## Tries on the Telly





# CAN WE SEE OUR GRANDCHILDREN PLEASE?

Brenda Dale family solicitor at Graham and Rosen Solicitors explores the rights of grandparents on family breakdown.



In many families, grandparents play an invaluable role as a source of love and support whilst also offering practical help including childcare. As a result there is often a close bond between a grandparent and grandchild built up over many years. A divorce or relationship breakdown between a child's parents can have a devastating effect on this.

A frequent question is "do I have any legal rights to see my grandchild?" Sadly, there is no automatic legal right to contact with grandchildren though it is possible to seek the right to pursue an order to see them.

Despite parental conflict, grandparents should try to work with both parents to sort amicable arrangements to remain involved in their grandchild's life; although difficult when emotions are running high, trying to remain neutral can reap future rewards. Even a "wronged" spouse can often see what their child gains from a strong relationship with both sets of grandparents especially when the child may be experiencing divided loyalties.

The next best solution is mediation. This involves voluntary participation by parents and grandparents in sessions with a trained mediator to try to achieve a mutually beneficial outcome. Any arrangements made are not legally binding but can still work well. Mediation provides a safe and controlled environment to air grievances and seek practical solutions. Mediation is also a pre requisite of court proceedings.

If other options fail then seeing a solicitor may be sensible. An initial letter proposing ongoing contact with the child, worded in a non-confrontational way, may be enough to get a reluctant parent to reconsider their stance. Failing that, an application to court can be made which is a two stage process. Firstly, to seek "permission" through court to make an application for a Child Arrangements Order (which includes contact). It is important to remember that the court's paramount consideration is always the welfare of the child, decided by looking at the case as a whole; any pre-existing involvement in the child's

life, the child's wishes (if old enough to express them) and any risk of physical or emotional harm. A grandparent who has been meaningfully involved in a child's life before separation will overcome the first hurdle and be able to proceed with their application to connect with their grandchild.

The court process can be confrontational and daunting and comes with no guarantees of success. Information is gathered and it is not unusual for there to be several hearings. A Child Arrangements Order could range from indirect contact, or supervised contact to extensive direct time with the child.

Always bear in mind that it is the right of the child to have the contact not the right of the grandparent so best not to approach court with "I am entitled to..."



## Nero, the hand-reared Friesian gelding in training- part 2

The subject of last month's editorial was introducing this young horse and why training him is such a difficult endeavour. Being hand reared as a foal has left him in a difficult emotional place where humans are concerned. Giving him the confidence to be with us but away from us at the same time, was my main objective at first.

Leading was dangerous at first because we did not exist in his mind so running us over, barging into us, through stable doors and gateways too. He could not be separated and felt so conflicted all the time.

I have gone about training him new concepts slowly and surely, making sure all the steps were solid. Training him to lead 5ft away and training him to walk around the outside track of the menage at an ever-increasing distance from us was as important as training the three basic movement cues- walk on, whoa and step back. Each part and each success is praised and rewarding scratches given.

From the whoa and his newfound ability to step back, I taught him how to turn right away from us. All this basic start to normal training is usually fairly simple and straight forwards. For Nero, it was very difficult indeed because he had never learned any form of distance from humans in his four years of life.

Hand reared horses are notoriously quick to rage when they feel conflicted, and we have seen some instances of this from him when he felt confused. Therefore, I have been extremely careful in how I approached his training. He needed to find confidence out on his own and away from us despite being attached on a line or rope.

As he progressed, he started to wear simple tack introduced carefully and slowly. Scratches and food rewards were given to create a feeling of wellbeing. Progress quickened by my slow approach. The slower you

go, the faster you get there as they say! Nero is enjoying the training and his confidence grows each day.

By the time I introduced long reins, where the human is behind the horse, Nero was well able to follow my voice cues for the movements and the directions he knew- out there all on his own with no support from me at his head or shoulder. That was a huge step in progress for him.

We had been traffic training and leading him out through the village over all this time too. The big wide world is a scary place for young horses. Giving him confidence with the close proximity of cars, lorries, buses, tractors and motor bikes alongside the pavement users, is a really big deal and one he has coped with really very well.

Training moves on and the time for wearing a human on top arrived! Backing him was never going to be easy so we broke it down into lots of small sessions, all highly rewarded. He suddenly attacked us on his right-hand side instant rage and quite out of the blue too. And by golly he meant it too. So carefully we kept doing little bits until he no longer felt so conflicted.

Clicker training has been a very valuable tool with Nero. However, the biggest hurdle for him to overcome in the first place was learning the concept that the food comes to him, not the other way around. Hand feeding a hand reared horse is usually a massive NO! Teaching him the all-important problem-solving skills and him learning to control his hard-wired impulses, was never going to be easy.

I did it carefully, using protected contact like you would with a Gorilla or a Tiger. He eventually learned how to learn and it's now such a blessing within his training and learning history, that we can reinforce the behaviours we would like him to repeat with food.

Onwards and upwards!



#### What's that noise?

Tell, here I find myself sitting in the garden on a hot August Sunday afternoon. So why do my thoughts stretch to the cold month of November? As most of you know, my ideas come to me during an event or happening in my life and this is no exception - well in fact there's two. Firstly there is Max. Our first response is to cuddle our pets, just like we do our children when they are afraid. This works ideally for the child who understands or the baby feeling the closeness but what about a terrified animal? They do not understand as we would, so soothing them with a "There, there do not be afraid" can be translated to "Help, I need you to guard me!". By ignoring your pet and carrying on with your usual evening routine, will help instigate a calm aura around the house. If they sense you are not afraid, then they are calm.

Make sure your pet has somewhere to hide if they wish and also give access to this safe place at all times. If your pet is happy, you could play with them, ignoring all the noises but do not insist if your pet is not interested.

Never punish or over fuss with your pet when it is scared. This will only make matters worse. Closing the curtains, turning the TV/radio on will help mark and muffle the sights and sounds of the fireworks. Ideally all pets should be microchipped (or in the case of dogs, it is now the law) just in case they take fright.

Please do not forget our furry friends, ie. rabbits, guinea pigs etc. Invariably, they are usually kept outside, so move them to inside a shed/garage if possible and cover the hutch to blot out any bright lights.

Finally, in the case of walking our canine friends on this day, please be aware of the dangers of using an extending lead. ### Terrible summer, but wine crops increase

o, okay, it's been a terrible summer, but there are always upsides if you look hard enough. And so far as us wine lovers are concerned it's being reported that English growers are expecting their "highest yields to date" after a dry June was followed by plentiful rain in July, creating near perfect

July saw more than 140mm of rain fall on English soils (the sixth highest total for July since records began in 1836), though thankfully the preceding drier month meant that grapes had developed enough to withstand Storm Antoni when it blew in.

"The dry, warm June resulted in an early and strong fruit set, with plenty of good sizeable bunches," Ned Awty, interim CEO for Wine GB has said. He also confirmed that the English wine industry has the infrastructure required to cope with the greater anticipated volumes — some producers are expecting almost double the volume of grapes compared with last year.

"Since the bumper crop of 2018, and in anticipation of higher volumes from ongoing new plantings, producers have invested in their wineries so there should be plenty of tank space for harvest," he said.

One producer expecting bumper crops is Sandbridge Barton Wines, based in Devon. "We usually harvest 60 tonnes of grapes from our 25-acre site but this year the number will possibly be up to 100 tonnes," said head winemaker Duncan Schwab, who also revealed that his grapes are turning in colour almost two weeks earlier than usual

"The red Pinots are getting pigmentation in their skins and that is happening two weeks earlier than

Meanwhile, Andy Hares, vineyard manager of New Hall Vineyards in Essex, said that 2023 "has the potential to be one of the best years for the last 10 to 15 for us, both in terms of the grape quality and

However, despite the positive outlook growers can't rest on their laurels as disease pressure remains with the wet and humid weather, making good air flow through the canopy vital to prevent mildew

"The wet July has swelled bunches but also brought disease pressure so vineyards have been working hard to mitigate this," Bed Awty has said.

"How the harvest ultimately shapes up depends on the weather from here, grapes are now going through veraison (the onset of ripening) so we are entering the critical phase and hoping now for lots of sun and little rain.

In East Yorkshire, our vineyards continue to go from strength to strength. At Laurel Vines at Aike, between Beverley and Driffield, continued expansion has seen - as from April of this year - a total of 15,000 vines producing 12 different varieties, including the three Champagne Varieties, Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier. The current wine-making capacity is 30,800 litres in themperaturecontrolled stainless steel tanks and another 3,600 litres of red wines aged in French oak barrels.

Laurel Vines' Vineyard Picnics continue into September, although a quick look at the website (www. laurel-vines.co.uk) revealed most are already fully booked. There were some places still available on September 7 - but be quick! It includes a tour of the vineyard plus sandwiches, scones and a bottle of wine.

Events also take place regularly at Little Wold Vineyard at South Cave (check out www. littlewoldvineyard.co.uk), including a blind tasting of their wines, accompanied by a fish and chip supper, scheduled for October 27 and November 24. Established in 2012, Little Wold Vineyard has over 12000 vines of five different white grape varieties and two red. Winter vineyard tours also continue there in November and early December.

Westow Vineyard is based as a relatively small operation covering some eight acres in the Wolds village of Kilham and was established just over ten years ago by James and Sally Mason. They currently grow two grape varieties - Pinot Noir and Seyval but plan to incorporate other varieties going forward.

They currently produce a couple of sparklers: Erishskroy Westow English sparkling blush (Erishskroy is Yorkshire spelt backwards, of course) which is made from a combination of the Pinot Noir and Seyval, described as "a fresh flavour that reminds you of summer fruits, served chilled, the perfect way to start and finish your evening whether it be in company or just winding the day down on your own"

Erishskroy Westow's English sparkling white is made predominately from the Seyval grape. Tasting notes say "hints of lemon zest, gooseberry with the warmth of brioche" and suggest serving it alone as an aperitif or with a light salad with grilled chicken and fish. Check out www.westowvineyard.co.uk

Now, away from wine for a moment, this caught my eye: Leeds-based brewery Northern Monk has teamed up with Hull-based Aunt Bessie's to create a range of roast dinner and retro pudding beers. I kid

There will be four different beers available via Morrisons stores, including: A Roast Dinner Brown Ale, a Jam Roly Poly & Custard Pale Ale, a Sticky Toffee Pudding & Custard Porter and an Apple Crumble & Custard Pale Ale

The Roast Dinner Brown Ale has been brewed with actual Aunt Bessie's Roast Potatoes and Yorkshire Puddings in the brew while the Jam Roly Poly & Custard Pale Ale is reportedly brewed with plum, apricot and strawberry the same products that go into the original Aunt Bessie's pudding recipe.

## **Motoring - with Roy Woodcock**



# Citroen has introduced a car with an added X factor, but what is it? Roy Woodcock finds out by taking a detailed look at the new Citroen e-C4 X ...

hat does "X" signify when it comes to naming a new car these days? I only ask because I do get a little confused . . . is it a "go faster" thing? A special edition? And I've just spent a week getting to know the brand new e-C4 X from Citroen.

In the French car-maker's case I deduce X denotes a mash-up of certain mainstream styles that we've all got used to over the years; and I don't mean that in any sort of derogatory sense. Let me explain . . .

Once upon a time, its was dead easy - we all drove saloons; four doors and a boot. Then some clever designer guys decided to turn the boot opening into a door (actually a wider-opening boot lid with the rear windows attached) and the hatchback was born

Then, somewhere along the line it was discovered that we all liked to get in touch with our more adventurous side, get off the beaten track so to speak. And see a little better, too. So, the SUV was born - a car with a higher riding position and capable (in some cases allegedly capable) of being driven off-road and over rough terrain, although in reality that often meant dealing a little more comfortably with the ever-growing number of potholes on our roads!

Anyway, enough of the humour; what we have here is a designer's take on the best of all possible worlds. Take features of a hatchback, crossover/SUV and saloon and blend them into one. Hey Presto, it's the C4-X, a bigger version of Citroen's C4. But importantly there's another initial been added, the "e" which, of course means the car is all-electric and, in fact, that's the only version you can buy.

All of which seems to suggest this will be low-sales-volume niche product. But does it work? My view, if you begin from the starting point that this is a biggish saloon, raised up to give you a higher ride and with some of the more rugged design cues that you would get from an SUV, then yes it does, although I still feel the inevitable smaller boot opening may well be a turn-off for those used to the loading flexibility of a hatchback.

There is an "e" version of the standard C4 hatch and at the front end everything looks exactly the same. But looking at this X version in profile, there's a markedly different roof line and an extra 240mm in length. This accommodates a large 510-litre boot (much bigger than the 380-litres you get in the e-C4 hatch). And a small duck tail-like spoiler with distinctive LED lights designed to look like arrows pointed towards the centre of the

boot lid.

A 10-inch central infotainment screen comes with all e-C4 Xs, as does wireless 'phone charging and 'Apple CarPlay' and 'Android Auto' smartphone-mirroring connectivity. Front passengers benefit from access to Citroen's Smart Pad Support, a retractable tablet holder built directly into the dashboard, which enables the front passenger to make the most of time spent on the move. Below this is a Dashboard Tray, a large sliding drawer with a cushioned action.

With prices starting from £31,995 on the road, the car its available in three trim levels; 'Sense', 'Shine' and 'e-Series' Sense models feature 18-inch bi-tone diamond-cut alloy wheels, body-coloured bumpers and LED headlights. A 5.5-inch digital instrument cluster is complemented by the 10-inch touchscreen.

Safety is enhanced thanks to Active Safety Brake with video assist, Lane Keeping Assist, and Forward Collision Warning, alongside Citroen Connect Box Emergency & Assistance. There are rear parking sensors and Advanced Comfort Suspension for a smooth ride.

Shine models boast dark-tinted rear windows with chrome trim, navigation that includes a three-year subscription to real-time traffic and speed camera alerts. Ambient lighting enhances the interior atmosphere.

Ease-of-use is assured with a reversing camera and Automatic Intelligent Beam Headlights that automatically switch between dipped and main beam. Safety is enhanced via Active Safety Brake with video and radar assist, Speed Limit Information and Extended Traffic Sign Recognition.

Finally, ë-Series models come with new styling cues to ensure they stand out on the road. The bi-tone Perla Nera Black roof is standard on all versions, as are the distinctive 18-inch Onyx Black 'Aeroblade' wheels.

Inside, wireless smartphone charging adds to the convenience on-board. The front seats are also heated.

Out on the road, I found the car smooth to drive with decent handling and acceleration. It's available with two all-electric powertrains. Customers can choose either the 50kWh battery and 100kW (136hp) electric motor combination, which is capable of up to 223 miles between charges, or a new 54kWh and 115kW (156hp) powertrain on the top-of-the range version with up to 260 miles of range.

Three driving modes are available – Eco, Normal or Sport – activated by a mode selector on the centre console. Eco mode offers the highest levels of efficiency, Sport mode offers the highest levels of performance, while Normal mode balances the two.

As we progress in this brave new world of all-electric motoring, it seems manufacturers are covering all the bases when it comes to catering for our motoring needs. This new e-C4 X marks an entry into giving us an even wider choice.

eptember is generally a cooler month than August although if we are lucky the Summer will extend into Autumn months and of course the days are noticeably shorter. There's still plenty to do in the garden at this time of the year, if you have a fruit or vegetable patch, you'll be busy reaping the rewards of harvest. It's also time to get out and start planting spring-flowering bulbs for next year.

Make the most of the remaining warmth while you can. Plus September is the perfect time to plant shrubs and trees and treat your lawn. If you want lovely grass in the Spring now is the time to give your lawn some TLC. There is also the offering of lovely Autumn colour in your garden from Autumn bedding the smiley faces of violas and pansies are always a welcome addition. Why not refresh your hanging baskets with some ivy, grasses and cyclamen for beautiful autumnal shades.

#### Autumn lawncare

There are many treatments you can do to your grass in Autumn that will ensure it is at its best the following Spring. One or more of the tasks below might be required.

#### Scarifying

Regular raking (or scarifying as it known) keeps levels of thatch (old grass stems, dead moss and other debris) at an acceptable level. Layers of thatch greater than 1cm (3/8in) deep can impede water and fertiliser penetration.

To remove thatch, rake vigorously but carefully with a springtined rake. For larger areas powered tools are available as single units or mower attachments.

Note: Turf is damaged if scarified too deeply.

#### Aerating (spiking)

Aerating (or spiking) lawns allows better movement of air and water in the root zone. A well-aerated lawn will manage better in periods of drought or waterlogging. For an average lawn, aeration


every two to three years should be adequate. Concentrate on areas that receive the most wear and those that are compacted.

Small areas can be spiked with a garden fork, spacing holes 10-15cm (4-6in) apart and deep. On clay or waterlogged soils use a hollow-tine aerator every three to four years. This extracts plugs of soil from the lawn. After hollow-tining, sweep up the plugs and then rake a top-dressing (see below) into the holes to improve air and moisture penetration. At Coletta and Tyson we have a great heavy duty aerator.

#### Top-dressing

Top-dressing is the application of loam, sand and well-rotted organic matter to a lawn in order to correct surface irregularities and improve the texture of difficult soils. This encourages greater rooting and thickening of turf.

The top-dressing mix is three parts sandy loam, six parts sharp sand and one part compost or leaf mould.



#### **Flattening**

To correct bumps and troughs, use an edging iron or spade to slice through the turf and roll it back. Fork over the underlying ground and add or remove soil as needed. Replace the turf, pressing the edges together, and water thoroughly.


