Rent in Advance

In a previous column, I talked about some relatively new deposit regulations that had come into force in relation to taking a deposit under an Assured Shorthold Tenancy. This has been quite a pivotal point in the lettings market and without doubt a piece of legislation that has and still is widely debated, at Homelink we have certainly had quite a lot if interest and queries on this matter.

One thing that is quite evident with the introduction of these new regulations is that Landlords and agents have taken quite differing courses of actions in reaction to the regulations. Without covering old ground, in essence there are a number of government approved schemes, whereby the deposit can be protected either at a cost to do so, or by the Landlord relinquishing direct control of the deposit. Another option that some have chosen to take is not to take a deposit at all, some would say this is a risky manoeuvre. Their is and probably always will be an element out there that pay complete ignorance to the rules and simply do not take heed of the rules, this however can be met with quite hefty fines.

It is the creative approach to taking deposits, of which a significant proportion of Landlords and Agents alike have taken that, has provided the inspiration for this months column, along with an article I recently read with great interest. Some Agents and Landlords have decided not to take a deposit for their properties, instead asking for more rent in advance from a tenant.

If two months' rent in advance is taken to cover any future failure on the tenant's part to pay the rent, then it can be held to be a deposit and within the remit of deposit schemes. This was exactly what happened in the case of Piggott v Slaven which had judgement passed in Grimsby County Court earlier this year. The court held that the taking of rent in advance constituted a deposit and it should have been protected. A penalty of three times the deposit was awarded against the Landlord.

Other cases with other facts may have a different outcome but clearly such a strategy carries risks. Being a county court judgement this is not binding on other courts but it is certainly a cautionary tale.

The moral of the story and the fundamental point in this case is that if you are taking rent in advance, what is the purpose of the rental in advance.

Finding your way around the Internet.

he Internet is what most of use our computers for most of the time. It can be useful, educational, fun, even vital, but can also be challenging or frustrating if you don't do things right! So this month we will look at making it easier to find what you want, a bit of a beginners guide, and explain some

First of all it is useful to know how you connect to the Internet. Most of us have a broadband connection now, and it is becoming more of a requirement for any computer to be able to keep its security up to date. If you are still on a dialup connection it is well worth upgrading to broadband for that reason alone. Some people say they don't go online enough to warrant broadband, but the reverse argument is that if you have broadband you will spend a lot more time because it is so fast and easy to use, you are more likely to enjoy it!

So assuming you have that in place, if you have been connected for a few years you may still have a Speedtouch modem, that is a small black box with two lights on the front, and you will have to click on a dial up box to get online. If this is the case, you would be well advised to speak to Karoo about changing to another package, it could even be cheaper, and get a router instead. Routers are more efficient and support the new higher broadband speeds, and you won't have to click to connect anymore. As long as your computer has an ethernet (or network) port you will be able to use a router. Any machine built within the last few years should have one. If you have a laptop, you may well connect using a wireless router. For those not familiar, that means a router that connects to a power socket and your telephone line by wires, but then broadcasts a signal all around your house or office that any wireless enabled device can pick up. This includes laptops, netbooks, iPod Touch, Wii to name but a few; and even some mobile phones. If you have a wireless router make sure it is secure (encrypted) otherwise everyone else in the vicinity could be using it too!

In order to get online of course you open a web browser. Most people just click on the 'big blue e' otherwise known as Internet Explorer, because it has always been there as part of the Windows operating system. As I have mentioned previously, there are others available like Firefox, Chrome, Opera and even Safari (originally only on Mac computers but now available to all). Basically though, they are all free to use, and all work the same way. If you are connected and have opened your browser, you should now be presented with your homepage. This is the first page you always see, and this can be set to anything you want. If you have recently upgraded Explorer you may find your homepage has changed to msn, as that it is owned by Microsoft, and like most companies on the Net they will try and change your homepage to theirs!

If you know the exact address of the site you want, you just type it into the address bar at the top of the browser, remember to get all the dots in the right place, and if there is a forward slash it goes straight after the address with no spaces i.e.: www.bbc.co.uk/weather Remember also that everything online is lower case, capitals not required. Alternatively, the saviour for us all trying to find something online is of course the search engine. Whether you use Google, Yahoo, Ask or Bing etc they are all there to let you find what you seek. Remember when using a search engine $\mbox{don't}$ type in \mbox{www} – just type what you are searching for in the empty box - bbc weather - for instance. Be as specific as you can or you will be presented with millions of results. Search engines have improved greatly however, but remember they are funded by advertising so if you type in hotels in Paris, it will more likely return lots of hotel booking agents, not the hotels them-

What about the dreaded 'page cannot be displayed' message? We've all had that from time to time. It may sound obvious but first make sure you are connected, check the lights on your modem or router etc. Then check the address bar to ensure you have typed the address correctly, and make sure you haven't put a comma instead of a dot etc. If the address bar says about: blank, you do not have a homepage set. To rectify this, type the address of the page you want, then find the home icon at the top of your browser, and click the down arrow to the right and click, add or remove home page, this will set it permanently. If you find that you do not get pages straight after checking your email, open Outlook Express, click Tools, Options, Connections, and if there is a tick in 'hang up after send/receiving' - remove it.

Favorites or Bookmarks is the place to store all your favourite websites. All you have to do is open the page you want, then click Favorites, and add to Favorites. If you want to store lots of different pages on the same subject, you can create a folder first. Click Favorites then create folder, type a name for it, then click add. Every time you find a website on that subject, click on Favorites then click on the down arrow next to Create in and you can file it away in that folder. To keep your Favorites organised, click on Favorites then right click on any entry and click 'sort by name' to get them in alphabetical order. Other tasks can be carried out in 'Organize favorites'

Next month we will look at some more advanced features and more hints and tips.

Ingredient of the Month

B ramley Apples are widely considered to be the cook's choice for cooking apples and have become one of the most popular cooking apples used in the UK, available to buy all year. They have a tart flavour which is generally not suitable to eat raw plus the added bonus of an excellent texture when cooked.

History

The Bramley apple hails from Nottinghamshire UK. A young girl called Mary Ann Brailsford who lived in Southwell, Nottinghamshire is believed to have sown some apple pips in her garden between 1809 and 1813 one of which grew into the first Bramley apple tree. Unfortunately, it isn't known from where she got the original pips, however the nature of sowing seed from fruit is that they often don't mirror the original plant so it is safe to say that the original fruit from where she took the pip bore little resemblance to today's Bramleys.

By 1837 the tree was bearing its first fruit and in 1846 Matthew Bramley, a local butcher, bought the cottage complete with garden and tree. It was whilst he was there that a local nurseryman called Henry Merryweather recognised the commercial potential of the fruit and asked if he could take cuttings from the tree which would reproduce true to type specimens. Mr Bramley agreed, with the proviso that the apples should be named after him.

Apparently, the original tree is still bearing fruit today.

Traditional Apple Pie

Ingredients
225g/8oz Plain Flour
A pinch of Salt
100g/4oz Margarine
675g/1 1/2 lb Cooking Apples e.g. Bramleys
100g/4oz Brown Sugar
1/2 teasp Ground Cinnamon
1/2 teasp Grated Nutmeg
1/4 teasp Ground cloves
50g/2oz Sultanas
1 Egg Yolk
A little Milk
1 tbsp Caster Sugar

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400F, 200C, Gas mark 6.
- 2. Sieve the flour and salt into a bowl and rub in the butter until it resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add enough water to make a firm dough.
- 3. Peel, core and thickly slice the apples into a bowl. Add the brown sugar, spices and sultanas and mix well. Place in a buttered pie dish and sprinkle with 2 tbsp of water.
- 4. Roll out the pastry and cover the pie dish, trimming any excess pastry off with a knife. Decorate the top with leaves or other shapes made out of the pastry trimmings. Brush with the egg yolk and milk mixture, sprinkle with caster sugar.
- 5. Cook in the centre of the oven for 20 minutes. Reduce heat to 350F, 180C, Gas mark 4 and cook for a further 20 minutes.

Apple Gingerbread

Makes 1 20x15cm/8x6 inch cake Ingredients
22g/8oz Cooking Apples, peeled, cored and sliced Granulated Sugar to taste
100g/4oz Golden Syrup
75g/3oz Butter
75g/3oz Demerara Sugar
175g/6oz Self Raising Flour
1 heaped teasp Ground Ginger
1/4 teasp Ground Cloves

Instructions

1 Egg, beaten

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4 and grease a 20x15 cm (8 x 6 inch) baking tin
- 2. Place the apples in a saucepan with granulated sugar to taste (2-4 tbsp) and a little water, mix well then cook over a medium heat for about 15 minutes or until tender. Stirring from time to time
- 3. Meanwhile, place the golden syrup, butter and Demerara sugar in another small saucepan and heat gently, stirring, until dissolved. Set aside to cool.
- 4. Once the apples are cooked, drain off most of any remaining liquid then mash well and allow to cool.
- 5. In a large mixing bowl, mix together the flour, ginger, and cloves. Make a well in the centre of the flour mixture then add syrup mixture and beat well.
- 6. Add the egg to the apple mixture then add the apple mixture to the flour mixture and beat until well combined.
- 7. Transfer to the greased tin and bake for about 30 minutes until firm.
- 8. Allow to cool in the tin for a few minutes before turning out. Cool on a wire rack.

Apple Crumble

There are lots of fruits that can be used as an alternative to apples e.g. Rhubarb, Brambles, Blackcurrants, Cherries, etc.

Ingredients

225g/8oz cooking apples Peeled, cored and thinly sliced 100g/4oz sugar Grated rind of 1 orange

Crumble Topping 175g/6oz plain flour 75g/3oz butter 75g/3oz sugar

Instructions

- 1. Place the fruit in a 1 1/2 pint pie dish, layering with the sugar to taste and the orange rind.
- 2. Sift the flour into a bowl, rub in the butter until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs and stir in the sugar.
- 3. Sprinkle the crumble evenly over the fruit, smooth the surface and press down lightly.

(Chopped almonds, walnuts etc. can be added to the crumble if pre-

4. Place the crumble in a hot oven 220°C/425°F, or gas mark 7 for 20 minutes and then reduce the heat to 190°C/375F, or gas mark 7 for a further 45 minutes or until golden brown.

Turkey/Chicken with Apples

This is a quick and easy recipe which has the added advantage of introducing even more nutrients by way of the apples. Serve it with creamy mash and a green vegetable. Cabbage with Bacon would be a good choice.

Ingredients

2 tbsp Olive Oil

4 Turkey Breasts

Salt and Black Pepper

A Knob of Butter

1 Small Onion, finely chopped

2 Apples, peeled, cored and sliced

240ml/8fl.oz.Chicken Stock

1/2 teasp Dried Sage

Instructions

- 1. Cut each turkey breasts into three pieces and season the turkey with salt and pepper.
- 2. Heat the oil in a large frying pan then add to the pan and sauté gently for 4-5 minutes on each side until cooked and browned.

- 3. Meanwhile, heat the remaining oil and butter in a large saucepan then add the onions and sauté for 2 minutes.
- 4. Add the apples to the onions and continue cooking for 3-4 minutes until the apples are just beginning to soften, then remove apples and set them aside.
- 5. Slowly add the stock to the onion, mixing well then raise the heat, add the sage and bring to the boil. Continue to boil for a few minutes until the sauce is slightly reduced and starts to thicken.
- 6. Add the apples and cooked turkey to the sauce and cook for 3-5 minutes, spooning the sauce over the turkey. Serve hot.

French Apple Tart

Sweet flan pastry

150g/5oz plain flour pinch salt

75g/2 /2oz butter, cut into small pieces 15ml/1 tablespoon caster sugar

10ml/2 teaspoons ground almonds

1 egg yolk

30-45ml cold water/2 to 3 tablespoons

Filling

450gm/1lb cooking apples Cooked, unsweetened and puréed 2 cooking apples, peeled, cored and thinly sliced 50g/2oz sugar Grated rind of 1/2 lemon





New Puss on the Block

Thave bought a new kitten (Fluffy) to keep my other cat (Thomas) company. I think Thomas is jealous of Fluffy. He doesn't sit on our knees any more, but hisses and runs away if we try to stroke him. He hardly ever comes down from the top of the kitchen cupboards, and he won't use his litter tray any more. Instead he is spraying (urine) on the furniture and curtains.

Fluffy is very good, she always uses the litter tray and is happy to sleep in the cats' bed. She loves being stroked and nuzzles and rubs us with her head. I don't know if we can keep Thomas as the smell is awful. I haven't been letting him out since we lost his brother on the road – but there are moments when I have been tempted to risk it.

Hi – **My name is Thomas**. My territory has shrunk to the top of the kitchen cupboards and I am TOTALLY stressed out. I was purrrfectly happy until recently, sharing my territory with my brother. Unfortunately he crossed the main road once too often,





and then I quickly settled down to life on my own. I like my own company and like most cats am not overly sociable with others of my own kind. I want to hunt the prey on my territory, not share it. I was quite content even though I was kept inside most of the time - a little dull but tolerable.

There is no advantage to hunting together. There is benefit in holding a territory to hunt in, and avoiding physical conflict through scent marking and respecting other cat's boundaries.

The introduction of a new cat into a household is possible and there are ways of conducting the introduction to give the best chance of having 2 happy cats living together. This may vary from pheromone sprays/diffusers to relax the atmosphere to position and number of litter trays. Ruth is available for further advice at our Cottingham surgery on 01482 843210.

professional help. I hope that I can give a little bit of hope and some "Dr Smile Maker" Top Tips to help.

So, What Is It All About?

Sometimes anxiety is brought on by a past experience. I have lost count of the number of people who said it was due to the school dentist of long ago. The association of this experience is locked away in the brain with an alarm set up around it. Each time you get near this the alarm is raised and anxiety begins. Sometimes the anxiety is more innate like a fear of spiders when there has been no previous bad experience. In computer terms in both cases (and I am no computer buff) there is an old program running. What you really need is a new program or update disc.

There are several ways to deal with dental anxiety. They can be split into two main groups of no drugs and drugs. Most of what I will discuss will relate to coping with dental anxiety relating to actual treatment but some methods will relate to helping some of you making that first step of making it to the first appointment.

Getting By Without Drugs

Personally, I deal mainly with the no drugs method. I find that the advantage of this is that it empowers you and gives you more control, self efficacy and self esteem. You can also use some of the methods in other areas of your life. The next bit is to do with getting by without drugs.

So, What Do I think Is The Most Important Thing?

I think that the most important thing, and have said this in an earlier piece, is building a good relationship. We are all only human. Explain yours anxiety and fears. Let your dentist understand. Communicate. Once understanding is there you have something to work from, a working relationship is formed and trust develops.

Imagine not going to the dentist for over twenty years through fear brought on by an experience in childhood. Over the years the problem gets worse, you develop a dental problem but ignore it until you cannot ignore it anymore. You have to go to see a dentist but break down and cry. Rather than be told to pull yourself together and get on with it you sit together to discuss he problem and have a chat about it. You feel better about it already because you have some understanding.

You may never have had that before. You then feel comfortable enough for your trusted dentist to have a look at the problem. Your dentist then explains everything to you including your dental condition and treatment options giving you control and empowering you to make decisions about yourself. Often the new program and update disc is already running. You make a decision, have some treatment and are better off for it. You feel great! Two birds with one stone, dental problem sorted and a new self confidence and self esteem. You now continue to have your mouth examined regularly to keep everything in check and maintained.

You May Think I'm A Dreamer

This is a case scenario that has happened and many other very similar scenarios have happened on many occasions over the years. In the last ten years or so the majority of people I have seen with dental anxiety can be helped in this way without moving on to other methods. If the update disc is still having problems loading then there are a few other tricks to try. More of these next time.

Top Tip: Talk to your dentist and communicate. Do not let things go from bad to worse. We are a caring profession here to help.

I hope that this has given you some hope and inspiration. Take care



In the Garden



Fruit and vegetable garden

Pick apples and blackberries for use in pies and desserts.

Pick autumn raspberries as they start to ripen.

Cut out fruited canes of summer raspberries and tie in new canes that will fruit next year. Select strong, healthy canes and cut out weak, forked or misplaced ones (such as those growing out into the paths).

Blackcurrants are often pruned commercially this month (straight after harvesting), but it is better for home gardeners to wait until the leaves have fallen, and to prune the plants while dormant during the winter. Valuable time is best saved for more urgent jobs that cannot wait beyond this month.

Water any new strawberry beds planted this season. If you have not yet planted new beds, this is really the last chance to do so, and only then in milder parts of the country. New plants need to establish before the cold sets in.

Lift and pot up rooted strawberry runners from vigorous plants.

New trees can be planted once the autumn sets in and the dry weather is over. The soil will still be quite warm in September even if the weather is cool, and the roots of new plants will benefit from this. This is particularly important for peaches and nectarines. Other fruit trees may have a higher tolerance of cold at the roots, and can be planted later.

Remove apples, pears and plums affected with brown rot to prevent the disease from spreading

Prune out any dead, dying or diseased shoots on fruit trees that are affected by diseases such as bacterial canker, cherry leaf scorch, powdery mildew or other problems that can overwinter or continue to wors-

en. Avoid pruning stone fruits (e.g. cherries or plums) once they are dropping their leaves, as this can make them vulnerable to silver leaf. Peaches and apricots can be sensitive to cold, so for this reason are best pruned in spring and summer.

Net or cage ripening fruits to protect them from birds.

Monitor yields on soft fruit crops, as older plants frequently become infected with viruses, which reduce yield. They may need replacing.

Vegetables

Continue to sow vegetables for overwintering, to mature next spring: turnip, spinach, winter lettuce, Oriental vegetables and seed of overwintering onions, both salad and bulb types.

Plant overwintering onion sets in late September.

Spring cabbages that were sown last month are probably ready for planting out. Cover them with horticultural fleece or netting to stop the pigeons shredding them.

Dig up potatoes before slug damage becomes a problem. Leave them out to dry for two to three hours before storing. Only store sound tubers in paper sacks or boxes.

Regularly pick fast maturing vegetables, such as French beans, runner beans, courgettes, cucumbers, peppers and tomatoes, to prevent them becoming stringy, tough or bitter and to encourage further crops.

- 1. Divide herbaceous perennials
- 2. Pick autumn raspberries
- 3. Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
- 4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them
- 5. Net ponds before leaf fall gets underway
- 6. Keep up with watering of new plants, using rain or grey water if possible
- 7. Start to reduce the frequency of houseplant watering
- 8. Clean out cold frames and greenhouses so that they are ready for use in the autumn
- 9. Cover leafy vegetable crops with bird-proof netting
- 10. Plant spring flowering bulbs

Remaining outdoor tomatoes should be picked by the end of the monthand ripened indoors. The whole truss can be cut off to allow the fruits to ripen 'on the vine', perhaps under a cloche or on a windowsill. Any green fruits can be used in chutneys.

Aubergines may still be cropping in the greenhouse. Pick them once the fruits have coloured, but before the skins start to wrinkle.

Lift onions and shallots once the foliage has started to die back. Do not be tempted to bend over the tops by hand as this can reduce their effective storage time. Allow them to dry on the soil surface if weather permits, otherwise dry in a well-ventilated shed and store in a moisture-free place. Thick-necked onions should be used rather than stored, as they may be prone to rots.

In cold districts, carrots, beetroot and turnip are best lifted and stored for use over the winter. Only store intact roots. Parsnips should be left in, as they taste better once frosted.

Harvest sweetcorn as it becomes ripe. Push a fingernail into the kernel when the tassels at the end of the cob start to shrivel and brown. If the liquid looks milky, they are ready.

Flower garden

Sow sweet peas in a cold frame or the greenhouse for early summer blooms next year.

Sow other hardy annuals (e.g. Consolida, Calendula, Centaurea, Limnanthes and poppies) in situ. If you have very heavy clay soil, you may get better results by sowing under cover in containers or plug trays, as the seedlings are less likely to rot.

If you sowed any spring-flowering biennials such as Viola, Digitalis (foxglove) or Erysimum (wallflowers), earlier in the summer, they will now need planting out.

This is a good time of year to plant new perennials, especially towards the end of September, as the soil is still warm, but moisture levels are increasing. There is still time for them to establish before the real cold sets in.

Bring inside any tender perennials, such as Fuchsia, Gazania, Lantana and Abutilon, before frosts cause damage.

Wait for the first frosts to hit dahlias and cannas before lifting the tubers or rhizomes. In warmer regions, they may be alright left in the ground, but do cover the crowns with a protective layer of straw or bracken.

Buy spring-flowering bedding plants, such as Bellis, Primula, wallflowers, and violas.

Buy or order spring-flowering bulbs. Try to plant daffodils (Narcissus) by mid-September for the best results. Tulips are best left until November. Remember that there are many other bulbs to choose from: Muscari (grape hyacinths), Chionodoxa (glory of the snow), Scilla, Ipheion and crocuses are all possibilities among many others.

Don't neglect hanging basket maintenance - a little deadheading, watering and feeding can keep them going until mid-autumn. Once

they are past their best, re-plant as winter/spring hanging baskets with spring-flowering bulbs, winter heathers, trailing ivies and spring-flowering plants as above.

Continue to deadhead plants such as Dahlia, Delphinium, Rosa and Penstemon to prolong the display and give colour well into the month.

Continue cutting back perennials that are fading and dying down.

Now is a good time to divide any overgrown or tired looking clumps of alpines and herbaceous perennials such as crocosmias. This will invigorate them, and improve flowering and overall shape, for next

Continue collecting and storing seed from perennials still forming seed heads.

Take cuttings of tender perennials, such as Pelargonium and Osteospermum. These plants often do better grown from new cuttings each year, rather than being overwintered in pots as adult plants. If you do not have a greenhouse, then use a light windowsill to grow them on.

Some tall late-flowering perennials, such as asters, may still need staking to stop them being blown over in the wind.



Free Electric Blanket Safety Testing begins September 14th throughout the region

Tree electric blanket safety checks will be carried out by East Riding of Yorkshire Council in partnership with Humberside Fire and Rescue during the week beginning 14 September.

Last year, more than 300 electric blankets were tested as part of the council's continuing programme of electric blanket safety checks. 31 per cent of the blankets failed the safety test and were found to be dangerous to users.

National statistics show that old and unsafe electric blankets cause over 5,000 fires each year and more than half of all electric blankets tested nationally are found to be unsafe.

Electric blankets that are over 10 years old do not have the same safety features as modern blankets. Serious defects can also develop when blankets are not used in accordance with the instructions.

Angela Currie, consumer education officer, said: "Electric blankets are often used by older or vulnerable people so it is important to ensure they are safe. Older residents may be using dated or even dangerous blankets without realising."

Councillor Jane Evison, portfolio holder for public protection, said: "I urge East Riding residents to take advantage of the free electric blanket safety checks being offered as the statistics regarding dangerous blankets are quite shocking."

It takes six minutes to check each blanket and the testing sessions will be held at the following locations: Monday, 14 September, at Beverley Fire Station; Tuesday, 15 September, at Bridlington Town Hall; Wednesday, 16 September, at Preston Fire Station from 9am ñ12.30pm, Wednesday, 16 September, at Withernsea Fire Station from 1.30-5pm; Thursday, 17 September, at Darby and Joan Hall in Cottingham; and on Friday, 18 September, at Hornsea, Floral Hall.

Unless otherwise indicated, testing will take place between 9am-5pm daily, finishing at 4.30pm on Friday.

Anyone who would like to have their electric blankets checked must ensure that an appointment is made for each blanket they intend to



new name has appeared on the restaurant scene in Cottingham and at last we have an Italian restaurant to shout about. Based in the old Elliots Wine Bar premises on the entrance to Somerfield's car park in King Street, Pascos opened it's doors in late June and appear to have been busy ever since.

We visited the restaurant on a Friday evening and I have to say, I was glad we had booked our table for two in advance. Although the restaurant is large and has covers for around 60 people, it does get very busy especially at weekends. If you are looking for an intimate, away from it all, quiet dining experience, this is not the place to come to. It is a bustling, noisy, typical Italian restaurant and if you didn't look outside, you could imagine you were in Italy.

We arrived on time and were shown to our seats in the middle of the restaurant. There is a bar to have a premeal drink, but we decided to have drinks at our table.

The menus were presented along with a wine list, and as is the case with many Italian restaurants, the menu is huge. Over 20 starters from £2.90 to £5.95, 14 Pizzas from £5.60 to £8.20, 14 Pastas from £5.60 to £6.50 and 18 main courses from £7.80 to £9.95. You will find all the usual starters on the menu from Garlic Bread through to Antipasto, Paté, Mozarella salad and various Seafood dishes.

My wife chose Mozzarella Con Prosciutto, (Cheese cut into sticks and wrapped in Parma Ham) which was delicious. I went for Coze alla Crema (Large mussels cooked with onions, white wine stock, cream and served with warm bread) also at £4.85. The mussels were perfectly cooked and just enough for a starter.

The main course was a more difficult choice, we could have played safe and ordered a Pizza or Pasta, but decided to go for the meat-based dishes. My wife chose Pollo alla Crema £8.60 (Chicken breast cooked with white wine, tarragon, cured bacon and served on a sauce of chicken liver paté), which was tender, moist and very

tasty. I chose Pollo Caprese £8.95, because it is one of the few Italian dishes I can actually cook, so I thought I would see if there was any difference.

The chicken breast was stuffed with cream cheese and then wrapped in bacon and served with a cream sauce. I have to say it was lovely and certainly better than my own!! Both dishes were served with vegetables of the day and potatoes. Also in the Main Menu List are Steak, Duck, Salmon and Mussels, so there is plenty of choice for everyone. Because we were having chicken and my wife loves Pinot Grigio wine, we decided to have a bottle to accompany our meal.

Now in a lot of restaurants, this is were the bill starts to grow. Not here! The wine list must be one of the best value for money lists I have seen in a long time. A comprehensive, not massive list, with wines to suit everyone's palate and wallet. The Pinot Grigio we chose was under £10 and was well chilled, crisp and dry. At the price we were tempted to have another, but decided on sparkling water instead.

We were sorely tempted to have the Tiramisu as a sweet, but we could just not manage it.

The biggest surprise of the night was the bill. Although we had some of the more expensive courses on the menu and a decent bottle of wine, the total bill was under £40.

No wonder the place was buzzing and when we left people were still coming in.

If you like La Scala in Beverley or La Perla on Newland Avenue, you will absolutely love Pasco's (at a fraction of the price). If you like Italian food, well cooked and presented at amazing prices then this is the place for an enjoyable meal in lively surroundings.

Once again, another great night out at a Cottingham restaurant and we will be going back soon.

Go on, try it!!!! You will not be disappointed, but make sure you reserve a table first.

A Sad Reflection of the times

My website creates a lot of enquiries. I hear from people from all over the country who are having problems with their horses. I spend a lot of time trying to give good advice freely and helping where I can.

A lady called Jenny from Cheshire asked me if I bought horses that have significant problems, which I don't. We got talking and I did what I could to talk thro "Zander's" issues.

This young lady has had nothing but heartbreak and serious expense with this horse for four years. Three trainers later, vast amounts spent on X rays and physios, trying to identify where there is, or might be pain. (Pain being one of the main reasons for horses to go off the rails). My format with every new case is...

- Are they in pain?
- Have they known pain?
- Do they expect pain?

One of those criteria invariably fits the bill, I'm sorry to say.

Zander is now in my yard. He is angry, he has significant pain in his sacraliliac joints on the top of his haunches. He is in self-protection mode and is offering me nothing as yet. Why should he? To him I am a new threat to his well-being and he does not trust me.

If I were stupid enough to try to ride him now, then his full repertoire of violence would be flung at me. Rearing up to the point of going over backwards is his main ammunition. His is past caring if he gets hurt in the process. All very sad.

Jenny could not face having this beautiful powerful horse (which despite all his failings she loves) put down. I have decided to take him on as my own..financial suicide for me.... but, equally I cannot countenance euthanasia without first giving him a chance.

If there is anyone out there who would like to help sponsor this horse through his treatments and training, then I would be extremely grateful. He is a risk, but one I felt worth taking. If there is no way of giving this horse pleasure back in his life, then I will be prepared to put him down.

There is a long way to go before that though. PLEASE WISH BOTH ZANDER AND ME LUCK!

The Battle of Quebec 1759 and its links with Cottingham

unday, 13th September, this year is the 250th anniversary of this battle. Why is this important for St Mary's and Cottingham? Firstly, a local man, Colonel Ralph Burton fought with Wolfe at Quebec, and has a memorial in St. Mary's Church (pictured above). And secondly, the battle was the inspiration for the names of about a dozen roads in the housing estate off Southwood Road.

There is Burton Road of course, and Wolfe Close and Mountcalm Walk, named after the British and French commanders, they both died as a result of the wounds they received. Monkton, Murray and Townshend were all brigadiers who served under Wolfe. Finally, Canada, the cities of Motreal, Ottawa and Ouebec, and the St. Lawrence River are also included.

At one time the battle was remembered in a jingoistic sort of way, adding a great deal of red to the map. It did this of course, but today I think it should be thought of, not just in these terms, but as one of the great battles in world history, the culmination of the campaign in North America, part of the Seven Years War.

It was one of the few battles fought between European forces outside Europe. Numbers involved were relatively small. Militarily it was important because of the close co-operation between army and navy, this set new standards. Finally, the outcome of the battle to a large extent determined the subsequent history and development of North America. The British victory freed the American colonies from the French threat, thus they were able to take an increasingly independent line, culminating in the Revolutionary War about twenty years later.

At the same time as the loss of Quebec, France lost its forts in the west, notably Fort Duquesne on the Ohio which became Pittsburgh.

The newly formed United States then was able to expand ever westward until it reached the Pacific. Canada stayed under British rule, the French settlers who remained, were allowed freedom of worship, and played an important part in the development of the country. Today French influence is still strong in the province of Quebec. Many Americans who remained loyal to the British Crown fled to Canada after the War of Independence.

Later, slaves from America sought refuge and freedom in that country. Countess thousands of people from the British Isles, particularly Scotland emigrated to Canada in search of a better life. Eventually Canada itself became independent and a member of the British Commonwealth. In both World Wars Canada joined Britain to fight alongside the Mother Country from the start. The debt that we in Britain owe Canada is enormous.

Finally, may I suggest that people read an account of the campaigns in North America, including the Battle of Quebec. It makes interesting reading, the tide turning one way and then the other. For light reading the novel "The Last of the Mohicans" is based on an incident in that war and it helps to understand why on Colonel Burton's memorial, the war is described as "rude and savage".





Hallgate Schools -

January 1918 to December 1918

uarterly exams were held in the boys' department in January and into February 1918 - English, arithmetic and composition were the subjects as usual, but the proceedings were interrupted by severe weather which kept large numbers of pupils away.

Lessons on the 'transit of foodstuffs' were given in the upper classes in view of 'the present condition of the mercantile services'. German U-boats were sending thousands of tons of allied shipping to the bottom of the seas each month and the situation was becoming critical as the strangle-hold tightened. Economy became the watch-word - economy in food and any material that had to be imported - hence the efforts in the school gardens.

The Haltemprice Urban District Council staged a demonstration of 'Economic Cookery' to mothers, cooks, housekeepers, etc. under the Council's 'Food Economy Campaign'. Benches out of the cloakroom and corridors were lent for the occasion to the Council demonstrators - this was probably held in the hall. Strangely, there is no mention of this in the girls' log book - perhaps it was a joint effort, or the demonstration was also given in the girls' school but was not recorded. Mr Moorby had suffered several bouts of illness during the previous year and these continued into 1918 necessitating his absence from school. 'Ague' and influenza kept him away at the end of January and again in February. Miss Youngson asked for a day off to be with her cousin, a New Zealand soldier, who was on leave in Cottingham from his regiment.

The Urban District Council helped to secure another allotment for the boys to continue their good work - they were aware of the disappointment caused by having their growing area reduced by Mr Dunling, who was, however, prevailed upon to let them have a plot of 900 square yards close to the school building (where the playing field is now).

There was a 'violent air raid' around Cottingham on the night of 12-13th of March, 'the noise being so terrific that sleep was impossible for anyone.' Only eight boys turned up for school next day and fifteen girls and no infants, so they were sent home again. A further raid the next night resulted in more absences in the departments, but not enough to close the schools. A collection for 'Blinded Soldiers and Sailors' realised £2: 4s: 3d and was handed over to Mrs Burstall the local organiser. Lessons were held on the work of St Dunstans' Hospital.

Garden work was impossible during the middle of April due to 'snow, rain and wet soil', but the weather had improved by the end of the month - manure was delivered and work commenced. An appeal was made to the school by the Newland Orphan Homes on Cottingham Road for flowers to decorate their Whitson Carnival tents, floats, etc. The response was enormous - a cart load was collected by the boys and girls from their own gardens and from the hedgerows. Bunches of flowers had been contributed by all departments for a number of years, but in 1918 the response 'was staggering' probably due to the fact that the Orphanage had been established for the children of sailors lost at sea and the flowers were a recognition of the very great losses at

The usual Sunday School Feasts were held in June with the schools closing early to let the pupils attend. An exhibition of hand work done by the girls was held in their hall and a number of parents went to inspect it, also the Rev. Lowndes and Mr A. Dixon from the Urban District Council. Cases of mumps and measles appeared among the girls and began to cause concern to the M.O.H. - illnesses also spread to the boys and infants.

Senior students from the Roman Catholic College visited the schools once again and showed particular interest in the allotments, so a demonstration was laid on with the older boys hoeing and weeding. The weather was hot and the soil was very dry after no rain for several weeks and Mr Moorby was a bit disappointed at 'the look of the crops on the whole. It continued hot and dry well into July making further sowings and plantings 'somewhat precarious'.

Despite the hot weather influenza was endemic that summer, striking down staff and pupils - 56 boys were away in early July and taken together with the girls' department where mumps and measles were the main cause of absences, nearly 200 children were away from the three departments at any one time with the result that the managers and the M.O.H. persuaded the County Council to close the schools earlier than usual on the 10th July for the summer holidays. Several boys were given permission to stay off longer to help with harvesting on their parents' farms after schools recommenced on the 19th August.

For a while, the number of absences through sickness decreased, especially in the girls' school. Miss Edith Chester from Beverley Girls' High School started duties as a student teacher and poor old Kathleen Legard was sent to an industrial school in York. Mr Crab, H.M.I. visited the girls' school for one day and examined all the classes - a far cry from the days of 'payment by results' when an inspector turned up for a two or three day inquisition - however, as in a lot of cases, the wheel has been turned full circle as Ofsted descend on a school often causing as much disruption as their predecessors did in Victorian times!

A half day holiday was arranged in the boys' department for the 13th of September to hold a sports day on a field owned by a Mr. Field - location unknown. - but a venue does appear later in the log book at a surprising place.

One of the teachers in the boys' school, Miss Steele, received news that her brother who was a ship's chaplain was missing after his vessel had been torpedoed near Gibralter. This news saddened everyone, as indeed any news of the loss of a relative or a friend did. The war memorials in St. Mary's churchyard and at each side of the iron gates of the Memorial Gardens in Hallgate testify to the losses of Cottingham men - 105 of them, often two or three from the same family, most of them ex-scholars of the school. Great sadness was often a visitor to the schools in those days fathers, brothers, cousins killed in action or at sea, others returned blind or injured and many people in the village were to know hard times for more years to come. Casualty rates grew and the 'Spanish Flu' epidemic of the 1918 claimed 150,000 British lives, service-men and civilians - this coupled with food and fuel shortages, plus more frequent Zeppelin raids had the effect of creating a feeling of despair - 'when will it all end' was a cry often heard.

Seasonal 'flu' exceeded mumps and measles and affected staff as well as pupils and three teachers were away in each of the departments and it was virtually impossible to get temporary staff because most schools were in the same situation that October, with the result that the M.O.H. ordered the schools to close on the 6th. When they reopened on the 4th of November only 68% of pupils were present in each department and the managers closed it again until Monday the 11th of November - the day the Great War ended. Strangely, there is no reference to this in either the girls' or boys' log books but it must have been marked in the schools.

Illness still dogged both staff and pupils and the cold foggy weather made matters worse; everyone was glad when this terrible year drew to a close, with Christmas songs and hymns to parents in the respective halls on Thursday the 19th December 1918.




