

# 'Race Online 2012' the digital highway

he Government's latest tack to get us all on the digital highway is 'Race Online 2012' Fronted by Martha Lane Fox, one of the co-founders of lastminute.com, it is aiming to assist or maybe persuade the 10 million citizens reckoned not to use, or have access to the Internet. Not everyone wants to be online of course, and it is interesting to note that such luminaries as John Humphrys and Rory Cellan-Jones of BBC fame, both admit to having been late and somewhat resistant converts to the online lifestyle that reporters enjoy. Let us hope that this latest attempt focuses our leaders on sensible technological developments and not huge money-wasting IT projects...we shall see.

By contrast a new report by Ofcom suggests that 'The average Briton spends almost half of their waking life using media and communications, often multi-tasking'. This includes exposure to TV, radio, printed media, telephones and computers. There are differing reports over whether this lifestyle makes us less intelligent, or in fact sharpens the brain and makes it develop even further. 20 years ago multi-tasking would probably have been watching the TV whilst reading the paper and drinking a cup of tea!

Should you have a few minutes to idle away during your busy multi-tasking lifestyle, take a look at this website: <a href="www.1000awesomethings.com">www.1000awesomethings.com</a>. This quirky little site lists all those (1,000) things that make you smile. Like: finding money in your pocket; getting out of the car after a really long drive; or No.440 - Correctly guessing an old password you haven't used in a while!

There are so many ways to communicate nowadays, texting, instant messaging, mobiles, in fact with the younger generation, (doh! I must be getting old), email is almost old hat. As I heard a couple passing in the street the other day, say: 'I'll message you on Facebook'.

Some time ago I mentioned a telephone scam where customers receive a call telling them that there PC is infected and for a fairly hefty fee the problem can be fixed remotely. Anyone falling for this and giving out their card details would then find further funds being siphoned from their account. This has surfaced again recently and seems to originate from a call centre/s in India. They have even used the line that Microsoft has passed on information from all those error reports that we all see on our computer from time to time. Do not be bamboozled by this. There is no way some unknown company can tell what your computer is doing, and Microsoft certainly does not release details of those error reports (and anyway all that information is collected completely anonymously). The Police do have a file on this, so if you are contacted, pass on the details to them.

In the old days of motoring, if you were a member of the AA or RAC and you were going on a long journey you could send off for a detailed route plan from those organisations. Now of course it's all available online. Just go to the respective website and click on route planner, enter the postcodes or cities you are travelling between and voila up comes the route all ready to print out. You can also click reverse to print it for your homeward journey. This is a useful addition to a map, and even to the SatNav so you don't just blindly follow the spoken instructions and end up on a muddy track or in a stream!

A good tip for searching online is that with the latest versions of all the browsers, Internet Explorer, Chrome & Firefox etc., you can just type a search into the address bar. In other words where you normally would type for instance: <a href="https://www.bbc.co.uk/weather">www.bbc.co.uk/weather</a> - just type BBC weather and then click on one of the search results. That way you don't have to go back to Google or another search engine first.

Incidentally, if you like to regularly check the weather on the BBC site, another idea is to enter your postcode in the box provided (or any major town or city worldwide). Then you can click to make it your default location, so it comes up every time you visit the page.

Want to check if you've won the Lottery? Just go to <a href="www.national-lottery.co.uk">www.national-lottery.co.uk</a> and see the results of all the draws. There is even a list of all the unclaimed prizes. Any contributions gratefully accepted...!

There is talk in the IT Industry about using simplified language when conversing with, or selling to customers. This really follows on from lots of the big high street names becoming more involved in the supply of technology products. Plain English is something I have always been a supporter of in my day to day work. I know it is a fact that so many people become alienated by sales people full of 'techno-babble'. Change would be a good thing for everyone.





# In the Kitchen

# Ingredient of the Month - The Tomato

he tomato's progress from wild vine to popular fruit was not easy. A member of the same family as the potato and deadly nightshade, its relation to nightshade convinced many that it was poisonous. The courageous Italians and Spanish used the tomato as food to their---and the world's---culinary benefit. By the middle of the 18th century, most Europeans had discovered that the little "pome dei Moro" (Spanish), "pomme d'amour" (French) or "poma d'oro" (Italian) was tasty and versatile.

The French introduced it in their colony at New Orleans and Thomas Jefferson grew tomatoes at Monticello. The tender vine was still viewed as poisonous by the less worldly inhabitants of New England who grew it as an annual ornamental. As legend has it, the myth of the poisonous fruit was finally dispelled in 1820 by one Colonel Robert Gibbon Johnson who proposed to eat a bushel of tomatoes on the steps of the Boston courthouse.

The crowd that turned out to watch him die in agony was no doubt disappointed. Recipes for tomatoes flooded cookbooks thereafter and by 1880, the myth was an "old wives' tale." Today, thousands of acres in hundreds of countries grow the tomato, providing a source of vitamins C and A. Research has also established that the lycopene in tomatoes may help fight certain cancers.

#### Misconceptions

Botanically, the tomato is a fruit---it flowers and contains seeds. An American, however, added to the mythology by attempting to have the tomato classified as such to avoid the tariff on imported vegetables. The U.S. Supreme Court, in Nix v. Hedden (1893), officially ruled the fruit a vegetable leading to confusion that persists to this day.

#### Ratatouille

Ingredients

2 Large Aubergines, (eggplant)

2 large Courgettes

Salt and Pepper

120ml/4 fl.oz. Olive Oil

2 Large Onions, thinly sliced

3 tbsp Tomato Puree

3 Garlic Cloves, chopped

2 Large Capsicums, ( sweet peppers) cut into thick strips

4 Tomatoes, skinned and chopped

1/2 tbsp Freshly chopped Coriander

A pinch of cinnamon

1 teasp Freshly chopped Basil

#### **Instructions**

- Cut the halved aubergines (eggplant) and courgettes (zucchini) across in slices about 2.5cm/1 inch thick and arrange in layers in a colander, sprinkling each layer with salt. Top with a weighted plate and leave to drain for one hour.
- 2. Heat the oil in a pan, add the onions and gently fry for 5-8 minutes until soft and transparent. Stir in the tomato puree and cook for a further 3 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 3. Rinse the aubergines and courgettes under running cold water then dry on kitchen paper. Add to the onions together with the garlic and peppers. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes.
- 4. Add the tomatoes, coriander, cinnamon, basil, salt and pepper. Mix well then cover and leave to cook for a further 40 minutes. Remove the lid for the final 5-7 minutes to allow the sauce to reduce if necessary. Serve hot.

#### **Tomato Sauce**

Ingredients

1 Onion, finely chopped

450g/1lb Tomatoes, peeled and chopped

175g/7 oz Butter

1 tbsp Fresh Thyme

1 tbsp Fresh Tarragon

1 Clove of Garlic

2 tbsp Tomato Purée

110ml/4 fl.oz Fresh Vegetable Stock

Salt and Pepper

#### **Instructions**

- 1. Put the onions, tomatoes, butter, herbs garlic and tomato purée into a blender and process until smooth.
- 2. Bring the stock to the boil, then lower the heat and gradually add the puréed mixture whisking continuously. Do not allow to boil. Continue to cook for 15 minutes.
- 3. Season with salt and pepper. Serve hot.

Serve with savoury pancakes, fish, pasta, vegetables, lamb, beef or poultry.

#### Lamb Provencal

Ingredients

1 tbsp Olive Oil

4 Lamb Chops

2 Garlic Cloves, sliced

1 tbsp Fresh Rosemary, chopped

1 Onion, chopped

75g/3oz Mushrooms, sliced

450g/11b Tomatoes, sliced

1 tbsp Tomato Paste

Salt and Black Pepper

#### Instructions

- 1. Heat the oil in a frying pan, add the lamb and brown on both sides. Remove from the pan and set aside. Stir in the garlic, rosemary and onion and cook for a minute.
- 2. Add the mushrooms and cook for a further minute, add the tomatoes, tomato puree and seasoning and stir well.
- 3. Return the lamb to the pan, cover and simmer for 12-15 minutes.(or when lamb is cooked through) Serve hot.

# Cat Crisis at the Hull Branch of the RSPCA, Clough Road, Hull

Road, Hull & East Riding Branch based on Clough Road, Hull have rescued and accommodated a huge number of cats this year and are having to prioritise the cats now being admitted to only the most vulnerable, those which are sick, injured or those which are victims of cruelty. This is to ensure that those cats that are most in need receive the care that they require. The downside is that these cats require extensive veterinary care before they can be re-homed and this is presenting a huge strain on the centres financial resources.

Many of the cats being rescued are having to be boarded at local veterinary surgeries as the animal centre is so overcrowded, or fostered by members of staff and volunteers on a temporary basis within there own homes.



## Summer . . . the silly season

s summer draws to a close (it's raining as I write this in the middle of august), I think of the summer only problems we have seen this year.

People think of fleas as being the main summer problem, but this year I have seen an unusually large number of harvest mite larva (Trombicula autumnalis) infestations especially around Cottingham. The usual presentation is of the poor cat or dog itching its feet, biting them until the skin is broken.

If you part the hair carefully you can just make out the minute orange larvae of the harvest mites. Treatment involves killing the mites, the only way we appear to manage that is to spray the feet or soak them in fipronil (frontline spray), the spot on flea treatments do not appear to be effective on the extremities. Despite killing the mites the intense itching still carries on so a short course of steroids is often needed to relieve the scratching. (See pic top right column)

Summer is BBQ time but the BBQ can be a hazardous times for your dog. If your dogs are like mine they think the BBQ is just for them, but you need to keep an eye on the dogs. Every year we spend many happy hours removing discarded BBQ food from dogs' intestines. So far this year the number one offending BBQ left over has been the corn on the cob or should I say the cob without the corn. The left over cob fits perfectly in a dog's small intestine to cause a blockage.








The small orange harvest mites larvae on a cat's ear.

The dog will usually present a couple of days after the BBQ vomiting, not keeping any fluids down and very depressed. We will x ray the dog looking for a foreign body but the corn can be difficult to see on X ray.

The only way to remove the offending object is abdominal surgery to remove the corn.

The most amazing foreign body in a dog this year has been the spaniel which swallowed a mango stone! Not only did the dog manage to swallow the stone but the stone passed out of the dog's stomach into the small intestine, incredible considering the stone was four times wider than the diameter of the intestine. Peach stones are another favourite found inside dogs.

More dangerous than these are the rib bones that we leave behind and while our backs are turned the dogs will steal. Rib bones have an unfortunate ability to get stuck in the dogs' oesophagus causing choking and retching. The bones can only be removed via endoscope and large pair of forceps, but the oesophagus is a very sensitive part of the digestive tract and can be easily scarred leading to permanent damage.

The last scourge of the summer is the dreaded grass seed. These innocuous little things get everywhere and cause endless trouble. Soon after July the spaniels come into the surgery shaking their heads vigorously and there nestling against the ear drum is a grass seed. It's not just ears though, the grass seeds burrow themselves into dogs' feet causing large penetrating wounds and the grass seed can take some hours of surgery to locate, only this week I removed a grass seed from inside a dogs pelvic canal following a 2.5 cm tract from just in front of its vulva.

My advice for hairy dogs such as spaniels is have the fur around the ears and feet cut short so the grass seeds can be seen easily before they work their way into the dogs ears and skin.

be fixed train track type or clear tray type. Veneers usually mean some tooth grinding, often quite a lot of grinding. Crowns definitely mean quite a lot of grinding. Obviously there is the biological cost of tooth grinding as well as the financial cost. More often than not adults are not prepared to have a brace on, especially for extended periods.

Well there is now an alternative. The Inman Aligner is a removable brace that exerts a steady small force on the teeth that makes the teeth move more quickly in a very safe manner. This means that treatment times are from as little as six weeks and up to sixteen weeks only. This can remove the need for veneers, reducing the biological and financial cost. Also veneers can leave in-standing teeth thick and bulky.

How about that? Often it is necessary to some very minor enamel stripping and re-contouring where the teeth touch to make a bit of space but this very minor indeed and is a fraction of a millimetre. The appliance was initially invented in the US but the technique has been developed here in the UK and is now spreading like wild fire across Europe and the rest of the world.

Because the brace is removable you do not have to avoid the food that you love that may break a fixed brace. Also for those times that you could really do without a brace in your mouth you can take it out (as long as you remember to put it back in so it does its job). Tooth cleaning is also a doddle because you can take it out. Now there are limitations with what the Inman Aligner can do but there have been lots of cases that I have seen over the last seventeen and a half years that it would have been perfect for.

They must also have appropriate insurance in place for the work that they are carrying out. Should any problems arise, you will have reassurance that the SRA will be able to help you.

Solicitors are required to be upfront and clear about costs. There should not be any hidden surprises along the way. When contacting a firm of solicitors, we recommend that you should always ask for details of cost in advance.

You would advise you to ensure your solicitor is a specialist in Private Client law - not all solicitors prepare Wills regularly. Look out for specialist qualifications such as membership with the Society of Trust and Estate Practitioners (STEP) and members of the Chartered Institute of Taxation (CTA). When arranging an appointment, don't be afraid to ask about the experience of the individual you will be seeing and for details of their supervisor, if appropriate.

Flaws in your Will may only come to light when you are not here to correct the problem. For peace of mind, we would advise you to always check:

- \* the experience and qualifications of your advisor
- \* whether they are regulated by a professional body
- \* what insurance they hold





# Residents warned to take care with Doorstep Traders

esidents are being asked to beware of companies selling security and fire alarms by using high pressure sales techniques

It has been brought to the attention of East Riding of Yorkshire Councilís trading standards service that a company from the north west of England - which can not be named due to ongoing legal proceedings - has been targeting elderly and vulnerable East Riding residents in the hope of supplying burglar or fire alarms at inflated prices.

Although the firm may offer to supply and install the alarms free of charge, the amount of money charged for monitoring and maintenance can run into thousands of pounds.

Colin Briggs, trading standards service manager, said: "When consumers are visited at home and agree a contract with the salesperson present, they should receive a notice of their cancellation rights.

"However, the vulnerable people targeted by these unscrupulous security firms have been encouraged to sign a declaration allowing work to begin straight away. This means that the work has been done and payment made before the consumers have had time to think about the cost."

Councillor Jane Evison, portfolio holder for cultural services, housing and public protection, said: "Unfortunately disreputable firms often target older and more vulnerable residents by making unsolicited visits or telephone calls. Residents should be aware of this and treat all uninvited callers with caution."







# In the Garden



eptember is generally a cooler, gustier month than August and the days are noticeably shorter. While there's not as much to do in the ornamental garden at this time of the year, if you have a fruit or vegetable patch, you'll be busy reaping the rewards of harvest. It's also time to get out and start planting spring-flowering bulbs for next year. Make the most of the remaining warmth while you can!

#### Sowing and planting

Sow sweet peas in a cold frame or the greenhouse for early summer blooms next year.

Sow other hardy annuals (e.g. Consolida, Calendula, Centaurea, Limnanthes and poppies) in situ.

If you sowed any spring-flowering biennials such as Viola, Digitalis (foxglove) or Erysimum (wallflowers), earlier in the summer, they will now need planting out.

This is a good time of year to plant new perennials, especially towards the end of September, as the soil is still warm, but moisture levels are increasing.

#### Cutting back, pruning and dividing

Don't neglect hanging basket maintenance - a little deadheading, watering and feeding can keep them going until mid-autumn. Once they are past their best, re-plant as winter/spring hanging baskets with spring-flowering bulbs, winter heathers, trailing ivies and spring-flowering plants as above.

Continue to deadhead plants such as Dahlia, Delphinium, Rosa and Penstemon to prolong the display and give colour well into the month.

Continue cutting back perennials that are fading and dying down.

Now is a good time to divide any overgrown or tired looking clumps of alpines and herbaceous perennials such as crocosmias. This will invigorate them, and improve flowering and overall shape, for next year.

#### **Propagation**

Some tall late-flowering perennials, such as asters, may still need staking to stop them being blown over in the wind.

Most perennial weeds are vulnerable to weedkiller in early autumn. Applying a product containing glyphosate will ensure that the roots, as well as the top growth, are killed. Treasured plants must be protected with plastic sheeting.

#### Planning ahead

Buy spring-flowering bedding plants and buy or order spring-flowering bulbs.

## Flower garden

Sow sweet peas in a cold frame or the greenhouse for early summer blooms next year.

Sow other hardy annuals (e.g. Consolida, Calendula, Centaurea, Limnanthes and poppies) in situ. If you have very heavy clay soil, you may get better results by sowing under cover in containers or plug trays, as the seedlings are less likely to rot.

Wait for the first frosts to hit dahlias and cannas before lifting the tubers or rhizomes. In warmer regions, they may be alright left in the ground, but do cover the crowns with a protective layer of straw or bracken.

Buy spring-flowering bedding plants, such as Bellis, Primula, wallflowers, and violas.

Buy or order spring-flowering bulbs. Try to plant daffodils (Narcissus) by mid-September for the best results. Tulips are best left until November. Remember that there are many other bulbs to choose from: Muscari (grape hyacinths), Chionodoxa


Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

Telcome back readers to this months fishing news. Firstly this month sees some unfortunate bad news regarding one of our local waters; disease has hit the popular fishing venue Risby Park. Everything is being done to rectify this problem, both by Anthony and the Environment Agency. The one thing I want to request on this matter is LETS ALL HELP BY STOPPING THE SPREAD OF DISEASE BY DOING SIMPLE THINGS!

Firstly; all keep nets and landing nets must be air dried thoroughly. If you use a stink bag, once you get home please hang them out to dry; all aquatic diseases die when dry.

Secondly; even if rubbish bins are provided at venues, it is still important TO TAKE ALL RUBBISH HOME! Our litter as a general rule contains food items which in turn attracts the rats and other vermin, all of which carry their own diseases.

On a brighter note, how has your fishing gone lately? Good we hope. I have been receiving news of good results being produced by both still waters and the rivers. The River Hull has seen good numbers of fish as far down as Ennerdale Bridge. Barbel weighing an impressive 8lb, reported with photographic evidence, from the Kingswood Bridges and good shoals of



perch from the shipyard in Beverley. The upper stretches have also been producing good mixed bags, with summer Pike being caught at Hempholme.

Lots of club matches on venues such as; Fitlin (Westfields), Albrough (Lambwith Lakes), Westlands and Foss Hill have been producing big bags on the 'method'.

I will try to explain how this works: firstly there are two types of method feeder; flat and triangular, both come in either elasticated or inline versions. This enables you to fish a free running tactic or bolt rig style. For the flat method choose a groundbait such as swimstim or any fine method mix. When mixing your groundbait you must add just enough water so it sticks together when squeezed. For the specimen feeder choose a heavier method mix containing more particles, these groundbaits tend to be stickier, but again don't add too much water, you can add more but you cannot take it out.

When your ground bait is ready the same principles apply to both the flat and triangular feeder; take a handful of the mix and squeeze onto the feeder, but not too much at this stage. Then with your short hook length around 4"-5" place your hook bait onto the feeder, now you can add a second handful of groundbait over the first, then mould with your hands into an aerodynamic shape for better casting and bait presentation. The second handful that you placed over your hook length explodes first, this exposes your desired hook bait on top of a pile of goodies. Any queries on the above pop in and I will happily explain these methods in more detail.

# Hallgate Schools - continued

#### The Year 1924

by Peter Railton (Author and Local Historian)

oth, new Headteachers got off to a flying start in 1924 judging from the reports of the H.M.I. Mr. Vigrass in the January.

#### In the girls' school -

"The School is directed with marked earnestness, and a spirit of conscientious endeavour permeates the teaching. Much good work is "being done and the general atmosphere is very buoyant. The activities of the school are expanding and the study of teaching methods is being undertaken with some degree of enthusiasm. The results of these developments are seen in the increasing interest and intelligence displayed by the children, especially in the upper classes."

#### In the boys' school -

"There are signs of renewed vitallity here which auger well for the future. The Headmaster is animated by zeal and his vigorous efforts to raise the standard of teaching are meeting with a satisfactory measure of success. The general activities of the school both in and out of the classrooms are much wider, methods are more varied and some of the teachers display very creditable skill."

Back to the girls' department. Mumps became a real threat to attendance in January and February and numbers dropped to 80%, On Friday 12th of February nearly 60 girls were away and the M.O.H. ordered the school to close for two weeks; when it reopened only 68% of girls were present, the rest still away with mumps and now the 'flu, then came snow and hard frosts depleting numbers still further, including some staff.

#### **Teaching Practice**

The students from the Training College finished their teaching experience and were sorry to leave; Hallgate School always has been a popular venue for student teachers - I remember them as a pupil there and I did my first teaching practice there in the boys' department when Mr Hassam was Headmaster, in 1967.

Back to the '20's. Some girls were going to be involved in the Dance section of Hull Music Festival that year and Miss Wolstenholme called to arrange the dances to be taught to the girls in the Country Dance

On Saturday 22nd March, 30 girls were taken to see 'A Tale of Two Cities' performed by the Dickens Fellowship in Hull. This was an interesting group of Dickens performers, a, relatively small number of amateur actors who gave plays, or excerpts from plays to invited audiences. They had the costumes and props and scenery and were certainly still active in the 1960's, though much reduced in numbers by then and mainly confined to quiz - nights and social evenings among themselves in the Hull Church Institute in Albion Street.

#### **Honours Board**

An 'Honours Board' was put up in the Hall. "This will be a great encouragement to the girls to be diligent in their studies," Miss Brimelow recorded in the log book. Upon the Honours Board were inscribed the names of pupils who had passed scholarships for secondary schools. There was one on the back wall of the boys' Hall too - I remember it well, it was certainly there in the 1960's but has since curiously disappeared and I can not find any trace of it - no one seems to know anything about it - like the school bell that was taken down from the belfry above the infant's Hall in the 1970 's - that too has vanished!

#### **Many Outings**

Another outing was enjoyed on the 29th of March when the scholarship class plus the St.VII girls were taken to see 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' at the Grand Theatre in Hull. The usual Empire Day obligations were carried out in the schools and were followed, by a concert in the girls' hall. In mid-June a party of 29 girls went to

London to see the Wembly Exhibition and to 'visit other places of interest! This must have been an exciting venture and shows just how much the concept of a wider education had come in a few short years. A shorter trip was made in July to Bridlington and -

'many girls were sick the next day! - too many chips and ice cream perhaps.

The Staff for the following school year were to be - St. ex-VII + scholarship class Miss Cleator; St.VII Miss Brimelow; St.VI+V Miss Buttery; St. IV Miss Wrigglesworth; St. III Miss Dixon; St. II Miss Wright; St.I Mrs. Tether.

Nine girls were successful in obtaining scholarships to Beverley High School for girls that year. In October a Circus was held on the Rectory field for two afternoons at which all the children of the schools attended in turn; the Rectory field was where the Adult Education Centre is, plus part of the new Primary building and car parks and was to be the site of mobile classrooms in more recent times.

#### **New Technology**

In the Spring of 1924, technology came a step closer to the Boys' department - a new 'optical lantern' was used for the first time and operated by Mr. Gore, Head of Hymers College who gave a lecture on clouds using the new visual aid. He remarked on the 'splendid piece of equipment that the school was fortunate enough to possess' - even if they had no slides of their own! Several dignitories were present at what was at the time a milestone in group teaching - I wonder what they would have made of today's class technology? It was used again a few weeks later when Mr. Tom Sheppard of Hull Museums brought his slides along of 'The Evolution of Yorkshire Man' depicting life in the Iron and Bronze Ages and 'up to the present day!

#### **Music Festivals**

On the 9th of May, Mr. Brookes, Mr. Haggard, and Miss White took a party of pupils to take part in the York Music Festival; the choral group got a second class certificate and the team of eight boys who performed the 'Haxby Sword Dance' got a first. There was a great enthusiasm for competitions of all kinds in schools in the 1920's and all entered into for the glory of the school and the satisfaction of pupils and staff alike.

#### **Proud Record**

Hallgate, has a justifiably-proud record, in competitions of many kinds and these were actively encouraged by the Heads who tapped the strengths and interests of their staff to train-up the youngsters who willingly practiced during lunch time and after school. More successes followed when Miss Steel took a junior choir to Hull Music Festival and came third out of thirty one other schools.

Stephen Tennison and Kenneth Ashton fell in the playground in separate incidents - one cut his knee and the other sprained his wrist. These incidents were recorded in the log book because they needed medical attention.

#### **Woods Lane Sports Ground**

On the 24th of June, the Holderness Sports were held in Cottingham - the likely venue was the old Ellermans Ground down 'Woods Lane', since become better known as a training ground for Hull City players. The weather was excellent and the proceedings went on until 8.00 pm. The Heads of the participating schools were there, plus the usual dignitories and County Councillor Mrs. Alice Holtby (mother of local author Winifred) presented the cups, bowls, shields etc. to the winners.

More sports days, more outings, more competitions here and in other parts of the East Riding followed - both Mr. Brookes and Miss Brimelow were 'go-getters' in their day and aimed, for the best for their pupils.

#### Mrs. Moorby Retires

A final link with the past took place that autumn with the retirement of Mrs. Moorby as Head of the infant school in the village for 38 years; she was presented with a 'wireless set' and a cheque for £12.12s. The next Head of the infants was Miss M. E. Sowerby.

Bless her, this little horse from the Welsh mountains even took to the Skidby roads with all the traffic, dog walkers and all the other alien comings and goings. She loved being ridden up the road and away! Her natural inquisitiveness coming to the fore!

Storm proved to have the heart of a lion. John and Lorna came back up from Port Talbot during the third week. They were very moved at the huge breakthrough we had made and were delighted to watch their wish list be answered. We could get on from the ground by putting a foot in a stirrup and jumping up. We taught her to stand at a mounting block quietly and be mounted. We could get both on and off from both sides of her without reaction.

Other things on their wish list were being able to wash her down with a hose pipe and apply fly spray without a hissy fit and decrease her dominant attitude in her stable.....all answered. Little Storm was a whole new, happy and accepting person....if you see what I mean!

The next three days were all about teaching John all the groundwork techniques needed for him to be able to carry on back home. With one or two hick ups, John managed to master this new ethos and ride his little horse again. He loved being

able ride her in just the rope halter and no bit! He thought the ability to halt her by touching the Balance rein round her neck was a miracle! The lovely thing about my life is how I can teach people who are masters in the "OLD WAYS" this whole new approach to horse training via natural / psychological training. John, a hill farmer from Wales, who has worked with horses all his life became a student again. The results were wonderful. They teamed up and became one again.

When they all left, they left a gap in our lives. Such lovely, enthusiastic and talkative people made our yard feel rather empty and bereft without them! They had become involved in all that we did on the yard with all the other horses, participated, commented and lent a helping hand. It was strangely quiet when they drove away!

Back home in Wales, John carried on with all he had learnt. We had regular reports of their progress and accomplishments. John rode her away back up those mountainsides and all was doing well....until she stumbled coming back down a steep, stony farm track.

She fell on those tenderly healed knees, gouging out a large hole in the old scar tissue. John fell off over her head and was filled with dread at the possible re enactment of panic and flight. Strom went nowhere. She stood quietly while John picked himself up, dusted himself off and examined the damage. She lead quietly back home and the vet came to attend.

This set back is a blow to all involved. Scar tissue is notoriously hard to re heal...however heal it will. Storm has changed. She is no longer the volatile and reactive horse that she was before she came to us.

Her attitude in all ways is steadier and calmer. To deal with on the ground, to cope with the fall, to cope with more pain, to tolerate the vet and the daily nursing...everything is different now. She has amazed her owners and the vet with her tolerance, acceptance and manners now.

Poor John, I am so sorry for this set back. All the worries of getting back on will be flying round his head again. I realise that it will be harder than ever for him but not so for Storm. She will be far more open minded now and so long as John follows the training procedures he has learnt there will not be a problem.....but he has to believe that completely. If He puts a grey area in there then it will remain so.

I will go down to help him get back on when the time is right, just to make it all go smoothly. They will have to give me a bed for the night and feed me!!!!!

## Free Electric Blanket Safety Checks

embers of the public are being urged to book a place now if they want to take advantage of free electric blanket safety checks.

The checks will be carried out during the week beginning Monday, 13th September 2010, by East Riding of Yorkshire Council and Humberside Fire and Rescue Service.

Councillor Jane Evison, portfolio holder for cultural services, housing and public protection, said: "I urge East Riding residents to take advantage of the free electric blanket safety checks being offered as the statistics regarding dangerous blankets are quite shocking."

Last year more than 429 electric blankets were tested as part of the council's continuing programme of electric blanket safety checks.

In total 38 per cent of the blankets failed the safety test and were found to be dangerous to use.

National statistics show that old and unsafe electric blankets cause more than 5,000 fires each year. More than half of all electric blankets tested nationally are found to be unsafe.

Electric blankets which are over 10 years old do not have the safety features of modern blankets. Serious defects can also develop when blankets are not used in accordance with the instructions.

Colin Briggs, trading standards manager for East Riding of Yorkshire Council said: "Electric blankets are often used by older or vulnerable people so it is important to ensure they are safe. Older residents may be using dated or even dangerous blankets without realising it."


Appointments must be made for any blankets which will be brought to the event, and are available on a first-come first-served basis. It takes six minutes to check each blanket.

Those who arrive without an appointment for a blanket will be disappointed as there will not be time to take extra blankets.

On Thursday, 16th September a testing session will be held at Beverley Fire Station.

Anyone who would like to have their electric blankets checked must ensure that an appointment is made for each blanket they intend to bring.



The pensioner benefit help team has since 2006 helped over 2,500 pensioners claim more than £5 million in benefits. If you pay council tax and either receive Pension Credit Guaranteed Credit or have savings or investments that are worth less than £16,000, and are resident in East Riding, then you should call the pensioner benefit help team.

Those with savings of more than £16,000 would not qualify for council tax/housing benefit but may still be entitled to Pension Credit or one of a range of benefits and entitlements designed to help older people

In these difficult times, everyone is feeling the strain of rising prices and household bills and the team is urging pensioners to check they are receiving all benefits to which they are entitled.





Congratulations also go to Beverley Unbeatables Swimming Club, Driffield Disabled Swimming Club, Goole Splashers and Haltemprice Dolphins (all members of the East Riding of Yorkshire Disabled Swimming Association), Leconfield Senior and Junior Badminton Clubs, Beverley Braves RFL Club, Pocklington RUFC, Welton Sailing Club, Parkside Raiders JFC and Wolds Archers (Adults) who have renewed their level one accreditation, Stamford Bridge Cricket Club and Meridian Gymnastics Club who have successfully renewed their level two accreditation and Hull and District Canoe Club who have renewed their level three accreditation.

The scheme works as a partnership between the East Riding Council for Voluntary Youth Services (Erycvs) who co-ordinate Ercas level one and the East Riding Sport and Play Development Service who administer Ercas levels two and three.

The aim of the scheme is to promote a quality club infrastructure focusing on key areas such as child protection and implementing health and safety measures. A further requirement for all junior clubs is to have qualified coaches and CRB police cleared volunteers.

Achieving the ERCAS standards is mandatory for all voluntary sports clubs who use East Riding school or leisure centre facilities, deliver taster/holiday sessions in schools, hire school facilities through the Directed Community Use of School Team (DCU), apply for Rate Relief or hand out any publicity material to local school children.




