centaurea, Limnanthes and poppies) in situ. If you have very heavy clay soil, you may get better results by sowing under cover in containers or plug trays, as the seedlings are less likely to rot.

If you sowed any spring-flowering biennials such as Viola, Digitalis (foxglove) or Erysimum (wallflowers), earlier in the summer, they will now need planting out.

This is a good time of year to plant new perennials, especially towards the end of September, as the soil is still warm, but moisture levels are increasing. There is still time for them to establish before the real cold sets in.

Bring inside any tender perennials, such as Fuchsia, Gazania, Lantana and Abutilon, before frosts cause damage.

Wait for the first frosts to hit dahlias and cannas before lifting the tubers or rhizomes. Buy spring-flowering bedding plants, such as Bellis, Primula, wallflowers, and violas.

Buy or order spring-flowering bulbs. Try to plant daffodils (Narcissus) by mid-September for the best results. Tulips are best left until November.

lood is needed for treating a variety of illnesses and conditions not just for accidents and emergencies. Even for some whose illness has no cure, a blood transfusion can help to improve the quality of their life. The NBS needs to collect up to 7,000 units every day to make sure that patients in hospitals across England and north Wales are able to receive the life saving treatments they require. This means a total of almost two million donations each year are required to meet the ongoing demand for blood.

Each year the NBS requires a staggering 249,000 blood donations across Yorkshire but last year, one in 20 people* who visited a donor centre to give blood, was unable to do so, because the haemoglobin in their blood was too low. Iron from the diet is an essential part of haemoglobin - the substance which carries oxygen in the blood. It is therefore essential at all stages of life for blood to work efficiently. Iron is also required for energy metabolism and is necessary for the normal function of the immune system. If the body's store of iron is low and there is too little iron in the diet to form new red blood cells, the symptoms of iron deficiency anaemia will start to develop.

Eating healthy during the Autumn

The NBS recommend that you embrace the start of autumn by celebrating seasonal foods such as blackberries, plums, apples, pears, pumpkins, leeks, courgettes and parsnips. Lean meats, fish, eggs, nuts, pulses and wholewheat breads are all good sources of iron, as are broccoli, spinach, dried apricots, raisins and avocado. A well-balanced diet will provide you with the nutrition you need to stay healthy this autumn. Sheena Simpson, Communications officer for the NBS says "Eating a diet rich in leafy green vegetables, iron rich proteins and vitamin C means not only better health, but also a greater chance of being able to give a much needed life-saving pint to patients."

BMX Track Opens on KGV Playing Fields, Cottingham

esidents of Cottingham are flocking to the King George V playing fields after the completion of two new, state-of-the art facilities. After several years of dedicated hard work, the 'Friends of KGV', working in partnership with East Riding of Yorkshire Council, are celebrating the opening of a Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) and a dirt BMX track, as part of the ongoing refurbishment of these popular historic playing fields.

The 36 jump BMX track is the result of several years' continuous hard work from a group of local lads and the 'Friends of KGV.' The track, designed by local enthusiast Graham Taylor, provides a range of challenges for all abilities, incorporating 'Table Tops', 'Gap Jumps' and a number of 'Berms'.

Graham said: "We wanted to create a track which would enable as many people as possible to go out and enjoy the sport. The track has been divided into four areas - expert, highly experienced, novice and junior - with jumps ranging from two metres high to small mounding.'

The enclosed space of the MUGA has been specially designed with a non-slip surface to cater for a range of sports including three tennis courts, football, netball and basket ball. Floodlighting has been installed to enable greater usage in the winter months.

Gary Cooper, chairman of the Friends of KGV, said: "We are over the moon to see the completion of this project. The council, Friends and the BMX Group have raised approximately £60,000 to enable the construction of these two projects. In July 2007, we received the news that Biffaward had awarded us a grant of £50,000, along with £10,000 received from the Youth Opportunities Fund. This was the last piece in the financial jigsaw and enabled us to start construction.

Councillor Jane Evison, ERYC portfolio holder for cultural services, said: "The council is delighted to see the completion of this scheme. The new facilities provide a wider range of opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to be more active and to try out new and exciting sports. This project is designed to have long term social and health benefits and is a good example of what the local community and the council can achieve by working together."

The council is also pleased to announce that the old Cottingham Playsport building is currently being redesigned. It is hoped to begin construction in the near future. Precise dates for a start to the work depend on the outcome of discussions with potential funding partners.

Further discussions are also taking place as to the future management of the site. East Riding of Yorkshire Council is keen to work with local groups to establish a management structure to take the facility forward.

Gary Cooper, Chairman of the Friends of KGV, said: "The idea is to put the facility at the heart of the community and establish a management structure with the long- term ability to attract external fund-

"We all hope that in this way we shall be able to continue building on the substantial improvements that have been made at KGV."



New website venture launches in Cottingham

myshowhome.co.uk is a new web site that has been launched this month.

Based in Cottingham, the main aim of the new web site is to offer local people an alternative way of selling your home without the need or expense of using an estate agent. It is generally assumed by most people that selling your home through an estate agent is much easier than selling it yourself, but this is not necessarily the case. Even when you are selling through an estate agent you may well be asked if you wouldn't mind providing your own accompanied viewings and end up doing a lot of the sale work yourself anyway!

It was surprising how easy it was.

myshowhome.co.uk lets you sell your own home in exactly the same way. They will take up to ten pictures of your home, create a personal property web page for you and add a link to your property on their web site, they will also provide you with 'For Sale' stickers to display in the corners of your most prominent windows so people will know your house is for sale. The web page they provide you with will feature ten pictures of your home with descriptions, directions and contact numbers, which are straight forward and easy to understand. The pages give people a good impression of your home and make for a perfect first viewing. You can also promote your house 'To Let' on the site too. Even if you are currently with an estate agent you could use the service to help promote your current house sale. myshowhome is a creative service only and not an estate agent so you are not tied to them in any wav.

What makes myshowhome.co.uk unique is that the property page supplied is unique to your home. You will be given your own web address that will take people directly to your own web page (eg: www.myshowhome.co.uk/home001), which you could use in less expensive local classified advertisements if you wanted to. You can print the pages out and use them as your own sales leaflet too as well as having a link to your property page on the myshowhome.co.uk. Your property will be available to view online 24 hours a day for a full 12 months or until your it has been sold. With regular local advertising it is hoped that myshowhome.co.uk will become a popular addition to the local property market.

Using an Estate agent is still the best way to sell your house but if your looking for an cost effective alternative myshowhome.co.uk is a great place to start. The only problem you may have is deciding what to do with all the money you save.

Five Generations of one family who have attended Hallgate School, Cottingham

In 1894, soon after the opening of Hallgate Infants School, my maternal grandfather and grandmother, William A Thrussell and Annie Elizabeth Dandy, commenced as pupils, thus starting an unbroken five generations attending the same school

The next link was my father, Arthur Wilfred Burrell, along with his six brothers and three sisters, the first one attending as the school opened in 1893.

Fred Fairbank Akam, Henry T Borrill 1896, Rosseta Burrell 1898, John Edward Burrell 1901, Ernest L Burrell 1902, Stanley Burrell 1905, Charles Burrell and twin Alice Burrell 1910, Arthur Wilfred Burrell 1912 and Violet Breta Burrell 1914.

At the close of WORLD WAR ONE, my mother, Edith May Thrussell 1917, and her sister Annie Millicent Thrussell 1918 become pupils there.

During World War Two, my two sisters and brother, Audrey, Joyce and Keith and I, Dorothy Burrell attended as pupils. In 1945, after passing what was then called my scholarship, I continued my education at Beverley High School. Audrey stayed on in the capacity of Junior Clerk for the girls school until 1948.

In 1982 after moving to Cottingham my younger son, John M. R. Pearson, transferred from Swanland School until 1984 when he went on to Cottingham High School.

To complete the five generations, in 1983, my grandson, James Ashton, transferred from Liphook School, Hampshire, to Continued on page 38



Property News from Martin English of **Homelink Estates**



Energy Performance Certificates (EPC) for **Rental Property**

Time is running out for landlords, if you are not aware already as of the 1st October 2008, if you market an investment property for letting or when a new tenancy is granted after the October deadline all property must have a valid EPC or risk a £200 fine from the Local Trading Standards Officer.

What is an EPC?

An EPC or Energy Performance Certificate is broadly similar to the labels provided with domestic appliances such as fridges and washing machines. They provide a rating of how energy efficient a building is by giving it a rating between A & G, where A is very inefficient. The idea being that tenants can use them to make informed decisions on which property to rent based partly on their likely fuel efficiency.

When do I need one?

The EPC and recommendation report must be made available free of charge by the landlord to any prospective tenant at the earliest opportunity. The government defines these "opportunities" as being

"Any written information about the building is provided in response to a request for information received from the prospective tenant"

'When a viewing is conducted"

If neither of the above takes place then the EPC must be produced before the letting contract is signed.

Where do I get one?

EPCs are available from one of the approximately 7000 qualified domestic energy assessors (DEA's) that have been recruited to handle the work. If you have a managing agent they may already have their own DEA or have teamed up with one.

How much will it cost?

The government estimate that they should cost around £100.

If a landlord searches they are likely to be quoted prices over and under £100. Some of the low cost EPC on further inspection are not quite as attractive as they may first appear. Many headline rates exclude VAT which will immediately put an extra 17.5% onto the cost. Others offer variable rates for different sized properties. Needless to say the low price only applies to 1 bed properties for example.

The good news

The good news for landlords is that once done the EPC lasts for 10

Alternative Health Natters by Carole Headley

Stress and Nutrition

his month was hard to decide what to write about so I thought of looking at two items albeit only briefly - stress and nutrition. I hope the men as well as the ladies will learn something from this month's issue and not be shy about trying some of the relaxing treatments available.

STRESS - Studies have shown that long term stress may be linked with more serious health conditions. Physical and emotional trauma can, in some people, cause health conditions - especially if they are not dealt with at the time.
