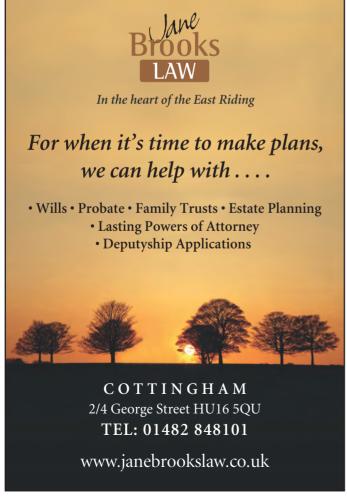

Windows 10 has arrived and some mayhem has ensued, and Q&A....

indows 10 has arrived and it is fair to say a good deal of mayhem has ensued! We have had crashed computers, blue screens, password lock-outs, lost email, printers and scanners. But some people (apparently) have upgraded with no problems. So my advice based on all this, is to hold off, don't go for the free upgrade yet. Wait a while for all the bugs to be sorted out.

Now the good news is that Microsoft has graciously given users of Windows 7 and 8 until July 2016 to make up their minds whether to go for the free upgrade. You can register for it any time by clicking on the Windows icon in the corner of your screen, but you don't have to install until a time of your choosing, and you can't just upgrade by accident! See the O&A section at the end for more info.

Now don't get me wrong, I certainly don't want to appear a naysayer, there is nothing wrong with Windows 10 itself. It does have quite a slick new interface (techno-speak for nice look and feel!). Most people will certainly find it an improvement on Windows 8, and we'll be confident in selling you a new Windows 10 computer, and you shouldn't have any problems. It is quite a refreshing change and there is less confusion now as you boot straight to a Desktop, and it is nice to see the Start Menu back. The blue Windows 8 start screen with the giant tiles has gone, the only remnant is having some small tiles attached to the side of the Start Menu, but these are removable or customisable to your choice. There is an alphabetical programs list, now called 'All Apps', a file explorer and shut down options, just like on the old classic Start Menu. And if you want to talk to your computer, with the aid of a microphone, there's Cortana to answer your questions! 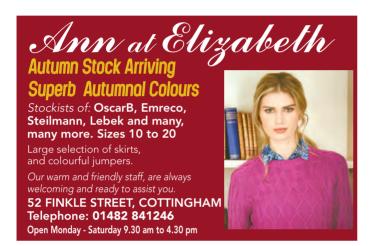

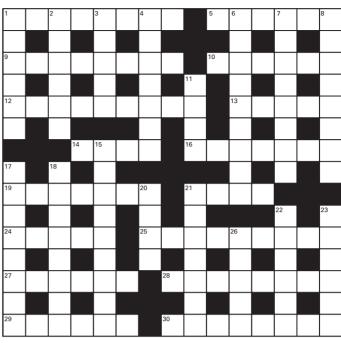

any people pass over British cheese for French or Italian cheese, but with over 700 cheeses being made in Britain today, and with a very long history in cheese-making, they shouldn't. So hats off to British Cheese Week. Not only is the UK still producing traditional and new British cheeses but our cheese-makers have gone a few steps further and today there is more mozzarella produced in the UK than in Italy. We also produce our own Parmesan, Brie, Camembert and Gruyère.

General British Cheese History

Whilst cheese has been made in Britain for thousands of years, it was during Roman times that the processing techniques were refined. During the 11th Century, much of the cheese- making in Britain was carried out by monks, whose monasteries were thriving following the Norman invasion.

Their experimentation gave us, at the least the foundations of many of the cheeses made today. An excellent example of this is Wensleydale which can be traced back to the twelfth century when it was made by the Cistercian monks at Jervaulx Abbey in Yorkshire.

From the 16th century onwards, cheeses were being known by the name of the region in which they were made and by the early 19th century the British Cheese industry was booming with cheese was being made in farmhouses across the length and breadth of the United Kingdom. However, two factors were to have profound affects on British Cheese-making.

The Industrial revolution with its vast railway networks made the transport of fresh milk over great distances possible, making it more profitable for dairymen to sell milk rather than make cheese, resulting in local cheesemaking taking a nose-dive.

World War II Rationing

World War II brought rationing to Britain with the weekly allowance per person being only 50g/2oz! And as if that wasn't bad enough, The Ministry of Food stipulated that only one type of cheese could be manufactured - the National Cheese - the final nail in the coffin and by the end of the war only a few varieties were being made.

It wasn't until the 1970's that British cheese-making had something of a revival with the happy re-discovery of old recipes and the development of new cheeses and techniques bringing us to the present day thriving industry.

Cheddar has always been and still is Britain's favourite cheese. It gets its name from the Cheddar Caves in Somerset, UK where it was first stored in the 15th Century. Here are a few interesting facts about Cheddar:-

• There are six main varieties of Cheddar - mild,

medium, mature, extra-mature, vintage and West Country Farmhouse Cheddar. The main difference between them is the time they are aged – usually from two months for mild to 24 months for vintage

- Cheddar is the UK's favourite cheese, accounting for 55% of the market
- It takes 10 litres of milk to make one kilogram of Cheddar
- A matchbox sized piece of Cheddar contains about 30% of the recommended daily calcium intake for adults
- West Country Farmhouse Cheddar has a PDO (Protected Designation of Origin) and can only be produced in the West Country Devon, Dorset, Somerset and Cornwall
- By the reign of Charles I, records show that the demand for cheese made at Cheddar was so high that it was "bespoke" and already sold before it was even made.



Welsh Onion Bake

Ingredients:

675g/11/2lb Potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced 350g/12oz Onions, thinly sliced 100g/4oz Butter Salt and Black Pepper 100g/4oz Caerphilly Cheese

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C, 375F, Gas mark 5.
- 2. Line a baking tray with parchment paper butter generously and layer with potatoes and onion, dotting butter and seasoning between each layer ending with a layer of potato. Dot remaining butter on top, cover with foil and bake for 11/2 hours.
- 3. To serve turn out onto a warm serving dish, peel off the parchment, sprinkle the cheese over the top and melt under a preheated grill. Serve immediately.

Cheese and Onion Tarts

Ingredients

200g/7oz Shortcrust Pastry 15g/1/2 oz Butter 1 Onion, chopped 75g/3oz Cheddar Cheese, grated 1 large Egg 90ml/3 fl.oz. Milk Salt and Pepper

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C, 375F, Gas Mark 5. Divide the pastry into four and use to line 4 x 10cm/4 inch tart tins. Place on a baking tray.
- 2. Melt the margarine in a pan, add the onion and sauté gently until soft and transparent.
- 3. Divide the onion between the 4 tarts and sprinkle the grated cheddar over the top.
- 4. In a jug, beat together the milk and egg and season with salt and pepper.
- 5. Pour the egg mixture over the cheese and onion in the tarts and bake for 30 -35 minutes until set and golden.
- 6. Transfer to wire racks and allow to cool. Refrigerate until ready to serve.



Cheese and Meat Loaf

Ingredients

500g/1 lb Minced Beef 150ml/5fl.oz. Water 1 large Egg Salt and Pepper 100g/4oz Fresh Breadcrumbs 1 Onion, chopped 1 teasp Dried Mixed Herbs 100g/4oz Cheddar Cheese

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180F, 350F, gas Mark 4 and line a loaf tin with parchment or greaseproof paper.
- 2. Put mince, breadcrumbs, water, onion, egg, mixed herbs, salt and pepper into a bowl. Mix well.
- 3. Cut cheese into 12mm/1/2" squares and stir them through the meat mixture.
- 4. Turn the mixture into the loaf tin and bake for approx 1 to 1-1/2 hours.
- 5. To serve invert onto a serving platter and serve hot or leave in the tin until cold.

Chocolate Coconut Cheesecake

Ingredients

For the base

75g/3oz Butter

225g/8oz Digestive Biscuits, crushed

For the filling

175g/6oz Dark Chocolate

450g/1lb Cream Cheese

275g/10oz Caster Sugar

5 Eggs

120ml/4fl.oz. Whipping Cream

2 tbsp Plain Flour

2 teasp Vanilla Extract

1/2 teasp Almond Extract

125g/5oz Desiccated (flaked) Coconut

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170C, 325F, Gas Mark 3 and lightly grease a 22cm/9-inch springform tin.
- 2. Melt the butter in a large saucepan, add the crushed digestive biscuits and mix well. Press into the bottom of the greased tin and bake for 10 minutes. Allow to cool.
- 3. Meanwhile, break the chocolate into a small heatproof bowl. Set the bowl over a small pan of very hot water and stir until melted. Set aside.
- 4. Place the cheese and sugar in a large mixing bowl and beat until smooth then beat in the flour and eggs one at a time.
- 5. Add the cream and extracts and mix well then stir in coconut.
- 6. Pour the filling onto crust then drizzle the melted chocolate over filling swirling with a skewer to create a marbled effect.
- 7. Place cheesecake in a large baking tin with enough hot water in the tin to come 2.5cm/1 inch up sides of cake tin. Bake for about 1 hour.
- 8. Remove the cake tin from water and allow to cool before refrigerating. Chill for at least 2 hours before unmoulding. Serve cold.

ONTHE GRAPEVINE

WITH ROY WOODCOCK

The power of TV on the sales of wine

opefully many of you will already have discovered one of the area's newest eating places, which opened a few months ago just over the Humber Bridge at South Ferriby. I'm talking about the Hope & Anchor pub, which was unfortunately forced to close following the tidal surge and floods of 2013 and has since been given a transformation by Great British Menu double winner Colin McGurran, owner and head chef at nearby Winteringham Fields.

After a couple of abortive efforts we made it there with friends during August and I have to say the £500,000 renovations are stunning, with unrivalled views over the Humber from the main dining room.

I mention all this because we were there on the Glorious Twelfth, the start of the grouse shooting season and grouse was on the menu as the "star" of the specials board. But what to drink with it - and game in general?

The traditional answer is a "bottle of good, old red burgundy", but apart from the difficulty of finding a good one, the age of it probably won't come into play - early on in the season the birds can't possibly have been well hung so you won't be trying to match the intense, rich, flavours that develop later on.

Depending, of course, on what the bird will be served with (in our case the grouse was roasted whole and served with red cabbage, potato and celeriac pave and an Old Peculiar gravy) this leaves you able to choose something like a good Pinot Noir from Australia or, better still, New Zealand.

We chose a Languedoc blend with lashings of the local grape, Carignan, which was available by the glass, so we could have changed our minds if it had been disastrous. It wasn't.

If you like game as much as I do then respected wine suppliers Berry Bros & Rudd, of London, carries a great section on food and wine matching on their website, with a whole page devoted to game, including wood pigeon, pheasant and partridge as well as grouse.

The power of TV, even daytime TV, was illustrated perfectly recently when a little known Portuguese red sold by Majestic was recommended by Master of Wine Susie Barrie on the popular cookery show Saturday Kitchen. It subsequently sold out within hours, causing the merchant's website to crash.

Barrie said the 2012 vintage of "Porta 6", a Tinta Roriz, Castelão and Touriga Nacional blend from the Vidigal winery near Lisbon, would work "just brilliantly" with a barbecued lamb dish and the show's host, James Martin, agreed calling it one of the best reds he'd tried in the 10 years he'd worked on the programme.

He added that he'd bought three cases online and Majestic stores were "inundated" with orders as a result and traffic to the website was so heavy that it crashed briefly at 11am.

Majestic reported that it took over 1,000 orders for the wine by midday in the "busiest hour in its website's history" and had completely sold out three hours after the show had finished. Furthermore, it collected orders and reservations for a further 30,000 bottles over the course of the weekend.

This caused Majestic to order all the remaining stock of the 2012 vintage and order a shipment six times larger than the last consignment to meet demand.

Holly Ninnes, Majestic's buyer for Portugal, said: "I'm delighted that Susie Barrie recommended Porta 6 on Saturday Kitchen and, of course, with the response it received.

"I brought this superb red into our range six months ago – it's typically Portuguese, but even more approachable and fruit-driven in style. I hope customers enjoy it and it leads them on to discover more great wines from Portugal."

Porta 6 is now back in stock.

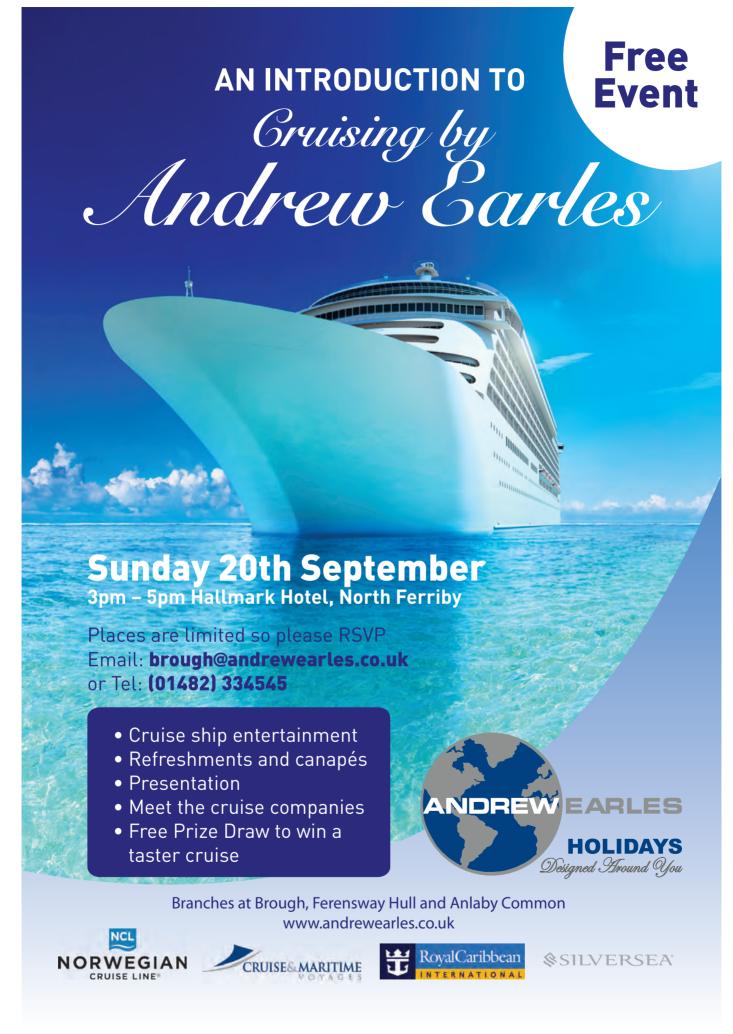

Could you be a Puppy Parent?

That it is to have a helping hand don't you think? Someone you can turn to when things get a little tough....to tell your troubles to or help out with the shopping and household chores. Sometimes these 'hands' appear from the most unusual circumstances and that is how I met Susan, a lovely lady in her early fifties, who had been in a wheelchair for the past two years, after a dreadful car accident. With no-one at home, she was finding it difficult to adjust to an 'able bodied' way of living. Her bungalow had been customised accordingly for Susan's needs but she still needed that extra pair of 'hands'. At the beginning of the year, Rebecca, a close friend of mine, introduced me to Susan whilst she was visiting the place I was residing at the time.

At first I saw the wheelchair. I suppose it is something we 'able bodied' are always drawn to see but then I saw Susan. On the outside she came across a confident lady but also looked a little in denial that she actually needed an out stretched 'hand'. After all, it was only two years ago when Susan was looking forward to a two week holiday in Spain. It was the being involved in an accident on the way to the airport that took her independence away. As I looked beyond all this and into her eyes, there told a different story....a picture of sadness and a cry for her long lost independence to be regained. It was on this day our bond formed. Here was someone who needed my help, my abilities were

slightly limited...but even so. Over the following months, Susan made the journey to see me once or twice a week until it was time for me to return home.

On returning to Hull, Rebecca immediately took me to see my new found friend. With great pride, Susan showed me around her little palace, pointing out all the useful aids that had been fitted to make it more adaptable and comfortable. The cupboards had been lowered, doors widened and a special ramp had been built up to the front door for her wheelchair. "I know we are worlds apart and so different which may lead to slight frustration and I also have a lot to learn, but do you think you can help me?" Looking into the deep blue eyes I first saw all those months ago, I didn't have to acknowledge...Susan knew from my reaction, we had found a true friendship.

My first challenge came in the morning. I had to help Susan get out of bed, something we all take for granted but for someone who lives most of their life in a wheelchair, it can prove quite difficult. I brought her the training aid I had been shown and with a careful tug, Susan was sitting on the edge of her bed. Her clothes laid neatly on the chair so I took each garment to her marvelling at how she had been able to cope in the past but also hoping I am giving her that extra bit of help and confidence.

Today was also our first day to tackle shopping and it was here that Susan explained that we will see a different side to the 'Human Race'. "It's bad enough being small like you but for someone on their own in a wheelchair, people (some but not all) seem to put me into insignificance" she explained. But on this day, whether it was my presence, things slightly changed along with the help I could give her. Doors were opened by people who were more than willing for this 'unlikely pair' entering the shop. I was able to help take items off the shelves and put them in the basket, which is something Susan had only been able to do with the help of the shop assistant. Payment was also made easier a I 'handed' the bank card to the lady on the till. "You've got a good help there" she exclaimed to Susan. The beam on her face said it all. The next challenge was the cash point. Once again, popping Susan's card into the machine made it so much easier (why the banks don't accommodate wheelchairs I do not know). The only thing I couldn't help with was the pin (for security reasons of course) much to the amusement of the couple standing behind us in the queue.

So the list is endless, from waking in the morning to going to bed at night, I will be there for Susan...as her friend, helping 'hand' and confidant. Someone she can tell all her stories, troubles and future ideas to. Someone who knows, will listen and not criticise. Someone who has unconditional love no matter what the future holds. "Come on, Faye, time for bed". So as I laid my head on the edge of my basket next to Susan's bed, I looked up. Seeing those loving blue eyes and feeling the warmth on her outstretched hand as she stroked my head, I knew I had come home.

CANINE PARTNERS is a national charity who train and then find loving homes to assist wheelchair bound people, and are always keen to find and take on new PUPPY PARENTS. This involves a 'parent' to foster an eight week old puppy and to comply with the charity's training and adapting to everyday events throughout its first year. The puppy will them complete its final training at the charity's Head Office where it will be united with a suitable partner.

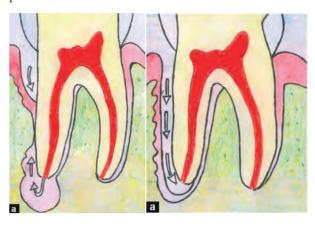
Staying Proper Toothy

I'm staying on the same theme as last time about making the decision when a tooth's time is up or not. Oh my word two articles on the bounce about TEETH! I'll have to lie down.



Perio-Endo Lesions

So, what's this double Dutch jargon then? Well let me explain a bit. Odontology is the study of teeth. Latin I think. The supporting structures **around** teeth are the **peri**odontal tissues. Peri meaning "around", "surrounding" or "enclosing" like perimeter.

Dealing with inside the tooth is **Endo**dontics. Just like endoscope is an instrument for looking inside. Usually endodontics is doing root canal treatment, treating the inside of a tooth to try and save it. Periodontal treatment is treating the gums and bone around teeth usually treating gum disease.

Us dental lot are a bit lazy with English language (you may have noticed). So, we refer to things short hand e.g. perio for gum work, endo for root canal treatment.

Oh, there is ortho as well. Orthodontics is dealing with tooth position and movement (braces). Left: both going on.

Getting Back On Track

So, back on track. A tooth that has a perio-endo lesion is getting a right old battering as there is a problem around it and inside it. Often this is infection and bone loss. Sometimes the endo problem comes first and then affects the perio second and vice versa. Depending on the extent of the problem this can sometimes be treated but it might take a bit of doing. Other times there is both a perio and endo that just join up. These can be catastrophic and quite a lot of the time there is nothing you can do, especially if the tooth gets loose.

Rain, Rain Go Away

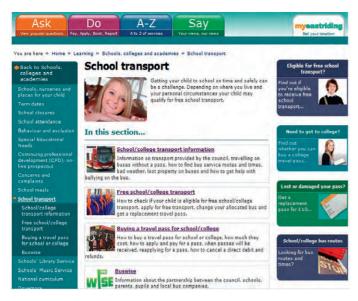

Parents can now apply for school transport quicker and easier online

Il the information students and parents need about local school transport can now be found in one place – thanks to the launch of a new webpage.

The page on East Riding of Yorkshire Council's website www.eastriding.gov.uk/schoolstransport has been redesigned and updated for the summer holidays to make it quicker and easier to access school transport information for people whose children are starting school or changing school in September.

Parents are now being encouraged to visit the webpage to make sure they apply for school travel passes in plenty of time for the start of the new term.

The site also has useful information for people with children already travelling to school, such as bus routes and times, and allows them to ask questions and report any problems.

Using the new website, people can:

- Find out if their child is entitled to a free travel pass.
- Apply for a school or college travel pass for their child by completing an online form.
 - Buy a travel pass by applying online.
- Apply for a replacement bus pass if theirs is lost, damaged or if their child has changed schools or moved address.

- Or just to send an online enquiry to the council's school transport team.

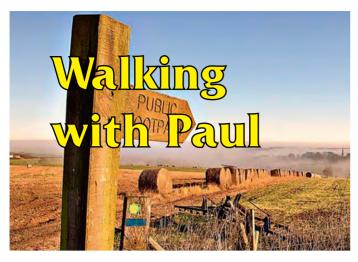

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

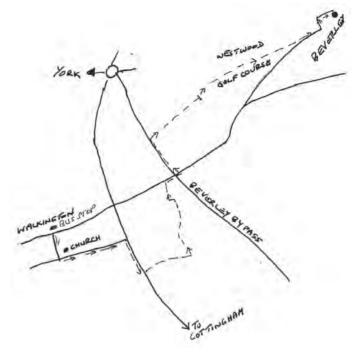
Map. EXPLORER 293

Start at GR. SE997371 Bus stop near Dog and Duck pub. Walkington. Distance 4.4 Miles.

From the bus stop adjacent to the Dog & Duck public house, cross the road and walk up Kirk Lane to the







junction and turn left to walk along the path at the back of the church. Ignore the path that turns off to the right but continue ahead passing a play area on the right and at the end of the path bear left and then immediately right and walk with the hedge to the right to eventually emerge on the Walkington to Bentley road. Turn right and after about 500 metres cross the road and enter Moor Lane to the left of Bentley Park Farm.

Continue down this lane for about 500 metres and after passing through the plantation locate a wooden foot bridge which cross and then pass through a Kissing Gate and walk with the hedge on the left, At the end of the field pass through a second Kissing Gate and then continue in the same direction again keeping the hedge on the left. At the end of the second field cross a foot bridge and continue in the same direction. At the end of the third field pass through another Kissing Gate and enter an enclosed path and continue to emerge on the Beverley to Walkington road near East Wood. Turn right and follow the road towards Beverley and immediately after crossing the bridge spanning the A1079, cross the road and take the path to the right of the A1079.

Take this path as it descends gradually and locate a Kissing Gate on the right which pass through and walk along the field headland keeping the hedge on the left. On approaching the Westwood, bear left and then right and pass through a Kissing Gate. Walk in an easterly direction and on sighting Black Mill head straight for it. Pass the Mill and then aim for Westwood Road. Walk down Westwood Road into Newbegin and into Beverley, take any of several routes to the bus station.

HOW I DID IT.

Depart Hull Interchange at 9.08 am on Bus No. 61.

Alighted at the Dog & Duck at Walkington and commenced walk at 10.05 am.

Completed walk at 12.00 pm and boarded Bus No. X46 at 12.35 pm back to Hull Interchange.

eptember is generally a cooler, gustier month than August and the days are noticeably shorter. While there's not as much to do in the ornamental garden at this time of the year, if you have a fruit or vegetable patch, you'll be busy reaping the rewards of harvest. It's also time to get out and start planting spring-flowering bulbs for next year. Make the most of the remaining warmth while you can. Plus September is the perfect time to plant shrubs and trees and treat your lawn.



Herbaceous Border

A herbaceous border is a collection of perennial herbaceous plants arranged closely together to create a dramatic effect through colour, shape or large scale. A good border design can take a lot of time to plan on paper and in practice — and involves a lot of plants in order to look lush and exotic, but once established it should provide an eye-catching spectacle in your garden for months on end.

Preparing a new border

The best time to create a new border is spring or early autumn. Not many people know that August is the perfect time to plant borders particularly shrubs, trees and herbaceous plants.

- Decide whether you want a traditional formal border along one or both sides of the garden or an island bed which can be viewed from all sides. Don't be too ambitious it's better to create a smaller border that is packed with different colours and textures than a large expanse that is only sparsely planted.
- Mark out the area with stakes and string. To make an

impact, herbaceous borders need to be at least 1.2m wide.

- Dig the area over. Remove all weeds, including any with deep roots, and all large stones.
- Sprinkle a balanced fertiliser over the area such as bonemeal, dig in plenty of compost or well-rotted manure and leave the ground to settle for a fortnight.
- Rake over the ground to make it as level as possible.
- Remove the lower branches of any trees to allow light, rain and air through to your new plantings.
- Planting is best carried out from autumn until spring when the soil is dry enough to work but before conditions become too dry as plants may fail to root even if you water night and day. Container grown plants can be planted at any time of the year, weather permitting, but tender perennials should only be planted out once all danger of frost has passed.



PLANNING

- Consider the soil and aspect and find out what will grow best in your garden.
- Consider the colour scheme you want to achieve pastel lilacs and pinks; hot reds and golds; cool blues and whites; modern blacks, limes and oranges. Work to ensure the balance is neither too bland nor too chaotic.
- Visit shows and gardens for ideas that appeal and jot them down in a notebook. Notice what grows well in local gardens in your neighbourhood.
- Plan your scheme on paper, starting with small groups of plants that work well together and build them up until you have filled your border with several combinations. Use groups of plants in large blocks of odd numbers for greater impact, repeated along the border to help provide continuity

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Divide herbaceous perennials
- 2. Pick autumn raspberries
- 3. Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
- 4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them

of colour and form. Avoid planting singly, except for specimen trees, grasses or shrubs.

- If your garden is small, keep your choice of plants to a few species and repeat them. However, you don't have to include only low-growing plants larger plants will have greater impact in a small space.
- Use your borders to the full by including spring and autumn bulbs in between herbaceous plants and beneath deciduous trees and shrubs, and plant climbers up fences or walls. Choose plants with more than one season of interest such as autumn foliage, unusual bark, seed heads or berries and ensure your plantings are chosen to give a succession of interest.
- Try to include plants that enliven all the senses textural foliage such as downy Stachys or spiky Yucca and Acanthus; decorative stems or bark such as cornus or climbing hydrangea; fragrant flowers or foliage including lavender or geranium; bamboos and grasses for movement and sound; and a few attractive edibles such as chives, fruit trees and strawberries.
- Vary the height and overall shapes of your chosen plants, ensuring taller growers are placed at the back and ground covering plants at the front in island beds place tall plants in the centre. To lead your eye along the border, use architectural plants or splashes of red. Ensure you have a good mix of foliage colours and include a mixture of evergreen and deciduous shrubs. When the soil is ready, position your plants in their pots on the soil first to ensure you are happy with the effect and have enough room or plants.
- Position large shrubs, trees and architectural plants first, then surround with groups of herbaceous perennials followed by low-growing plants and bulbs.
- Leave about 30cm between plants to give them room to reach their full potential, flower well and continue to perform in future years.
- When you are happy with your scheme, dig planting holes and firm in your plants.
- Water in well and mulch with fine bark or cocoa shells.
- Continue to water in dry spells and hand weed as necessary.
- As plants start to grow, support taller ones with stakes if necessary but you may find that close spacing means the plants largely support each other.

- Deadhead regularly to prolong flowering, unless you specifically want the seedheads.
- Grow a selection of plants in containers that can be used to fill any gaps that appear.

Mantainance

- Thin more vigorous plants to maintain a balance through the growing season
- Remove any plants that are diseased, not flowering well
 or simply in the wrong place, and fill any gaps with new ones
- Remove the lower branches of trees and shrubs to allow light through to the plantings below and keep weeds in check.
- In winter provide a top dressing of well-rotted compost or manure to nourish the soil.

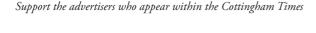

Hallgate Schools - continued

by Peter Railton (Author and Local Historian). The year is 1954

There are no entries in the boys' log book for that year for some reason that I have been unable to discover, so this record deals with the girls' school only.

At the end of January, Miss Hopkinson left to go to St. Mary's School in Beverley. A presentation was made to her by the staff and pupils; she was replaced by Miss Kirby.

Netball and hockey inter-house matches were played in early April as an opener to the season, and on the 9th of the month a concert was given to parents during the afternoon and the choirs and orchestra took part and Junior 4 gave an example of choral speaking, then the school broke off for the Easter holiday.

Three parties of children were taken to see "Alice in Wonderland" at the Hull New Theatre on the evenings of the 26th, 28th, and 30th of April. During that month Mrs. N. N. Thompson took over the teaching of French on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons.

The Haltemprice Netball Rally was held in early May and the Senior and Intermediate teams both won their events and finished with first places and the Juniors took second place in their events - a very successful rally for the Cottingham girls, though the venue is not recorded.

On the 18th a Traffic Warden was appointed to conduct pupils across the road at Market Green bus stop on their way to and from school; this was from the Duke of Cumberland corner and across the road to what was then the Gas Showrooms - later a furniture shop, then successive stores.

The Warden was introduced to the girls by Sgt. Dawson who took him to the school and explained the importance of obeying his instructions at the crossing - unfortunately, his name is not recorded; at that time there would have been more children approaching the crossing from the direction of South Street and Bacon Garth because their school was not yet built and all Cottingham children attended Hallgate Schools, hence the constant struggle to find room for everyone.

Junior 3 along with their teacher Miss Kirby and also Miss Selby, went by special bus to Huggate. The class had been studying a 'Wolds Village' in their environmental work and went equipped with questions to which they had to find answers. They left school at 9.00 am and returned at 7.00 pm - a long day.

On the 3rd of July the East Riding Folk Dance Festival was held at Market Weighton County Secondary School and about 30 girls, accompanied by some teachers, took part. Two days later, 20 girls and boys set off for a weeks Youth Hostelling in the Lake District, along with Miss Selby and Mr. Lacy. Mrs. B. Waters and Miss M. Bell left the school at the end of term - Miss Bell was to teach at Aldborough County Primary School.

School re-opened with 379 girls on the roll - another increase on the previous year; no doubt the boys' department will have seen significant increases in numbers, but the figures were not available. The department had been re-decorated and looked 'fresh and inviting' to quote Mrs. Fletcher and an extra junior class had to be formed and put into the hall. The organisation then was thus - Senior 4 room 10 Prefabs with Mrs. Barr; Senior 3 room 9 Prefabs with Mr. Lacy; then in the main building - Senior 2 room 6 with Mrs. Waters: Senior 1 room 4 with Mrs. Cox; Junior 6 room 5 with Mrs. Evans; Junior 5 room 7 with Mrs. Auty; Junior 4 room 2 with Mrs. Nellis; then the new class named 'Remove' sandwiched between Juniors 3 and were in room 1 with Miss Porter: Junior 3 room 3 with Miss Kirby; Juniors 2 and 1 were in the hall, designated as room 8 with Miss Anderson and Mrs. Lythe.

Miss Selby was in charge of P.E. and Mrs. Clark of domestic science; Mrs. Thompson, a peripatetic teacher of French, attended on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons and a Mr. Craig, peripatetic teacher of music on Wednesday afternoons.

Mrs. Barr, Mrs. Cox and Mrs. Lythe all began duties on the 13th of September, when the new term began and 69 girls went up from the infants plus six more whose parents had moved into the area everyone looked forward to the opening of the new Secondary



School due to be opened in January the following year. Although there are no records of the situation at the boys' school, they must have been feeling the pressure of numbers just as the girls' school was. Only six girls remained at the school of those who had taken violin lessons in the last term, so two new groups of juniors were formed after consultations between the Head, Mr. Hart and Mr.

Nurse Hoggard pronounced all girls were 'clean and well cared for' after her visit that September. The weather turned very cold and Mrs. Fletcher asked the Authority for permission to use the heating. and the school photographer, Mr. Doran arrived and took photos of the children.

Five girls were due to leave at the end of October half-tern holiday and Mrs. Hodgkiss, the Youth Employment Officer, went to the school to interview them; she then addressed the rest of Senior 4 on the kinds of jobs open to them after leaving school. Attendance in September and for the remainder of October was around 94%.

On the 4th of October, Mr. Stern from Hull University French Department discussed the possibility of forming a French group from Senior 1 as a demonstration class for students, the class to be held on a Saturday morning. The lessons would start the girls on their French course and 15 of them joined.

On the evening of the 18th October the first P.T.A meeting of the season was held, all the staff 'were at home' to about 70 parents and discussions concerning the children were held between parents and staff - the precursor to 'open nights' for parents now.

Mrs. D. McDonald who had been school secretary for the previous six years left the school in late October and was succeeded by Mrs. S. M. Wheeler.

On the 23rd of October, Senior 4 along with their teacher paid a visit to the newly opened Cottingham branch of Waddington's, glove manufacturers whose main factory was on Cottingham Road in Hull. The Cottingham branch, which provided jobs for a small workforce, was situated down the pedestrian way between the 'King William IV' public house and the present betting shop



and was located in the rear part of what was a much older building before the betting shop was opened; one of the first Cottingham supermarkets, then Ashton's garden shop, then Woodhead's the bakers and cafe all succeeded it over the years - further back still it was Brocklesby's grocers.

Colds and 'flu were keeping the percentages down to around 81% - this dropped to 74% in mid-month and 60% toward the end of the month. Six members of staff were absent at various times during the month, all contracting the 'bug'

A significant meeting of the P.T.A. was held on the evening of the 8th of November, when a large audience heard Mr. E. Greenwood, M.A., due to be the Headmaster of the new Cottingham High School, talk about the arrangements that were being made and the progress towards its opening - now set at Easter, not January, 1955.

The main Christmas entertainment for that year was the Christmas Cantata 'The Flower of Bethlehem'; the choral and spoken parts were provided by the Junior girls - a very ambitious undertaking. A dress rehearsal was given to the school first and to parents on the evenings of the 14th, 15th and 16th of December. Three teachers left the school at the end of term, Mrs. Barr, Miss Kirby and Mrs. Waters

Public to have say on Council's dog breeding policy

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council is urging residents to be careful when choosing a new puppy and warning dog breeders to make sure they follow the law.

Residents are also being invited to give their views on the council's dog breeding policy, which is under review.

The council's licensing team enforces dog breeding legislation to protect the welfare of dogs used for breeding and is reviewing dog breeding policy to strengthen controls and promote animal welfare.

The policy out for consultation sets out minimum standards expected by the council of dog breeders relating to issues such as accommodation, food, water, bedding exercise, disease control and transportation as well as limiting the number of litters a female can have and the minimum age for breeding.

The council is currently investigating eight allegations of illegal breeding and is warning people to be aware of the dangers of buying a puppy from someone who is not registered or from a puppy farm, which can often bring misery if the dog falls ill.

Some puppies may be illegally imported into the UK and are often sold online or via newspaper adverts or in pub car parks.

Sometimes, they are accompanied by incomplete or forged documents that leads the buyer to think the dog has been imported legally.

Before buying a puppy, the council advises:

- to check the puppy has been vaccinated but be aware that vaccination cards are easy to fake if the vet's contact details are not visible or has a non-UK address the card may be false
- imported puppies must have a pet passport or a vet's certificate confirming it is microchipped, vaccinated against rabies, treated for worms and was over three months and 21 days when it was imported
- buyers should always see a puppy with its mother and it is best to buy from a local licensed breeder
- ask to see the father too, or at least a photo of the father, and be suspicious if the breeder cannot show you the mother or father
- pedigree certificates are not a guarantee for the condition of the dog and may not even mean the puppy is pure-bred – contact The Kennel Club for details of the accredited breeder scheme.

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and community partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Dog breeding can be a lucrative business and those unlicensed breeders who run a business will often cut corners and sacrifice animal welfare.

"Anyone thinking of buying a puppy should check the legitimacy of the breeder.

"The law on dog breeding is very clear and is in place for two key reasons – to ensure a high standard of welfare for animals and to give peace of mind to members of the public that they are buying from a reputable breeder."

A licence is also required for those who breed dogs as a business – selling two or more litters in a year is automatically considered to be a business but those breeding as a hobby do not need one.

Councillor Horton added: "Anyone found to be operating a business without a licence may face the possibility of prosecution or a fine as well as any proceeds from the sale being seized under the Proceeds of Crime Act."

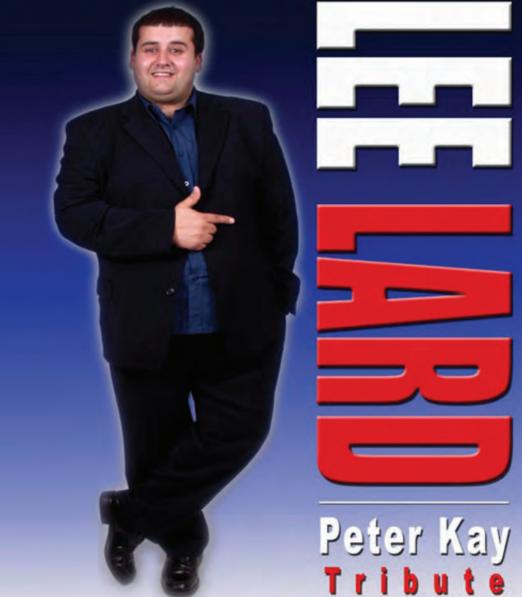

Residents needed to help council's bid for innovative heating project

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council is asking residents who heat their homes with oil or LPG systems to contact them as they try to secure funding for an innovative pilot project.

The council, in partnership with Community Energy Solutions, (CES) is just one of a handful of local authorities across the country who have been invited to bid for additional funding from the National Energy Action's innovation fund.

If successful, the money would provide hi-tech heat pumps in private homes which were previously ineligible due to the limitations of the technology.

In order to make the bid, the council would like to hear from residents who:

- have an oil or LPG heating system
- live off the gas network in a larger than average property
- live in an older property with solid walls
- are struggling to heat their homes due to the cost of fuel.

The council and CES will then assess the enquiries to see which could benefit from this project.

Over the last seven years, the partnership between the council and CES has enabled more than 130 air source heat pumps to be successfully installed into private sector homes off the gas network replacing existing systems and reducing fuel costs.

It is due to the success of this project and other successful schemes run by the council to reduce fuel poverty that they have been invited to bid for this funding.

Councillor Symon Fraser, portfolio holder for asset management, housing and environment at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "I'm proud that due to the council's track record of helping people reduce their fuel costs that we've been chosen to help pilot this project.

"It is hoped that this funding will enable us to widen our work which helps East Riding residents to reduce their energy costs and live in a much improved home environment."

Tom Shepherd, project manager at Community Energy Solutions, added: "Heat pumps are a cost-effective way of heating homes and have lower running costs than oil of LPG.

"If you reduce the oil or LPG used and run a heat pump instead people will reduce their overall heating costs."

Beach restrictions reminder for dog walkers

og walkers are reminded there are a number of restrictions on where they can walk their dogs on the county's beaches.

The restrictions, enforced by East Riding of Yorkshire Council, will run until Wednesday, 30 September and the four beaches which fall under the restrictions are:

Bridlington north beach – from the northern end of North Marine Promenade to a line extending east from Limekiln Lane

Bridlington south beach – from the south pier to a line extending east from Kingston Road

Hornsea beach – from the concrete ramp at Headlands View to the steps south of Sands Lane

Withernsea beach – from the access ramp opposite Seaside Road to the beach access steps 100 metres south of Pier Towers.

Dog wardens are patrolling the restricted areas and so far have issued five fixed penalty notices of £75 to people breaching the order on the areas in Bridlington.

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "The East Riding has around 30 miles of beautiful coastline for people to explore and enjoy.

"These restrictions are on a limited section of beaches allowing families and visitors to enjoy the seaside without being bothered by nuisance dogs or dog fouling."

Anyone caught walking their dog in the restricted areas during the period of the ban may be issued with a £75 fixed penalty notice.

Helping households to keep warm and healthy

public sector partnership is keen to hear the views of residents and local communities on a new affordable warmth strategy.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council, working with a range of other local organisations, such as NHS East Riding of Yorkshire Clinical Commissioning Group and East Riding Age UK, has developed a new draft affordable warmth strategy.

The new strategy will build on the success of the 2012 strategy and provide a strategic framework for all action in the East Riding on the issue. It recognises the importance of helping residents to insulate their homes, access the cheapest energy available to them and reduce their energy bills. The draft strategy also includes actions to raise awareness of the issue of fuel poverty, particularly in rural communities off mains gas.

Living in a cold and damp home can have serious impacts on health and wellbeing. This is especially true for people with an existing health issue, over 65s or children under five-years-old. Respiratory conditions, such as asthma and bronchitis are exacerbated by cold conditions. Other issues include increased risk of heart attack and stroke.

Councillor Jonathan Owen, deputy leader of East Riding of Yorkshire Council and chair of the East Riding Health and Wellbeing Board, said: "The council and our partners recognise that they have an important role to play to work together to tackle this very serious issue.

"By training frontline staff to be more aware of the signs that someone needs help, we hope to make every contact count, ensuring those in need get referred through to the right support."
