CANWE SEE OUR GRANDCHILDREN PLEASE?

Grandparents in many families play an invaluable role as a source of love and support whilst also offering practical help with children. A divorce or relationship breakdown between a child's parents can have a devastating effect on the close bond between a grandparent and grandchild.

Do I have any legal rights to see my grandchild?

Unfortunately, there is no automatic legal right to contact with grandchildren, though it is possible to apply to the Court to seek the right to pursue an Order to see them.

The first step

We would always advise that despite parental conflict, grandparents should try to work with both parents to sort amicable arrangements to remain involved in their grandchild's life.

If that doesn't work...?

The next best solution is mediation. Any arrangements made are not legally binding, but they often still work well. Mediation

provides a safe and controlled environment in which to air frustrations and to seek practical solutions. An attempt to mediate is also a pre-requisite of Court proceedings.

If all else fails ...

If other options fail, then involvement of a solicitor may be sensible. An initial letter can be sent to the parent with care proposing ongoing contact with the child. That initial letter, worded in a non-confrontational way may be enough to get a reluctant parent to reconsider their stance.

Going to Court

If that fails, an application to the Court can be made, although most grandparents will need 'permission' of the court first. This is often (but not always) a formality.

The Court's paramount consideration is always the welfare of the child, decided by looking at all the circumstances of the case. This includes pre-existing involvement in the child's life, the child's wishes, if old enough to express them, and any risk of harm, including emotional.

Always remember that it's the right of the children to have the contact, not the right of the grandparent.

Check your back-ups and questions and answers

ack-ups failing...If you've gone to the trouble of securing your data by having a back-up plan, you want it to continue working right? For a while now some customers have had problems where their back up had stopped working. This could be caused by a failing storage drive, or the back-up software not doing its work, and there have been cases of Memeo software stopping working on some computers. So how do you check? First of all check that your back-up device (external hard drive, memory stick etc) is connected and working. Go into File explorer and double click on the drive and make sure you can see the contents. If so look for the back up folder, open it up and check the date of recent documents or pictures and make sure they are recent versions. Open up your back-up software and make sure the plan is active and there are no error messages. If you have a software problem and it can't be fixed you could always set up Windows back-up. In Windows 10 this is located in Settings, Update & Security. Click on back up and go for the File option, this way you can choose which folders get backed up to your chosen drive, and how often. Be aware of a new telephone scam that has been reported by a few customers recently. It takes the form of a recorded message advising that your internet service is going to be cut off in so many days time. You are then asked to press a number on your keypad, needless to say, don't press anything - just hang

This may be of interest if you ever email out newsletters or other communications. Some people you send to might not be able to open documents created in Microsoft Word if they don't have it installed or have a much older version. But there is a solution.

When you have finished creating the Word document, save

it in the normal way, then go back to the File menu and click Save As, and from the drop-down list of file types under the file name, choose 'PDF'. This will then save your new document in a locked 'portable document format' which means it will look the same on any device that receives it, and will not be able to be edited. Send out by email as a normal attachment. Recipients' computers will be able to open the document with Adobe Reader (also known as Acrobat), Edge, or any another pdf reader.

Tip: Regarding PDF documents, if you realise you have made a mistake, or need to make any changes before sending it out, just close the PDF and then go back to your Word document. Edit as necessary then save in Word, then do File, Save As, the same name as before and you will be asked if you want to overwrite the PDF document of the same name, just answer yes.

Question & Answer section

Q: A box keeps popping up on my screen - what is Microsoft One

A: One Drive is Microsoft cloud storage. If you have a Microsoft account you can sign in, and use this free storage to back up photos and documents etc.

Q: My iPad is a few years old and now has locked me out with a 'failed authentication' message

A: This has been happening on older iPads that cannot update to the latest IOS version. There is a fix for this usually if you can connect the iPad to a computer (with iTunes). But in the long term you should consider buying a newer iPad, and you may well find it to be cheaper than when you first bought it.

Q: When I open my Eset banking & payment app, it comes up with an 'insecure' message

A: This is a bit of a glitch to do with the Chrome web browser, but be assured it is not insecure, and as soon as you type in your bank address the bar will change to a secure setting.

Q: When I open Word, a box comes up asking me to agree to terms & conditions - is this ok?

A: Yes, recently they have changed some wording, so they are asking users to agree, so it is safe to do so. If you don't agree it won't open the program!

If you haven't already upgraded to ESET Internet Security, now is the time to do it. Just make sure you uninstall any existing anti virus you may have, even if it has expired. For prices, upgrades and licences - just give us a call.

Telephone scam - yes, I must mention this again. There has been another spate of unsolicited calls to computer users in this area purporting to be from Microsoft (who they are not) offering to fix problems with your computer (which they won't) and then fraudulently taking money for their non-existent services. If you get such calls, and they can be very persistent, tell them you are not interested, or that you have a local computer specialist, or that you don't have a computer!

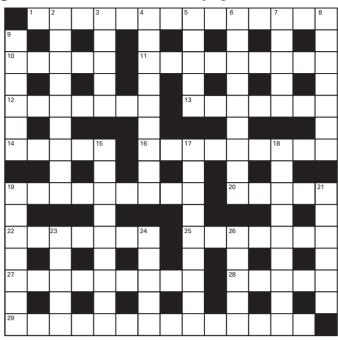

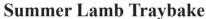

Tikka lamb cutlets with new potatoes and peas

Ingredients

4 lamb rack cutlets

1 x 70g Patak's Tikka Masala Paste Pot

½ lemon, juice

3 tbsp mint raita

½ small red onion, finely sliced

300g new potatoes, halved

160g frozen peas

Handful mint leaves, shredded

Method

- 1. Put the cutlets, paste and a squeeze of lemon juice in a resealable freezer bag. Massage the paste into the lamb, then set aside to marinate for 20 minutes (or chill for up to 24 hours). In a large bowl, mix the raita, remaining lemon juice and sliced red onion; set aside.
- 2. Put a large frying pan over a medium-high heat. Remove the cutlets from the bag and scrape off and discard the excess marinade. Season and fry for 4 minutes on each side, then fry the edges for a couple of minutes to crisp up the fat. Ensure the juices run clear before setting aside to rest for 5 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, cook the potatoes in a large pan of simmering water for 12 minutes, then add the peas. Bring the water back to the boil, then drain thoroughly. Tip into the bowl with the raita and onion, then toss together, season, and fold through the mint. Divide between two plates and serve with the lamb cutlets.

1. Preheat the oven to 170°C, gas mark 3. Lightly grease and line a deep, 20cm cake tin with parchment. Toss the marzipan

and all but 4 of the cherry halves in 2 tbsp flour; set aside. Beat the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Gradually add the eggs, beating between additions and stirring in a spoonful of flour if the mixture curdles. Add the vanilla, then fold in the remaining flour and ground almonds, followed by the lemon zest and $1\frac{1}{2}$ tbsp juice, to make a thick batter.

- 2. Spoon about 2/3 of the batter into the tin and top with half the floured cherries and marzipan. Cover with the remaining batter, smooth the top, and add the remaining cherries and marzipan in an even layer, pressing them down slightly (they will sink into the cake as it cooks). Bake for about 1 hour 15 minutes, loosely covering the top of the cake with foil if it browns too quickly. Cool in the tin for 15 minutes before carefully turning out onto a wire rack to cool completely.
- 3. Roughly chop the 4 reserved cherry halves and squeeze out their juice (or pass through a sieve) into a bowl. Stir in the remaining ½ tbsp lemon juice and the icing sugar until you have a smooth, spoonable, pink icing. Drizzle ½ this icing over the cake, scatter with the flaked almonds and drizzle with the remaining icing to finish.

Green pepper & vegetable paella

Ingredients

2 tbsp wok oil

3 green peppers, cut into small chunks

2 onions, chopped

3 cloves garlic, crushed

ON THE GRAPEVINE

WITH ROY WOODCOCK

Orange Wine, anybody?

o, I can't say I knew much, if anything, about it either, but it's a phenomenon seemingly beginning to take off.

It was something quite widespread in Italy in the 1960s apparently, but had largely disappeared until three or four years ago, when it suddenly became fashionable in some circles again. The wine is socalled because the grapes used are fermented on its skins and the resultant colour which ensues.

And you know it's becoming mainstream when a retailer like Aldi (always a good source of interesting and value-added wines) begins to stock it.

The wine - branded, simply, as just "Orange Natural Wine" with a minimalistic label - retails at \$5.99 and is produced by Cramele Recas, a Romanian estate which has ramped up its UK exports in recent years after seeing its sales soar by 35 per cent in 2017.

Aldi say the wine has aromas of quince, pear and a hint of vanilla and is a blend of 85 per cent Chardonnay and 15 per cent Sauvignon Blanc grapes. On sale since the middle of last month, the wine is produced without using sulphites or animal by-products, making it both vegan-friendly and part of the growing natural wine trend.

Its amber hue comes from a long fermentation, with skin contact at lower than average temperatures, which the producer claims gives the wine flavours of "stone fruits, backed up with a powerful tannin structure and long finish.'

It's the annual York Food and Drink Festival this month and, as always, there's lots of interest for the wine lover. For instance, under the festival's "Taste Trail" banner, there's an introduction to cheese and wine pairing at the Love Cheese shop in Gillygate on Tuesday September 25, between 3pm and 4pm. White wines with crumbly cheese? Sparkling wine with soft? You'll definitely try something new. Tickets cost £16.50 and more information is available from the festival website, www.yorkfoodfestival.co

At York Cocoa House in Blake Street the same day you can join Peter McKenna for a tutored tasting of Italian Wine. Peter will guide you through this selective tasting of six wines made from entirely native grape varieties, ranging from Piedmont in the North to Sicily in the South. And these exciting wines show why Italy rightly deserves the name "Enotria" - the land of the vines. The tasting runs from 6pm to 7pm and tickets cost £15.

The festival's wine fair takes place on Friday September 28 at the Double Tree by Hilton (formerly the Monkbar Hotel). Open from 7.30pm to 9.30pm, it's a chance to compare wine offerings from both major supermarkets and independent suppliers - you get a glass and it's up to you to explore. Tickets cost £20.

The festival runs from September 21 to 30 and features dinners, markets, cookery demonstrations and much more. Other wine events include a Pinot Noir tasting with Yorkshire Post wine writer Christine Austin and a tasting of rose wines from around the world.

Locally, there's a wine tasting this month, organised by Beverley-based One World Travel. It takes place on Thursday, September 13, at the Beverley Cricket Club on Norwood in Beverley, starting at 7.30pm.

Ticket cost £5, to include all wines tasted and nibbles. The concentration will be on the small and single-estate vineyards of Australia and New Zealand. Tickets are available by calling in at the Beverley shop in Saturday Market or by calling 01482 280081.

Now, this is not as batty as it sounds, but wine growers in the Dordogne region of France are installing bat boxes around their vineyards to attract the nocturnal creatures that act as a natural pesticide against one of their worst enemies - the dreaded grapevine moth.

The moths and their larvae are the bane of French vintners due to their voracious appetite, with the pests capable of wiping out up to half of some vineyards. Currently, growers faced with an infestation have no choice but to spray their vines with chemicals, but a study commissioned by the wine industry committee of Bordeaux and published earlier this year found that bats were observed swooping to hunt more often towards vines where the bugs were present.

Some 20 wine domains in the area are being equipped with the roosts, with tests due to last up to

Could this be a new trend - wine in a can? Apparently, sales of canned wines are soaring in the United States, with year-on-year sales currently up 43 per cent as consumers become more open-minded to

The trend has taken longer to hit the UK, but this May new drinks brand The Uncommon released the first English wine in a can – a lightly sparkling Bacchus using grapes grown in Surrey. Drinks "experts' say the can format is proving popular among millennials as they can be taken to picnics, concerts and festivals, and enjoyed on the go.

Landlord Oven Clean Dilemma

One of the biggest issues that landlords face when tenants move out is the oven clean

Why is the landlord oven clean such an issue?

The answer is simple. Landlords remember providing their tenant with a new immaculately presented oven in their buy-to-let property. Wasn't the oven just out of the box and still had the packing paper and the instructions with it? So what is this grease encrusted blackened piece of mangled metal? What happened and surely this transformation of a Landlords oven goes beyond fair wear and tear?

How do you clean your tenants oven?

Landlords can embrace the cleaning of the oven once the tenants have handed back their property. This is a generous act and also borne out of self-interest to ensure that the incoming tenants have a decent oven and property to inhabit. If you are going to have a go at cleaning the oven then there is no shortage of guidance out there. Clearly the easy bit of cleaning any oven is the outside and giving the outside a bit of a clean with a basic cleaning solution to take away the grease followed by a little bit of buffing.

The inside of the oven is where the real challenge for a Landlord lies. Some people maintain that it is possible to clean an oven without any high strength cleaning chemicals with just a little bit of vinegar baking soda and a hell of a lot of elbow grease. Good luck!

The other alternative to a professional oven clean is for the landlord to do it themselves. It's not difficult or impossible for you to get your oven back to a pretty high state of cleanliness. There is a lot of advice out there on the internet and those landlords who want some tips of the DIY oven cleaning tips could do much worse than reading the Good Housekeeping guide involving oven cleaner, plastic gloves and a 10 step guide.

Why tenants view the oven clean differently to landlords?

Some tenants are likely to think that having a weekly roast dinner is all part of having your own place which is fine. But what they tend to forget is that you need to clean up after your roasting the hog every week. So when the landlord gets back the property, instead of getting the shiny gleaming piece of modern cooking technology they had left, they return to a blackened, crud encrusted box that looks as if it has a small incendiary device has exploded in it.

The big question is, at what point does fair wear and tear become damage, and warrants the landlord to withhold a tenants deposit.

If landlord does decide to hold a tenancy deposit they will need to evidence the change of condition of the oven between the start of the tenancy at 'check in', and the end of the tenancy at 'check out'. A strong pointer is a receipt for a new oven, proving to any arbitrator that the oven was 'brand new' on check in. Failing this, evidence (receipt) for a professional oven clean should be enough for the arbitrator to be convinced that a retention of the tenants deposit for a professional clean is justified. Without this a landlord could be on a sticky wicket.

What do landlords do about the oven clean?

These day many of us simply don't have the time. I must admit my days of rolling up my sleeves and getting cleaning are generally done. I'm not adverse to it, don't get me wrong, but time really doesn't make it viable for me anymore. There are numerous local oven cleaning services also out there as well as good professional house cleaners.

Whichever service you choose the key advantage of having a professional oven clean is it provides proof of the clean state of the oven for any future disputed tenancy deposits.

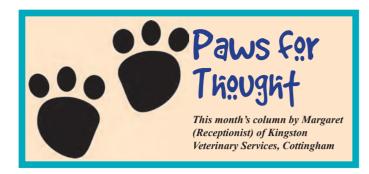

It's a Cats Life

s a family, we have had numerous cats over the years, the first being a tabby kitten called Suiki. She was a feisty little thing (maybe because her mum was a farm cat) and ruled the roost, even taking on Brandy, the dog we had at the time. She was well respected amongst the 'Animal Kingdom' and was definitely Top Cat. So when Bisley, you remember him...my one and a half eared cat, came along to join our ever increasing family, emotions ran high. Hissing and spitting first which was then followed by an abundance of fur and of course, Bisley came off worse! Over a period of time they learnt to respect each others territory that was UNTIL Jaffa arrived, the most beautiful ginger tom kitten I had ever seen. Once again we were back to square one, hissing, spitting, fur flying and not forgetting the odd woof and growl coming from Tammy, our cross bearded bitch we got as a puppy after we sadly lost Brandy. Now, at the time, we thought that the feline species get on with each other, just like their counterparts the canines, and that they enjoyed being a member of a pack. To one or two cats this maybe true but surprisingly to the majority, they are solitary... enjoying their own company combined with their owners affection.

Here is a scenario:

I have bought a new kitten Simba to keep my other cat Theo







company. I think Theo is jealous of Simba. He doesn't sit on our knees any more but hisses and runs away if we try to stroke him. He hardly ever comes down from the top of the kitchen cupboards and he will not use his litter tray any more. Instead he is spraying (urine) on the furniture and curtains.

Simba is very good, always using the litter tray and is happy to sleep in the cats bed. She loves being stroked, nuzzling and rubbing her head as we do so. I don't know if we can keep Theo as the smell is awful. I haven't been letting him out since we lost his brother on the road but there have been moments when I have been tempted to risk it.

LET'S HEAR IT FROM THE 'CATS WHISKERS'......

"Hi, My name is Theo. My territory has shrunk to the top of the kitchen cupboards and I am TOTALLY stressed out. I was purrfectly happy sharing my territory with my brother but now??? Unfortunately he crossed the main road once too often and then I quickly settled down to life on my own. I like my own company and like most cats am not overly sociable with others of my own kind. I want to hunt the prey on my territory, not share it. I was quite content even though I was kept inside most of the time - a little dull but tolerable.

Then CATASTROPHE! Two weeks ago a young kitten TOTALLY invaded my territory. How would you like it if a total stranger moved into your home uninvited, started sleeping on your bed, eating off your dishes and even using your toilet!! Fine if you are a dog.

Clearly, scent marking my territory from my facial glands is not sufficient. The boundaries need stronger defenses so I have begun spraying on the curtains and furniture. I feel a bit safer when there is plenty of my scent in the air. Good news on the toilet front too. When IT is asleep, I sneak down and I have found a quiet corner behind the chair to use instead of the litter tray followed by scratching my claws into the stair carpet on the way back. Fortunately, IT is unable to get up there. My owners are of no help, allowing IT on my things. They then try to touch me when they stink of IT. That really does tick all the wrong boxes - I cannot bear them to touch me! If I could just get outside again and put a bit of space between me and IT, I would have something else to think about."

Cats hunt small prey and often live solitary lives other than when reproducing and caring for their young. Siblings may share parental duties, but go hunting separately. There is no advantage to hunting together. There is benefit in holding a territory to hunt in and avoiding physical conflict through scent marking and respecting other cats boundaries.

The introduction of a new cat into the household IS possible and there are ways of conducting the introduction to give the best chance of having two happy cats living together. This may vary from pheromone sprays/diffusers to relax the atmosphere, to positioning and increasing the number of litter trays.

Thwaite Hall – Cottingham's hidden gem, a green oasis in the suburbs

any reading this article will know of Thwaite Hall and its estate in Cottingham. It is owned by the University of Hull and until recently was used as a student residence. The large estate includes a lake, woodlands, lawns, meadows and botanical gardens complete with greenhouses. The Hall and the majority of the estate are now up for sale (see www.thwaitehall.co.uk). For the purpose of the sale the land has been divided into three. Two parts are for sale and the third part is to be retained. The bids are to be considered in September.

The story so far: The botanical gardens i.e. green house area and adjacent lawn (behind Green Wickets) is being retained by the University. For many years the Friends of Thwaite Gardens has been involved in conjunction with the University in maintaining this area and it is anticipated this will continue. Although privately owned by the University, many people have had access to the full estate through membership of The Friends or during the open days.

The estate once contained the national collection of hawthorns, many of which are still present and the estate still has many mature specimens of trees from around the world. 80 are recorded on the tree register of Britain and Ireland, 31 are Yorkshire champions and 6 are English champions for their height and girth.

The lake is an ARC site for the indigenous crucian carp which is currently rarely found in this country and The Environment Agency is involved in a long term project with these fish.

Thwaite Hall is being sold on a 5.5 acre plot as a redevelopment opportunity which must conform with the Cottingham neighbourhood plan. This may be sold with the remaining 17.4 acres amenity land. This garden includes the lake and woodland. If not sold with the Hall, the plan is to sell the garden area separately. The garden has a Grade II historical garden listing, is located within conservation area and is part of the flood alleviation scheme. It is anticipated that the lake and woodland area will be expensive to manage / maintain due to public liability insurance, security and maintenance costs.

The beauty of Thwaite: Thwaite is an amazing asset. Green tranquil spaces nourish the soul. It is a great place to see the seasons unfold. Wildlife is in abundance and the tall majestic trees and the serene lake capture the imagination.

The vision: would be to work with the buyer for limited or controlled public access to a maintained and managed estate. The Community should celebrate the gardens and protect and promote the wildlife and biodiversity. Don't let this gem be a paradise lost!

Why Heart Of Glass?

To be honest this a really poor link but bear with me.

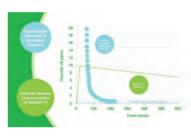
At the festival there are some really diverse acts from Bruno Mars and Little Mix to Led Zeppelin and Elvis. One act that I have seen every year since going is a Blondie tribute called Heart Of Glass. They are always brilliant and put on a good show

Well, this may now sound a bit random but I'm going to go on a bit about Bio-Glass. Apologies. I got there in the end.

Bio-Glass To Strengthen Teeth

A while ago I was asked to do a TV advert for Sensodyne. I liked the repair and protect toothpaste by sensodyne because it had a bio-glass that sticks to surface like a protective layer to help stop tooth sensitivity. There is another toothpaste called Biomin. BioMin $^{\text{TM}}$ is a technology developed by scientists at Queen Mary University London and Imperial College, London, for over the past decade.

Traditionally, to try and strengthen teeth and protect against



decay with a toothpaste, fluoride is used in quite high concentrations. Most adult toothpastes have 1400 parts per million (ppm). One that has to be prescribed has 5000ppm. That's a lot of fluoride. The thing is that this is soluble

fluoride so it washes away quite quickly. Also it has to be used correctly and not swallowed. Research has shown that you more benefit from low doses of fluoride with a sustained release than a high dose that washes away. That's where the biomin F comes in with a low dose fluoride release over 12 hours. It also releases calcium and phosphate that are needed for tooth repair. By using the F version the tooth repair after an acid attack is stronger when fluoride is present by making a tighter Fluorapatite crystal. There is a non-fluoride option that slowly releases calcium and phosphate called Biomin C.

More Economical

Prior to Biomin you could get an extra source of calcium and phosphate with a product called Tooth Mousse and then use it with a high concentration fluoride tooth paste as well. This is in more extreme cases like excessive acid erosion or dry mouth syndrome. This all starts to get a bit pricey, (the tooth mousse is particularly expensive) so a single toothpaste that gives the benefit of both sounds really good. Oh, and it's good for sensitivity as well.

I'm off to Morocco with dental Mavericks in early October. The charity has really moved on and this will be the largest group and we are working with the local health authority

the offering of lovely Autumn colour in your garden from Autumn bedding the smiley faces of violas and pansies are always a welcome addition. Why not refresh your hanging baskets with some ivy, grasses and cyclamen for beautiful autumnal shades. Many people's lawns aren't looking their best at the minute after the long hot summer we have had. To give it the best chance of revival follow our top tips below.

Autumn lawncare

There are many treatments you can do to your grass in Autumn that will ensure it is at its best the following Spring.

Scarifying

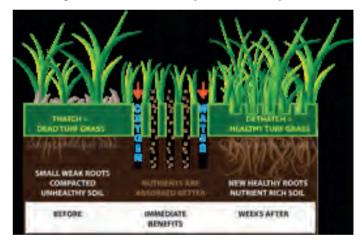
Regular raking (or scarifying as it known) keeps levels of thatch (old grass stems, dead moss and other debris) at an acceptable level. Layers of thatch greater than 1cm (3/8in) deep can impede water and fertiliser penetration.

To remove thatch, rake vigorously but carefully with a spring-tined rake. For larger areas powered tools are available as single units or mower attachments.

Note: Turf is damaged if scarified too deeply.

Aerating (spiking)

Aerating (or spiking) lawns allows better movement of air and water in the root zone. A well-aerated lawn will manage better in periods of drought or waterlogging. For an average lawn, aeration every two to three years should

- 2. Pick autumn raspberries
- 3. Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
- 4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them
- 5. Net ponds before leaf fall gets underway
- 6. Refresh Summer hanging baskets & containers with Autumn bedding
- 7. Start to reduce the frequency of houseplant watering
- 8. Clean out cold frames and greenhouses so that they are ready for use in the autumn Smoke fumigators are ideal for this
- 9. Cover leafy vegetable crops with bird-proof netting
- 10. Plant spring flowering bulbs



be adequate. Concentrate on areas that receive the most wear and those that are compacted.

Small areas can be spiked with a garden fork, spacing holes 10-15cm (4-6in) apart and deep. On clay or waterlogged soils use a hollow-tine aerator every three to four years. This extracts plugs of soil from the lawn. After hollow-tining, sweep up the plugs and then rake a top-dressing (see below) into the holes to improve air and moisture penetration.

Top-dressing

Top-dressing is the application of loam, sand and well-rotted organic matter to a lawn in order to correct surface irregularities and improve the texture of difficult soils. This encourages greater rooting and thickening of turf.

The top-dressing mix is three parts sandy loam, six parts sharp sand and one part compost or leaf mould.

Flattening

To correct bumps and troughs, use an edging iron or spade to slice through the turf and roll it back. Fork over the underlying ground and add or remove soil as needed. Replace the turf, pressing the edges together, and water thoroughly.

Problems

Lawns can suffer from a variety of fungal problems including red thread, fairy rings and take-all patch. Damage created by lawn pests such as leather jackets and chafer grubs, as well as their predators, can be really devastating. Worm casts are also a nuisance in wet weather.

Autumn is a good time to repair damage caused by fungal diseases or pests.

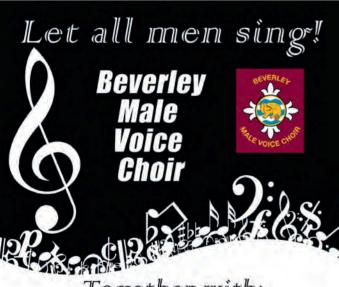

A centre providing oncology and haematology services for more than one million people was announced by the Government in July 2002.

Services for cancer and haematology patients were to be shifted to the new centre at Castle Hill, with beds increasing from 1,495 to 1,533 while 118 extra clinical staff were to be recruited.

Along with oncology and haematology, the centre also offers neurological rehabilitation, immunology and allergy, haemophilia and lymphedema

Nine courtyards with intimate walled gardens were incorporated in the design along with a high-level glazed walkway known as the "walk in the

The Cottingham countryside influenced the design, with the sloping site used as a natural way of reducing the thickness of the concrete protection required from radiation equipment.

Almost every one of the 800 rooms in the centre benefits from natural sunlight and views over the countryside.

The centre was officially opened by the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh on March 5, 2009.

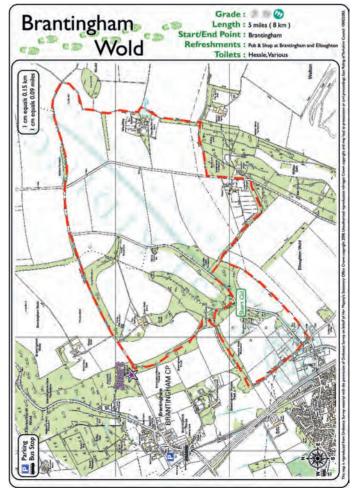

Community Speed Watch to be developed across East Yorkshire and Northern Lincolnshire

olice and Crime Commissioner Keith Hunter and Humberside Police Chief Constable Lee Freeman have agreed to the development of a Community Speed Watch scheme across the force area, the exact arrangements of which will be developed further in the coming weeks.

The decision follows a successful pilot earlier this year at a village in North Lincolnshire, followed by visits to similar schemes already operating in other police force areas to establish best practices.

Community Speed Watch allows residents, particularly those in rural communities, to become police-trained volunteers monitoring vehicle speeds in their communities, with the aim of changing the behaviour of some road users who drive above the speed limit through small towns and villages.

Keith Hunter said: "There has always been a persistent problem with drivers speeding in all our towns and villages but particularly in rural areas. Communities tell me time and again how this inconsiderate behaviour blights their lives and how they want to help the police to reduce it.

"I have always said I want more power passed to communities who want to make a positive difference where they live and Community Speed Watch looks to give residents what they have been asking for. We have received numerous requests for a Speed Watch scheme across the force area so I am delighted Humberside Police will now be developing our own in the coming weeks.

"Similar projects have been in place up and down the country for some years so we already know what works well and not so well and will develop our own scheme accordingly. It relies on volunteers coming forward who want to make a difference in their town or village and we will work with them to make their community safer and stronger for everyone living there."

Further details on how communities can become involved in Community Speed Watch will be release in due course.

Reusable cups introduced at Hull Royal Infirmary and Castle Hill Hospital

hospital trust is introducing reusable cups to slash the number of disposable cups sold in its restaurants by 180,000 in two years.

Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust has brought in black and lime green reuseable cups in all of its outlets at Hull Royal Infirmary and Castle Hill Hospital.

Last year, the trust used 390,000 disposable cups in its restaurants, cafes and retail outlets and the aim is to halve that amount by 2020.

Cups cost £5.50 or £5.75 with a hot drink and staff, visitors and patients will receive a 10p discount on all future hot drinks.

Catering manager Neil Woods said the trust would also be introducing discounts for people bringing in their own reusesable cups in the next few weeks.

He said: "This is a win-win for everyone – the trust saves money on disposable cups, people save money on their drinks and the environment benefits because we're reusing rather than buying single-use cups destined for landfill.

"We are looking at ways of reducing our environmental footprint over the coming weeks and months by introducing changes in our catering and retail outlets.

"But we're asking staff, visitors and patients to play their part. People can help by "eating in" and using crockery and cutlery rather than taking their food away in plastic containers, using plastic cutlery.

"Together, we can make a huge difference."



New Walking for Health Walks in Cottingham are proving popular

The flourishing local Walking for Health scheme has expanded and the new 30 minute walks launched recently in Cottingham are already proving popular.

Brambles and Babies

s this extraordinarily hot, dry summer is waning into very Autumnal changes, we are seeing much shorter days and feeling welcome cooler temperatures. It's been a harsh summer to work outdoors in at times. The heat affected and drained the energy out of both us humans and our animals. The act of training horses in that intense heat had to be done carefully and in short sessions.

Flies have been a huge problem much earlier this year too, where our horses have been plagued by the biting and painful nuisances. This negatively affected their behaviours and their disposition at times, which was more than understandable. Although we cover them in every brand and make of fly sprays available, none seem to make any real difference. I think it simply makes us humans feel better that we at least tried!

I personally, am glad to have the temperatures drop into a kinder, easier range because working outdoors has become more comfortable. Who would have thought that we bemoaned such a wet winter and spring! Snow in March and mud so deep we lost our wellies in it frequently! I wonder what lies in wait for us this coming winter? Will it be dreadfully wet again or a continuation of this long dry spell? I will put my money on it being mild and wet again.

Last night I went Bramble picking where I discovered Sloes too high for me to reach. While I was problem solving how I could harvest those elusive Sloes for my Sloe Gin, I was thinking about a subject which is prominent in the horse world just now - weaning this year's foals from their mothers.

In the old days, foals were just ripped away from their mothers without warning, stabled up alone and left to "get over it". Sometimes this was the first time humans really handled them too, so were then flooded by humans doing things to them, like tying them up to a wall and picking their legs up to handle their feet.

The sensible owner should have invested much time over the past six months quietly handling, leading, grooming and foot handling their equine babies but this is not always the case. So many wild bred youngsters are forcibly removed from our moors and fells each year. They are herded down into ready-made corals and split up from their mothers.

My old boss in Gloucestershire used to wean all her foals in one go and together. She put an old broodmare in with them to give them security and a much needed motherly nuzzle. Their mothers were moved away to another field a long way away. I witnessed very real grief from some of the mares and very real relaxation from others, glad to find peace. Their foals would grieve too but without a doubt they found solace in the old nanny broodmare and in the company of each other.

Scientific studies now show that the best way to wean foals is slowly and as naturally as is possible and over a whole year rather that this human defined 6 months cut off point.

In the wild a mare will slowly wean her foal off in preparation for the next foal to come along. In the wild, foals have the company of a whole herd of other horses from youngsters to matriarchs. They can forage and graze over great distances and become independent very easily within a group. This is not the case for most foals bred by humans in captivity where they are most likely to be the only one.

It has been proven, beyond doubt, that the emotional fall out caused by abrupt and harsh forced weaning can affect a horse for its entire life time. Separation anxiety and gut instability issues like a predilection to painful stomach and gut ulcers. It has been proved that these horses may become very easily stressed in life and become difficult to train. Their immune system can become compromised leading to a whole range of issues. They can be less able to fight off infection and be more open to illness and diseases.

Horses tend to have many homes throughout their lives by being sold on so they experience the self-same trauma each and every time. Sadly, the majority of horses fall into this category where they are taken away from all they have known as safe, time and again losing bonded partners and thrust into a whole new strange and scary world. This can lead to escalating separation behaviours, fear and rage driven with a large handful of grief thrown in.

Life can be harsh for our animals as they have no power of choice in what happens to them, so often labelled as bad, naughty, difficult and down right dangerous. Who knows how many are set up to fail in life by how they were weaned in the first place? Food for thought for sure.

How many employment allowances can you claim?

Your existing company employs several workers. You're starting a new business shortly which will also employ staff. Are you entitled to just one NI employment allowance to cover both businesses or can you legitimately claim two?

Employment allowance

The government introduced the employment allowance (EA) in April 2014, hailing it as a tax cut for employers. It's actually an NI cut, but who cares what you call it if it saves you money. The EA reduces employers' NI bills by £3,000 per year (originally £2,000). After a few teething problems and the introduction of some anti-avoidance rules to prevent one-man companies claiming it, the EA is now a permanent fixture.

Claiming the allowance

Unless you personally tackle the payroll for your business you probably don't think about the EA. Your payroll software automatically takes it into account assuming that the person who crunches the numbers for you ticks the right boxes. However, there are several situations where more thought is required. We've already mentioned that the EA can't be claimed by one-man companies; another potential stumbling block is where you have two or more businesses.

Trap. Where you own, or partly own, two or more businesses, they may be entitled to only one EA between them.

One EA only

The Trap can apply:

- if you're self-employed in two or more businesses, even if they are entirely separate. For example, if you're a bookkeeper and own a shop
- where two or more companies are connected and are "interdependent", i.e. they use common resources such as premises, staff, finances. Connected means where one company controls the other or the same persons control both. There's an exception to this rule, see below
- where two or more limited liability partnerships are connected. Broadly where one has the right to more than 50% of the other's assets or income.

Tip. The good news is that in some circumstances where you would expect the **Trap** to apply because two or more businesses are connected, loopholes in the rules mean that each is entitled to claim the EA.

Connected companies

The condition which limits connected companies to one EA between them (see the second bullet point above) applies only at the start of each tax year. For example, if you own one company and later in the tax year start another, both companies can claim the EA for that year, but for the year following they must share one.

Different business structures

Where you own two businesses through different structures, each is entitled to the EA. For example, if you are self-employed and own or partly own a company, each business can claim the EA. Similarly, if you're self-employed but are also a partner in a business, each qualifies for the EA.

If the new business is a company, both it and your current company can claim the employment allowance, but the following year they must share it. If the new business is run as a sole trader or partnership, it and your existing company can each claim the employment allowance for every year.

Hundreds of doctors join Hull Royal Infirmary and Castle Hill Hospital

undreds of new junior doctors started work at Hull Royal Infirmary and Castle Hill Hospital recently.

Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust welcomed about 400 newly-qualified doctors starting their first jobs as trainee doctors, some of them returning to Hull for the next stage of their training.

The trust held inductions at the Medical Education Centre at Hull Royal infirmary today to mark the annual event, taking place every year on August 1, when junior doctors "rotate" to different organisations as part of their education.

Welcoming the junior doctors to the organisation, interim Chief Medical Officer Dr Makani Purva said "You have a great experience waiting for you here.

"We are a forward-thinking and very supporting organisation.

"Care, honesty and accountability are our three values and we live up to those values

"We hope those values will support you in having an excellent experience with us."

Dr Audrey Fox is joining the trust as a Specialist Trainee in her fifth year (ST5) in emergency medicine after working in Scarborough.

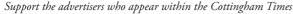

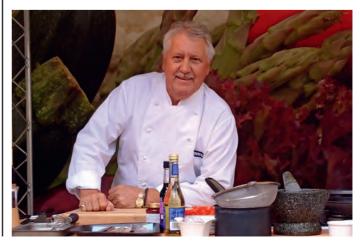
"Not only do we have Brian Turner making a guest appearance, we've also got local chefs and some fabulous artisan food producers which will make for a fabulous foodie event!"
